

Few of the London cab-drivers use check-reins, knowing them to be inconsistent with proper work. It adds this information: "There is an important difference between a tight check-rein and a tightened rein, although not generally understood. The first is injurious and cannot help the horse, while the latter is often useful. Because the latter is a steady support to the animal's head from a distinct aud intelligent source—the driver—whereas the former is only the horse's head fastened to his own shoulders. That the check-rein is inconsistent with the action of the horse's head is clearly shown by the fact that, when a horse falls it is always broken." In London, Ireland, Naples, Venice, and Paris check-reins are very rarely used on draught horses, and not much, and hardly ever tight, on hack horses. The custom in its objectionableness seems to be principally confined to this ountry.



This privilege, as is well known, allows goods, produce, and all other kinds of freight to be shipped by rail, in bond, from points in the United States through Canada, and back into the United States again without detention at custom houses or the payment of duty. It also allows the same privilege in the case of goods shipped from point to point in Canada through cer-tain parts of the United States. By means of the bonding privilege millions of bushels of wheat are yearly carried by the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific railways from Minnesota and other western States through certain portions of Canada to Montreal and thence to Boston and Portland, where it is shipped to Europe.| Without the bonding privilege that wheat would be carried by the trunk lines which centre in New York, at a much higher rate of freight. The competition of the Canadian railways, therefore, gives the people of these Western States much cheaper transportation of their farm produce to the sea board, and while the action which the President contemplates would of course affect to some extent the railways interested, it would to a much greater extent affect the interest of the wheat growers of the west, in depriving them of the only competition which affords cheap transportation for their staple product. Again, it is well known that the shipping

port of the Grand Trunk railway is Portland, Maine. From that port, during the run of a year, immense quantities of both outward and inward Canadian freight are shipped, in bond. The handling of all this reight and the supplying of the steamers and ships of other kinds which come there in consequence of this traffic gives a large amount of employment and puts a large amount of money in circulation in the city of Portland. If the bonding privilege were topped, all this business would come to Halifax and St. John at the expense of Portland. So far, therefore, as the maritime

There is, however, a third feature of the case. Within the last two years the Canada Pacific Railway Company has placed on the Pacific, between Vancouver and China and Japan, three of the finest steamships afloat, -The Empress of India, Empress of China and Empress of Japan. These are ships of 6,000 tons, with engines of 10,000 horsepower, and capable of steaming nineteen knots an hour. So far superior are these to the boats running from San Francisco, that they are taking from the latter a large part of their China and Japan trade, and as a onsequence the American through lines of railway are feeling the effect. At every trip of one of these steamers there are landed at Vancouver thousands of chests of tea, bags of rice and other articles, imported by Boston and New York merchants. These are loaded into cars which are sealed by the American Consul, and forwarded to their destination by the Canadian Pacific. So large has this through traffic become, that the railway and steamship men of the United States have become, so it would appear, uneasy about the future of their interests; and it is chiefly from this source that the pressure upon the president has come. It seems peculiar, however, that these men should so easily acknowledge themselves beaten. American freight comes from the far east by the C. P. R. because that route offers cheaper and quicker transportation. New York and Boston merchants patronize that route as a simple matter of business. If the American lines can offer the same facilities at equal or less cost, they could regain the bulk of the trade already lost; and it seems strange that instead of doing this,

they should seek to cut off competition by cancelling the bonding privilege.
Still, however, it is not difficult to see which party will suffer most from the threatened action. The Canadian Pacific Railway Co. will lose some of its present through freight, and on the other hand this 14 same freight will be imported by way of San Francisco at a greatly increased rata, and at nsiderable expense of time. However, if the American merchants can stand that kind of thing we can do so equally as well.


