

Since among this under priviledged class of children there is an abnormal tendency toward truancy and delinguency because of social ostracism and a religious indifference on the part of those who might help them, t is exceedingly difficult to deal with hem in their own homes. For econo-

mic reasons it is well nigh impos sible to make more than the most seriously delinquent ones, wards of the Children's Aid Society. On the other hand it is impossible in many cases to attend to more than their most apparent physical needs such as food, shelter and clothing. If left at home their educational, moral and spiritual possibilities can never be realized under the conditions they are being reared.

The most baffling problem confronting us in this County is that of the feeble minded child and especially the feeble minded girl. Of this class there is a much larger number throughout the county than casual observers think. The number is unmistakeably increasing and consequ-


