IMPROVING THE STOCK.

NO breeder should be satisfied with the maxim, "Let well enough alone." It may be a good maxim for many things, but it should have no place among the rules of the breeder. Better poultry each year should be his aim.

But how is he to realize such an aim? This is a very practical question.

He should, in the first place, determine what he means by better poultry. This term will have different definitions, depending upon the point of view of the one defining it. It may mean to the fancier birds of a finer type or richer and more harmonious coloring, birds nearer the ideal requirements of the Standard. Or it may mean to the practical poultryman fowls which produce more eggs or which yield more and finer meat for the food consumed. Or it may mean a combination of some or all of the above characteristics.

These characteristics are to a certain extent antagonistic. The breeder for fancy points, while he may consider practical qualities, will be tempted to make them of secondary consideration or forget them altogether. If the Standard description, however, is the description which will fit the most perfect practical bird, as in certain cases I believe it will, then the fancier, though he does not give a thought to practical qualities, will, nevertheless produce them by making the Standard's ideal his own. There is a more real antagonism between great laying and great table characteristics. The type of fowl which will produce the largest number of eggs is not the type which will produce the most meat for the food consumed. If he gets an extreme development in one direction he must

expect to make a sacrifice in the other direction. Both he cannot have. It becomes necessary, then, for the breeder to decide in what direction he will secure development, in other words to define what he means by better poultry.

Having decided this preliminary point, he needs to make a thorough study of the variety of fowls which he is breeding. Mating is the crucial test of the breeder. A man who knows how to mate his fowls aright is pretty certain to become a first-class breeder. And in making his matings he should ever keep clearly in mind the purpose he desires to accomplish.

But while mating is the most important thing it is not all. Rearing exerts a decided influence upon the characteristics of a fowl. It affects not only size and weight, but color, laying and indeed all other characteristics. The breeder of Shorthorns does not rear his young stock in the same manner as the breeder of Jerseys. He knows that as beef is his object, it is not wise to adopt the milk breeders' system of rearing. Observations have shown that Jersey calves reared for show purposes, that is upon a system of feeding which would put on great flesh and bring out the nice appearance of the young, have not equaled as milkers calves of the same breed which were reared in a different manner. Neither does the wise breeder of great layers adopt the same regimen for his chickens as that employed by the rearer of the meat breeds.

When mating for a specific purpose is followed up by rearing for the same purpose, there is reason to expect a steady improvement in the quality of the stock from year to year. But when one has no well defined purpose, and mates his fowls upon no well defined plan, the chances for improvement are small. If improvement takes place, it may be in one direction one year and in another the next, and the improve-

ment of one year may defeat that of the previous year. To improve poultry one needs to have a purpose or plan which does not end with the year but reaches out into succeeding years, so that each improvement will help the next, the cumulative effect of many small improvements in the same direction producing a marked influence upon the characteristics of the flock. There is some truth in the old saying "Fools for luck," for heedless breeding may have produced excellent results, but in the long run the observation of well defined principles of breeding will beat luck hands down. Luck is a poor dependence. Rejoice when you are lucky, but for success do not depend upon a fortuitous concatenation of events, but upon a pre-arranged plan which will cause things to work together for the desired end.

INSTRUCTION IN POULTRY CULTURE IN RHODE ISLAND.

To aid in promoting the study of poultry culture a poultry plant for educational purposes has been established on the farm of the Rhode Island College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts at Kingston. The teaching of poultry culture is made a regular feature of the agricultural instruction.

The next special course of instruction in poultry culture is planned to begin on January 9, 1899, and to continue four weeks.

The College has a good force of instructors in the sciences and arts upon which poultry culture is based. Several expert poultry specialists will assist as instructors in the course.

This special short course of study will include instruction in the following topics: Poultry plants, location, planning and establishment, drainage of the land; buildings, planning and drawing of plans, making specifications and estimates, location and arrangement, construction, ventilation and furnishing, fowls, their origin, kinds and breeds, principles of breeding, mating, special breeding of waterfowl, turkeys, pigeons, etc.; incubation and rearing both natural and artificial, foods, feeding, care and management, production of eggs and flesh, caponizing, fattening, killing, dressing and marketing, diseases, business meth-

ods and management, scoring, records, accounts, etc.

Instruction will be given in zoology, anatomy and physiology sufficient for a foundation for the course. Embryology will be taught in the biological laboratory, where also the nature and habits of poultry parasites will be studied. Carpentering and the construction of poultry houses and fences will be taught by practice in the carpenter shop and poultry department. A special study will be made of the chemistry of poultry foods and the balancing of rations.

Mr. M. H. Arnold, Manager of the Poultry Plants of the College Farm and Agricultural Experiment Station, will aid and guide the pupils in their practice in the running of the incubators and brooders and in the feeding, care and management of the fowls.

During the course the forenoons will be devoted largely to lectures and class-room work; the afternoons to laboratory work and to practice in the carpenter shop, incubator-house and brooder-house and in the management, care and feeding of the fowls; the evenings to study, to meetings for discussion, etc. The Saturdays will be devoted chiefly to inspection excursions of the class to different poultry farms in New England. Special public lectures will occasionally be given. Opportunity is further offered to a limited number of students to supplement this special course of study by a year's practical training in the work of the College poultry plant.

The necessary expenses of the course to the pupils will be very moderate. The only tuition fees are in connection with the use of the carpenter shop, laboratories and incubator and brooder-houses. For the course in each of these one dollar will be charged each pupil. A few dollars will be required for the purchase of reference books, note books and class room supplies, all of which are furnished at cost by the College book store. Board at the College dining hall is \$3 per week. Lodging during the four weeks of the course can be arranged for in several of the College buildings or in the village of Kingston and the neighborhood at from fifty cents to one dollar and fifty cents per week. A special fee of five dollars will be charged pupils from outside the State of Rhode Island. Twenty-five to thirty dollars should cover the necessary expenses of a student while on the grounds. No entrance examina-

tion is required. Oral or written examinations will be given during and at the close of the course and certificates will be awarded according to merit. The College is co-educational. Application should be made promptly to ensure enrollment, as the class will be limited in number to twenty students.

Your problems are our problems and we offer our co-operation to the fullest extent possible in the solution of the perplexities of the poultry business.

TORONTO'S BIG FALL SHOW.

A RECORD BREAKER AT THE INDUSTRIAL—THREE THOUSAND BIRDS AND GRAND QUALITY.

WHERE shall we put them? was Mr. Daniels' question on the day before the show. The large building was taxed to its uttermost, every coop filled and in several cases birds had to be shown in some of the exhibitors' coops. If the entry keeps on increasing in the same ratio in which it has done the past two years further extension of the building, or else a new and modern erection will be a necessity which cannot be got over by any other means.

One or two of the western exhibitors suffered severe loss caused by the extreme heat during time of transit. Mr. Oke was the heaviest loser and Mr. McNeil also had cause to regret the demise of several birds. The time of exhibition for the poultry is altogether too long and many grumbles were heard regarding it, especially as the prize-money had been cut down. This latter we hope will be but for one year, the directors no doubt will open their hearts—and pockets—and in future add to instead of deduct from the money offered. The Industrial has been liberal in the past, and can afford to be so in the future. They get the best exhibitors have to show.

Mr. Daniels, the able Superintendent, had all ready for the birds on their arrival and no time was lost in getting them into clean coops with an ample supply of fresh water and feed in each.

Several birds were present from Manitoba but met hot company and their condition told the effect of the long rail journey. The spirit of the Prairie Province exhibitors deserves better luck, let us hope it will come "next time."

The usual amount—no more—of grumbling was heard from dissatisfied exhibitors. No man can please all, a fact often overlooked. Mr. Jarvis has kindly consented to report on his classes and Mr. Butterfield will write on the Game and Game Bantams.

VARIETY BANTAMS were out in force and were mostly good. Pens nice. Cock in first Poland a blue legged V combed, one of the coming type, but the poor fellow "winked the other eye" once too often and now has to go through life with one optic. In Japs,

first were black-tailed, second whites. First black-tailed Jap cock, the bird we noticed in Ontario report, a neat one, low on the leg with a big tail, second better comb, good tail but higher on leg. First hen, small and easily the best, badly flecked hackle. Whites, first and first a grand pair in full fit, neat all over, second cock has lost points of comb, good tail, not all moulted out yet, third rather better in color, but higher on leg and comb over at back; second hen smaller than third. White chicks a good lot, while the black-tailed were not. A neat black cockerel won first in the other color class. Polands a nice lot, we are looking for what the new Standard calls for. Sebrights a good lot—we liked first silver cock, a model in size and style and well laced. Too many are on the large size. First gold cock has the clearest tail we have seen on one of this color, small and neat, but carries a comb too high off the base. The others good. We have seen better classes of black rose-combs. We liked first cock, who carries a grand full tail, good lobes and color. The winning chicks were neat. Buff Cochins do not show any improvement and we let them down easy in saying this. First and second cocks are more like the color now asked for. First hen: best and most typical Cochin in the lot. Old blacks good, especially first hen. Whites not as good as last year, especially the juveniles. A.O.V went to the best lot of white rose-combs we have seen for years.

BRAHMAS--The darks made small classes, but quality was high. First light cock beats second in soundness of tail, but has a coarse comb; third fails in color; an unnoticed one (Sceker) about as good as any but brassy on top. First hen beautifully shown, neat headpiece, good color and legs, second larger and a good one all over. First and second pullets a neat couple, best of the young lot.

COCHINS--Partridge did not make a large lot, we liked shape and pencilling of first hen. Whites were really good all through. We fell in love with first and second pullets, a shapely pair of fine color and style. Blacks small classes but good. First buff cock, a large good colored bird, profuse in feather, low set, comb too big, second does not carry so much feather, higher up, neater comb. First hen nice shape, good legs, good color but quite mealy enough on top,

second larger, good in cushion, well feathered legs, tail not all in; third fair. First cockerel mature, nice color, good legs and feet, second a bit higher up and not quite so good in tail; third immature. First pullet fluffy, high enough in color, good legs and feet, second excels in cushion, third neat.

LANGSHANS—Whites small class and but fair in quality, a long way off the blacks. First black cock a big bird of good color, though he shows some purple tinge in tail, second not through moult yet, grand color on back, wings and breast; third full in tail, well shown. First hen a good one, fine color all over; second not quite so good in shape, grand color all over; third not yet fit. First and first youngsters a good pair, grand color, liked shape of pullet; second cockerel younger, higher up, second pullet neat. We liked shape of cock in first pen, good green lustrous color, broad in front, well shown.

JAVAS—A nice lot, some good mottles in A.O.C. class.

WYANDOTTES—Old blacks small classes but show a good deal of improvement. First cock a large, good colored bird, big comb well set on, lots of work in it; second also good, not as large, smaller comb and smoother on top. Hens and chicks good. Buffs not large classes but show improvement in the last three years. First cock a large fellow of even color, good buff tail, well set on comb and splendid yellow legs; second and third fair. First hen very even all over, including tail, good legs; second fair, but for her pale legs we liked third better, fairly even in color and farther through moult. First cockerel needs age to fill out, he is even in color with the best of legs and feet and a neat head piece. We greatly liked the first pullet, sound and even in color, good legs, comb too smooth on top. Others good. Whites a grand lot, first cock a large blocky bird pure in color, good stout legs, neat head; second as yet hardly as white, but a very good one, as is third. First hen a big blocky bird, in fine trim, second close up; third not so well shown. Young were good all through. A pullet of Massie's unfortunately overlooked in the judging would have been in it. Silvers but fair classes. We liked first hen, a nice even laced one, as were the two best pullets. In the golds the three winning pullets stood out, nicely laced and good all over.

ANDALUSIANS—Good, nearly all going to one exhibitor.

RED CAPS a tremendous class, seem to grow in favor. Winners all good and lots that could not win.

SULTANS—A small lot, old birds good.

SILKIES a big lot and quality very even.

ORPINGTONS good. A large hardy bird on the Plymouth Rock build. A nice lot of blacks, good in shape, size and color.

SPANISH fair, as were DOMINIQUES, but few of the latter.

Several incubators were on view, including the Meyer, Toronto and Cyphers. Mr. Daniels on his stand showed the best stoneware chick fountain, in two pieces, we have seen, handy grit boxes, bone mills, grit and meals of all kinds, etc.

Mr. Jarvis brought down a most attractive exhibit from the Government Experimental Farm at Guelph and the birds were shown in most excellent coops. The quality was high and we noticed sold cards on several pens.

BLACK RED GAMES—First cock much the best bird in class, both in color and symmetry, and if he would only stand a little straighter on his legs in a show pen would be a very hard bird to beat. I had him taken out of the show coop and placed on the floor, and he showed himself immensely, but when put back in the coop he seemed to have a tired feeling. I noticed him when I was in England and he had the same faulty way of standing in a show coop. Second cock a grand bodied bird, but has not got the grand lemon hackle and saddle of first prize cock, but stands better on his legs than first cock. Third shorter in head and broader in tail feather, a nice colored neck and saddle, but too broad and loose in feather. First hen a nice neat one but not large enough to beat all comers; second hen much after the fashion of first but a shade smaller; third hen much larger but on the coarse side, lacks quality. First cockerel was a little seedy, may have been partly owing to the hot day, but he certainly carries a grand tail and a long clean neck, very fair in color, and will when well make quite a show bird; second on the small bone order but he was in good show shape so far as health and feather was concerned,

but he will be too small in size for first-class company in the winter show ; third has a grand neck and tail, but too full of brown chicken feathers, but if all goes well with him he will stand amongst the winners later on. First pullet an immense good one and every part of her was of an extraordinary grand order ; second prize pullet, larger, but lacked the grand shoulders and prominence of wing butts and not so good in color of wing, and broader in tail feathers; third, about same description would do for her as second pullet. Brown Reds—Cocks and hens were a fair good lot, but sadly want new feathers. Duckwings—First cock a real grand styled bird but lacks in size, what there is of him is very proportionate ; balance of class all wanted their plumage renewing, especially so in females. Pyles made a strong class and we noticed a great many of them sadly off in leg color, and I am sure all breeders must agree with me that the yellow leg on Pyles is a much desired acquisition. Indian Games not as strong as usual, but first cock and hen are very good birds. Cockerels and pullets were really fine specimens, as far as they had gone on the road to maturity.

GAME BANTAMS—If any of the directors were to judge them once I feel sure they would soon suggest an improvement in re-arranging the coops—the bottom tier is so low down that it is almost an impossibility to get the carriage and symmetry of the birds, and as more dependence is attached to Game and Game Bantams than any other breed of fowls, it should be remedied, for when any judge can hardly satisfy himself how can exhibitors be satisfied, and hence when I meet the same birds under more favorable circumstances of cooping, I see the birds in much better positions, and even if the birds did not change in health they certainly change a great deal in appearances, and I will write Mr. Hill and see if he can get the lower tier elevated about twelve or fifteen inches, for I like to feel, when judging is done, that the awards are pretty correctly placed. I think all exhibitors would be glad to see the change made, and I have no doubt all exhibitors agree that Toronto fall show is the feeler just as the Dairy Show in England is the feeler for the Crystal Palace and Birmingham, England's greatest shows, and when Toronto show can draw over 2,900 birds I am only fairly expressing that there should be nothing lacking in arrangements

to mar the prestige which Toronto show has fairly won, and as for criticising the Bantams it is almost out of the question to do it as I would wish to, for I always feel annoyed when I cannot do the work to my own satisfaction, and in those coops it is impossible.

THE WESTERN FAIR, LONDON.

A FALLING OFF IN THE ENTRY BUT QUALITY HIGH—
AN INCREASE IN THE AMOUNT OF PRIZE-
MONEY SAID TO BE NECESSARY.

WE saw at London this year what we do not recollect seeing there before and that is a number of empty coops. How to account for this state of affairs is a puzzle as the pretty western city is the centre of an immense poultry section. The only reason we can assign is that the amount of money offered, \$1.25 for first and 75c. for second, is not sufficient to induce breeders to bring out their best birds, and this is a necessity at London. This was freely commented on and there are now so many fairs, held on about the same dates, even what are considered the smaller fixtures, that are making a specialty of the poultry section, recognizing it as a most popular feature, that to keep in the front rank it is really necessary to offer sufficient money to at least show a reasonable chance of paying expenses and a little over.

This is written in the most kindly spirit and not for any purpose of fault finding. We feel positive that no list of less than two dollars for first and one dollar second prize will draw an entry in proportion to the magnitude of the poultry industry or in comparison with other departments of our leading fairs.

What was lacking in quantity was in most cases made up in quality, though even here all was not as it should be. The building was neatly decorated, the birds well attended to and Superintendent Saunders did not fail to look after the creature comfort of exhibitors.

While in London we paid a visit to Mr. Richard Oke's nice place, where we found several additions in the way of new buildings, new at least to us, and from the great number of chicks running around Mr. Oke has nothing to complain of the past season in either

quantity or quality. His Hamburgs and Sebright Bantams are particularly good.

Mr. McNeil, we are glad to learn, was right on top, and Mr. Millard, Mr. Bogue, Wray Bros., Mr. Kettlewell and others had also had a good breeding season.

LIGHT BRAHMAS were few and but moderate, while the darks were good, though not at all large classes. We liked first cockerel, in fact all were good.

BUFF COCHINS fair classes, not up to London's usual prominence. We liked shape and style of first hen; first pullet is quite high enough in color. Whites an unusually good lot. Blacks good, first and second pullets extra. In partridge the first hen stood out, carries lots of cushion and leg feather and is nicely pencilled.

GAME about as at Toronto, a good lot, especially black-reds, in which there was some discussion in awards on cockerels. Some thought third should win, in style he is nice but we think his principal faults lie in lack of substance in body and a too highly carried tail. Indian Game good, first cock a hard metallic feathered, big-bodied bird with stout shanks and good color. First and first chicks a really nice pair.

LANGSHANS—First cock the Toronto winner looking very fit, second a narrower bird and shows more daylight under him. An unnoticed one (Scott) of different type, upstanding, ragged, grand color and carries a full tail. Hens good and chicks extra.

WHITE WYANDOTTES good all through. Liked first cock and first pullet, good clear color; first cockerel a nice bright yellow legged bird with neat fitting comb. Blacks small classes but good. But one buff a decent cock. Golds and silvers few but fair. Nice open laced pullets won in both sections.

SPANISH—Large classes, quality fair. First cock big, good quality of face but could do with more of it. First cockerel well grown and promising.

BLACK MINORCAS—A failure in numbers, easily out-classed by the whites, in which the first cock is a very nice bird of fair size, comb carried a bit too high off neck. First and second hens good and of nice size, cockerels all young yet, first rather yellow on top but promises to be large.

RED CAPS—Good classes in both numbers and quality. DOMINIQUEs fair.

HAMBURGS AND POLANDS were all that could be desired. Quality is always high here.

HOUDANS few but good, as were the other French classes and the JAVAS.

WHITE PLYMOUTH ROCKS extra classes First cock a blocky bird of good color, fine pair of shanks. First hen a big one still too brassy in color, good legs, neat head piece; second not as large, paler in legs. Chicks good, first and second pullets nice, good legs but a bit creamy in color. Barred Rocks were large classes and good stuff. First cock a large bird standing on good shanks, neat head and well barred; second also good. First hen of good size and well barred all over, nice bright legs for a hen, second fails to her in size, color and legs, but still a real good one and lots of other good ones left. First pullet good shape, heavy barring, good legs a bit dark in front, second of same type and others good. Cockerels good. In buff Rocks first cock is a large fellow, high in color; first and second hens a nice pair, even all over; winning chicks really good, third pullet is large, even color, but dead; we liked light but sound color of second cockerel, grand legs, has not the age of first; third, large, bright color, comb cut at back.

WHITE LEGHORNS fair, we have seen much better classes here. Blacks, large classes and good. Browns fairly large classes and good birds. First cock an excellent one all over. Buffs good. First and second pullets both even in color, first wins on size. First cockerel large. In hens we preferred second, she was in better fit and is even in color. The rose-combs made nice classes. Second white pullet and third cockerel have grand colored legs but are too creamy in plumage.

SILKIES and SULTANS good and PHEASANTS made a grand display of many varieties.

BANTAMS in the variety classes were a grand lot. Game fair. Sebrights good in both colors. Japs about as at Toronto, except that the winning black tail chicks, a grand pair, were ahead of anything there. Rose-combs nice, buff Cochins fair, whites and blacks good, Polish fair.

TURKEYS, DUCKS and GESE were about as usual.

WHAT THE JUDGE SAYS ABOUT SHERBROOKE, LONDON AND OTTAWA.

We left Toronto on Monday, Sept. 5th, and journeyed to Sherbrooke and found there quite a surprise, a large new poultry house with good accommodation for 1,500 birds, and the house was full to the doors at each end—a new house, new coops, and everything kept scrupulously clean with lots of light and a really good ventilator which kept the place just as sweet as if no fowls were there. Last year when we were there the poultry exhibit had to occupy the old poultry house, which was only a few years old, but it only held say 600 to 700 birds, and they had to get a tent to hold about 500 birds, so apparently without saying much about building they erected the new house to hold 1,500, and to all appearances they will have to add on one third more of length, to hold the necessary exhibits for it was full enough, without one spare coop in the building. Great credit is due the Superintendent who has worked up this department, for he surely has the confidence of every exhibitor, and I heard several of them speak in unstinted praise of the thorough gentlemanly way he has of trying to make the birds as well as their owners all feel comfortable, and surely the entries have grown in three short years from 600 to 1,500, which speaks volumes for the Sherbrooke show, for its Manager and Superintendent of this department. At the many shows I attend I find few to equal this show, for everything is done on business principles, and with a good premium list and the best of care and attendance, many send their birds who cannot attend personally, and I am sure it must surprise them to find their birds return home in such grand condition, and no wonder at the increase of the exhibits year after year, and I feel sure in saying that in a very few years it will meet the most sanguine expectations of any enthusiast. Enclosed please find the classes and the respective number of competitors.

Our next show was London, right in the heart of poultry breeders, and what can be the matter when we found just about one half the number of exhibits that were at Sherbrooke. The premium list must make a wonderful difference in the number of exhibitors, for Sherbrooke list was first \$1.50, second \$1, third 50c., London first \$1.25, second \$1 and no third.

We then went to Ottawa, found premium list same

as Sherbrooke and nearly 1,500 birds here in competition. This seems to warrant the conclusion that where there is a good premium list it will help to get the entries and make the poultry exhibit a great factor at any show, and if the managers of our fall shows could have some way of registering the people who pass through the several departments, I have no doubt the poultry register would show a higher number of visitors than pass through any other department, indicating that poultry and pets are appreciated.

I find the exhibits have now got to be very much alike, for you will find just as good birds shown at Sherbrooke as you find at Toronto, London or Ottawa, and take the white Rock classes at Sherbrooke, 45 birds in competition, in barred Rocks 47, Minorcas 45, and several other classes 30 to 40. OTTAWA'S FIFTEEN HUNDRED BIRD SHOW.

EVERY COOP FILLED.

ABOUT 1,500 birds were congregated at Ottawa this year, the largest entry they have yet had at the Capital. An addition has been made to the poultry building for the Bantam and Pigeon entry. I am pleased to say that another old landmark was done away with in the rail that went round the building next the coops.

The Superintendent had the old trouble to contend with caused by the taking of entries up to a late date, which upsets the cooping plan. However, he did the very best under the circumstances, and there were but few changes that I could suggest for the better. These no doubt will be looked after next year. The prize list also wants overhauling in many sections. Take Cochins, for instance, where there is a class for partridge and but one other class for all the solid

colors. It is not fair to ask buffs, whites and blacks to compete in one class. There were quite a number of exhibitors from the west that had not previously shown at Ottawa, including Messrs. Barber, Essex, Dewey, Bedford, Blain and Mrs. Shales, Toronto, Millard & Stewart, London, Beckworth, Blenheim, and others.

DARK BRAHMAS—Good, equal to Toronto, while the lights were fair but in poor feather. In partridge Cochins, first cock and hen a grand pair, in good show shape. Balance of class fair.

WYANDOTTES—Silvers the poorest lot ever shown in Ottawa. Whites, first cock grand shaped bird, poor in feather, first hen extra. Young golds grand, better than at Toronto.

GAME—A grand collection, better on the whole, I think, than at Toronto, and the same may be said of the Game Bantams.

MINORCAS large classes and winners of good quality.

BARRED ROCKS fine, no less than nineteen cockerels and nineteen pullets

LEGHORNS were also big classes filled with fine birds. Other varieties were well up.

Entries in Turkeys, Ducks and Geese were small. We much missed our old friend Thompson of Allan's Corners. Report has it that he is looking for a wife and could not come.

POULTRY ASSOCIATION OF ONTARIO.

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—SIX POULTRY JUDGES FOR NEXT SHOW—A SPECIAL GRANT ASKED FOR TO WELCOME THE AMERICAN POULTRY ASSOCIATION.

THE regular annual meeting of the directors of the Poultry Association of Ontario was held in the board room of the Industrial Exhibition Association, Toronto, on the afternoon of September 8th. Those present were Dr. A. W. Bell, Chairman; R. Oke, Acting Secretary; D. C. Trew, C. Bonnick, W. McNeil, A. Bogue, T. Brown, T. J. Senior, W. J. Bell, F. R. Webber and T. H. Scott. Mr. C. C. James, Deputy Minister of Agriculture for the Province appeared on invitation to hear what the

Association had to say as to the need of a supplementary grant.

After the Chairman's prefatory remarks Mr. Bonnick was asked to lay before Mr. James the desires of the Board as to the entertainment of the members of the American Poultry Association, a trip to the Agricultural Farm at Guelph being included in the program. Considerable expense would also have to be met in the supply of extra coops, etc. After asking several questions, the Deputy Minister expressed himself as being quite satisfied with the explanation made and would report favorably to the Hon. Mr. Dryden. The sum asked for—in addition to the regular grant—was three hundred dollars. Mr. James expressed his great pleasure at seeing such a grand display of birds and said in no department has such advance been made in the past four years as in poultry culture. His advice was never to lose sight of the practical side of poultry raising, especially that of artificial incubation. Mr. James' remarks were received with the applause they merited and a hearty vote of thanks was extended for his presence and for the interest he had displayed in the Association's work.

A statement of Dr. Bell's is worth placing on record and that is that the poultry department of the Industrial returns more in entry fees for the money received than does any other department of the exhibition. This coming from the Assistant-Manager of the Exhibition should be remembered when the revision of the prize list occurs.

Mr. I. B. Johnson appeared on behalf of the Homeing pigeon breeders and asked for representation on the prize list.

A letter of invitation from the Peterboro Association asking for the show of 1900 was read by the delegate, Mr. Rightmeyer, who supplemented it with promise of a right hearty welcome.

Mr. A. G. Gilbert gave the results of his experience with fifty hens as showing a profit of two dollars each. He is now conducting a series of experiments to show the difference in profits between old and young stock. Mr. Gilbert's remarks were warmly applauded.

Entries for next show will close on January 2nd and no birds will be received after 10 a.m. Tuesday, at which hour the judges will begin work.

The providing of sections for Canaries, Pheasants and Homing Pigeons was left in the hands of the President and Mr. Bonnick for future action.

The judges selected with the classes they are to judge are as follows.

I. K. FELCH—Light and dark Brahmas, Langshans, Plymouth Rocks and Leghorns.

F. B. ZIMMER—Game, French classes, Sultans, Orpingtons, any other variety and cross breeds.

J. H. DREVENSTEDT—Wyandottes and Turkeys.

S. BUTTERFIELD—Cochins and all Bantams.

L. G. JARVIS—Dorkings, Polands, Geese and Ducks.

T. H. SMELT—Dominiques, Javas, Spanish, Minorcas, Hamburgs and Red Caps.

I. B. JOHNSON—Pigeons and Pet Stock.

For conducting the show Toronto is to be allowed the usual one hundred dollars and gate receipts. In addition to this fifty per cent of all entry fees in excess of the total number received at last show will go to the local association.

Mr. C. J. Daniels was appointed Superintendent and Mr. Chas. Grimsly Assistant Superintendent. In their hands exhibitors may with confidence entrust their most valued stock.

EASTERN ONTARIO POULTRY ASSOCIATION.

THE meeting was held on the Thursday evening of the Ottawa show. The minutes of last meeting were read by the Secretary and adopted. The auditor's report was adopted as read.

Browne, Brockville; Blake, Almonte; Neilson, Brockville; Reid, Kingston; Gill, James, Auclair, McKinstry and Taggart, Ottawa. Auditor, A. P. Mutchmor. Dele-

gates to Central Canada Exhibition, Messrs. Higman and Gisborne. Patrons, His Excellency the Governor-General; Hon. Sidney Fisher, Minister of Agriculture; J. F. Wood, M. P., Manuel Roche, Esq., Mayor of Brockville, and Messrs. Lumsden, Powell, Hutchinson, Bellcourt and Ashworth.

The Executive were empowered to appoint a judge and fix dates for show.

Moved by Mr. Higman, seconded by Mr. James, that show of 1901 be held at Ottawa.

At the subsequent meeting of the Executive, Mr. Butterfield was appointed to judge all classes.

POULTRY-FATTENING STATIONS.

A DESPATCH to the "Globe" says that "The Department of Agriculture is making arrangements to open a number of poultry-fattening stations. At present these establishments will be limited to Ontario and Quebec, but as yet the exact locations have not been decided upon. A change is coming over the taste of the consumers of food products in Great Britain, which seems to be in the direction of consuming larger quantities of hams and bacon served with cold chicken. While in Great Britain Prof. Robertson found that a large part of three counties during recent years had become really a poultry farm. The difference between the poultry business as carried on there and in Canada is that in Canada chickens have been killed as they run while still in a lean condition. This is practically the same as if farmers were to kill cattle while they were still in the condition of stockers instead of keeping them until they had become fattened. The question has often been asked: Would Canadian consumers pay the high price that would be required for fattened poultry? It seems capable of an affirmative answer. And the argument as presented by Prof. Robertson is something like this: A housekeeper buys a pair of chickens for forty cents, of which there would not probably be more than two pounds of edible portion. If these chickens were fattened for a month and made to gain two and a half pounds each, the housekeeper would get instead of two pounds of edible meat in a pair of chickens at least six pounds at the same rate per pound. If these fattened chickens were paid for at the same rate per pound of edible meat as the others, that would make their cost \$1.20. This would be cheaper eating, and the quality of the meat would be much better than if lean chickens were bought at 40 cents a pair." This may be all very well and is doubtless a step forward, though the increase in weight is exaggerated. First get the farmer to breed pure breds, then put on the extra weight.

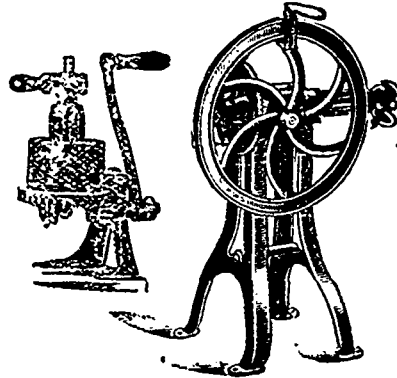

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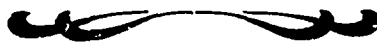
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
