## RELICIOUS BOOKS.

ALTHOUGH Canada very liberally upports several large bookselling houses, dealing almost exclusively in books religious or of a religious tenden' $y$, there does not appear to be the active interest taken by the retail trade xenerally in publications of this character, and too frequently we find the most unattractive portion of a book-ellers' store devoted to the stock of this nature, and only ar indolent interest betrayed in its behalf. We find various, yet not insurmountable, objections urged against a cultivation of such a class of business. and the most common one, that of nece-sary discounts, seems to be the great bugbear. In what other lines of lookselling are discounts not necessary? list prices on any save net books are to-day scarcely ever obtained, and yet these same reasons are not employed by the dealer when discussing other lines of bookselling.

If the trade in religious books has been driven to the book centres, it is largely an outcome of the lack of carefill interest and cultivation on the part of the local bookselier. Right here comes the solution in part of the Sunday school library difficulty. The church irade properly cultivated will run through local trade channels much more reacily than any other class if the dealer aims to supply the various kinds promptly and correctly, and the difference between trade and retail discounts is sutijciently
large to admit of a very profitable class of business being obtained and matntained. As a natural consequence, those buyers are almost invariably the ones chosell by a srhool to select reading watter for the scholars. And what more natural than that they should seek the snurce of supply where their individual requirements have been most satisfactorily met. A large stock is not necessary, and the publishing house will not be slow to recognize and support any member of the trade who seeks to build up and localize this, the best class of bookselling.

It is beyond a doubt that Canada offers a markel unsurpassed by any other country, population considered, for the sale of a highly moral and religious rlass of literature, and the dealer who by his efforts succeeds in building up such a trade has the double satisfaction of having a profitable, prompt paying class of customers, and of circulating literature calculated to build up the community.

Further, in no line of thought are new books more anxiously sought or more eagerly purchased than in those devotional and religious, and from a casual dropper-in the dealer will find those in every community who will become regular customers.

If, then, in seeking new avenues for enet $k y$ the bookseller will give a careful consideration to the religious book trade, he will, we safely venture, not find that energy misplaced.

## EATON'S EOOK DEMARTMENT.

IN Toronto there is a bix diy goods store owned by The T. Eaton Co., l.di., and this dry goods store possesses a look counter which does a rattling big business. The books sold are of the cheap varicty, because most of the people who buy do so according to price, not according to the merit of the book. Still they have some purchas. ers who are very discerning.
For example: l.ast Friday, this sreat company advertised " Ships That l'ass in the Night," at five cents. Well, the wholesale price in the city varies from twelve to fifteen cents, and of course there was moncy in them for somebody at five cents. A bright young man saw the advertisement and he went up and prced up the entire stock ten copies-and paid his fifty cents Ithen took them away and sold them at lifteen cents each.

Some more examples: Xearly every small bookseller in Toronto goes regularly 10 E,a'on's and buys his stoek, whenever he call buy it at less than wholesale. If he is asked the regular who esale price, he prefers to place his order with the regular wholesaler, but he buys with avidity whenever Eaton's prices are below cost.

The Eaton Co, ate supposed to sell below cost for advertisement purposes; yet about two-thirds ef thestnck sold at shis price goes
info the hands of the other booksellers, and hence The Finton ('o. pay for adiertising: which they never get.

This is an example of intensely stack bus. ness methouls. It is also atn exauple of the fact that latie stores, like corporations, have no souls; and puisue it course of unrelenting and selfish cutting which in disastrous to established irale. The slack business methods ate not ineviable, but they are very likely to exist in a very large busines. This incliscriminate cultung is a feature whuch is also not inevitable. and which has really no part in the methods of conducting a large retail store of the kind managed by the ' l '. Fiaton Co., loronto
Noone objects to the lirge houses selling at close margins, but when they have a small stock of a book which is much in de. mand, and they cut the price down below cost, clean out the $r$ stock amd get in no more (they sold "Heavenly "I'wins" at $23 .$. ), they are simply doing something which injures legitimate trade and does themselves no good.

The part that the departmental store will play in the future is an economic question, too vague and toolarge forpresent di cussion.

Still the bank reports which have lreen pabli,hed during June show that nearly all the banks have done an imereased busines, for the twelve inonths ending June ist, 1 Sift, and have made a good $p$ otit. Wost of then have also increatied their reserve funds, and hence a bank paric is unlikely yea, inposable.

## POSTMASTERS NOT TO RETURN UNOELIVERED CIRCULARS.

There is a prost oflic e exulation which per. mus basmews men and others so pur on their encelopes a printed ieg:ent to pormastets to return withuso many days if not detwered or caled for lansegulation was ongually intended to apply to letters onl), but the fost (Ofice llepartinent for many years has been quict lenient in this respert and re.
turned all such correspondence to the address given whether it was on a sealed envelope, circular or sample package. The large amount of matter that it has recently been necessary to handle in this way was recently broughe to the attention of the l'ost Office Department at Ottawa, and it was decided to enforce the regulations. l'ostmasters throughout Canada are now required to refuse to forward all articles other than letters posted bearing the request to return if not called for. If business men insist upon sending them through the mails the authorities will forward them to the Dead l.etter Office and an exta charge will be made for their relurn. It is very necessary therefore that business men eierywhere should observe this regulation, otherwise their matter will go to the Dead l.e ter Office. Letters of course will be forwarded as usual.

FROM AN EDINEUNOH PRISS.

S(IMF: of the best books on Canadian looksellers' shelves are from the press of Oliphant. Anderson \& Ferrier, Fidinhurgh. This firm's imprint stamps a book as being worthy of attention, and as being possensed of greater or less inerit.
"Contidential 'r,ilks with Young Men," is the tule of a great book by L.sman 13. Sperry, II.I., an imerican. It presents certain knowledge in a form calculated to keep dowin their purence and to call out! reserence
The "Second Series" of Alexander Whyte's Bunyan characters has been issued, and judging fiem the success of the first volume, the se ond should do well. Ignorance, Little-faith, Atheist, Hope'ul, old Honest, and Christian are a few of the characters described; while the brok closes with three descriptions: 1. The Enchanted Ground; 2. The l.and of lieulah; and 3. The Swelling of Jordan.
"Pleasant Places, or Words to the Young," by K . S Juff, is a splendid book for children. It is published uniform with " (iolden Nauls." The book is a collection suitable for sirls and boys, and three of these adderses are on Tasmania.
"A l'enny Catechism of the Sacraments," by the Rev. Alexinder Miller, has passed into its third edition.
"the Silver llulle'," by P. Hay Hun er, and " The Curse That (ame Home," by Jessic $K$ l.awson, are two excellent books, which will be found reviewed elsewhere in this issue.
" Her Day of Service" is an excellent book, by Edward Ciarrelt. Speaking of this auhors "At Any Cost," the Cireenock Telegram sa)s "There is a peculiar ongenalty and force in everything that proceeds from the pell of lisisified witer: but in the presem work she reaches an unusu, lly high standard of excellence. Edward liarrelt is a great preacher, with more sound doxtrine in her novelties than is to be found in a good many sermons of the regulation pattern."

## THE MEAVENLY TWINES

SARAH (;RANI)'S latest bonk. "The Heavenly "Twins," has scored an enormous surcess. In its cloth ectition it had a big sale, and now that the Cinsell I'ub. Company have issued a paper edition at 50 cents. the sale has increased in this country and over 2,000 copies have already been sold.

The book itself contains a great deal of matter, much of it beng very tase reading - for a man. The author tries to impress one with the idea that man is a brute in 50 far as regards his treatment of women. 'lhis may be so, yet neither the "brute" nor the "truted" are gaing to believe. For this reason the bnok seems like the vaporings of an educated and branny crank the one-idea ctank - rather than the delicate and precise statement of a case by a broad-minded student of human affairs. Of Evadine's father she says: " He was one of those men who believe emphatically that a woman should hold no opinion which is not of mas. ruline origin." Again, she makes him say: "Only confusion cemes of women thinking for themselves on social subjects; you inust let me decide all such matters for you, or you must refer them to your husbind when you come under his control." (eertainly such language from a man is offensive ; but only one man in a thousand would utter such sentiment, and that one doesn't live on this side of the Atlantic. What may be true of one man should not be set down as true of the whole male race This is where Madanie Grand is unfair.

Evadne is a queer character, but intensely interesting-being a pretty maiden, as well as intelligent. The "twins" were heavenly because they came to an oid couple late in life, and have queer ideas and actions which could only be--to the family and relations heavenly. The sitle of the book should have been "Evadne," because she is the leading character, and because around her centres most of the interest of the story.

## THE EELMORE AND ILLUSTRATED SERIES.

I$F$ there are two series more important than the rest of those published by Lovell, Coryell \& Co., they are the Belmore and the lllustrated. Inoth contain the works of such authors as J. M. Barrie. A. Conan Doyle. Marie Corelli, Robt. Buchanan, W. Clark Kussell, etc. Both are paper covered series to retail at $; 0$ cents.

To the ll'ustrated Series, each volume of which is beautifully illustrated, some excelIent tities have recently been added. "The l.ast Sentence," by Maxwell Ciray, author of "The Silence of I)ean Maıtland," is still a comparatively new book, and as descrip. tion of what may result froin a concealed marriage, it is powerful aud enthralling. "In and Clut of Threc Normands Inns," by

Anna lowiman Dodd, author of "Cathedral liass," $^{\prime \prime}$ is a gallery of pastels in prose, writtell as by one under a spell of fascimation. l'p to the present time it has been securable only in cloth edition.
"The Truth About lScalty," by Annie Wolf, is a wholesome and sane book on the acquitement and preservation of beaty. "Woman Through a Man's E.scglass" is a bripht book on the deliriously interesting topic of woman and lier foibles. A clever and amusing book, full of witticisms and bright things, is "The Iliary of a Noboly," by Cieorge (inossmith Among others in this series are "rwo of Them" and " The little Minister," by J. M. Marrie, and "The White Company," by .I. Conan loyle.
The lielmore Series, with ths chaste covers and heavy piper, is a favorite. Among the recent issties in it are "The Cuckoo in the Nest," by Mrs. Oliphant : "Found Cinilty.' by Frank Iharrett, and "The Countess Kadna," by II. L:. Norrs. These three lrooks have been extremely nood sellers, a Canaditlt edition of the latier hasing been is. sued. Six of Maric Corellis books are issued in this series, five by J It lbarrie, and live by $\boldsymbol{A}$. Conan lloyle.

Both these series are handled in Canada by the joblers, but L.ovell, Coryell $\mathbb{S}$ Co.'s travelers also call on the leading retailers in the cities. This company also publish other series, and a variety of cloth books too large to enumernte.

## LAIPD LEE'S NEW BOOKS.

LAlRI) \& L.EE have added some new books to their library of choice fiction which are worth noting.
"Six lears in Heaven" is the taking tile of a queer book. In lllinois state lises a man named lienrge Jacol Schu einfurth, who professes to the the new Messiah, and who has sathered around him a believing colony. This book exposes the infamy of the institl. ton and vividly portrays the shrewdness, cupidty. hyperrisy; and heariless selfishness which charditerizes this professed Messiah. The author has woven the weft of fact and the warp of fiction into a tale fraught wath alluring interest for the casual reader and platosopher alike.
"The I luke of Arcanum," by Frank arleton l.ong, is an interesting tale, and intended to show the great social value of charity. The teaching of the book is beyond reproarb, alhough it is kept behind the events of the story. Edgrumb was not one of that numer ous cl ss who. being blesscd will a super. abundance of wealth, seek to leave some colossal monument to their bones by the endowment of sonte notable enterprise, bun he believed in extending a helping: hand to those oppressed by misfortune and the bitter athictions of a dire and re'eniless poverty.

Other new books in this series are "The l.ords of Misrule," by l'omeroy, and "The Tower of l'ercemont," by licorges Siand.

Six sitles by Opre Ried are also inchuded, as well as Steal's famous crillersm of Chirago.
in $2 ;$ cent book, Lard if I.ee V lastime Secies stands bigh. "The speaker of the House," by Anseline Teal, is just to hand It is an exquisite love tale, with a handsome man as a hero. Not only is he striking, but he holds the importane position of speaker of a state l.espinature, and as such is a social hon. The female characters of the brok are delicately and pleasingly drawn. "The (iirl from Macoupin," by II. E Scoll, is athother Western tike beginning with the morgaging of the farm and the farmer's son striking off to the city to taise the mones to lift the mortgage His failures on account of his vertant freshness, the bright smiles and winning sraces of the young lady who figures so prominently in the story, the charming descriptions of some of the dramatic events of every-day lie all make the book attractise. Its numerous illustrations also help. "The P'erkins' l'eril" is another excellent tale, and has been reviewed in these columns before. Some of 'Thomes' and l.ynelis looks have recently added greatly to the value of a series which now includes over a hundred titles.

## MONTREAL'S FIRST PRINTED BOOK.

Audet, keeper of the records, Depart. ment of sitate, is proud of owning a copy of the first book printed in Montreal. "Ihis work," says the (itizen, "is a small volume printed by 1 . Mesplet and C. Merber, and bears the ulle. 'Reglement de la Confrerie de I.Adoration l'erpetuelle du S. Sacrement ei de la Bonne Mort. Erigee dans L. Eglise Jaroissiale de lille Mario, en litsle de Montreal, en Canada. Nouvelle edition, revue, corrigee et augmentec.' We were privileged in being allowed to examine this arciorological curiosity yesterday, and find the book in typographical execution and seneral workmanahip excellent and such as would do credit to many of the best printing establishments of the present day, with all our boasted mprovement. Fleury Mesplef, one of the printers of the book, was a Frenchman by birth, who came to Montreal from l'hiladelphin, and in $1,-8$ commenced the publication of the ciarctie L.tteratre, the precursor of our respected contrmporary the Montreal Giactie, now one of the most intluential of commernial and political jaur nals." . The story is intensely in. tetesting, ionstantly gaining as new charac. ters and freah incidents are intruduced in the working out of the plot. l.awrence 1. l.jn'li has witten many allusing and thrilling tales. including " Shadoved by Three." "A lead Man's Sep," etc. This new book is somewhat more sentumental, but is nevertheless in the same second grade of literature. The book has little merit, but still it will be popular with the readers of cheap literature.

trations give an accurate idea of the picturesqueness of that part of France known as Normandy. This idea is further developed by the glowing and sympathetic descriptions which the author gives. When American ladies set out to see a country, they usually see a gicat deal that is pleasant, and much that is comically charming. The story of Maik 'l'wain's life and work will tee read with a kreat deal of interest by his many admirers. llis funny sayings, droll criticisms and witty bon moss are purely American. His career is a romance. His life is a curious medley of pathos and poverty, with an occasional laugh to help along cuer the rough places. He has been everything and not much of anything. His career has been as comical as himself.

The: Brans or Tasmek. By Mrs. Amelia F.. Harr, author of "The Mate of the Easter llell," cti. Popular Series, 25 cents. Robert lbonner's Sons, New Vork.
This is a iale of the Highlands of Scotiand, and a pretty tale at that. The cartle of lasmer stands on the thundering shores of West Kuss, and is a mon'rment to the famuly of the Toryuils, with whom the story is mostly concerned. It is a tale of domestic life: with its children and parent: : its lovers and lowed: its yuiet spots and its thriling adventures: its poetry and its prose. The book is very readable, and written in Mrs. Harr's graceful style.

Monti. By Eimile Zola, author of "The Hownfall," "A Dreall," " Ur. I'ascal," etc. Trans'ated by A. Visetelly. Cloth, \$1.25. Chatto \& Windus. I.ondon: The Copp, Clark Co., Toronto.
There have been many tianslations of this book and some cheap editions. Nevertheless a iranslation that is reliable. and that has been "toned up" to suit the British standard of novel writing liberty, will be welcomed. It will be doubly welcomed
owing to the fact that among the great questions of the day are the financial ones, and before ten years are past the greatest questions will be those pertaining in finance. The company promoter and the stock speculator with his wonderful versatility and still more wonderful imagination stands out preeminently as the greatest gambler and wrecker that the aineteenth century has produced. The wire-pulling, cheating, bulling, bearing, bribing and deceiving which narks the Patis lourse can be seen in L.on. don and New York on a similar scale. They can be seen on a minor scale in all the leasi. ing commercial cities of the world. These "brigands of finance," as \%ola calls them. these wreckers of human happiness as he describes them these are the men whom Zola has chosen as objects of his critician. He depicts their gambling while it is being carried to the point of absolute madness. He is a picturer of war --financial war. He takes the reader behind the scenes of Paris financial sage and reveals the incapacity, the deceit and the vindictiveness of the actors. He portrays alike the cruel triumph of the successful, and the plaintive moans of those who are crushed to earth. The charitable rich find their place in this wonderful book. So do the decayed noblesse and the hungry poor. It is on the whole a panoramic picture of Paris life written by one of the masters of modern fiction.

A Veteran of 1812 , being the Life of James Fizzgibbon, by Mary Agnes Fitzgibbon. Cloth, \$1.00. Wm. Briggs, Toronto.
It is a pleasure to handle the daintily printed and bound books which come from the press of the Methodist Brok and Yub. lishing House. This pleasure is enhanced when the book is a contribution to Canadian literature, as is this book under consideration. It is simply necessary to state that James fitzgibbon commanded a company under Colonel Harvey at the battle of Stoney Creek, one of the most brilliant victories of that menorable three years' war, to ensure the attention of every lover of Canadian freedom. Especially in Uppor Canada (Ontario) where the names "(ieneral Hrock," and "Colonel Harvey" are sacred to those who live in the fand bathed with such heroes' blood, will a book which tells of the many lutile exploits of that long struggie be doubly welcome.

James Fitzgibion was a bold Irish lad, and later a bold soldier of Her Ciracious Majesty. When the Americans were encamped at Stoney Creek he d sguised himself as a farmer and penetrated their lines with a basket of buttor on his arm. The result of his observations led to the midnight attack which cost the Americans so dear and bereft them of their two generals. Fits. gibbon was a noble feliow in many ways, and, as an autograph letter of which a facsimile is to be found in the book shows, was
a personal friend of Sir Isnac Brock. Here is an extract from one of Fitrgibbon's letters to his nephew : "Incalculable is the value of a firm purpose and a determination not to be defeated in one's pursuits. If there be one thing more than another calcu'ated toennoble the soul, it is the high faith in its own power." This carefully written and interesting personal history is illustrated by several photonraphs which are valuable in thelliselves. Besides a portrait of Fiizgibbon. a picture of Ciage's house and another of Stoney Creek balle ground appear. We Cou's house at Beaver I)am and the oficers' quarters at the OId Fott, Tomonto, are among the other photographs reproduced. The facsimile of Isaac Brock's autograph letter makes the book of double value. Several other special features contribute to the completeness of this historical work.

## PREEIOENT LEMOINE.

AMONG Canadian writers no one is more favorably known than J. M. Lemoine, the newly.e'ected President of the Royil Society of Canada. He belongs to nne of the oldest Canadian fam. ilies, being a descendent of Jean LeMoyne, who was a seigneur of three fiefs, and a near relative of Charles I.eMoyne, Haron of I.ongueuil. His house at Spencer Cirange, Sillery, is a literary man's paradise: here Mr. Lemoine has entertained some of the most eminent writers and scholars of our time. Dean Stanley, Charles Kingsley, Howells, the historians Garneauand Ferland, have all partaken of the hospitality of Spencer Grange: the late Francis liarkman was a frecuent visitor, and in the preface to some of his works acknowledses the valuable aid rendered him by Mr. Leennine. For over thirty years hardly a year has passed that we bave not to welcome sone new product of his pen in French or Engli.h. His best known works are Omithologie du Canada(2vols.), Les Pecheries du Canada Maple Leaves ( 5 vols.入 L'Album du Touriste, Chronic'es of the St. Lawre ce. Quebec Past and Iresent, Monographies et Esquisses, and Picturesque Quebec, all works of great historical value. In addition to these. Mr. Lemoine has contributed numerous articles to the magazines and the daily press. Imbued with deep love for the history and traditions of his country, his writings are re. plete with graphic narratives of inciJents that have occorred during the old regime, as well as suories of Canadian life and character of more recent date. To tell the story of our past is the chief delight of his life, and the tells it tuuthfully and impartially ; he jars no feelings of race and creed, for Mr. Lemoine's ideal is a Canada whose people shall be meither Eaxlish nor French but Canadian. In conclusion, we may say thit the Royal Society of Canada could not have selected one more deserving of the honor of president of that distinguished body than the historian par ricellence of the province of Quebec.-- Montreal Star.

Mr. leges is the authot of several well known works on the lianadian Northwest, and has written numerou, paniphiets on that and other subjects here and in Great Hritain The work which he is now engaxed upon is a history of the Northwest dating from the early discorelies,overlandand Hudson's bayexplorations, tracing thecour eof the fur traders and missionaries intotheinterior. The fur companies. early settements, the rebellions, Canadian Pacific Railway, and other subjects relating to the history of the couniry are fully dealt wath down to the present day. At the present time there is no complete historical recond of the Northwe i publish-d, although much has been written about the country, and Mr. Heyg's work is not oaly timely, but will prove of great service as a means of re. lerence to those interested in that patt of the Dominion. The history will be published in three volumes, the first app=aring about August nex', and Mr. Megs is taking the practical and sencible plan of making a personal soliritation for subscribers to the first edition.

The first establishment visited was that of Watson, Foster \& Co, on Cirey Nun street. This firm, which is one of the oldest in the trade, contend that the goods they turn out are not excelled by thove of any o:her house in the country. During the past two years their business has increased over 50 per cent., and they hold that they suppls half the total output of the Dominion. The line of samples that they show is certainly a wide and varied one, demons rating plainly that the firm is not disposed to rest content with what they have already accomplished, but that they are carefully studying the requirements of the trade, and are taking advantage of everythong nen that offers. It will ceitainly je pay any prospective buyers to sive Watson, Foster \& Co ${ }^{\circ}$ s representative some of their time when they are called upon by the later.

Their line of hangings, ceilings and friezes to match is a very large one, to describe which thoroughly would take much more space than is at our disposal. It is noticed houever that the leading patterns run to light grounds largely, strong yellows, cream buffs and terra coltas in all the higher class goods. A very fetching effect in the gold tracings on the ingrain papers, as noted on the samples shown, was secured by the thiter treatment which brings out the work very bright'y, a result not possible with ordinary will weik. dmong the almost innumerable styles shown it is a difficult matter to single out any palticular lines. No. ©os. a severe Greek hanging in all the popular shades. raught the writer's eye, however, as something especially neat and effective with its accompanying fricze and ceiling. No. got hanging, No. 1195 fricie, and No. 991 ceiling, are a splendid example of the Empire treatment. In the racoco treatunent No. wht hanging and $1: 22$ frieze in all rich warm shates is proving one of the firm's best selling lines in scroll renaissance, and horal designs of the same treatneat, any number of handsome samples are shown by the tirm. They are the only firm manufacturing these papers in Canada, and they are offering them to the trade at pr.ces which are very much less than any imp irted goods can be laid down at. The peculiar advantage posses ed by this line of goots is that they can be washed with impunity whenever they gather any dust or dirt, as the treatment they undergo gives them a sinouth slazed surface. They will last forever almost, and are just the thing for a bath-room, for instance.
A line of leather papers shown by the same firm has a wonderfully close resemblance on a wall to genuine leather. No. 962 is a very effective pattern of these. No. 982, a treatment of mica, etc., printed on a deep shade of dark green, should give a very handsome library paper.
The firm's line of cheap gilts also are selling at prices this fall which are almost as low. in fact practically the same price as white blanks were selling at last year. The grounded brown blanks are a very large line also, and so far as cost goes, Mr. Foster contends, offer a better line of stock for the moncy than anything ever shown in this line of goods before. The white blanks also, the firm point out, are a great improve. ment on last year's goods. It must be gratifying to Watson, Foster \& Co. to note in connect on with all these goods that their orders are coming in much larger than last year. They claim for their goods that they are sold at prices to meet all competition, whether foreign or domestic, and ask the trade to spare some time to their representative when be calls, feeling sure that they wilt find it worth their while to do so.
At 'oolin McArthur \& Co.'s Montreal Wall Paper Factory, on Norre Dame street, the writer was treated to an equally comprehensive and Lewildering display of what industrial art can do in designing wall paper so artistic as to make a proper description 2 very difficult matter. Messrs. McArthurshow all the leading lines of goods-brown blanks, white blanks, colored gilts, embossed kilts, colored borders, gilt borders. embossed gilt borders, plain ingrains, printed ingrains, and ingrain friezes, etc., etc. This firm's white blank and colored gilts this year are in entirely new patterns in accordance with their usual custom, and their travelers are meeting with an unusually encouraging deinand for them. The lines that this firm show are very numerous, so numerous that it is difficule to single out any for particular mention $A$ very handsome scroll landscape with a frieze to match and a butterty ceiling should make a handsome wall paper. Messrs. McArthor are making a leader of the latter, as it is a ceiling that matches with the many difierent patterns of hangings and friezes.

## NEW WALL DECORATION.

A novelly in house decoration has been intoolured in France under the name of "peinture expresse." The "espress paintmin" is a form of paper hanbing. A paper, covered with a smoth ground, apparently made of some sort of gum, is printed wath dengens, after the manner of wall pupers, but in oll colon instead of the ordinary me colot To apply the decoration, the back of the paper is moistenes. and the ralls are then glued back upwatd on the wall to be decotated with strong shlue. The back of of tho puper is well noiked wer with as rub. her "sefuernee." to press ont the superfluous silue ard moure adherence, and the whole left to uself to dry. .ifter it in thoroughly dry, orduay paste is spread over the paper, which of course has the back outward, and the work ngain left for an hour. At the end of thu stme the paper will be softened, and nothine remains but to stop it ofic leginning at one corner and pulling gradually, when the onf panted pateern will be found timly adherng to the uall or ceiling The marks of glue all then be washed away from the decoration, and the whole varnished if desiled

## ADVANCE IN ERITISH TASTE.

FROMI every ign around us, we feel, tays the Bratish and Colonial Printer and Statooner, confident in advancing the statement that under the impulse of a promised and evident revival of trade, the manufacturing stationery houses of this country are this season making greater efforts than usual to give their goods a preJominating value both intrinsic and extrinsic. We are particularly glad to be able to emphasise this double point, berause in past days we have felt compelied to pay an almost grudging tribute to some of our foreign competitors on the score of external beauty. loust often this latter quality has been fontered at the expense of nore solid quali. tues, but even allowing for this, we, as a nation, liave not kept all the trade we might hase done in our fingers because we have not sufticiently studied superfictals. We would illustrate it in this way liven two Chmomas cards, one of Contmental the wher of liritoh make. and of equal retall value: the one produced upon a cheap enamel board, the other upon a bristol lrourd ontins lifty to sinty per cent. more: the contmental productoon being brilliantly but superticinlly decotated. shainst the lirswh soldthy of tinish: public selection, whith so seldom loohs below the surface, would in the majonty of cases fall upon the mone meirtin mon sample We should be -onsy to nee the ver: sumplest of our Itritish mariulat tutes iose thers memme quality, but
we are heartily glad to note the much gicater and growing attention that is being given to artistic effect among us. It has been our one drawback undoubredly. This year a study of samples and sampie cases convinces us that there is a pronounced advance in the direction of true delicacy of taste and exterior finish about our goods. This applies not only to the multitud.nous lines in which lithography plays a part, but in all departments of the fancy stationery trade We ate satisfied that it will have a distinct influence upon the season's export trade, for our Colonial and other distant eustomers will be quick io perceive it, and when they once recognize that the British manufacturer is giving them values real and apparent good qualities and attractive ones
equal to or in advance of other nations, we shall reap the lenefits of extended trade. In saying this we do not lose sight of the fact that our wholesale houses largely recruit their sto ks from Continental sources, skimming the cream, as it were, from foreign producers' sample books. But we take a species of national and pardonable pride in recording that this year there will be less room for invidions comparison betneen theirs and ours, even on the one ground of superficial finish.

## FOUNTAIN PENS INETEAD OF TME LAW.

It is rarely that a man deserts law for mechanical pursuits, but in at least one instance the result of so doing has been highly adrantageous. This was so in the case of Jaul E. Wirt, of Bloomsburg, who, soon after his admission to the bar of Columbia County, devoted his a'tention solely to a mechanical contrivance, which, after a couple of years' steady work, he succeeded in perfecting. He held on to his patent rights, and for a year or so had the article manufactured on his own account. Then he ereited a factory in Bloomsburg, and at present manufactures every portion of the useful little article that bears his name. Mr. Wirt was at the Binghom House yesterday. He inoks as prosperous as he really is, for his invention has netted him a large fortune, and he is one of the substantial citirens of his town. He says that he has never regretted that he forsook the law; even though he has lost his cliance of wearing the ermine. - Phi'adelphia Inquiser.

About S.jo oclock last Wednesilay evening a fire, which is supposed to have started foom the furnace, occurred in the basement of Copp, Clark Company's printing estabhishment at $(x)$ Colborne street, Toronto. The loss is fully covered by insurance. Between fire and water about $\$ 3,000$ worth of damage was dowe to stock, machinery and the building. It is expected that no inconvenuence will result, and that their manufacturing $w i n$ it be interfered with.
