# NOTICE.

---

The Church Society was established in 1842.

Its objects are:

1. A Mission Fund, to aid in paying Missionaries to struggling Congregations.
2. A General Fund, to aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the education of the children of the Clergy, to aid Congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.
3. A Widows and Orphans' Fund, for the Clergy.
4. A Pension Fund, for aged and infirm Clergymen.
5. A Fund, to provide higher education for the children of the Clergy.
6. To provide Bibles, Prayer Books and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-Committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the Clergy licensed within the Diocese, the Church-Wardens, and others elected by the Society, being members of the Corporation.

(b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land and Investment, the Education, and the Depository.

2. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the Synod.

This Board pays all the Missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessments of the Congregations served by the Missionaries, (d) the surplus revenue of the Clergy Trust Fund, (e) the interest of the Invested Capital of the Mission Fund.

All letters referring to the assessment or contributions of Congregations should be addressed to the Rev. Canon Von Iffland, Bergerville, the Secretary, or to Mr. John Hamilton, the Honorary Treasurer of the Diocesan Board.

All other letters should be addressed to the Secretary, the Rev. A. J. Balfour, St. Peter's Rectory, Quebec. Contributions on behalf of the Church Society must be sent to the Treasurer, Mr. Edwin Pope, 83 St. Peter street, Quebec

Special General Meeting  
OF THE  
**CHURCH SOCIETY,**  
16TH DECEMBER, 1897.

A Special General Meeting of the Church Society was held, pursuant to notice duly given, in the Cathedral Church Hall, on 16th December, 1897, for the purpose of considering the By-Laws of the Church Society as revised by a Committee appointed for this purpose by the Central Board.

Present :—The Lord Bishop in the chair, the Very Revd. the Dean of Quebec, the Revds. Canon Von Iffland, Canon Richardson, H. J. Petry, L. W. Williams, E. J. Etherington, Col. J. Bell Forsyth, Captain Carter, Dr. Dunbar, Q.C., Messrs. J. Hamilton, E. Pope, G. Lampson, A. Rhodes, and Rev. A. J. Balfour, Secretary.

After Prayers, the Secretary read the notice calling the meeting and specifying the special object for which it had been summoned, and mentioned that in accordance with instructions received from the Central Board, he had three weeks previously sent a printed copy of the By-Laws as revised to each Clergyman in the Diocese with a letter soliciting any criticism or suggestions bearing upon the proposed changes which might suggest themselves. A Memorial was read from the Deanery of St. Francis, requesting the Church Society to postpone the enactment of the proposed amendments until the date of Synod in 1899. Letters were also read from ten of the Clergy included in the said Deanery giving their personal views for and against the alterations.

It was moved by Mr. Lampson, seconded by Canon Von Iffland, "That the request of the Deanery Board of St. Francis District for a postponement of the proceedings until the Synod 1899 be acceded to." In amendment, it was moved by Captain Carter, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, "That the Secretary be instructed to acknowledge the receipt of the Memorial, and to state that inasmuch as Article X of the By-laws of the Church Society provides against hasty legislation, it is not considered advisable to postpone the consideration of the business for which this meeting was called."—Lost.

The permission of the meeting having been given for the withdrawal of the original motion, it was moved by Canon Von Iffland, seconded by the Rev. Lennox Williams, "That the By-Laws, and the proposed changes in the By-Laws of the Society, as revised by a Committee of the Central Board, be referred to the following Committee, to report at the Annual Meeting in the month of February next, viz., Dr. Dunbar (Chairman), the Secretary and Treasurer of the Society, the Archdeacon, the Dean of Quebec, the Rural Deans of the Districts of Quebec and St. Francis, Col. Forsyth, Messrs. G. Lampson, R. Campbell, and the mover and seconder."—Carried.

The meeting then adjourned with the Benediction.

## Annual Meeting.

---

The annual meeting of the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec was held in the Cathedral Church Hall, on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, February 2nd, 3rd and 4th, 1898, beginning at the hour of three o'clock each day.

In the absence of the Lord Bishop at the opening of the Session, Dr. J. Dunbar, Q.C., Chancellor of the Diocese and Senior Vice-President, was called to the chair.

After Prayers, the minutes of the last annual meeting and of a special general meeting, were read and confirmed.

The Reports of the Central Board and of the Diocesan Board were read, adopted and ordered to be printed. The Report of the Treasurer of the Church Society was read, and Statements of the accounts of the Church Society, Clergy Trust Fund, Bishopric Endowment Fund, and Local Endowment Funds were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed. The Honorary Treasurer of the Diocesan Board presented his Report, which was ordered to be printed. The Annual Report of the S. Francis District Association of the Church Society was read, received and ordered to be printed in the Society's Report. The

Report of the Association of Church Helpers was received and ordered to be published in the Society's Annual Report, and the sense of the Society's indebtedness to that Association, for the aid which they had rendered the Church during the past year, was recorded.

The Rev. T. H. Lloyd, assistant Priest in the Cathedral, was elected a member of the Society; and Mrs. John Hamilton, and Mr. William Alexander Dunn were elected Life Members.

The Vice-Presidents of the past year were all re-elected.

In addition to those who are members, *ex-officio*, the following gentlemen were elected members of the Central Board: Messrs. W. H. Carter, H. J. Pratten, R. Campbell, E. Pope, J. C. More, E. E. Webb, Col. White, J. Winfield, A. Rhodes, G. W. Parmelee, W. Tofield, W. F. V. Atkinson, J. Brooke, G. E. Allen Jones, C. W. Walcot, E. F. Wurtele, A. Veasey, W. Gunn, W. H. Henderson, G. F. Gibsone, T. C. Aylwin.

The members of the Diocesan Board were all re-elected.

The Society recorded their great indebtedness to the Honorary Counsel, and also to the Auditors for their valuable services during the past year.

Correspondence was read from several Clergymen touching the By-Laws of the Church Society, as revised, and about to be considered; also a Resolution of the Central Board concerning the Society's action at its Meeting on 16th December, with regard to the revised draft submitted by said Board.

The consideration of the By-Laws was then taken up and continued day-by-day until completed, the revised draft, prepared by a committee of the Central Board, being taken as a basis.

The meeting closed with the Benediction.

## 61 VICT., CHAP. 86.

An Act to authorize the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec to deal with certain funds in its hands in a certain way, and for other purposes.

[Assented to 15th January, 1898.]

WHEREAS the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec has, by its petition, prayed for authority to consider certain local endowment funds now in its hands or which may hereafter come into its hands as one fund for the sole purpose of distributing proportionately over the whole any loss in the capital which may occur through failure in investment and of paying out all interest received thereon proportionately at a uniform rate upon the capital of each such local endowment fund, and has also prayed for authority to invest its funds in certain securities; and it is expedient to grant the said prayer;

Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature of Quebec, enacts as follows:

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec is hereby authorized to consider all the local endowment funds now in their hands or which may hereafter be placed in their hands, as one fund, for the purposes:

(a) Of distributing proportionately over the whole any loss in capital that may occur through failure of investment;

(b) Of paying out all the interest received thereon proportionately at a uniform rate upon the capital of each local endowment fund.

Provided there be nothing in the instrument creating such local endowment fund to the contrary.

2. Notwithstanding the provisions of article 981o of the Civil Code, the society is hereby authorized to invest money held by it as administrator or trustee thereof, in municipal stock or debentures, in real estate in the Dominion of Canada, or on first privilege or hypothec upon real estate in the Dominion of Canada, to an amount not exceeding three-fifths of the municipal valuation of such real estate, or in bonds of commercial corporations in the Dominion of Canada.

All investments made up to date outside the limits of the Province are declared to be legal and valid as regards the authority of the society to make them.

3. The act 45 Victoria, chapter 88, is repealed.

4. This act shall come into force on the day of its sanction.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1897.

*(Presented to the Church Society, February 2nd, 1898).*

Having acted to the best of their ability and with a view to God's glory in the advancement of His Church, your Board humbly trust that their efforts during the past year to promote the various objects of the Society, have not been without tokens of Divine blessing. A review of the work done, and of progress made, whilst leaving very much to be desired, affords abundant cause for thankfulness. Your Board therefore desire at the outset to express their sincere gratitude to those members and friends of the Society who have, by their subscriptions and donations, continued to support the general work of the Church, and above all to thank Almighty God for whatever good has been accomplished.

The Society's income for the past year, arising from voluntary sources, and exclusive of dividends and interest from invested capital, falls short of the income of the previous year by \$854.66. This is a serious falling off and is much to be deplored.

From the foregoing Comparative Statement it will be seen that the decrease in last year's offerings falls wholly under the head of the Mission Fund. This is the more to be regretted since the same Fund suffered a decline in revenue in 1896, to the extent of \$294. A diminution is apparent in the returns from each of the Deaneries of the Diocese: from Megantic, \$77.35; from St. Francis

\$116.84; from Gaspé, \$145.82; and from the City of Quebec, \$691.87. From the Gaspé Coast it was not wholly unlooked for. For two consecutive years that entire district has suffered from severe depression in the trade of fish, the commodity upon which the majority of the inhabitants depend. In 1896, in spite of this depression and of a dark outlook, their offerings to God exhibited no diminution; but a second year of increased scarceness has told its tale. Your Board desire to acknowledge with much gratitude the measure of help which, under the circumstances, the good people along that coast have contributed towards the general missionary work of the Church. "Bad times" are ever a searching test of Christian consistency and self-denial. They have borne the test nobly. The major share of the shrinkage however is to be found in the returns from the City of Quebec, and is due in part to removals by death of some who were generous subscribers. That the income of the Mission Fund should have fallen off to *any* extent, is, in the opinion of your Board, a matter that demands serious consideration. Missionary labour is the very first of the objects embraced in the Constitution of the Church Society; and in a Diocese such as ours it must ever demand the chief share of attention.

The department of Missions is under the management of the Diocesan Board; and in the report of that Board will be found full information respecting the work committed to their charge. The share which the Central Board has in this work relates more particularly to the supply of such means for carrying it on as come from voluntary sources. The Mission Fund was established many years ago by the Society to supply from voluntary sources a deficiency, which even then was beginning to be felt, arising from the withdrawal of the S. P. G. grant. In view of the fact that the grant from that Society, which still amounts to \$1,475, is to be wholly and finally withdrawn within two years; and in view of the further fact that the interest accruing from the invested Capital of the Fund is continually depreciating, the income from voluntary sources instead of declining must very materially increase, otherwise even the present missionary work of the Church cannot be maintained, much less extended. The deficiency which will be created by the near extinction of the S. P. G. grant can be provided for only by increased exertions among

ourselves. Your Board therefore earnestly appeal for a more generous and sustained support of the Mission Fund ; sustained as well as generous ; for it must be plain to all that unless a character of something like permanency be given to offerings in this behalf, Missions which now receive aid from this Fund, through the Diocesan Board, can have no sure guarantee of such help ; much less can a reasonable hope be held out to new fields already asking for the Church's ministrations. Your Board implore the serious attention of churchmen throughout the Diocese to this subject, and beg of them not to relax but rather quicken their interest in the Church's extension, and increase their support of the Mission Fund ; and further, like good missionaries themselves, seek to interest and enlist the active co-operation of others. Your Board feel confident that the more our people become acquainted with the actual wants and necessities of the Church, the more liberally will they bestow a portion of their means to meet them ; and this involves the duty on all the members of the Church Society of taking an active part in acquiring and in disseminating that information which will have the happy result of building up and extending the Church of God.

The Central Board desire to inform the members of the Church Society that under the recommendation of the Investment Committee and with the approval and advice of the Honorary Counsel of the Church Society, they respectfully requested His Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese, as President of the Society, to seek from the Legislature such powers as would enable the Society to invest money in certain other specified first-class securities in addition to those permitted under the general Act ; And also, in accordance with a Resolution of Synod passed at its Session in May last, "to seek from the Legislature such power as would enable the Church Society to consider and treat all the Local Endowment Funds now in their hands, or which may come into their hands hereafter, as One Fund for the sole purposes of paying out the interest accrued upon the whole of the said Endowment Funds proportionately at a uniform rate upon the capital of each Endowment Fund." The Society is indebted to Mr. Robert Campbell, LL.B, one of the Honorary Counsel of the Society, for kindly preparing the Bill ; to the Honorable R. Turner, for taking charge of the same before the Legislative

Council, and to W. J. Watts, Esq., M.L.A., for like services in the Lower House. The Bill was passed during the recent Session and is now Law.

#### GENERAL FUND.

*(To aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the support of Schools, in the education of the Children of the Clergy, in the formation of Local Endowments; and to meet the general expenses of the management of the Society.)*

A grant was also made in behalf of a new Church at Harrington Harbour, Labrador; but it had not been claimed on 31st December. An application for a grant in aid of the erection of a Church at Eustis was received late in the year, and its consideration postponed. It, with some others, will doubtless claim the attention of your Board early in the current year.

The claims upon this Fund are numerous and varied. Every appeal is carefully considered by your Board, and the means at their command, all too small, are administered as justly and wisely as possible. They venture to say that there is no Mission within the Diocese which has not been helped, not once nor twice only, but many times, by benefactions from this Fund: May they not therefore claim a wide sympathy with its manifold objects, and a grateful and generous response when, on each Quinquagesima Sunday, special offerings are solicited in its behalf.

#### MISSION FUND.

*(For the payment of Stipends of Missionaries;—the Fund being supplemented by the annual Grant from the S. P. G., the Assessments of the Rural Congregations, a Grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, and the interest of the Invested Capital of the Mission Fund,—the whole administered by the Diocesan Board.)*

The object and the present condition of this Fund your Board have already alluded to. For an account of its ad-

ministration they refer the members of the Society to the reports of the Diocesan Board. Some idea of the benefits which the Fund is made to serve, may be gathered from the interesting Reports of the Missionaries aided thereby.

#### PENSION FUND.

*(For the support of aged and infirm Clergymen.)*

This Fund, intended to aid in the support of Clergymen disabled by infirmity or by length of service, was begun in 1867 by subscriptions and offertory collections, and has reached very gratifying dimensions. The importance of the Fund is self-evident; for, "without such a provision, there is left the equally painful alternative of depriving a Clergyman incapacitated by age or infirmity of the means of support, or of leaving a Mission, through no fault of its own, inadequately supplied with the ministrations of religion."

Six aged Clergymen are now enjoying the well earned benefits of the Fund. The amount paid in pensions last year was \$2,485.00.

#### WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The following Clergymen have made the required number of payments according to the terms of the By-Law, viz. :—The Ven. Archdeacon Roe, the Rev. Dr. Allnatt, the Rev. Canons Adams, Von Iffland, Richardson and Foster; the Rev. Messrs. Smith, Lyster, Kemp, Washer, Thompson, Hepburn, Boyle, Sykes, Ball, Blaylock, Richmond, Chapman, Harding, Stevens, Wurtele, Scarth, Petry, Fyles, Riopel, Stuart, Forsythe, Walters, Falconer, Fuller, Robertson, Husband, Adcock and Balfour.

The following are in course of completing their ten payments, viz. :—The Rev. Messrs. Bayne, Bishop, Brooke, Curran, Debbage, Dickson, Fothergill, Hibbard, Horner, Moore, Murray, Parrock, Prout, Rothera, Scott, Whatham, Wilson and Wright.

The number of annuitants during 1897 remained the same as during the year previous, viz. :—Seven widows and five children. The amount paid was \$2,237.50.

#### EDUCATION FUND.

Seventeen Schools received aid from this Fund during the past year, being two in excess of the year previous. Small though our grants, severally, are, they serve a good

end, they are found very helpful and are much appreciated. To be able to insure that the teacher of the Public School in one's Mission is a member of the Church, which is a condition of the grant, is in itself a matter of no small moment: to have a guarantee that the education of the young, so far from being severed from Religion shall be on a sound religious basis, is at once a blessing to the children and an advantage to the Church even beyond parochial limits. The Reports received from the teachers and from the Clergy are, on the whole, of a satisfactory nature, although in some cases the average number of pupils in attendance appears small. It is gratifying to know that the small means at our command for this object is being used to promote the truest welfare of many poor children. Your Board desire to express their grateful appreciation of the generous gift of £80, received from the Colonial and Continental Church Society in behalf of this good work.

FUND FOR THE EDUCATION OF THE CHILDREN OF  
THE CLERGY.

Eleven grants were made from this Fund last year, seven in behalf of sons of Clergymen being educated at Bishop's College School, Lennoxville, and four in behalf of daughters at Compton Ladies' College. As hitherto, each grant made

by the Society was most kindly and generously doubled by Dr. Robert Hamilton. Much appreciation has been expressed by the parents of those aided, for the assistance thus rendered. Any one who considers for a moment how difficult it must be for a Clergyman with a family to live, as a Clergyman is expected to live, and to educate his children, and to keep a horse and summer and winter vehicles,—a *sine qua non* in every Mission,—all this, to mention nothing more, upon a stipend of \$750 or \$800, must surely appreciate the object which this Fund is designed to further, and acknowledge that it merits a more liberal support than it receives. The total amount granted last year was \$860.00.

The foregoing statement, compared with the statements of former years, unhappily exhibits a marked falling off in sales. This may in part be due to the fact that books of a miscellaneous character are now being sold elsewhere at marvellously low prices; also to the fact that any Clergyman, by remitting direct to the S. P. C. K. House in London, can obtain books for a Sunday School or Parochial Library of double the value of amount remitted, and free of transport charges. We find no fault with this generous treatment on the part of the S. P. C. K. (that noble Society whose agents we are.) It is but characteristic of all their good works.

It is however to be borne in mind that books obtained from the general bookseller may not safely be placed in the

hands of our children without having first been carefully examined, some of them being marked by an evident lack of sympathy with the Church and with principles held sacred by us; whilst, on the other hand, every S. P. C. K. publication may confidently be relied upon as sound and instructive as well as interesting. Doubtless a more general dissemination of S. P. C. K. literature, such as is now issuing from their press, would prove of great benefit to the Church in strengthening her members in their religious principles and in deepening their appreciation and love for the heritage which is theirs.

IN MEMORIAM.

Your Board desire to place on record their deep sense of the loss which the Church in this Diocese has sustained during the past year, in the removal by death of the Hon. Judge Irvine, of this city; the Hon. E. T. Brooks, of Sherbrooke; Mr. Armine D. Nicolls, Bursar and Registrar of Bishop's College, Lennoxville (the son of the first Principal of that Institution and grandson of the late Bishop G. J. Mountain), also of Mr. J. J. Foote and Mr. S. J. Shaw, all of them in their lifetime members of the Church Society.

Your Board, however, feel that more than a passing notice is due to the memory of Judge Irvine, since but few laymen have left to the Church in this Diocese or Province a richer legacy of mind and heart. The very Constitution of the Church Society as also the Constitution of the Synod of the Diocese bear indelible marks of his sound judgment, clear foresight, and unwavering loyalty to the true principles of the Church of England. For fifty consecutive years the name of George Irvine appears in the Journals of this Society, and ever amongst her most influential members. For thirty-six years he was one of the Society's Honorary Counsel.

## Abstract of Proceedings of the Central Board, DURING THE YEAR 1897.

---

**JANUARY.**—Annual Report considered and adopted. Vice-Presidents and members of Central Board recommended for ensuing year. Report of Education and Depository Committee and action thereon. Application from Vestry of St. George's, Beauce, for permission to sell portion of Glebe and apply proceeds towards erection of a Parsonage; referred to Honorary Counsel. The Treasurer submitted his report; directed to present it at Annual Meeting of Church Society.

## REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF MISSIONS

TO THE

**Diocesan Church Society for the year 1897.**

A year ago, the Diocesan Board, in its Report to the Church Society, expressed its satisfaction with the financial condition, which indicated that the resources of the Diocese for its Missionary work were keeping pace with the demands upon them.

Your Board regrets to say that it is not now in a position to assert so positively that this is the case at present; and with regard to the future it would be rash to speak with any greater degree of confidence.

The foregoing abstract of the revenue account shows that while the expenditure during 1897 amounted to \$28,630.47, the actual receipts for the same period amounted to \$27,753.70, a deficit of \$876.77. The small balance in hand at the close of 1896 has disappeared, and the sum of \$270.46 takes its place, but on the wrong side. To ensure the prompt payment of the quarterly stipends of the Clergy—an object which your Board has never hitherto failed to carry out—the Treasurer ought to be provided with not less than \$1,500, out of which to meet the temporary deficiencies caused by the want of punctuality in the payment of the quarterly Assessments. The attention of Church-Wardens is drawn to this, and the necessity of greater

promptness in their payments is urgently pressed upon them, if, in future, the drafts of the Clergy are to be honoured without delay.

The income from Assessments has exceeded by almost \$300 that for the previous year from the same source, which is satisfactory—a gleam of sunshine breaking out of a cloudy sky—but your Board had to call upon the Clergy Trust Fund for every cent of its surplus revenue, so that all available resources have been employed. On the other hand the expenditure has been greater than that of the previous year by \$665.30, incurred chiefly in special Missionary work. This additional outlay would however have been easily met, without resulting in a balance on the wrong side, had the receipts from the Mission Fund equalled those of the previous year. It is here, your Board regrets to observe, that the cause of the trouble is to be sought. In 1896 there was a falling off of over \$200, and this last year shows a further diminution to the extent of \$1,164.90. This is a very serious matter to present for the consideration of the Church Society and of every member of the Church in the Diocese. The revenue from this Fund is derived, partly from the interest on invested capital and partly from the annual offertories and subscriptions, the latter producing by far the larger amount. There has been a reduction in receipts in the case of both sources of income during the past year. With regard to the decrease in the offertories and subscriptions, ample reference has been made to the fact in the report of the Central Board just read to the Society. With what is so earnestly urged there the Diocesan Board is in hearty accord, and is no more than what your Board has been pressing upon the attention of the Diocese, from time to time, as the need arose and the occasion demanded. But the present need is greater than any which has heretofore presented itself, and calls for the most serious consideration. The Diocesan Board, entrusted with the Missionary work of the Diocese by the Synod as well as the Church Society, and therefore responsible to the whole Diocese, would be false to its trust, if it failed at this juncture to point to the grave issues which are concerned. And whilst there may be reasons to account in part for the want of due support accorded to the Mission Fund the past year, which may be, as we hope, only of a temporary nature, yet the fact remains that there has been an actual decrease in a source of income upon which

depends not only the advancement which we ought to look for in the Diocese, but also the bare maintenance of the work as carried on at present. The grant from the S. P. G., for the year 1898 and 1899, at the disposal of the Diocesan Board, will be only about \$1,475 instead of \$2,430 in 1897, and will cease altogether at the close of 1899. The surplus revenue of the Clergy Trust Fund, the largest source of revenue now next to the assessments, is certain to be reduced as investments mature. Your Board will therefore, from the present moment, be under the necessity of depending more and more upon the Mission Fund. Unless the members of the Church throughout the Diocese largely increase their offerings to the Mission Fund in 1898, the result will be most injurious to the Missionary work in which the Church Society is so deeply interested. The list of the Clergy will have to be cut down, and Missions which are financially weak will either have to be united together or formed into Missionary Districts without a resident Pastor. But your Board believes it is justified in hoping for better things; it believes that it is only necessary to point to the existing need, and churchmen will come forward and render the required help; the work is God's work, and therefore demands some sacrifice at our hands; and if it should appear to some that the requests to aid His work in various quarters are continually increasing in number, let us not forget that the need which lies at our own doors is a voice which speaks to us with special clearness.

It is true that the forecast of the financial situation does not include any reference to the "Bishop Williams Memorial Mission Fund;" but that Fund has not yet been placed at the disposal of the Diocesan Board and is wisely retained by your Society to fill in, in the future, the blank which will be caused by the entire withdrawal of the S. P. G. grant. The interest of that Fund in 1897 amounted to \$2,042.93, nearly \$400 less than the S. P. G. grant. When in 1900, it becomes necessary to make use of the Bishop Williams Memorial Fund, it will scarcely make up for the withdrawal of the money received from S. P. G.

It became necessary at the close of the year to renew the Board's agreements with thirty-four Congregations. From the greater number it was hoped that some increase would have been obtained, but this expectation has been realized only to the extent of about \$150. The depreciation in the

price of fish and the comparatively small catch the last two years have rendered the Missions on the Gaspé Coast unable to do more than keep up their present assessment, and various causes have operated in other parts of the Diocese to prevent all but a few congregations from acceding to the proposals for an increase. Two years from now, when a general re-assessment takes place, it will be absolutely necessary that a considerable increase should be secured if, in all cases, the religious privileges at present enjoyed are to be continued.

Allusion has been made in the Report of the Central Board to the individual reports of the Clergy, most of whom are connected with the Diocesan Board, as interesting and valuable records of the work which is being quietly and faithfully done. There is less reason therefore that the Diocesan Board should enlarge upon that work, more especially as the reports referred to may be considered as an appendix to the Board's Annual Report to the Church Society. To these accounts of Missionary labour cheerfully and devotedly carried on, often amidst much cause for discouragement, your Board would draw the attention of all members of the Church interested in the Missionary field of the Diocese. Your Board would also express its own conviction as to the unflagging zeal of the Missionaries of the Diocese, the great value of the work done, and the substantial progress made.

Including the Rectors of three self-sustaining Parishes there were, during the past year, thirty-seven Clergy serving in the Diocese in connection with the Diocesan Board. In addition to these there were three Clergymen ministering in places for which special grants were made.

There is not a single vacant Mission in the Diocese, and but one appointment was made during the past year, that of the Reverend John Almond to the Mission of Labrador, where he had previously been employed as Assistant.

## REPORT OF THE LORD BISHOP

FOR THE YEAR 1897,

**With reference to Special Funds entrusted to him for  
Missionary Work in the Diocese.**

---

With the Special Fund placed at his disposal the Bishop has been able to employ a Clergyman in each of the Districts of Hereford, Lake Megantic, Beebe Plain, and St. Ursule, a second Clergyman for part of the year and a Lay Reader for the rest of the year to assist the Rev. J. Prout in the Magdalen Islands, and an additional Clergyman and two additional School Teachers to assist the Rev. J. Almond and his Lay Reader, Mr. Willis, on the Labrador. Assistance has also been given towards additional work in the Missions of Danville and Waterville. For these purposes the Bishop has disbursed \$1,838.98, and this assistance has been met by \$1,580, raised by the people in these Districts. These sums, if added,—the first to what was raised, according to our Diocesan accounts, from S. P. G. grant, donations, subscriptions, collections and interest on our invested Fund, and the second to the amount raised by our people for assessments and other purposes in their own Missions,—shew us that the total amount given to our Missions was \$16,460.95, and the total amount raised by these Missions for themselves was \$15,588.50, making a total expenditure upon the stipends of the Clergy, in our Missions and in three self-supporting Parishes that are in connection with the Diocesan Board, amounting to no less a sum than \$32,049.45. These sums seem large; but a careful perusal of our accounts shews that for the work of our poorer Missions we are in great need of further assistance, and that those of our Missions which are able to do so must be led to do more than they do at present in the way of self-support.

## Report of St. Francis District Association of the Church Society, for the year 1897.

---

From the returns made by the Clergy of the various Parishes and Missions of the District, we find that there has been raised during the year the sum of \$32,888.57. Of this amount \$28,905.37 was for parochial purposes, \$2,052.25 was for the various funds of the Church Society and other objects within the Diocese, while \$1,938.95 was given for religious work outside the Diocese.

The Baptisms during the year have been 401, Marriages 87, and the Burials 210, showing an increase over last year of 152 Baptisms, 34 Marriages and 69 Burials. The number Confirmed was 346.

It is a matter for congratulation that there is not a single vacant Parish or Mission in the whole District. In every part the work is being carried on with vigour, and everywhere both the Clergy and laity are working harmoniously and on Church lines. In several of our Parishes and Missions there is now a Celebration of the Holy Communion every Sunday and on Saints' Days, while in many others the Celebrations have been increased, and, in one instance, doubled since Easter.

In some parts of the District our English-speaking people are moving away and their places are being filled by the French. But, in the instances where this is noticed, the Missionary adds, "but still our congregations are not diminished nor are our communicants decreased."

Very little has been done this year in the work of Church building; but this may be accounted for, partly, from the hard times and the low price of farm produce, and partly because the whole District is now pretty well covered with our neat little Churches, and you can hardly drive for seven or eight miles in any direction without coming to one. Not only are they found in the villages and hamlets, but sometimes by the country roadside, where in their solitude they testify to the faith and devotion of the farming community around them.

Many of our Clergy endure hardship, and most of them meet with difficulties and discouragements, but each one speaks hopefully of the bright prospect for the Church in his immediate neighbourhood, and no one complains of his hardships.

It is a cause for devout thankfulness that Bishop's College and Bishop's College School continue to prosper, and that the number of Students in the College and Boys in the School exceeds that of last year. Compton Ladies' College is also doing excellent work, and is now practically paying its way, but it still needs the sympathy and help of every Churchman in the District. The Lady Principal's report shows a small increase in the number of pupils with the prospect of one or two more after the New Year.

ACTON.

The Rev. L. C. Wurtele writes :—

The Sunday morning and evening Services in St. Mark's Church, Acton, have been regularly held during the past year. Owing to the fact that some of our people are of French origin and some of English, my custom hitherto has been to conduct the morning Service partly in the one language and partly in the other, but of late I have given the entire morning Service in English, and the evening Service in French, this arrangement appearing to be more generally acceptable.

It is with no little satisfaction that I am able to report the completion of long needed repairs both on the Church and Parsonage. The buttresses to the Church have been renewed, the chimney, as far as necessary, rebuilt, the ceiling repaired, the interior of the Church retinted, new stove-pipes provided, &c. The roof and verandah of the Parsonage have also been repaired. All these repairs have contributed much to our comfort, and at the same time to the stability and appearance of the buildings.

I am thankful to say that the usual Services at West Wickham and at Danby have been regularly and faithfully kept up, except on rare occasions, when very stormy weather and the impassable condition of the roads rendered it impossible for me to reach these stations in due time. At both places the attendance at the Services has been very fair.

Our little town is about to be lighted by electricity. The work and arrangements necessary to this end have already been completed. We are pleased to note any signs of progress and a keeping-up with the times.

## AGNES.

The Rev. J. Stanley Dickson reports:—

Having been in the Mission only since October 1st, I have very little to report. During this time the Sunday Services have been held regularly in St. Barnabas' Church, Agnes, and fortnightly at Ditchfield and Spider Lake. The attendance at the latter places has not been altogether satisfactory, but there are some slight signs of improvement, and I am in hopes that these may continue as the condition of the roads becomes more favorable. The Sunday School at Agnes is conducted by Mrs. Bailey, assisted by Miss Albro and Miss Farquah, and is well attended. At Ditchfield Mrs. Stewart and Miss Patton have kindly consented to take charge of the Sunday School, which was discontinued during the summer, and I hope to be present at least during part of the lesson-hour once a fortnight.

Our hearty thanks are due to the members of the congregation at Agnes, who have been active in Church work in the Mission, and especially to the Wardens, who do much gratis work in the Church, thus saving the expense of a Sexton, to the Ladies' Guild, for new lamps placed in St. Barnabas' Church, and to Miss Albro, for her regular attendance at the Organ.

The record of Baptisms, etc., is included in Rev. H. A. Brook's report.

## BARFORD.

The Rev. G. H. A. Murray reports:—

No change has been made during the past year in the general work of this Mission; and though the signs of progress may not seem so evident as in the reports of some by-gone years, yet it must be remembered that the ground has been gone over so often by both the Evangelist's plough and the Revivalist's harrow, that what still remains fallow is so hard and barren as to require years of faithful work before the good seed can even be rooted, much less yield a fruitful harvest. All that remains, however, is to toil on, sowing

in hope, and trusting that God in His own good time will give the increase. The finances of both the Dixville and Stanhope congregations, especially the latter, have been seriously affected by the dullness of the lumber market, as a large proportion of our people are partly dependent on this industry for their livelihood. This accounts for the deficit in the Church Society contributions, and the difficulty in meeting the demands of the Diocesan Board. The Harvest Thanksgiving Services were well attended, and I have to thank the Revs. Canon Foster, Prof. Wilkinson, and A. E. Whatham for appropriate sermons and other assistance. Nor shall I forget the kindness and sympathy evinced towards myself and family by individual members of the different congregations.

*Dixville.*—There is very little change in the average attendance at the Church Services; the Sunday School, however, is still growing. The gap in the teaching staff made by Miss Boright's removal has been very efficiently filled by Mrs. F. Damon, until her recent illness, which it is hoped will not be of long duration. Death has removed from our midst two regular communicants. Mrs. George Mayhew, snr., the oldest member of the congregation, passed away peacefully on the 28th of last December. My first duty Christmas morning was the administration to her and some of her near relatives of "the most comfortable Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ." On the 26th of October, after a short but severe illness, borne with Christian resignation, A. E. Johnson, a young man in the prime of life, fell a victim to Typhoid Fever. His loss is deeply felt not only in the home circle, but also in the congregation, as he was a steady, industrious and dutiful son and took an active part in the Choir and other Church work.

The assessment has been increased \$10 per annum.

*St. Lawrence's, Barford.*—Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Ward have gone to reside in England; their place has been filled by Mr. and Mrs. E. Molony, who are also staunch members of the Church.

*Stanhope.*—The Ladies' Guild made an Easter presentation to the Church of a beautiful stained-glass East window and two small coloured side windows for the Chancel, the work of Spence & Sons, Montreal. The total cost was \$100, which amount has been paid. The Guild continues to work diligently in order to raise funds for further improvements. On the 13th September, the windows were

consecrated by the Bishop. His Lordship, after having given a graphic description of the Jubilee and Lambeth Conference proceedings, congratulated the workers on what they had already done, and incited the congregation to take an active part in the beautifying of their Church. There was a Celebration of the Holy Communion the following morning, and the forenoon was spent in making parochial calls.

On account of removals this congregation is decreasing instead of increasing. Mrs. H. W. Marsh and Miss Cassidy, who are in charge of the Sunday School, do what they can to make it a success. The next item of interest is the marriage of the Organist. A prominent member of the Choir was the lucky man. Had Mr. and Mrs. Burgess remained in the place, the Church would not have lost anything; but they have gone to Newport, Vt. The change, however, has not been an unmixed evil, for our loss is Newport's gain; besides, others have stepped into the gap and, in consequence, are becoming more interested in the Services of the Church.

The yearly assessment has been raised \$20; but there are doubts as to the congregations being able to keep up its payments at the new rate.

*Perryboro'.*—The last time the Bishop visited this part of the Mission, His Lordship suggested that the Church should be enlarged. The matter was brought up at the Easter Vestry Meeting, when it was decided to carry out the project. Mr. Hobson kindly offered all the lumber necessary, others volunteered labour, so that everything is in readiness to go on with the work next spring. The Hon. Senator Price and Dr. Robert Hamilton have each contributed towards the Building Fund in their usual liberal way.

This congregation mourns the loss of John Robertson, another promising young man, in the prime of life, cut off by Typhoid Fever, who, before he left for Coaticook, where he had resided for nearly two years, was a regular attendant and communicant here. He was a general favourite, and his funeral was largely attended by representatives from the different societies to which he belonged. We have lost a faithful Organist and a good worker in the person of Miss Walker, who, on the 10th November, changed her name to Mrs. Jordan and her address to Barnston.

Wont some of our enterprising young men try to bring in a few fair Organists to take the place of those who have

gone out from us? The removal of the Robertsons to Coaticook has deprived this congregation, for the time being at least, of a family of regular attendants and active workers. Mrs. Robertson was president of the Guild. The attendance here is always in keeping with the Church population. An increase of \$10 in the assessment may also be noted. Baptisms, 11; Marriage, 1; Burials, 9.

## BISHOP'S COLLEGE, LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. Principal Adams reports :—

It is with a feeling of true gratitude we report at the close of another year.

The Services in the Chapel are as follows:—Holy Communion every Sunday at 7.30. First and third Sundays in the month at the 10.30 Service also. Holy-days—Holy Communion at 7.15. Matins—Sundays at 10.30. Week-days at 9. Evensong—Sundays at 7. Other days at 6. Litany—when not said at the Morning Service on Sundays, at 5.15 p.m. Wednesdays and Fridays at 1 p.m. The appointment of a paid Organist has enabled us to have Musical Services every evening of the week. The members of the Brotherhood of Readers not only read the lessons at the week-day Services in turn but also act as Sacristans, two members each week in rotation under the direction of the Professor of Pastoral Theology.

The Ladies of the College have recently been formed into a Guild under the direction of the Professor of Pastoral Theology, Mrs. Adams having been appointed Secretary.

This year we have to express our cordial thanks to the Ladies of the St. Matthew's Guild for completing the Altar Sets by the addition of a new violet and a green Frontal, both very beautiful. During the year the Chancel has been completed by the addition of a hardwood floor and by the panelling of the walls. The stalls and the hardwood floor of the main body of the Chapel are also in hand. A very important step has been taken with regard to the stained-glass windows. All the remaining windows, seven in number, are now practically secured; the Bishop of Quebec and Hon. E. J. Price having conjointly made themselves responsible for five windows, on condition that the funds are forthcoming for two others, one in memory of E. Chapman, Esq., the other in memory of A. D. Nicolls, Esq. Mr. Chapman passed away just before the Jubilee at a ripe old age, after a long life devoted to the interests of the College, the community, and the Church. We have this year to deplore the loss of Mr. Nicolls at the early age of 42. He was heart and soul devoted to the interests of the Institution, of which he was in a very true sense a son. His generous bequest of \$3,000 to found Scholarships in the name of his honoured father, Dr. Jasper Hume Nicolls, has been recorded elsewhere; but such a bequest, as well

as the public spirited act of the late J. H. R. Molson, Esq., of Montreal, in bequeathing \$10,000 to Bishop's College School, ought to be chronicled here as well as in the public papers. The year 1897 has not seen so far any very considerable addition to the Jubilee Fund, but it must not be forgotten that though the College did not profit by the great Marriott bequest, it still has to earn the conditional grant of £1,000 from the S. P. C. K. towards the endowment of the Principalship and the Professorship of Pastoral Theology. Something like \$4,000 is needed for this purpose. We have every reason for being thankful for the general response made to the appeal of 1895-96, but we have no reason to rest from our labours in this respect.

Periodical meetings of the Missionary Union have been held, and the offerings of this Society have been forwarded for the benefit of St. Paul's College in Madagascar. Three of our students have been ordained Priests and four have been ordained Deacons during the year. One of the latter group, the Rev. B. Watson, B.A., has joined the School Staff as an assistant Master and is now taking Sunday duty at Moulton Hill. Mr. Watson also takes occasional duty in the College Chapel.

At Convocation time we had the University Sermon given by our new neighbour, the Rev. Dr. Dumbell, who has taken the place upon the College Council vacated by the Bishop of Algoma. On the same occasion Archdeacon Mills, D.D., of Montreal, who was receiving from our University the *ad eundem* degree, gave us an admirable speech, shewing insight into and strong sympathy with our work and methods. On the same occasion the American Church was represented by a Baltimore Rector, Rev. Dr. Powell.

The periodical visits of the Bishop regularly once a term have brought us encouragement and instruction, and we have to express our cordial thanks for much useful advice and guidance in practical matters such as those connected with the restoration of the Chapel, and in many other ways.

Members of the Church Society will be glad to know that the very considerable increase in both departments (College and School) which characterised both College and School in 1896, has been followed by another increase in 1897. Thus there are now sixty-seven attending the College and ninety attending the School.

During the year the early and late Celebrations have been well attended. There was no Confirmation in June, but one has been arranged for within the first ten days of December, 1897.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE SCHOOL MISSION.

Up to June 30th, the following work was done :

Every Sunday : (1) Service at Moulton Hill at 3 p.m., preceded by a Sunday School. (2) Service at Haskell Hill School-house at 3 p.m. (3) Sunday School at Bullard School-house, and also Sunday School at the new Church at Eustis every Sunday afternoon. (4) Once a fortnight—Belvidere School-house. All these Services were discontinued during the Vacation. It is hoped that during the coming summer means will be found to keep these Services open. Since early in October three of these have been continued; but up to the present time the services of the Students have not been resumed at the Bullard School-house or at Eustis. In the Services held, an average attendance of fifteen to twenty might be expected as a rule. One instance of generous self-denial ought to be mentioned : Mrs. Edna Johnson refused to accept any remuneration for the board of a Student during the summer of 1896. The Belvidere School-house people paid \$6.54 towards our travelling expenses. Haskell Hill and Moulton Hill are employing their offerings in paying for organs for worship.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE BROTHERHOOD OF READERS.

(Report made up by the Vice-Warden, W. R. Hibbard, B.A., at the request of the Warden, the Rev. Professor Wilkinson, M.A.)

The Missionary work done by the members of the Brotherhood of Readers during the past year is as follows :

Mr. W. R. Hibbard, with Mr. Vial, took Services at Haskell Hill School-house on Sunday afternoons from December 1896 to June 1897, inclusive. On first Sunday after Easter and on 20th June (Jubilee Sunday) Mr. Hibbard took duty at the Church of the Advent, East Sherbrooke. For three weeks in July he relieved the Rev. G. F. Hibbard, Priest in charge of Montmorency, Lake Beauport and Stoneham. From August 6th to September 6th he relieved the Rev. H. S. Harte, Priest in charge of Mission of St. George, Beauce. During the Michaelmas term he assisted the Rev. T. Blaylock at Danville and Mission Stations.

Mr. John G. Holah—From second Sunday in Advent, 1896, to sixth Sunday after Trinity, 1897, conducted forty-three Services at Stanstead, thirty-five at Beebe Plain, three at Marlow, one at Hatley and two at Ayer's Flat. From seventh to eleventh Sunday after Trinity, nine Services at East Angus and five at Ascot Corner. From twelfth to fifteenth Sunday after Trinity, eight Services at Lake Megantic and three at Three Lakes. On Sundays nineteenth and twentieth after Trinity, two Services at Windsor and two at Brompton.

Mr. J. J. Lowe, during the months of July, August and part of September, took the duty at Compton in the absence of the Rector.

Mr. A. H. Wurtele assisted at Moulton Hill on December 6th, 13th and 20th, February 23rd, March 21st and 28th, April 4th and 11th, May 2nd, 10th and 23rd, June 6th; at Newport, January 17th; at Acton, January 3rd and 10th, April 18th and 19th, and from June 27th to September 12th.

Mr. W. E. Patterson was in charge of Hereford Mission up till February 27th, 1897.

Mr. C. Wilfred Balfour, during the Christmas and Easter Vacations, and on the three last Sundays of the Long Vacation, assisted the Rev. L. C. Wurtele, of Acton Vale; from January 24th to June 20th, with the exception of four Sundays, took duty at Moulton Hill, assisted in Sunday School, occasionally taking the Bible Class; on June 27th assisted the Rev. A. H. Moore, of Sawyerville, and during the month of July and first week in August had charge of the Mission; August 8th, took duty in Bury for the Rev. C. B. Washer; August 15th and 22nd in Cookshire for Rev. A. H. Robertson; September 26th, in Sawyerville; October 3rd, assisted at Moulton Hill; October 10th at Sandhill and Johnville;

since October 24th has been taking Services at Haskell Hill with charge of a Bible Class.

Mr. J. W. Wayman, till 1st July, 1897, when he was taken ill, assisted the Rev. T. Blaylock, of Danville.

Mr. E. N. R. Burns—From December 6th, 1896, to March 14th, 1897, taught Candidates for Confirmation or Sunday School at St. Barnabas' Church, Milby, continuously during this time (except on two Sundays in January); April 18th (Easter Day,) May 2nd, and during Long Vacation, took Morning Service at St. Barnabas', Milby, usually in conjunction with Mr. Callis (who also assisted in the Sunday School) on ten Sundays. Assisted Rev. B. G. Wilkin-son on other Sundays and on two special occasions; spent two months in Sherbrooke working with the Rev. Dr. Dumbell. Total number of Services, either taken entirely or assisted at, 120; visits paid, chiefly in East Sherbrooke, 185.

Mr. A. W. Dutton—From December 26th, 1896, to January 21st, 1897, in charge of Parish of Vankleek Hill, Ont. On one Sunday in February and one in March, took Service at Windsor Mills. From July 15th to August 15th assisted Rural Dean Philips, of Hawksbury, Ont.

Mr. W. H. Moor—Assisted Rev. J. Kerr, D.D., of Grace Church, Montreal, during the Christmas Vacation. Took the Services at Hereford from February to October. October 23rd, took duty at Dixville; November 14th, at Sandhill and Johnville; November 28th, at Cookshire.

Mr. P. Callis—From December 1896 to June 1897, assisted in St. George's Sunday School, Lennoxville. January 17th, took Service at Rivière-du-Loup. January 24th, March 27th and October 10th, assisted at Milby; April 4th and November 7th, at Sandhill and Johnville; April 18th, at Eustis. July to September, in charge of Mission of Dennistown. October 31st, assisted at Moulton Hill; November 14th and 21st, at Coaticook, and October 21st and 24th, and November 25th, at Dennistown.

Mr. J. A. Wilson—Assisted the Venerable Archdeacon Roe during the month of June, 1897. Took charge of the Mission of Windsor Mills during the Long Vacation. Is at present assisting the Rev. A. H. Robertson at Sandhill and Johnville.

There have left us during the past year Messrs. Watson, B.A., Vial, B.A., Pye, B.A., Gustin, B.A., Dowdell, B.A., and Bates, B.A., of whom the first three have been admitted to the Diaconate.

The following were admitted by the Bishop in the Chapel of Bishop's College on Monday, 6th December:—Percy Boyle, B.A., J. S. Brewes, B.A., E. Browne, F. D. W. Carroll, Harold F. Hamilton, Frederick G. LeGallais, Charles W. Mitchell, B.A., Ernest R. Roy, John C. Tannar, and Frederick C. Taylor.

The number of members is now twenty-four; larger than ever before.

BOURG LOUIS.

The Rev. J. B. Debbage writes:—

The year so soon to come to an end has been for us one unmarked by great events in the work of the Mission; but one of quiet work. Those who would ascend the ladder which Jacob saw, must do it step by step. One step more ascended does not seem much, but it is a gain, and by it we are raised a little higher to Him who is at the top. And so we trust that we have been ascending.

Our usual Services have been maintained on the Sundays and on special occasions marked by our Church. I have three Services on Sundays, two in the Church and one in the afternoon at some outstation. My youngest daughter kept up a Sunday School class during the summer, but it has been closed for a few Sundays during the worst part of the winter. I feel much encouraged by our young people. They attend our Services faithfully, and seem to take more and more interest in them. In the decorating of the Church for Christmas, the larger part of the work is done by them. Unfortunately for us the great majority of them will leave this place, and their lives will be spent elsewhere; but we hope they will never forget or lose attachment to the Church they attended in their younger days, and which helped to keep up the schools in which they acquired the education which qualifies and makes them more competent for the duties of life, and by which they often get into positions that they could not otherwise have filled.

It goes almost without saying that our Bishop has been with us, and has held a Confirmation. His Lordship came on the 10th of this month (December). In a Mission where almost all adults have been confirmed, where the sacred privilege of Confirmation is offered annually, and where the English population is decreasing, the number of Candidates for Confirmation can scarcely be expected to increase from year to year, however faithfully a Clergyman may

strive to do his duty. Our class this year was small. I am hoping to see all the newly confirmed receive their first Communion on Christmas Day. His Lordship as usual gave two addresses, both replete with instruction, and with encouragement to persevere in spite of failures. My people were deeply impressed and helped by his Lordship's earnest words and pleadings.

Situated as my Mission is, somewhat on the northern confines of the Diocese, I seldom have the pleasure of a visit from a brother Clergyman. Last autumn formed an exception to the rule. For three weeks we had the happiness of having in our neighbourhood the Rev. F. G. Scott, of St. Matthew's Church, Quebec, and his family—spending their vacation; and on three Sundays he most kindly preached for me, greatly to the delight of my people and myself. The wild but grand scenery hidden amongst our mountains had attracted our Canadian poet. We thank the author of the "The Unnamed Lake," of whom we are all so justly proud, for immortalizing our scenery, and we promise him a hearty welcome whenever he returns to us.

Our three schools aided by the Church Society were in operation during the first part of the year, but only two during the latter part. Miss Allen, the efficient teacher of No. 1 school is, with the assistance of others, preparing for the little ones a Christmas Tree, and an entertainment. I have to thank my parishioners for work kindly done on the Glebe, including the erection of a wire fence, etc.

#### BURY.

The Rev. C. B. Washer writes:—

The end of another ecclesiastical year brings with it the duty of reporting. Much matter has been sent to the *Diocesan Gazette*, and this need not now be reproduced. A few notes will suffice.

*St. Paul's*.—The congregations have been maintained, and the numbers at Holy Communion have increased. We have had two Confirmations during the year,—eleven

persons confirmed in the first, of whom two were married, and nine in the other, of whom six were married. The additions to Chancel by decoration of walls and, by gift of Altar furniture, donated by Rev. Canon Richardson, of Quebec, are a decided gain. (See *Diocesan Gazette* for August last.) By the time these words are in print a furnace will be in position under the Church, a result of the exertions of certain good ladies of the congregation. The Sunday School continues its valuable labours, but is not as regularly and numerously attended as might be. Before closing this part of my report, I would add that our Service of Thanksgiving, on November 25th, a few days ago, was an improvement on the past. Congregation about sixty-five, of whom forty-one took Communion. The offertory (for Pension Fund) was as large as a fair-weather Sunday special collection. Since we had no decorations, nor anything out of the common, one has reason to believe that the attendance was the outcome of thankful hearts. "I will give thanks unto the Lord with my whole heart; secretly among the faithful, and *in the congregation.*"

*St. John's.*—The fortnightly Services,—3 p.m., and on Communion Sundays at 9 a.m.,—have been continued. Progress here is very slow. Much more labour needs to be put into the district, and there should be Service in the Church *every* Sunday. A good horse-shed has been erected by the willing hands of the men of the congregation, next to the Church-yard, on a piece of land kindly given by Mrs. Vannever, of Boston, U. S. I have not represented the value of the work done and material given in the Financial Statement. The new shed succeeds a dilapidated one that was in a corner of the Church-yard, and is constructed with a view to the greatest convenience.

*St. Thomas'.*—Services here on alternate Sunday afternoons with St. John's, Holy Communion also at 9 a.m. The event of the year, of course, has been the completion and consecration of the new Church. In order to use it while the Bishop was in England, as necessary preliminaries could not be settled before he went, his Lordship was asked to *dedicate*, and dedicated it was on April 21st. On this occasion, eight Candidates were confirmed, including two married persons. The congregations have been good. At the July Communion we had a congregation of sixty-two, and of these thirty-eight communicated. The Lord Bishop was here again on September 26th, and consecrated the building. Seventy-four persons communicated,

increase due to friends outside district joining. Of the cost connected with building the Church, the people provided two-thirds in money and work, and kind brethren elsewhere willingly helped those who were helping themselves. Special thanks to dear old Quebec! A good five-hundred-pound Meneely Bell has been placed in the turret, and calls over hill and dale to worship. At this writing, a horse-shed, forming two sides of a square, is rapidly rising, speed accelerated by increasing cold.

With evident signs that the Lord is with us, we look forward with courage to begin another year, desiring to give greater diligence, and saying as earnestly as ever, "Brethren, pray for us!"

## CAPE COVE AND PERCE.

The Rev. Rural Dean Lyster writes :—

I am unable to report any changes in the condition of this Mission. The financial difficulties to which I referred in my last report are more seriously felt this year than ever before. The general depression of the fish markets of Europe and Brazil have caused much loss to the merchants on this coast, and their business is now the reverse of encouraging. The people are all more or less affected by this ; and though no absolute want has yet been felt, one frequently hears the expression, "there is no money in the place." In spite of this, the usual assessment has been remitted to the Diocesan Board ; and collections, though not large, have been extremely liberal, when our difficulties are considered.

I was sorry to be unable to present any Candidates for Confirmation, when the Lord Bishop paid us his annual visit ; we were all cheered however by his Lordship's kind words of encouragement, and edified by his instructive discourses.

For the first time in nearly forty years, I was laid up for nearly two months in spring, by severe illness, which at one time brought me so low that I hardly expected to recover. God, in His mercy, was pleased to restore me to health but the effects of influenza were felt for a long time. During my illness, Rev. Mr. Richmond kindly held Services on one Sunday in both Churches ; and my Lay-Readers and Lay-Helpers were extremely kind and active in the performance of their duties. Services were held with unfailing regularity in both Churches, and I am glad to say were well attended.

I gratefully add, that much kindness and sympathy were shewn for me during my trying and tedious illness.

We are very thankful for the grants, though much di-

minished, to our schools; without assistance it would be very difficult to keep them constantly in operation.

COATICOOK.

The Rev. Canon Foster writes :—

I have nothing strange or startling to report in connection with the Church's work in this Parish during the current year. The usual Sunday, Advent, and Lenten Services, at both St. Stephen's and Christ Church, have been kept up with unflinching regularity. The Sunday School in connection with St. Stephen's Church is carried on by Mr. J. J. Fiske, manager of the Penman Manufactory's Mill here, assisted by a staff of Lay Teachers, who render willing and efficient service. Mr. Fiske is a very busy man, yet he finds time to act as superintendent of the Sunday School of the congregation in which he worships. The Sunday School at Christ Church, North Coaticook, is not in a flourishing condition, owing to the difficulty of procuring efficient teachers.

I have three Services with Sermons every Sunday, and a fourth Service, with Catechising, every second Sunday in the month. These Services take up so much of my time that I find it impossible to give as much time to teaching and catechising as I ought to do. I am happy to report that the Bishop has kindly recommended Mr. Philip Callis, a member of Bishop's College Brotherhood of Readers, to

assist me on Sundays until the close of the College in June next. With Mr. Callis' help I hope to have two Services with Sunday School in each Church, with catechising, every Sunday. From this change I look for those good results which are sure to follow faithful catechising.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Parish is still in active operation. The Secretary reports that the interest in Mission work is steadily increasing, and that many of the members who lead busy lives at home, and whose means are small, devote themselves earnestly to the work, and give cheerfully and liberally. The members meet at the different houses with unfailing regularity. This year two bales of clothing have been sent to the Indians in the North West, at a cost of \$83.39, and a third bale is now in preparation. The Woman's Auxiliary have also sent six dollars in aid of Domestic and Foreign Missions.

Much needed repairs in the way of painting, tinting, rebuilding chimneys, etc., have been made to the Rectory, and the Sexton's house, during the summer, the whole at a cost of about \$82.00. Funds are being collected for the re-shingling of Christ Church, and the horse-shed at North Coaticook next spring.

The Rev. G. H. Parker writes :—

## COOKSHIRE.

The Rev. Alex. H. Robertson reports :—

*St. Peter's Church, Cookshire.*—On December 27th the Lord Bishop held a Dedication Service at the reopening of the restored and enlarged Church. His Lordship expressed his approval of all that had been done, and I think that all our people, without exception, are proud of our Church, and

the feeling has been expressed in a larger average attendance for the year. I am glad to report that all accounts have been paid, and the Church is entirely free of debt.

On Sunday, 20th June, the Jubilee Service was attended by the Mayor and Council, School Commissioners, Military, the Masons, and other Societies; all Christian bodies joining in the Service.

In response to a general invitation from the Rector and congregation of St. Peter's, the Clergy and people of the Cookshire Deanery assembled for a Deanery Meeting at Cookshire. The Rector of Lennoxville and the Clergy from Bishop's College favoured us with their presence, and Rev. Dr. Dumbell preached at the Evening Service. We hope to make this Rural Deanery Meeting an annual event.

Our Bishop spent Sunday, 31st October, with us, and administered the Rite of Confirmation here and at Sandhill and Johnville. Including an Address at the early Celebration on Monday (All Saints' Day), his Lordship gave eight earnest and inspiring Sermons or Addresses during the twenty-four hours he spent in our Parish.

Our thanks are due to Mrs. R. H. Pope and daughters for the gift of a beautiful Altar Cloth of exquisite workmanship. Our Guild and Woman's Auxiliary continue their helpful work for the Church and for Missions. Our Sunday School shows the largest average attendance we have ever had, and while we feel that much more might be done by both Rector and people, yet we are thankful for the real progress that is shown in all our parochial life.

*St. Luke's, Sandhill, and Johnville.*—At Sandhill and Johnville also I have had the assistance of Mr. T. Dowdell, B.A., of Bishop's College, who has done his duty faithfully and well during the past year. Mr. J. O. Wilson has now taken over the work. I must thank the Ladies' Guild, both at Sandhill and Johnville, for their valuable assistance in many ways. Mrs. E. P. Smith, as organist, and a large and efficient Choir at Johnville are a great help; and Miss Persis Coates has acted as organist at Sandhill with much acceptance.

*St. Andrew's Chapel, Eaton Corner.*—Our numbers here are few, but all work earnestly together for the good of the Church, and my thanks are due to all my helpers and fellow workers in all parts of this large Parish.

## DANVILLE.

The Rev. Thos. Blaylock writes :—

We have just finished the first year of possession of our new Church, which also marks the beginning of the tenth year of my ministry here. The building has fulfilled our expectations as regards convenience and comfort. Its suitability for public worship is self-evident. Everything about it speaks of its holy purpose and tends to promote the spirit of reverence. May we profit by it as we ought.

The ordinary Services have been well attended and reg-

ularly kept up with the exception of the Sunday Evening Services in August and September, which had to be given up on account of the sickness of the Lay Reader, Mr. Wayman, who, I regret to say, has had to resign his position here. I am very much indebted to Dr. Adams, of Lennoxville, for help on several occasions during the year. His kindness of heart I greatly appreciate. He is ever ready to help in time of need. Inspector Hewton has also given me much valued aid. We have had several special Services, Masonic Church Parade, Foresters also, and a special Choir Festival, when the Choir from St. Anne's Church, Richmond, came over. We had a delightful Service, Dr. Dumbell preaching and Mr. Dorey presiding at the organ. Both sermon and music were much enjoyed by the large congregation present.

The Choir and Organist have been very faithful to their duties. The singing has greatly improved; there is however great room for improvement in the way of hearty responses. The offertories have been very good, better than ever; but I am sorry to say that some families are very backward about subscribing to the assessment, and some who do subscribe forget to pay. This should not so be. Five cents put in the Sunday collection will not do much to keep up the worship of the Almighty in our midst, yet a few are content with this. They realize neither their obligations nor privileges, but are quite willing to give up both, to our few ever willing and generous supporters. I am however most thankful to say that here and at all the Missions the Church-Wardens have met all the demands of the Board upon them. The very respectable sum of \$1,374.71 has been raised in the Parish, which would be perceptibly increased if I had received full returns from Kingsey Falls and Lorne. At all the outside Churches the regular Services have been kept up, and the appeals of the Church Society responded to and a fair sum raised, thanks to the diligence of the lady collectors. In fact a good percentage of the total raised, viz., the sum of \$185.75, is for non-parochial objects.

There are fair Sunday Schools with diligent teachers at Danville and Troutbrook. I have very loyal helpers in the Church-Wardens and all other workers. They deserve my best thanks. On the whole, we can look back on the year that is past, and find room for encouragement for the future.

## DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Rev. R. J. Fothergill writes:—

On Sunday, November 25th, 1896, I took my first Services in this Parish; and on January 12th, 1897, I was formally inducted by the Rural Dean, the Rev. Jas. Hepburn, M.A., assisted by the Rev. D. Horner, of Durham. During the year Services have been held regularly in the Parish Church on Sundays, and during the week a Service on Friday evenings. In Lent and Holy Week there were more frequent Services. In spite of very bad roads the Devotion of the Three Hours on Good Friday was very fairly well attended. At Mitchell Station, about fourteen miles from Drummondville, Services are held at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. But somewhat irregularly I regret to

say, the distance and bad roads frequently making it impossible for me to go and return in time for Evensong at Drummondville. The Sunday School, held after the Morning Service, has been continued, but the scattered nature of the Parish makes it very difficult for the children to attend, especially in winter, with anything like regularity, and the school suffers in consequence.

During the Christmas holidays a very enjoyable entertainment and Christmas Tree was given for the children. And a little later a very successful concert was held by members of the congregation, kindly assisted by Mr. Dunn and Miss Clarke of Montreal. So successful was it in every way that a great part of the concert was repeated at Forrestdale, a neighbouring place on the D. C. Railway. The money thus raised was used for the purchase of a carpet for the Chancel and matting for the aisle of the Church.

On the fifth Sunday in Lent the Bishop visited the Parish and confirmed ten Candidates, all of whom made their first Communion on Easter Day. The Woman's Auxiliary has continued its work both at Drummondville and St. Germain, and a barrel of clothing, etc., was sent off last summer to the Rev. E. Thomas, of Fort Alexander, Manitoba. Money has been collected in the Parish by Mrs. W. J. Watkins, Mrs. R. L. Mitchell and Mrs. Fothergill, with which it is proposed to get a Frontal for the Altar and other hangings, which are now being made by the St. Matthew's Guild in Quebec.

In October we had a meeting of the Deanery, at which Mr. Wurtele and Mr. Horner read very interesting papers. And Missionary Addresses were given at the Evening Service by Mr. Wurtele and Mr. Curran. Last summer we were very glad to welcome the Rev. F. G. Scott in his old Parish. Mr. Scott preached two very helpful sermons, and otherwise cheered us up greatly. The Rev. Wm. Mitchell and my father, the Rev. M. M. Fothergill, also visited the Parish during the summer and preached in the Church.

In closing this report I would tender my thanks for many acts of kindness shown by members of the Parish ; and I would thank the Drummond County Railway Company for an Annual Pass, as also the Church-Wardens, Organist and Choir, and all who have in any way assisted me in the work of the Church.

## DURHAM.

The Rev. David Horner reports :—

Church life is evident in this Mission; and yet in our work we have not escaped discouragements, for during the year we have lost by death many valued members, who in their lifetime were loyal and active supporters of the Church, and helpful by reason of their good example. Their removal is a serious loss to the Mission, and promises to increase our financial difficulties, which already were not light. On the other hand we have had many things to cheer us, and it is with much thankfulness we note the extraordinary interest and efforts shewn by the congregation and people of South Durham in the building of their new Church. Ven. Archdeacon Roe attended a Vestry meeting, called in July, and gave us valuable suggestions, and the Rev. James Hepburn, our Rural Dean, came to the place on the occasion of the laying of the corner stone (which was laid by Mr. Benjamin Dowd), and gave us an able lecture on Early English Church History. The Church (unfurnished) is to cost \$1,150; the plan is similar to that of S. Paul's Church, L'Avenir. The contractor, Mr. Nathan Montgomery, has secured the experienced help of Mr. Wm. Beard who built S. Paul's Church. The local subscription list comprises no less than sixty names, and was started at a time of agricultural and financial depression; but the amounts ranging as they do from \$25 to not less than \$1 are a fair indication of substantial interest, especially when we add the result of the untiring work of the Ladies' Aid, \$302. Many of the subscribers are not adherents of the Church of England, yet they most kindly contributed, wishing, as they said, "to shew their good-will, and help a good cause." Others, moreover, shewed such a startling willingness to subscribe, that our local treasurer, in one instance, felt it his duty to refuse an amount offered, and

accept instead a smaller one,—but this was unique, however! Miss Lena Church (the Methodist organist) started a scheme about a month ago, amongst the young women of the community, to purchase a Bell for the new Church; each member of the society giving 50 cents, with the capital of which they individually are expected to gain by trading or skill, whatever they can. The society is yet in its infancy, but it already shews undoubted vigour. Some of the men of the South Durham congregation, have given three days to the work of levelling and improving the ground surrounding the site of the new Church, and two days to work about the grave-yard.

At L'Avenir the Church-yard and grave-yard have been fenced, but the work is not yet completed.

The School Commissioners of Ulverton have voted the sum of fifty dollars to be paid to the authorities of Kirkdale Church, for the use they had of the Church Hall for school purposes in days gone by; but, as the Church-Wardens have not yet collected the amount, I have not inserted it in the present year's report. The fund referred to in the Kirkdale financial list is to be used for finishing the wood-shed of the Parsonage and barn, and adding a storm porch to the kitchen.

The current expenses of Kirkdale Church (see financial statement) are greater than in the other Churches, since at L'Avenir and South Durham much of the necessary work about the Church is done free of charge.

Last spring, a party of young people from Kirkdale drove out to South Durham over well nigh impassable roads, to give a concert in aid of the South Durham congregation, and made \$32.95, which was given to the secretary to fulfil the agreement made to the Diocesan Board; the deficit being caused by the Church-Wardens promising more than their subscription list justified; the amount had been accumulating for some time, and I felt justified in using this means of replenishing the treasury, from the fact that I was expecting then to leave the Mission, and I wished to leave it clear of debt. One of the young people who so willingly helped us, James William Stevens, died a few weeks afterwards.

I beg to thank the kind friends who have helped us during the present year: Mr. Wm. Lyster for a load of hay, Mrs. Mansbridge, Mr. Wm. Stevens, Mr. John Hall, Mr. Wm. G. Lyster, Mr. Henry Thompson and Mr. James Dowd for various kind gifts received from time to time. I have also

to report and to thank our kind friends in Quebec for their welcome gifts to the building fund of South Durham Church, amounting in all to \$167.50; especially his Lordship the Bishop of Quebec for \$25, and Mr. Robert Hamilton for \$100.

EAST ANGLUS.

The Rev. W. A. Adcock reports :—

The work of the past year has been much the same as formerly; we have endeavoured to gather up the fragments of opportunity whenever possible, and have done or tried to do what we could for the good of the cause. Sixteen have been confirmed, all of whom are Communicants. The Parsonage is now practically free of all debt, and very soon we hope to improve the condition of the Church and make it more suitable for Divine Worship. Much needs to be done, and yet with such a floating population as ours it is not easy to accomplish much. Our assessments have been paid very promptly. The Sunday attendance at Church is good, especially so in the evening. The Sunday School marks an important feature in the Church's work and is encouraging, increasing in numbers and doing Missionary work. We have one special Sunday Service for the young

with public catechising. With the aid of the S. P. C. K. we have purchased some \$60 worth of good books. The Ladies' Guild seems to be flourishing and promises good work for the future. Many acts of kindness and good-will have been shown me by my parishioners during the past year, among other tokens I should mention the gift of a good horse.

While thankful for much, it has often been that the bare necessities of life are valued at a price; with us good water within one-seventh of a mile is a luxury, not always to be obtained even within that distance. We have a tank for rain water and are thankful for that blessing.

The work at Ascot is encouraging. The attendance at Church is fair and even large when roads are good. The village, which four years ago was inhabited by our own people, is now almost entirely handed over to the French. The grounds about the Church here have been graded, and trees planted thereon, while the interior of the Church has undergone some improvements. The Altar has been raised on a platform of two steps, and a Retable and Dossil added. New matting too has been provided. Our assessments here have never been paid more promptly than during the past year, which is due to our keeping this obligation constantly before the people; neither has their interest ever been keener in the Church's Services than now.

## FITCH BAY AND GEORGEVILLE.

The Rev. R. W. E. Wright reports :—

In looking back over the work in this Mission during the past year, I find that there is very little to chronicle that has not already appeared in print in our *Diocesan Gazette*. The work has been going on steadily and the routine of Services kept up regularly, viz., four and five every Sunday, Celebration of the Holy Communion every Sunday and on Saints' Days.

*Fitch Bay*.—The Services in S. Matthias' Church have been regularly kept up during the past year, — every Sunday Matins and Evensong, and Holy Communion every alternate Sunday, either at 8 A.M. or mid-day. Following the mind of the Church, last spring, I began holding Celebrations of the Holy Communion on every Saint's Day at 7.30 A.M. This has met with great encouragement, an average of one-third of the Communicants in the village being always present. This Service, I regret to say, will have to be discontinued during the winter months. Friday evening Services, with an instruction on Church teachings, etc. Attendance at all Services good, considering the very few Church people in this village of many sects and places of worship. I am glad to say that our Sunday School has shewn a marked increase during the past twelve months.

Since last sending in a report, I have been working to get rid of some of the legacies, left me by my predecessor. A most unexpected debt came to our notice last spring, when we were informed that the Church seats had never been paid for, and that the money had only been advanced by a friend to allow the Church to be consecrated. There was no record of this debt, and no one in the Parish seemed to know anything about it; it amounted to \$55, of which the lender kindly gave \$10, and so far we have paid up about half of the balance. We have also made small payments on a note given some years ago for money advanced for Church purposes.

The Lord Bishop visited the Parish on November 2nd and 3rd, and administered the Apostolic Rite of Confirmation to three Candidates. Again I have to regret the loss of four of my young people (Communicants) by removal.

*Georgeville*.—The Services in S. George's Church have been regularly kept up, Matins and Evensong every Sunday, Celebration of the Holy Communion every alternate

Sunday, Wednesday evening Service with reading. The attendance at Services is fair but ought to be better. In the summer the congregations are very good. The Ladies' Guild and Children's Guild, who meet and work during the winter months, held their Annual Bazaar and Concert in August,—assisted very materially on both by our summer visitors,—part of the amount so raised has been used to paint the Church and the balance to pay off another note of many years' standing. On Wednesday, November 3rd, the Lord Bishop visited Georgeville, and after calling on several families residing on the outskirts of the village, held a short Service and delivered a most interesting lecture on the Queen's Jubilee Celebration and Lambeth Conference.

*Outstations.*—(1) *Bachelor's School-house.*—Services as usual have been regularly held here fortnightly on Thursday evenings. Attendance good. We have lately acquired an organ which improves and brightens the Service. The people held a Social last winter and gave the proceeds to the Wardens at Fitch Bay for Church purposes. (2) *Boyn-ton School-house.*—Services were not held here last summer. The few Church people in the vicinity are quite willing to come to Georgeville (not two and a half miles away), and no visitors were boarding in the neighborhood. The attendance at this School-house has never been at all encouraging. Services will be resumed if necessary.

I wish in conclusion to thank all my Lay-Helpers in the Mission, and especially my Lay-Reader, Dr. Codd, who takes two Services every Sunday, alternating with me, and so giving both Churches the privilege of both Matins and Evensong.

Our financial statements shew an increase of \$108.45 over that of last year, which I am very pleased to note.

## FRAMPTON.

The Rev. F. J. Boyle reports:—

In an old Mission like this, where every day and every year is so much like those that have gone by, there is really nothing new or striking to relate. The congregations too on the whole have been good and attentive. One encouraging feature in the record of the past year is this and it is exceptional: formerly, when I married a young couple, it was marriage first, then a general pack up and a start for parts unknown to seek their fortunes, but, last summer, I married six couples, and they have all (with one exception) settled down in this Mission and are doing fairly well.

We had a visit from our worthy Rural Dean, the Rev. I. Thompson, in September, and from our Bishop in October, when his Lordship confirmed fourteen Candidates.

## GASPE BASIN.

The Rev. J. P. Richmond reports :

The usual Services have been regularly held in this Mission, except at Christmas-tide, when I was absent owing to an enforced attendance at Quebec.

*S. Paul's Church.*—A good stained-glass East window has been placed in this Church, executed by Spence & Sons, of Montreal. Services continue to be held at the L'Anse au Cousin Settlement, on the North-West Arm of Gaspé Bay, but it is hard to get the families here to attend regularly. The Parsonage outbuildings have been supplied during the past year, and I hope another year will see the third flat in the house completed.

*S. James' Church.*—For the first time in ten years there has been trouble to meet the payments to the Diocesan Board. The increased assessments on account of the new Church in York falls upon the undivided congregation of S. James, without an increase in the contributions from York. This year witnessed a decrease in temporal prosperity on the Coast of Gaspé, and we have felt specially the closing of the blueberry factory and the great decrease of labour afforded from other sources. The blueberries were a loss to this and neighbouring Missions of \$1,500 to \$2,000, and during the autumn there was another falling off in labour amounting to about \$300 per week. Many of our young men are away at the lumber camps and the Railway. Many are looking forward to the completion of the Railway to Gaspé and the opening up of industries for which there is no lack of raw material in the County. I have to thank the Rev. G. T. Harding for a Service at S. James' Church on the Sunday after Christmas, as well as for his attention to sundry other calls from this Mission during my absence.

*S. Andrew's Church, York*—Still continues a part of S. James' Church congregation, and has a fortnightly Service, being served from Gaspé Basin and Sandy Beach. I have undertaken sole charge of these Services for the winter months, Mr. Harding taking my place at S. Paul's monthly.

## HATLEY.

The Rev. A. Stevens reports :—

During the past year the Services have been regularly kept up throughout the Mission. At S. James' Church the congregations have been somewhat larger than last year, particularly during the summer, when those who spent their holidays here were regular in their attendance. The Young Girls' Sewing Class met weekly during the school holidays at the Rectory, and in August held their sale, from which about \$45.00 was realized. The Woman's Auxiliary sent \$15.00 in money and a large bale of clothing to the Rev. J. Hinchliffe, for distribution among the destitute Indians on the Piegan Reserve near Macleod, N. W. T. The interior of the Church has been improved by the putting down of a new chancel carpet and new matting in the centre aisle. The convenience and comfort of the Rectory have been increased by the addition of a summer kitchen. I have had a donation of \$100.00 for the Endowment Fund, the donor stipulating that for the present it be invested by the Rector in a certain way, and the annual revenue be used for Church purposes. I have also the promise of another donation of like amount from another parishioner. At the recent visit of the Lord Bishop thirteen persons were confirmed and six adults were baptized the same day. From Massawippi there is nothing of a special nature to report. The Sunday evening Service has been maintained with about the usual attendance. I hope to have a class of young people ready for Confirmation here in the early summer. At Ayer's Flat our numbers have been decreased by death and removal. The Union Church in which our Service is held was required once a fortnight for another Service at the same hour at which our Service was held, consequently we have had only fortnightly Services here since the spring. On the Sunday afternoon when I am not at Ayer's Flat I have Service in the McConnell School-house, in the direction of Magog. This point is ten miles distant from Hatley, but I do not mind the longer drive, and we usually have a larger congregation than at Ayer's Flat. While from the peculiar conditions which surround us there are some discouragements, yet, on the whole, we have much to be thankful for, and good reason to be hopeful for the future.

## HEREFORD.

The Rev. C. E. Bishop reports :—

We came to this Mission on the 1st October and met with a cordial welcome. The Mission of Hereford includes Old Hereford and Hall's Stream, in the Diocese of Quebec, Beecher Falls, Averill and Canaan in Vermont, and West Stewartstown and Colebrook in the Diocese of New Hampshire. We have selected Canaan as our headquarters, this being the most central point of the Mission. Having been in residence less than two months, my knowledge of the Mission is soon told. I have a Service every Sunday morning in All Saints' Church, Hereford, every Sunday evening in West Stewartstown, and at Averill and Colebrook alternately on Sunday afternoon, making three Services every Sunday and a drive of twenty miles; and on alternate Friday evenings at Beecher Falls and Hall's Stream. The faithful ministrations of the Rev. E. K. Wilson, who left here over a year ago, have permeated the whole Mission with much good among all classes. Between the departure of Mr. Wilson and my arrival, the Services were taken chiefly by Messrs. Patterson and Moor, members of Bishop's College Brotherhood of Lay Readers. Their work was greatly appreciated throughout the Mission. During the same period, Baptisms, Marriages and Burials were most kindly taken by the Rev. Mr. Murray, of Dixville. The deep interest which the Ven. Archdeacon Roe has taken in this Mission and his services in its behalf are highly appreciated. At each station above mentioned we have a little band of faithful workers, whose readiness to help in the Sunday School, in the choir, and indeed in every way possible to further the interest and prosperity of the Church, lends great encouragement. At West Stewartstown, the Ladies' Guild, for a time in abeyance, is about to revive its work. It is a pity that the little new Church at Hall's

Stream had not been built nearer Beecher Falls : its holy purpose would then have come within the reach of many more than is now the case, and the Clergyman's labours have been lightened. It is a matter of much thankfulness to me to find in every part of the Mission many who are willing and anxious to do what in them lies to promote the welfare of the Church.

Yesterday being the National Thanksgiving Day, the Rev. A. H. Robertson, of Cookshire, kindly came and preached for me. We had an early Celebration here in Canaan, then a Service at 10.30 in All Saints' Church, and again an evening Service here. The Services throughout were well attended, bright and hearty, and much appreciated.

So brief has been my Incumbency, I am unable to furnish any financial statement. I believe the assessment of the Mission amounts to \$175.00. Since 1st May, 1896, there have been 2 Marriages, 18 Baptisms and 7 Burials. There have been two special offertory collections during the past two months, \$2.35 for the Pension Fund and \$2.83 for the Mission Fund.

#### INVERNESS.

The Rev. H. A. Dickson writes :—

The last ecclesiastical year has left the Church's work in this Mission in about the same condition as it was when I made my last report. When the direct results of the work are viewed, there are many marks of improvement on the part of individuals who are taking a new and keener interest in the welfare of the Church ; but on the other hand, when we look for progress, we find about as much undone by the removal of our people as we by our united efforts have been able to accomplish.

At St. Stephen's and Campbell's Corner the work has been carried on without any interruption or variation from the course pursued last year.

At S. Luke's Church, Adderley, the Church people are still few and the average attendance small. About nine months ago we began to hold fortnightly Services at a Union Chapel, three miles from Adderley, on alternate Sundays with those at S. Luke's Church, but no marked improvement is yet noticeable, and the results are yet to be seen.

## IRELAND AND PARTS ADJACENT.

The Rev. Wm. Barton reports :—

*St. John's Church, Thetford Mines.*—With thankfulness we record the steady growth in the numbers of our congregation. The regular Sunday Service is greatly appreciated by the members of all denominations. The Services are hearty and a more lively interest is taken in the general affairs of the Church. At the Annual Vestry Meeting a hearty vote of thanks was given to Mr. George R. Smith, M.P.P., for the Church sheds presented by him. By the perseverance and energy of our Church-Wardens, Messrs. Wm. Sharp and Robert Devinny, the assessment has been promptly paid, and the warming and lighting of our Church attended to. We take this opportunity of thanking them. A new stove has been placed in the Church, and an effort is being made to complete the internal furnishing of the Church. Since the beginning of September the work here has been carried on by the Rev. W. A. Gustin, B.A., who is ably assisting in the work of the Parish during the absence of the Rector, the Rev. W. G. *St. Mark's Church, Kinnear's Mills.*—With great thankfulness we are able to report that there are no longer any arrears of assessment here, and that we stand free of debt.

The words of our Bishop acted as a tonic, and all have been awakening to their privileges as members of Christ's Church. The congregation has grown wonderfully, the average attendance being double what it was last year. Through the kindness of St. Matthew's Guild and the Church Helpers' Association, supplemented by the subscriptions of our people, a new solid silver Communion Set has been obtained. The St. Matthew's Guild has also presented a complete set of Fair Linen. Very thankful are we to the Ladies of the Guild and the Church Helpers for their beautiful presents. Members of the congregation have assembled several times repairing and cleaning the Church. Work done for Him shall indeed be blessed. We are greatly in need of a new Church, the old one being scarcely habitable. It is the intention of the congregation this winter to make a great effort and see what can be done. The Rev. T. Ball has promised \$25.00 towards this object and several friends have promised help, for which we are very thankful.

#### KINGSEY.

The Rev. J. S. Sykes reports:—

The year just ended has been one with many encouragements and much to be thankful for. Our numbers are continually decreasing and more are preparing to move. But

this only brings to the surface the steadfastness and zeal of those that remain. Our offertories, special and general, and our annual subscriptions illustrate this; also, the regular attendance of our people at the Services of the Church, and the strongest point of all, the regular, undiminished number at every Communion. The past seasons have not been prosperous ones to many of our farmers; a wet spring and a long drought in the early part of the summer made sowing late, and consequently much grain did not ripen and had to be cut down green. Other crops suffered too. But, notwithstanding these temporary drawbacks, all dues have been met, though not without difficulty. A new fence on the Parsonage lawn improves the appearance of things outside. Harvest Thanksgiving Services were held at what the Incumbent considered an appropriate time. The day appointed by the Government was also observed to satisfy the conscientious scruples of those who profess to feel more warmed up to the proper pitch of thanksgiving on that particular day. But when the day came and the opportunity offered, they conscientiously stayed at home. I believe that the 25th of November was appointed by the Government under the impression that everything in the Dominion would be harvested by that date. I feel sure that it is only necessary to hint to the Government that one important industry has been left out in the cold, in order to secure a still later and more fitting date for a general thanksgiving, viz., the ice-harvest. The Jubilee Services to commemorate the long and prosperous reign of our beloved Queen were heartily observed. In addition to the offertories, I collected the following sums for the See-House:—Mrs. S. A. Parker, \$5.00; J. R. Denison, \$1.00; Mrs. Geo. Wadleigh, \$1.00; Mrs. Edgar Wintle, \$1.00; Rev. J. S. Sykes, \$2.00.—Total, \$10.00. Our lady collectors, who are in truth the very best of Church Society Helpers, are deserving of the highest praise, travelling over rough roads, and facing cold winds and weather in the interests of the Church. I am very thankful to them all, for the ready, cheerful and willing manner in which they responded to my request to collect these annual subscriptions. I am glad to say that the same spirit animates Church-Wardens and all others whenever it is necessary to call them to my help.

## LABRADOR.

*St. Clement's Mission.*

The Rev. J. Almond reports :—

In reviewing the work of the Church in this 450-miles District during the past year, we have much reason to be thankful to Almighty God. At Harrington Harbour, on a beautiful site, chosen by the Lord Bishop of Quebec, overlooking the whole Island, stands the Church which was erected during the past summer. It is a perfect model of what a Church should be, and much credit is due the Rev. C. E. Bishop for overseeing the work from the beginning to end, and leaving it clear of debt, as he was only two years on the Coast, and the Church, I believe, cost something over \$1,300. Under the guidance of the Rev. C. E. Bishop, Priest in charge, the life of the Church in this Mission has been one of marked growth; he was greatly aided in his work by the wholesome influence of his wife among our people. The work of Christian women is very much needed on the Labrador. This year we have two lady

teachers added to our staff: Miss Lilian Almond and Miss Marion Travers. During the months of September, October and November, Mr. Bishop and myself, in the Mission boat, went over the entire District. Mr. Bishop remained at St. Paul's River and vicinity until the month of February; then, owing to a severe accident, had to return to Quebec. But on the way he worked the Mission from St. Paul's River to Long Point of Mingan, being the first Missioner to travel the Coast from Natashquan to Long Point during the winter season. After arriving in Quebec, and obtaining medical aid, Mr. Bishop, accompanied by his wife, returned to the Coast for the summer, and left for the Mission of Hereford on the fifth day of September.

I was stationed at Mutton Bay until the 20th of January, and, besides my week-day and Sunday Services, I taught day school. During the months of February and March I journeyed over 550 miles with my dogs and cométique, and down in the Newfoundland District as far as L'Anse-aux-Loups. The months of April and May I spent at Mutton Bay and vicinity. June and part of July, in the Mission boat, I visited the Coast line from Natashquan to Bonne Espérance. The latter part of July and August I spent on the Gaspé Coast with my friends.

I was admitted to the Priesthood on the 5th of September, and appointed to succeed the Rev. C. E. Bishop as Priest in charge of the Mission of the Labrador.

On the 15th of September I sailed from Gaspé along with the Rev. Geo. Pye, our second Missionary, who was ordained Deacon on the 5th of September. We worked the first forty miles of district together, from Sheldrake to Mingan, and as it was getting rather late in the season, Mr. Pye was sent on through to St. Paul's River, where he will remain the greater part of the winter. Mr. G. W. Willis, our Teacher and Reader, taught at St. Paul's River until March, and from March until June at Mr. Wellman's. Mr. Cornew taught at Tabatière part of the winter, and at Old Fort the remainder. At Mutton Bay, Mr. Organ continues to act as Lay-Reader, and as such, renders a great service to the Church. Mr. Thomas Green, our Sunday School Superintendent at Mutton Bay, is a devout and earnest worker. At Harrington, Mr. John Bobbitt acts as Lay-Reader, holding Service twice every Sunday,—in the summer on the Island, and during the winter at the winter quarters. Mrs. Dan Bobbitt superintends the Sunday School

and is doing excellent work. This summer we bought two Church bells,—one for Mutton Bay, the other for Harrington, at a cost of \$38.00 each, which was collected on the Coast, with the exception of \$20.00 collected by the Rev. I. N. Kerr, for the bell at Mutton Bay. I intend, God willing, to visit the whole Mission during the winter we are now entering upon. I have my own dogs and cométique and find it very convenient. There is really nothing worthy of the name of hardship, and the work is of a most enjoyable character.

The fishing, in some harbours, has proved a failure the past summer, and some of my people will be in sore need of both food and clothing; but I am thankful to report that a kind friend of the poor, in Quebec, has sent down considerable aid to be distributed as it is wanting. We are all looking forward to the summer, when, we hope, the Lord Bishop of Quebec will again visit the Mission.

LAKE ST. JOHN.

*Indian Mission.*

The Rev. E. A. Dunn reports:—

It would be difficult to find any work in the Diocese more full of interest than the ministration to the needs of our Cree Indians at Pointe Bleue, Lake S. John, and also of the few white people who reside in that district. During the past year I was able to pay twelve monthly visits, most of them of only two or three days' duration, but in the month of July, when the Indians were all on the Reserve; trading their furs and obtaining supplies for the next winter, I stayed nine days amongst them, camping with two of my brothers in what we called the "Church Tent;" and on this one occasion I had fourteen Services with Addresses, one Baptism, one Marriage, three Celebrations of the Holy Communion (one private), fifteen sick visits, and seven Confirmation classes. A new feature of the work, and one which added greatly to the enjoyment of the Services by the Indians, was the reading of the Prayers in the

Cree Dialect by Joseph Gunner, who, vested in Cassock and Surplice, acted as Lay Reader. Altogether forty-one Services were held during the year, of which sixteen were Celebrations of the Holy Communion. And besides these there were Services on most of the Sundays in July and August at the Roberval Hotel, conducted by holiday Chaplains. On August 17th, too late to see the majority of the Indians, who had already started for their winter hunting grounds, the Bishop visited the Mission and confirmed five Candidates, all white people. Next year he hopes to be able to arrange to go a little earlier in order to confirm some of the Indians who have been prepared for Confirmation and who are waiting for an opportunity.

Turning to material things, we are able to say that by the efforts of the people of the Mission, together with some assistance from outside, the grave-yard has been enlarged and surrounded by a new fence, a stone foundation has been placed under the Church, which hitherto had stood on stumps that heaved each spring with the frost, the exterior of the Church has received a much needed coat of paint, and we are hoping soon to be able to sheath the interior and thus make the Church warmer.

In addition to this regular work at Lake S. John, I also paid visits in the month of September to Lake Edward and Grand Mère. One adult belonging to the former place came down to Quebec in Holy Week on purpose to attend some Church Services and to be confirmed. At Lake Edward I held two Services, and the people, to the number of about fourteen, who had not had a Service for many years, appeared very grateful. I hope early in the year to visit them again and at the same time to go to Chicoutimi. At Grand Mère I stayed one night and visited all the people who claimed to belong to the Church, but, as no arrangements had been made beforehand, I was unable to hold any Service. This place is a rising town on the Lower Laurentian Railway, brought into existence by some new and extensive paper mills, and it is expected that next spring its population may reach a thousand. It remains to be seen what proportion of these will be Church people. There is already a Presbyterian Church there, and from all that one could learn, we may confidently expect that it will be necessary to open a new Mission in that district within a year.

I can only add in conclusion that in all my journeyings

up and down the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway I have everywhere met with a most hearty welcome and an unbounded hospitality, and it would be invidious to single out any names for special mention. But I cannot refrain from expressing a tribute of thanks to Mr. J. G. Scott, of Quebec, for his great kindness in granting me a pass over the railway, without which it would be impossible to do for these scattered people even the little that is being done.

LEEDS.

The Rev. J. Rothera reports:—

*St. James' Church.*—The usual morning and evening Services have been held here during the year and have been fairly well attended. The Holy Communion has been administered once a month, and on the chief Festivals of the Church. The average attendance, I am pleased to say, has been better than last year. The Sunday School has been well conducted under the tuition of five teachers, to whom we are much indebted. The annual picnic for the S. S. was held on July 6th, at Wilson's Mill. Our thanks are due to Mr. W. Wilson and his family, who contributed so much to the enjoyment of all in providing tea, and swings in a grove, and boats on the river. A Christmas Tree was held in connection with the S. S. at the Village School, which was quite a success, and enjoyed by all. The W. A. meets at the Parsonage once a month. The bale of clothing sent last year did not reach its destination and was returned. This year's work was sent, together with the bale returned, to Algoma through the St. Matthew's Branch, Quebec. The Ladies' Aid meet once a month in rotation at each member's house, and have done good work for the Church. Week-day Services have been held once a month at Wilson's Mills and Nelson Road School-houses, and have been very well attended.

The Bishop of the Diocese paid a visit to this Church on Sunday, March 7th, when seven Candidates were confirm-

ed. On Monday, March 8th, His Lordship gave an interesting Church History Lecture to a large audience.

*St. George's, St. Sylvestre.*—I have made an alteration in the number of Services here. Instead of a Service once a fortnight I have given a Service every Sunday from Easter to November, and during the winter three Services a month. The Holy Communion is administered once a month, and the average attendance has been more than the year previous. The Sunday School has been carried on by Mrs. A. D. Ross, to whom we are very grateful. The Woman's Auxiliary, I am sorry to say, has only met once this year, the members being so few, and on account of sickness. I trust they will receive and continue their good work for Christ and His Church. The Bishop paid a visit to this Church, when five Candidates were confirmed, on March 6th.

*St. Matthew's, Beattie's Settlement.*—I have held Divine Service here once a fortnight alternately with the Rev. Mr. Gustin. The Holy Communion is administered once a month. The attendance has not been so good this year, owing to the removal of two large families from the District. The Bishop visited this Church on Sunday, March 7th, when seven Candidates were confirmed.

*St. Giles.*—Divine Service is held here once a month. Distant seventeen miles, the Missionary is obliged to go the day previous for the Service. All the Church families, except one, live long distances from the Church and widely apart.

The Harvest Thanksgiving Services were held on October 24th, at Leeds and at St. Sylvester, when both Churches were neatly decorated for the occasion. Our thanks are due to the Rev. J. Kemp for his kind help, also to the Organists, members of the Choirs, Sunday School teachers, Church-Wardens and all others who have assisted in the work of the Church.

## LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. A. C. Scarth reports:—

On the day following the meeting of the Association last year, our enlarged and renovated Church was re-dedicated by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese. Many of the Clergy of the District were present, and the Service was glorious and impressive. A full account of it appeared in the *Diocesan Gazette*. Since then a beautiful memorial window has been placed in the Church by the members of the Bartlett family, "To the glory of God and in pious memory of their father and mother," at a cost of \$185. The window is the work of J. C. Spence & Sons, Montreal. By Christmas Day we expect that another window will be erected, to the memory of the late Edward Chapman, so greatly beloved and respected by all who knew him. This is also being made by the same well-known firm, and will also cost \$185, of which \$138 has been raised in the Parish, the remaining \$47 being contributed by friends outside. The contributions for outside purposes are somewhat less than last year, owing to various causes, such as deaths and removals, and in some cases to altered circumstances. There has, too, been a good deal of money collected in the Parish for objects not directly connected with the congregation, which has to some extent affected our offerings. We have to record the removal by death of some of our most valued members of the congregation. The place of A. D. Nicolls will not easily be filled. He was always at his post and rendered able assistance in the Choir, and was most liberal in his contributions for the support of the Church, and ready to respond to every call. Mrs. Mitchell, the oldest member of

the congregation, and a faithful and consistent church-woman, has gone to her rest, having completed her four-score years. Mr. Stuart, also at the great age of eighty-five years, departed this life a few weeks ago. Our old people—landmarks—as they may be called, are rapidly disappearing, and we do not find that others come in to take their place. On looking back over the long period of my incumbency, now almost thirty-nine years, I find but very few left of those who formed the original congregation.

There is nothing special to note in the ordinary work of the Parish. The Services on Sundays and holidays, with celebration of the Holy Communion, have been conducted without interruption. The Sunday School numbers about one hundred children, with eight teachers. Fifty new volumes have been added to the Library; some of the old books have been given to one of the students for use in his Mission. For myself personally, I have to add that the retrospect of the year is full of causes for the deepest thankfulness to Almighty God for all His merciful care and preservation of me and mine from danger and from sudden death.

#### LEVIS.

The Rev. I. M. Thompson writes:—

There is very little of interest to report from Levis this year. Our Services, on both Sundays and week-days, have been continued without any interruption. The average attendance has been about the same as last year, with a slightly increased and more regular attendance at Holy Communion. Cottage Services were held with more or less regularity at Mr. George Samples' and Mr. George Findlay's at Hadlow, and Mr. James King's at South Quebec.

The attendance at these Services was very encouraging, and the bright and hearty responding of the children made them most enjoyable. It is at Services such as these that we see the value of the paged Prayer Books. We have not lost any of our people this year by death. A former and greatly beloved parishioner, Miss Florence Green, died in Quebec, and her body was brought to Levis for burial, but she had severed her connection with this Parish some years before. We lost one family by removal to Quebec and another is preparing to move to Montreal. These removals are very trying to us in many ways. At present we have a few old and valued members of the congregation making a temporary sojourn with us, and we are very much pleased to have them. The Ladies' Guild have continued their labours with unflagging diligence and have added \$27.48 to their funds. They have, at a cost of \$32.50, painted the roof of the Rectory and placed new pipes along the eaves, for which we are very grateful to them. The Woman's Auxiliary have been as faithful as ever, and have realized from their work the sum of \$12.67, besides valuable contributions of clothing and other useful articles, all of which have been forwarded to Clergymen in different parts of the Mission field. Our Sunday School, which numbers thirty-five, is under the efficient management of Mr. Geo. Addie. On the first Sunday of each month I have a children's Service, when I catechise and address the little ones. I am greatly indebted to Messrs. James King and J. Brown, Church-Wardens, and Mr. W. Hamilton, Vestry Clerk, for their devotion to the interests of the Church; also, to Miss Nattie Piton, our faithful and untiring Organist, the Church Society Helpers, and indeed to all our co-workers. I have also gratefully to acknowledge much kindness shown to myself and family. There are three day schools in this Parish, one model and two elementary; for the former I am deputy-examiner. I visit them all occasionally and examine the children in Scripture history. His Lordship paid us a visit during the year and gave us a very helpful and interesting sermon, for which we are very thankful. I cannot close this report without a reference to the Deanery and Archidiaconal Meeting held here on the 1st and 2nd December, for it was a most enjoyable and profitable occasion. To the Ven. Archdeacon Roe and to all my brethren of the Clergy who attended that meeting I should like, in behalf of myself and people, to tender most sincere thanks.

I hope, through the kind providence of God, to be able to have such a meeting at Levis every year.

NEW LIVERPOOL.

The Rev. I. M. Thompson reports:—

The Services here, as arranged when I entered upon the work, have been continued without interruption. We have a fair attendance at all the Services during the summer months, but when our friends from the city return to their homes, and our people, many of whom live at a great distance from the Church, have to face winter storms and bad roads, the attendance is very much reduced and somewhat irregular. In addition to the regular Services in the Church, occasional Services have been held at Chaudière Mills, St. Henri and Belair. In my last report I mentioned that our Parsonage grounds here had been newly fenced and the place put in order to receive a tenant should one offer. One has offered, and none more welcome could. Mr. W. F. V. Atkinson, son of our esteemed Church-Warden, has taken the place for three years. We are all delighted to welcome Mr. and Mrs. Atkinson to a place amongst us. Our Sunday School was again open for the summer months with the usual attendance. E. H. Wade, Esq., kindly superintended it and taught the senior class, and was assisted by Miss Atkinson and Miss Mary Brown. Since the closing of the school Miss Atkinson has held a Bible Class for all the children who wished to attend, and many of those living near the Church have availed themselves of the privilege thus offered. The most interesting event to the young, during the past summer, was a Sunday School picnic, held on the beautiful grounds belonging to Mr. Wade. A sumptuous repast was provided and done ample justice to. Our faithful Church-Warden, Mr. Henry

Atkinson, most generously provided prizes for the successful competitors in the games. At intervals of rest between the games, Hymns were sung and recitations given by the children. The prizes were presented by Mrs. Henry Atkinson, with a few pleasant and appropriate words to each successful competitor, the whole being brought to a close by the Doxology, sung by the children, and the Benediction, pronounced by the Incumbent. There is a very prosperous day school here, supported principally by the taxes collected from Mr. Atkinson and Mr. Wade. Three-fourths of the children in attendance are Roman Catholics. Miss Brown, the teacher, exercises so much tact and good judgment, that all the children appear greatly interested in their studies and are making real and substantial progress. His Lordship the Bishop paid us a visit and gave us a very helpful and interesting address, for which we were very thankful. Mrs. McQuilton, a kind charitable woman, after many years of suffering, borne with Christian fortitude, was taken from us during the year. His Lordship the Bishop kindly went to her home to administer to her the Rite of Confirmation. She received the Holy Communion and other ministrations of religion from time to time with devout reverence and gratitude. The little child too of our devoted Church-Warden, Mr. B. Sample, was transferred to the happy Paradise of God during the past year.

I cannot close this report without gratefully acknowledging the valuable help always so cheerfully rendered by the Church-Wardens, Sunday School teachers, the Church Helpers for collecting subscriptions in behalf of the Church Society, Miss Ethel Atkinson, our Organist, and all the members of the Choir. I desire to thank all who have in any way helped to forward the work of Christ and His Church in this place, and who have shewn to myself great kindness and consideration.

## MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

The Rev. John Prout reports :—

Since being appointed to this Mission in October, 1896, I have endeavoured, as far as possible, to continue the work of my predecessor. In this Mission of Islands there are four Churches, situate respectively on Grindstone, Amherst, Entry, and Grosse Isle. The work, owing to the difficulty of passing from Island to Island, and the scattered condition of the congregations on each, is extremely difficult, indeed impossible for one Missionary to perform efficiently; but by the co-operation of the Lord Bishop and other kind friends we have been enabled to support a Deacon for the last two years. At the headquarters of the Mission, Grindstone, there are twenty-four families. The Sunday Services here used to be held fortnightly, with week-day Services on Wednesday and Friday evenings. But since September I have been enabled to devote most of my time to Grindstone, leaving Mr. Major, the present assistant, to conduct the Services at Grosse Isle. I am pleased to be able to state that the Grindstone congregation have placed new sills under the Church. This work was much needed. A new and handsome Altar cloth adds much to the appearance of the Sanctuary. Sunday School work has also been carried on with regularity and success.

*Grosse Isle.*—Owing to the difficulty of travelling a distance of thirty miles from Grindstone, twenty-five of which lies along a soft sand beach, the Sacrament of the Holy Communion is administered only once in five weeks; weekly Services are taken by Mr. Major.

*Entry Island.*—On this Island there is a very pretty little Church, where the congregation met regularly every Sunday, from November 1896 to May 1897. These Services were conducted by the Rev. Stanley Dickson, who, during the week, taught the day school. After he left, the Services were held every three weeks until the Fall, when, owing to the great winds which then prevailed, it became impossible for the Missionary to continue his visits. It is with much pleasure that I am able to state that the debt of \$30.00 on the Church has been completely cleared off. A marked improvement is noticeable here.

*Bryon Island* (ten or twelve miles out to sea from Grosse Isle).—Services were conducted here every Sunday during the month of June,

I desire, in conclusion, to express sincere and hearty thanks to our Church-Wardens, Sunday School teachers and to all our Church workers, and especially to Mrs. Hunter Dunn, who sent us a bale of clothing, which has proved very helpful to the poorer people of the Mission.

MAGOG.

The Rev. R. C. Tambs reports :—

At St. Luke's Church, Services have been held twice each Sunday, with a well sustained attendance. There has been mid-day Communion twice a month, and an early Celebration on the other Sundays in summer. The largest number of Communicants was on Lay Helpers' Sunday and Easter Day, namely, fifty-three and seventy-three. On each of these days there were two Celebrations. During Lent, blackboard lectures on the Acts of the Apostles were given every Wednesday evening.

At Cherry River we have Service on two Sundays out of three, in the afternoon, with an average attendance of forty. I have held forty Cottage Services in different homes throughout the Mission, consisting chiefly of religious instruction by means of diagrams. We are privileged in having two excellent Lay Readers, Mr. Ben Verity, of Walpole, Mass., and Mr. Frank Daye, of Cornwall, Ont., who, besides being of great help in other ways, read the lessons in Church, and once in a while a sermon, and occasionally take a Service at Cherry River, usually to enable me to conduct the devotional meetings of the "King's Daughters," which occurs once a month. St. Luke's Choir is under the direction of Mr. J. R. Wilcox, and the Bishop's words from the pulpit in praise of our singing were a well merited compliment to him, and in no small measure also to our faithful organist, Miss Maggie Lindsay. Last winter the Choir, assisted by the Magog "Pastime Orchestra" and other talent, gave an exceedingly fine concert in the Music Hall, which was calculated to promote musical culture in the community. Our Sunday School, under Mr. Verity as superintendent, is doing well. The attendance including teachers has reached as high as eighty-six.

Among the scholars are two Chinamen furnished with a Bible in Chinese, and a manual for learning English. During Lent, the children made collections in behalf of the Indian Homes, and during the last half of the year, have sent to the Indian Missions the offertory of the first Sunday in each month. The Christmas Tree Festival was held as usual in the Music Hall on Christmas eve. There was a good attendance but no mirth, owing to the gloom caused by the sad drowing a week before, while skating, of two of the most excellent of our young people—Annie Cain and James Mills, aged seventeen and sixteen. Annie Cain was a devout communicant, a winning Sunday School teacher and a general favourite, being as unselfishly good as she was unconsciously beautiful. Never was there such a funeral in Magog. The mournful cortege with its two hearses moved to the solemn strains of the Dead March played by the band of which young Mills had been a member, and in whose midst was reverently carried their comrade's cornet, draped in white. Hundreds failed to find ingress into the Church—most affecting was the Service, for all were mourners, the stoutest of hearts breaking down in tears. The coffins, side by side, were covered with the choicest of floral emblems. At Cherry River the Christmas Tree was a success beyond experience there, and the kindly feelings of the people towards the Incumbent and his sister found expression in most generous gifts to them. On August 31st came off our annual Sunday School excursion to Newport, Vt., on the "Lady of the Lake." With a cheery company of between four and five hundred, with the kindly volunteered services of the Bullard Military Brass Band, and with the loveliest of weather, the trip was one of surpassing enjoyment to all on board. Scarcely less delightful was an earlier excursion over the same water, under the auspices of the "Boys' Brigade." A pleasing incident in connection with this organization was the presentation, at the close of Sunday School on Easter morning, of the Governor General's silver medal to the winner, John Chadwick, as being the boy of highest standing in the company. After a season of inactivity the company has resumed operations under the captaincy of Mr. Daye, and the ranks are again filling up. It is a great drawback that there is no suitable place at our disposal for them to drill in. We feel the lack of a Church Hall at every turn. It is for this reason that our meetings in the

name of the Ministering Children's League are in abeyance. By means of funds kindly supplied by the Ladies' Guild, the interior of the Church has been further improved at a cost of \$107. An organization known as "The Sanctuary Circle" attends to the Fair Linen of the Altar, furnishes the vases with flowers, and, with the assistance of others, sees to the decoration of the Church on the chief festivals and other special occasions. At Christmas and at the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Service the decorations were exceedingly beautiful and appropriate. On the latter occasion a military band assembled outside the Church and played Hymns before the Service. The Sanctuary Circle have recently furnished the Church with stained-glass windows executed by Messrs. Spence & Sons, of Montreal, the central one being a representation of the Good Shepherd. "The Middle Circle" have been teaching little girls to sew and to make useful articles of wearing apparel for the Indians of the North-West. The missionary spirit cannot be inculcated at too early an age. The little ones are deeply interested in this charitable work. We have another organization known as "The Silver Cross Dispensary," which has for its object the lending of appliances serviceable in the nursing of the sick and in needy cases, the furnishing, as far as funds permit, of medicines and comforts free of cost. The work is carried on in co-operation with the local physicians. Dr. Robillard has generously placed a room opening from his drug store at the disposal of the Circle and renders most kind assistance whenever possible. A stock of needful appliances is being gradually furnished, hitherto with funds given without solicitation; one person for this object sold, through the ready agency of Dr. Robillard, cut flowers for over eight dollars. The benefits of the Dispensary are for the town and vicinity, irrespective of creed or nationality. I have not mentioned any of the "King's Daughters" because they are content to be hidden in their efforts, being happy in their simple motto: "In His Name." They work together as a general circle as occasions prompt. In one instance they quietly collected, in a couple of days, \$45.00 for a benevolent purpose. They are generally pleased to come to the assistance of the minor circles, as they did for the Woman's Auxiliary in making up a barrel and two boxes of things, last December, for the Indian Mission of Black River, Man., the various contents of which the Missionary, the Rev. John Anderson, so gratefully acknowl-

edged. In addition to all the above organized lay help we are further cheered by the formation, lately, of a Chapter of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, consisting of six members, with Mr. Verity as Director, Mr. James Prince as Vice-Director, and Mr. Day as Secretary.

Our indefatigable Bishop made three official visits to the Mission during the year, in December, April and October, confirming on the three occasions respectively, nineteen, eighteen and five. On the first visit his Lordship arrived on a Saturday, and on that day confirmed privately an aged man in invalid health. On the following day, Sunday, his Lordship, besides holding Confirmation at 11 a.m., officiated at an early Celebration and preached in the evening. In the afternoon he addressed the congregation at Cherry River, and in the course of his remarks encouraged the people greatly in regard to the building of a Church, by assuring them of generous financial assistance. On his October visit his Lordship dedicated the new Chancel windows immediately before the Service of Confirmation. It is very interesting to note the change of mind throughout the Mission with regard to Infant Baptism. A strong prejudice had long prevailed against it in these parts. Now, however, parents of their own accord are bringing their children to the Font.

In conclusion I desire to express my gratitude for all the kind help that I have received in my work, and in doing so I would add the thanks of the congregation of Cherry River for the kind gift of a surplice and stole from the Church Helpers' Association of Quebec.

#### MALBAIE.

The Rev. G. R. Walters writes:—

I have but to report the ordinary routine of duty in the life of a Coast Clergyman, with no special events to distinguish the year just closed from any that has preceded it.

We were all cheered by the Lord Bishop's visit in the month of August, when some twenty-four persons received the Rite of Confirmation,—seventeen in St. Peter's Church, Malbaie, and seven in St. Paul's Church, Barachois. Large congregations attended both Services, and all were much impressed by the earnest loving words addressed to us by the Bishop. Ninety persons remained to partake of the Holy Communion in St. Peter's Church. After holding Confirmation at Barachois in the afternoon, the Bishop returned for Service and address in St. Peter's, Malbaie, in the evening, where, during the Service, a little one was received into the Church, being baptized by the Bishop. Quite a large congregation had assembled, to whom the Bishop spoke on the growth of the Church of England in Canada and more especially in this Diocese of Quebec. His Lordship preached in St. Luke's Church, Corner Beach, on the Saturday previous. I am glad to say we have our much talked of bell now in the spire of our little Church at Barachois. All are satisfied both with its tone and with the price paid for it. It answers our purpose remarkably well.

Our fishing season was fairly good in the early part of the year, although the price given for cod, owing to the state of the foreign markets, was low; but I am sorry to say that owing to extremely boisterous weather, there was no late or autumn fishing.

Our special collection for the Indian Famine Fund, \$26.40, sent registered to Montreal, was unfortunately lost in transit through the mails. In the month of January a couple of most successful Parish Teas were held in our Church Hall on behalf of our Church work. Our warmest thanks are due to all who helped.

Miss Caulfield, who has so kindly played our Church organ during the past three years, was, through the efforts of Mrs. Geo. Fauvel, presented with a purse of \$20, "with the best wishes of the congregation." I have been assisted in my Sunday School work throughout the summer by my daughter and Miss Duncan. All the children in the Mission were entertained at Tea, in a field at Point St. Peter, in the month of June, during the time of the Jubilee rejoicing. This was the most successful children's Tea yet held by us, and I would thank all who assisted at it. I am greatly indebted to Mrs. Collas for supplying and arranging fresh bouquets of flowers for the Altar vases and for many other kind ministries.

Our assessment, I am glad to say, has been met in full, though it took some effort to raise it, money having been unusually scarce on the coast this year. Mr. Duncan, the people's Warden, is deserving of much praise for the energy he has shown and for the interest he has taken in Church work; and I hope that he will long continue, with Mr. LeGros, in office, for in a place like this, where it is so hard to get any young man to undertake the office of Church-Warden, services such as he rendered become doubly appreciated.

I hardly like to speak of our latest venture, viz., a "New Parsonage House" I may however say that we have allotted to our congregations a list of the wood required for its construction, and I hope to receive, if not all, yet a good portion of it this winter. The greatest difficulty in this undertaking is summed up in two words: "The cash."

The Rev. E. K. Wilson writes:—

During the past year we are able to report some substantial progress in the temporal affairs of the Parish, whilst, judging from the increased attendance at Divine Service and Holy Communion, we trust that in things spiritual there has been an advance also. In addition to the routine of Services referred to last year, I have to report fortnightly Services in the School-house at South

Dudswell, which have been thus far very encouraging. The temporal improvements to which I have referred are: (1) Matting for aisle of S. Paul's Church, presented by the Ladies' Guild; (2) improvement of Parsonage by two coats of paint and a storm porch, also repairing of barns, the cost of material in each instance being met by the Ladies' Guild; (3) our horse-sheds have been once more made presentable by new sills and shingles. But whilst we are indeed thankful to be able to report as above, yet that which calls forth the special gratitude of the Incumbent, is the abundant supply of good spring water which now flows into the kitchen of the Parsonage, so that the Incumbent is no longer "A drawer of water."

We had the pleasure of having his Lordship the Bishop with us two days during the month of October, viz., Saturday, 3rd, when he delivered a most interesting and instructive lecture in our Parish Hall in behalf of our branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and on Sunday, 4th, officiating at three Services, twenty-five persons receiving the "Laying on of Hands."

MATAPEDIA.

The waters of Lake Matapedia (in the County of Rimouski) flow by a river of the same name through the County of Bonaventure and discharge into Chaleur Bay, near its head. Opposite, to the mouth of the River, is Campbellton, in the Diocese of New Brunswick. At Matapedia, Assamatquaghan and one or two other small villages in Bona-

venture County, on the river bank and on the line of the Intercolonial Railway, are a few scattered families and individuals, some forty-five souls in all, who belong to the Church of England. Far removed from any established Mission within the Diocese of Quebec—New Carlisle being probably the nearest — these few people are most kindly ministered to by the Rev. J. Spencer, of Campbellton. Mr. Spencer mentions having held in all eighteen special Services for their benefit, having administered the Sacrament of Holy Baptism to three, and the Sacrament of Holy Communion on five occasions, in addition to paying many visits of a parochial nature. The Church Society has gratefully acknowledged these kind offices, and in a small way made some compensation therefor.

MELBOURNE.

The Rev. J. Curran reports :—

It is with pleasure and satisfaction that I present the report of the work accomplished in this portion of the Lord's Vineyard during the past year:

*St. John's.*—Services have been held here regularly every Sunday, on the first Sunday in the month in the evening, at other times in the morning, with a Celebration once a month. The average attendance is fifty-six. The ladies have kindly provided a carpet for the Chancel and two new lamps, and are at present devoting their energies towards procuring a bell. Already they have banked \$77.00 in this behalf. We have to thank the Association of Church Helpers of Quebec for \$20.00 towards the same object. The Lord Bishop visited us in February last and confirmed six Candidates, one of them a man of seventy years of age, who had been an Irish Roman Catholic. His wife, on her death-bed, claimed to belong to the Church of England, and was visited by me. In all my ministrations the husband took a deep interest, and joined reverently with us in prayer. He subsequently came to Church to hear the Bishop, and being much impressed with what he heard his Lordship say about Confirmation, expressed a desire that I should prepare him for the reception of this Apostolic Rite. He is an earnest Christian man and is anxious to live a life pleasing to God.

*New Rockland.*—The Services here are held every Sunday afternoon, and are well attended and seemingly much

appreciated. Many who attend do not belong to the Church of England, yet they enjoy our Services. Unfortunately we have here no Church edifice, nor building of any kind exclusively for our own use. It is a great want which I hope may, at no distant day, be supplied.

*The Ridge Road.* The Service here is held every Sunday evening except on the first Sunday in the month, when it is held in the morning in the Badger's school-house. This plan enables me to reach every family in my Mission. At this point I have a prosperous Sunday School carried on by Miss Holland. The Services here are very hearty, and the people are very anxious to do what they can to help on the work. I am pleased to be able to report that we have made a commencement on the new Church. The building committee hope to get all the lumber upon the ground this winter, so that when the spring comes everything will be in readiness to go on with the work. The contract is given out, and the sum of \$300.00 has been collected towards it already. Our hope is that in the early part of summer it will be ready for Divine Worship.




## MILBY.

The Rev. Professor Wilkinson reports :—

Services have been held as usual by myself assisted by Mr. E. N. R. Burns, B.A. In January an outbreak of diphtheria rendered it necessary to close the Church for one Sunday. In the long vacation, during my absence at Lake St. Joseph, Que., where I acted as Chaplain to the summer visitors, the Services were taken by the Rev. Professor Scarth, Rev. A. H. Robertson and Mr. F. Dowdell. The Sunday School has been superintended by Mr. Burns, who reports the average attendance over seven and the number of scholars on the roll at present twenty-two. The average would no doubt have been better had not seven of the most regular scholars gone in January to form a Confirmation Class. Mr. Burns, under my direction, took the Confirmation Class for some weeks, during which time Mr. Callis took the Sunday School. When the time for the Confirmation came—All Saints' Day of this year—I was enabled to present to the Bishop ten Candidates—two of them married persons whom it is a special joy to me to number now among our Communicants. The Confirmation Service was a very hearty one, and all who were confirmed have since communicated, and will, I trust, continue to observe this primal obligation of a Christian worshipper.

The Harvest Thanksgiving Service was this year largely attended; the Rev. Professor Parrock was the preacher, the Rector (the Rev. A. C. Scarth) and the Rev. Canon Adams were present; Mr. Davies, the College Organist, was kind enough to help us, and a volunteer choir of students were of great assistance at this, as they afterwards were also at the Confirmation Service.

I am happy to say that several improvements have been made this year both inside and outside the Church. The Church-yard fence has been renewed, and the drain beneath the Church completed; the bell-tower so long talked of is in course of erection. Inside the Church a Lectern and Litany Desk have been placed; they are, it is true, only lent, but we hope they are the forerunners of like permanent ornaments. Two solid chairs of good design have been placed in the Chancel for the use of the Clergy. These various improvements have been rendered possible by the good-will and hard work of the Woman's Guild. A lady has promised two brass vases for the Altar.

## MONTMORENCY, LAKE BEAUPORT AND STONEHAM.

The Rev. G. F. Hibbard reports:—

*Montmorency.*—Our little congregation here has suffered much during the past year, partly from the death of our devoted Church-Warden, Mr. Harry Marsden, and partly from the removal of many helpful members of the Church. Mr. Marsden, who was justly beloved by us all, died suddenly in Montreal last fall, whither he had gone to consult the physicians of Victoria Hospital as to his health which had for some time past been rapidly failing. The Funeral Service, by the kind permission of the Rector of S. Matthew's Church, was held in that Church by myself, assisted by the Rev. F. G. Scott. The removal to Montreal of Mr. Whitehead and his family, also of Mr. Craig and his family has made a serious diminution of our numbers, and the prospect of other earnest helpers also leaving us early in the new year does not brighten the prospects of the Mission. However in a busy place like Montmorency there are always hopes that the future will bring new arrivals, who will augment the numbers of the congregation, though they cannot fully take the place of those kind and generous friends who have gone. Efforts are being made to interest and help the people here by social evenings spent in pleasant recreations, thus promoting good fellowship which is so essential in successful Church work. The Sunday Services have been held regularly, and the special Lenten Services were very well attended. The Sunday School with Mrs. Gosling as its teacher has done excellently. A goodly subscription was raised by Miss Price and Miss Harwood towards the Indian Famine Fund.

*Lake Beauport.*—This model little Mission causes me much pleasure as I note the steady maintenance of the numbers who come through all sorts of weathers and roads to join in our Services, and the yearly growth of the average number of those who receive Holy Communion regularly. The congregation subscribed cheerfully towards the Indian Famine Fund, and at present a new but rapidly

growing fund has been started with a view of purchasing a new organ. This reminds me that our faithful organist, Miss Sangster, received at Easter time a hearty recognition of her services in the presentation of a beautiful watch and chain from the congregation. Both this Mission and that of Montmorency have received from the Children's Ministering League of Holy Trinity Cathedral a set of very pretty and useful book-markers.

*Stoneham.*—With an able and energetic Church-Warden in the person of Mr. Thos. Brown our Mission is struggling to free itself of debt and has already partly succeeded. Each member of the Church here has raised his subscription above the old rates, and soon we may hope to be entirely out of debt and able to go ahead with needful alterations in both Church and Church-yard. By the aid of the Children's Ministering League, "old Christmas" has been celebrated by a very successful Christmas Tree for the young ones.

#### NEW CARLISLE AND PASPEBIAC.

The Rev. E. B. Husband reports:—

Looking back upon the year that is past, I feel especially thankful for two things, the consecration of our new Church in New Carlisle, and the continued improvement in our Sunday Schools. For over seven years the new Church has been building, many expecting it to take longer. But thanks to the S. P. C. K., to the Church Society, to friends in the Diocese and in England, and also to Miss Murison, who has collected in all \$556.12, our new Church was consecrated on August 23rd. Naturally there is much yet to be done in the way of adornment, and we need especially a furnace; this latter I trust will be provided before another winter. May this Church be not only an ornament, but a House of God indeed, in which weary souls may find rest and refreshment. I feel thankful, too, that there has been an increased attendance at our Sunday Schools, both here and at Paspebiac. I have been enabled to give greater attention to this work in New Carlisle by holding a Bible Class in the Vestry on three Sundays in the month. Paspebiac Sunday School has been almost entirely under the care of Mrs. Husband. We need very much an earnest superintendent here to look after this most important branch of Church work. The Woman's Auxiliary in Paspebiac has done good work.

During the summer we enjoyed a visit from His Lordship the Bishop, who confirmed twenty-one persons. The Services, especially during the summer, have been well attended.

In Hoptown there is much to be done. A few families keep the Church open, but many, alas! are seldom seen within its walls. In some cases the cause may be poverty, but in others it is indifference. We are trying to erect here a much needed horse-shed, many of those who come having some distance to drive. On the whole there is cause to be thankful. May God stir us all up to greater earnestness for the souls of others, and move the hearts of all who are still far from Him.

NEWPORT.

The Rev. A. H. Moore reports :—

When one casts about for the material for his annual report, he is confronted by such a mass of detail that he is nonplussed to know what to select to indicate the general trend of affairs. Some of the events in this Mission have already been reported somewhat fully in the March and November numbers of the *Diocesan Gazette*. I shall there-

fore not stop to speak of the inauguration of the Rural Deanery of Cookshire in this Mission, when the Archdeacon of Quebec was present and gave a most helpful charge, or of the improvements in our Churches at Randboro' and Island Brook, or of the visit of our beloved Bishop, which we all remember with pleasure.

The usual Services have been regularly kept up at the five stations in the Mission, with, perhaps, a small increase in the attendance.

*S. Matthew's Church, Randboro'*, has been beautified by a stained-glass east window, in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Asher Jones, and a very suitable polished brass alms dish has been presented by Mrs. G. G. Hurd and Miss Laura Hodge. The Sunday School has been kept up during the summer by Mr. A. F. Planche, Church-Warden, and Mrs. Wm. Planche. Services were held every Friday in Lent at this Church, and every Wednesday at Island Brook, and an attempt has been made to establish a regular "week night" Service, but the attendance is not encouraging.

*Christ's Church, Island Brook*, is fortunate in having a hard-working Ladies' Guild. Under the energetic presidency of Mrs. G. W. French, this Guild has spent some \$240.00 on Church repairs during the past two years. The Church has cathedral glass in all the windows now as a result of their last effort. Mrs. Lothrop has taken charge of the Sunday School and conducted it with marked success. A most successful Jubilee Service was held here on the 20th of June. The Mayor, Council and School Boards attended in a body, along with a fraternal society, and the Church proved much too small to receive the loyal assembly.

Two members of this congregation, who have entered into rest during the past year, are much missed: Mr. R. H. Wilford, who has been an earnest and faithful Warden since the Church was built, and Mrs. J. W. Miller.

Sawyerville has a fortnightly Service in a hall. The attendance has improved and the Service is always hearty and dignified. Mrs. Moore has opened a Sunday School here, and every Sunday upwards of fifteen children have assembled for instruction. Mrs. H. Hunt and Mrs. C. French have assisted in the teaching.

Learned Plain School-house has often so large a congregation and so hearty a Service that one wishes we had a Church to worship in. Miss V. Bowen has gone to California, and we miss her from the organ. Mrs. A. F. Bowen keeps up the Sunday School.

Clifton is my least promising station. While the Service there is orderly the attendance is uncertain; and the fact that no Church people reside near the school-house suggests the possibility of better work being done by Cottage Services during the week.

I have to report with thankfulness many kindnesses from my people, for all of which I wish to express my gratitude. The Diocesan Board has requested the Wardens to agree to an increase in the assessments for next year, and I have no doubt they will do so. Once the laity, and especially the men, feel that the Church is theirs, and her work their work, the way is open for that work to go on successfully to the praise and glory of God.

PENINSULA AND LITTLE GASPÉ.

The Rev. N. M. Bayne reports :—

A. D. 1897 has been one more year of regular worship and work in the Church here. Services, with an average

attendance, have been held regularly every Sunday as usual both in St. Matthew's, Peninsula, and St. Peter's, Little Gaspé. In both Churches there were extra week-day Services during Advent and Lent, which were well attended, whilst in St. Matthew's there has been a fortnightly week-day Service during the other seasons of the year. The Lord's Supper has been administered every month and on great festivals, and the average number of Communicants has been in excess of former years. Sunday School work has been continued as heretofore during the summer months in Little Gaspé, and all the year through in Peninsula. The superintendent of this school, Mr. Miller, with two of the teachers, Mr. Lewis Ascot and Mr. Lewis Annett, began a branch work on the north-west of the Bay in the early summer and carried it on until winter set in. This was for the benefit of the children of three families who are seven miles distant from the Church. The effort has been much appreciated by the parents, who are unfortunately unable to teach the children themselves; and I am thankful too, both for the valuable work which they have done and because they have the spirit to do it for God and His Church.

The Lord Bishop visited the Mission on the 31st of August, when he preached to a large congregation at Little Gaspé, and also at Peninsula, when he confirmed a class of eight Candidates, one being an aged man prepared and sent by the Rev. G. T. Harding, of Sandy Beach.

Good and willing work in building continues. Within the present year a substantial barn has been built. The congregation of Peninsula prepared the frame and boards last winter, and put the whole together in the spring, the Little Gaspé congregation having furnished the shingles. In this way very little cash has been required, and the building is practically free of debt.

The Peninsula congregation has long felt that their Church needed renovating and completing; but owing to hard times found it impossible both to purchase the necessary materials and provide the labour. Therefore early in October last I went to Quebec seeking assistance, and received sympathy and kindness as well as liberal contributions towards our contemplated work, such as I had scarcely hoped for. Among the many who so kindly assisted us to realize the handsome amount of \$316, I must particularly mention the Hon. E. J. Price, who gave \$100; Mr. Robt.

Hamilton, \$50; The Church Helpers' Association, \$48; the Lord Bishop, \$20. With sufficient funds now in hand to buy all the material and furnishings needed, we have ordered lumber for finishing the interior, and have set about raising funds to pay for the more skilled labour. This is a difficult matter however, as the year has been one of unusual business depression on the coast, and as by the change of Government administration several small but helpful situations have been taken from our people and given to others. These circumstances make it also a strain for the Mission to meet its usual obligations to the Board, etc. The Ladies of the Guild of St. Matthew's Church have laboured with unabated zeal during another year, and of their willing efforts and substantial help in every undertaking of the congregation, I cannot speak too highly nor feel sufficiently thankful.

Here also, I express my gratitude for many kindnesses and much real help which I have received from the Mission, chiefest of which are an abundant and regular supply of wood; the hauling of my hay from a considerable distance; besides almost all the labour of shoeing my horse given gratis by one man during the four years of my incumbency. Such things not only make for mutual good will and substantially help the priest, but, when coupled with a truly Christian spirit, they give him courage and cause for deepest thankfulness.

## RICHMOND.

The Rev. James Hepburn writes :—

The past year has been one of peace and prosperity. Of this the financial statement speaks quite plainly. The debt which pressed upon us has gone down steadily for a few years past, and now stands at \$1,200, so that we anticipate the consecration of the Church at no distant date. This fact speaks eloquently of the efficiency of my Wardens who are serving for the third year to my great comfort, and also to the kind and generous hearts of my people. Not only have they given well for their own Parish, but for outside objects also—the two things always going hand in hand—as is seen by the sum of \$331.50 out of a total sum of \$2,568. The money has been obtained by direct taxation, excepting what was made by a very interesting and successful entertainment “Pepita,” the responsibility of which was borne by Mrs. Hepburn. The effect of the training of about forty of the young people for this was very wholesome.

There have been some pleasing variations of the Services during the year, occasioned by the visits of several organizations to the Church, viz., Foresters, Oddfellows, and Sons of England. The last named Order asked for a special Ser-

vice in the afternoon of June 22nd, the grand anniversary day. The Church was filled three times that day, and in the afternoon very full. The forms supplied by the Lord Bishop were used with good effect and with great acceptance. We have also had a very successful Choral Festival, our own choir, supplemented by the choir from Danville, being under the able management of Mr. Dorey, of Sherbrooke. The Service, as becometh all Services in the House of God, was inspiring, the music elevating, and the day a day of joy and profit to us all. The Service was repeated in Danville on the following week.

A very profitable day was spent with the Archdeacon of the Diocese, who kindly consented to read his paper on the Papal Encyclical, and encourage discussion upon it afterwards. The audience was much too small, but several of the Clergy were present, and we felt that we had been greatly favored. The Rev. T. Cunningham, of Montreal, took a month's holiday in the town, and he was willing to assist me every Sunday, so that I was greatly refreshed by his presence.

The Lord Bishop confirmed a small class of seven in May; and on his return from England he visited us again and gave an account of the Lambeth Conference. This he introduced by a most vivid description of the grand Jubilee Day in London, and especially of the Service at the steps of St. Paul's Cathedral. It was a treat, indeed, for which we are all more than thankful. Since Easter the number of the Celebrations of the Holy Communion have been doubled. I am now happy in offering to my people at 8 A.M. or 11 A.M., on alternate Sundays, the privileges and blessings of this Holy Ordinance. Much is yet to be desired in the increase of the Communicants, and also in the regular attendance. Old prejudices die slowly. It is also very hard to keep up a continuous interest in religious things. There is such a tendency to weary in well doing. However, from time to time, I have much to cheer me on my way. Two thankofferings to the Church moved me greatly, and also an Easter gift of new curtains to mellow the light. Mr. C. Pickering's gift of \$100 from the first instalment received on a patent he had designed from his railroad experiences, deserves special mention. His removal to Montreal from among us makes us mourn, for he was a strength to the Church in many ways, being known everywhere as a faithful, kind and good man. Owing to removals from the Dis-

trict I have transferred a week night Service from the Boast School-house to the Janesville School-house. This is only a little more than a mile from the Church, but it is a suburb of the town rapidly building up, and I have many aged members in it who can get to Church only occasionally, and a goodly number of others whom I hope to help. I have rented an organ, and the Services have been very hearty, thus far, and much appreciated. It was well that I took no holiday this season, for serious sicknesses have prevailed since the early spring. And the year will be remembered from the large number of deaths, and many of peculiar sorrowfulness, from accident and from malignant disease. During the last five months I have been called to bury six of my bright and happy young people, three of them taken in a moment, not to mention babes and older ones. May our God and Father help the bereaved and bring good out of it to all of us.

RIVIÈRE DU LOUP.

The Rev. G. G. Nicolls writes:—

The central event in the history of this Mission during the past year has undoubtedly been the clearing off of the last cent of the debt upon the building hitherto known as "the Mission Church," followed, as a natural consequence, by its consecration. It was mentioned last year that the debt was all paid save a small sum due for interest on borrowed money. Large and small are however relative terms; and the small sum of \$25.00 becomes a large one when it is contributed by a single individual, as in this instance. Our kind friend is a Montreal lady upon whom we have indeed but little claim, but who, within an hour of hearing how matters stood, sent me, to my unbounded surprise, the whole of the money required. Her good deed will meet with its due reward.

On the sixteenth Sunday after Trinity, October 3rd, the Bishop visited the Mission, consecrating the Church in the morning, by the title of S. Michael and All Angels, and administering Confirmation in the evening. The Services were joyous and bright, and the Bishop's addresses inspiring as usual.

On the initiative of an American lady who spent last summer (1896) with us, and largely through her exertions, assisted by a more than generous grant from the Guild of St. Matthew's Church, Quebec, the old and unshapely set of Altar Vessels (and poor plate at that), long in use in the Mission, was replaced by a heavy set of solid silver at Easter. The new vessels are correct in shape, and beautiful in design and workmanship; the upper surface of the Paten and the cup of the Chalice being richly gilt.

A new departure in the work of the Mission was made early in February. Hearing that a large majority of the men at two lumber camps, some fifty miles from here, were Protestants, with a fair sprinkling of Church people amongst them, I volunteered to go into the woods and have Service with them. My offer was kindly welcomed by the Messrs. Towers, the "bosses," and I was well received by the men, who seemed to enjoy and appreciate the Services. The journey was made partly by rail, but involved also a drive of some twenty-two miles each way, and a very cold drive it was on the return trip. These Services will be repeated this winter it is hoped, though I am told that the proportion of Roman Catholics amongst the men is very much larger than it was last year.

For the rest, the work has gone steadily on in its usual grooves; the number of outstations, up and down the railway, and in the Saguenay, remaining the same as it was last year. We still retain the services of our faithful Church-Wardens, now in their fourth year of office. It has become a tradition—though wrong in principle—that the chief burden of the work should fall upon the people's Warden, and it is only fair to say that Mr. Hill has discharged the duties pertaining to his office with exceptional faithfulness and devotion. We lost in the autumn the services at the organ of Miss Jessie Hill, who had given them with conscientious regularity for two years. Our little Sunday School still owes its very existence, one may almost say, to the exertions of Mrs. LeBrocq. The Guild

and Auxiliary continue their quiet but effective work, and this year an enormous packing case, full of comforts of all kinds, was sent away to the North-West, instead of a barrel, as has always been the case hitherto. Our summer visitors were rather fewer than usual this year, and the consequence was apparent both in the collections in Church and in the aid which they always give us in meeting our assessment; but this latter has been met to the last cent at the end of the year. We have lost by removal within the past three months nine or ten persons, and one by death, yet, strange to say, the average attendance at Services is as numerous, so far, as during any winter for the past four years. The attendance on Christmas Day was the same as last year, when it was larger than that on the same festival in 1893, 1894 or 1895. The death above referred to is that of Mr. J. B. Fergusson, whose membership in the congregation was probably of longer duration than that of any of those who survive him. He was for many years Church-Warden, and also for a time Lay Reader. In July last there passed away at Father Point, at the ripe age of seventy-eight, Mrs. McWilliams, after much lengthened suffering, borne with exemplary Christian patience. If ever there was a true saint, here was one. It will be recollected that she was clinically confirmed by the Bishop in August 1896. She had been bed-ridden for several years. SANDY BEACH.

The Rev. G. T. Harding writes :—

Our circumstances this year have been less favourable than for many years. The fishing industry seems to be losing its place in the coast district. The markets, all over the world, are very dull; merchants are reducing their operations and establishments, buying little and at low prices, and seeming to threaten a complete withdrawal from the business. Then the Petroleum Oil Company, whose operations in the

district for many years gave employment in various ways to a number of our people, suddenly stopped work for a couple of months ; and this, though only temporary, was severely felt ; and taken in conjunction with the depressed trade in fish, and the failure of a number of smaller industries, caused a good deal of trouble and anxiety in all quarters, and in particular has made quite a difference in matters which concern the Church. Things looked very gloomy for a time in the autumn, and I was almost afraid that our congregation would feel compelled to ask additional help from the Diocesan Board of the Church Society ; I am thankful, however, that nothing of the kind was done, and am in hopes that the worst is now over with us. Needless to say we have before us difficulties and a struggle still, in doing our duty to Holy Church ; but this is all for our good, and I should not like our people to choose, if the choice were theirs, a condition of things in which there is no struggle. For reasons given above I fully expected that there would be a falling off in the amount collected here for extra parochial objects, but I am pleased to find that, although the amount raised for the funds of the Church Society is \$1 less, the total for outside objects (\$70) is \$10 in excess of last year. The Sunday collections for general purposes have fallen off. This is in part due to the unusual number of stormy Sundays which we have had, and in part to the fact that by the Bishop's request I have assisted the Missionary of Gaspé Basin by celebrating Holy Communion for him in the new Church in York once a month since the month of June, so that altogether we have no reason to be discouraged but every reason to be thankful. The Services here and at Barachois School-house have been continued as usual, excepting that on the days of my absence in York one Service only has been held at this Church. Holy Communion has been celebrated once a fortnight, the attendance being generally good and on some occasions excellent. On Easter Day we had over seventy ; on Ascension Day twenty-five ; on Whitsunday thirty-seven ; on Thanksgiving Day forty-five ; on Christmas Day sixty-two. Bible Classes were kept up as usual during the winter at the Parsonage and at Barachois, the former being much more successful than it has generally been of late years. The success of the latter is always good. Our Lenten and Advent Services were well attended, the latter especially so, over a

hundred being present at the last of the course, although the season was not very favourable for getting about, and many of our people were away from home.

Much kindness has been shewn by our people to myself and family, during the past year, such as the getting out our fuel for the year, sending us supplies of fish and vegetables, making two handsome donations (one at Easter and one at Christmas) to my daughter, who plays the organ at Barchois, together with many acts of personal kindness, all an indication of good-will and thoughtfulness, which is duly appreciated by us, and for which we here beg to thank them.

SCOTSTOWN.

The Rev. H. A. Brooke writes :—

There are really very few remarks to be made upon the past year's work in the Mission of Scotstown, which would be interesting to those living outside the Mission. The work has gone on much as usual. The clergyman has been greatly aided by a band of devoted and loyal Churchmen and women, who are not simply willing to give of their worldly substance, but also devote their time freely to the service of the Church of Christ.

*Scotstown.*—Service is held here every Sunday, and although we have lost many families by removal, still of late our congregations have been larger than usual, owing perhaps to the fact that many who do not belong to the Church yet delight to avail themselves of the opportunity of worshipping God in the Church's way. The Sunday School is in a very prosperous condition ; there are about thirty children on the list, all under definite Church instruction, the result of which will doubtless be seen in years to come.

At *Canterbury* we are now worshipping God in our new Church, which was consecrated on the 11th of

December, 1896, by the Lord Bishop of Quebec. The Church completed cost \$1,168.00 and is free from debt. The effect of the Church has been to increase attendance and reverence at all Divine Services.

Much praise is due to the Church people in the district of Canterbury, for having accomplished, by the help of God, what seemed to be almost an impossibility. For forty years they had worshipped God in an old School-house, and now, through their self-denying efforts, they meet together to worship Him in a beautiful Church paid for and consecrated. The Sunday School is in a very satisfactory condition.

*Lingwick.*—The great event of the year at Lingwick was on Jubilee Sunday, when a new Diamond Jubilee Bell which cost \$93.00 was placed upon the new Church and dedicated to the Service of God as a Thank-offering for the Diamond Jubilee of our noble Queen. It was the first Church bell ever rung in Lingwick. Both old and young attend the Sunday School here, and very helpful indeed it has been to the Church. I only wish we had the same attendance in all our Sunday Schools, and I feel sure we would see far better results. The saying, "we are never too old to learn," is always exemplified in the Sunday School at Lingwick.

A Service once in two weeks is held at McNamee, a place seven miles from Scotstown, and a very good attendance we have. I also hold an occasional Service at Milan and Spring Hill, twelve and twenty-six miles respectively from Scotstown, where we have one family in each place.

I had charge of Agnes and Lake Megantic from March until October, when the Rev. Stanley Dickson was appointed, which relieved me of any further responsibility. Before closing my report for the past year I would like to thank the Church-Wardens and all Lay Helpers in my Mission for the valuable and helpful assistance they have rendered to the Church and to myself personally. Let us remember that of ourselves we can do nothing, but with united effort and the help of God, we can accomplish grand things for the Church of Christ in this world.

## SHERBROOKE.

The Rev. Dr. Dumbell writes:—

When I came into residence, in February last, I found this Parish in good working order, and giving evidence throughout of the zeal and prudence of my predecessor. I found also an united and, for the most part, earnest people, wonderfully free from the cliques and petty jealousies with which large Parishes are so often afflicted. Under these circumstances, it is not wonderful that things go smoothly, and that by reason of union a great deal more work is done than could otherwise be accomplished.

We sustained the loss of a faithful and hard-working Priest by the removal of the Rev. H. E. Wright, Curate, from the Diocese. The Curacy has not yet been filled up, but I have efficient Sunday help from the Rev. E. Costigan, of Bishop's College, who takes three Services. I go every other Sunday to Brompton Line, where the congregation is steadily increasing, and includes a number of young men; Rev. Mr. Costigan, on the alternate Sunday, holding Service at the School-house on the Magog Road, where the people are earnest and attend well. At the Parish Church, and at the Advent, East Sherbrooke, there are the same Services as heretofore, three at each. Daily Prayers are said at S. Peter's, morning and evening, with occasional lectures, etc., in addition. There is, of course, as there has been for many years, a Celebration every Sunday and Holy-day.

I cannot speak in too strong terms of the work done by the women of the Parish. Activity, energy, and the greatest perseverance are coupled with an unanimity and charitable spirit which evoke my admiration and inspire confidence. The Guild of S. Peter is doing noble work, as is also the Woman's Auxiliary.

The following additional Societies have been organized

during the past year and are doing well : — The Clothing Club, for the sale of garments to the poor at nominal prices. This is working admirably. The Altar Society, for taking charge of the Sanctuary, Altar Linen, Vestments, etc. The Guild of S. Agnes, for young women in the Mission District of the Advent, East Sherbrooke. I have made an attempt to revive the Chapter of the Brotherhood of S. Andrew, but, so far, I regret to say, without much success. I find the difficulties which my predecessor encountered in this branch of work to be as great as he did. Still, as I have been successful elsewhere, I shall try again.

To one thing I refer with great thankfulness, namely, the increased and increasing attendance at the early Celebrations of the Holy Communion. I trust that ere long all who are physically able to do so will make their Communions at the first Service, instead of consulting their own ease and comfort by coming at a later hour.

The fund for the new Church now amounts to about \$17,000, including \$4,000 subscribed, but not yet paid, and a gift of \$5,000 from the Maryatt bequest, secured for us by the personal exertions of the Bishop. This gift is on condition that the Church be finished (with no legal claim upon it) by the end of January 1900.

I acknowledge with gratitude assistance given me on various occasions by the neighbouring Clergy, especially of Bishop's College, and particularly by my Rev. Brother, the Rector of Lennoxville, who has attended several urgent sick calls for me since I have been without a Curate. I have also had efficient help from two members of the Brotherhood of Readers of Bishop's College, and must acknowledge the Services rendered by Mr. E. N. R. Burns especially, who was with me for two months and who did admirable and faithful work.

Over one hundred persons have assisted in various ways in the Church work of the Parish during the past year. The Wardens have fulfilled their duties admirably and with fidelity, but we have sustained a sad loss by the removal of Mr. J. A. Ready to Toronto. His duties, however, as Rector's Warden, have been undertaken by Mr. H. D. Lawrence, an able and faithful Church worker, whilst his position as superintendent of the Sunday School is now filled by Mr. J. C. Price, well known as one of our most efficient and faithful teachers.

## SHIGAWAKE.

The Rev. I. N. Kerr writes :—

I entered upon work in this Mission on Advent Sunday 1896, succeeding the Rev. R. J. Fothergill, who had laboured faithfully in this field for three years. I have carried on the work pretty nearly on the same lines as my predecessor.

*St. Paul's, Shigawake.*—Services have been held here regularly once each Sunday, and the Holy Communion administered once a month on Sunday and also occasionally on the Festivals. During Advent and Lent the special week-day Services were well attended, there being an unusual number of men present at the Litany Services on Fridays at 7.30 A. M. The Sunday School continues to be successfully carried on under the superintendence of Mr. Frank Skeene, who has an able staff of female teachers to assist him.

Partly owing to depression of the fish market, but also in part due to indifference and lack of a spirit of self-sacrifice on the part of some members, this congregation are continually in arrears with their assessment. I hope to see an improvement in this respect in the future, for when the hand is closed it is too often a sign that the heart is so also. The Woman's Auxiliary continue to do good work, and sent a bale in November to one of the Indian-Homes in the North-West.

*St. James', Port Daniel.*—This congregation have the same number of Sunday Services as St. Paul's, but not so many on week-days, as the majority of the people live at a distance from the Church. But I gave them a Service twice a month on Friday evenings in No. 2 School-house; these were well attended. I am thankful to notice a slight increase in the number of male Communicants. The interior of the Church has been greatly improved and made more

comfortable by the addition of new seats and also a new organ, both of which were much needed. For these improvements our thanks are largely due to some ladies of the congregation, who, by earnest and hard work, raised the necessary funds. We have also to thank the Church members in Quebec, who gave us nearly fifty dollars towards the organ. Two Sunday Schools were carried on during summer, one in the Church by Miss McGie and Miss Sweetman, and the other in No. 2 School-house, superintended by Mr. Norman Don.

*St Philip's, L'Anse aux Gascons.*—There are only sixteen families here, but the congregation, although not large, are earnest and devout, and the Services always hearty. During the early part of the year this part of the Mission suffered much from sickness, and three of our most faithful Church members were removed from our midst. This congregation were pleased to have a visit from the Ven. Archdeacon Roe in July, who very kindly gave them two Services. They are also, very grateful to Miss McGie, who during the greater part of the year drove from Port Daniel, a distance of five miles, to take the organ, and thus helped very much to brighten the Services.

*St. Peter's, Newport.*—A regular monthly Service has been held here during the year. This Church has been enriched by a beautiful brass Alter cross, presented by S. LeMarquand, Esq., of Boston, in memory of his nephew, Victor Samuel LeMarquand. A suitable fence has been erected around half of the grave-yard.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese paid the Mission a visit in August, and held Confirmations in three of the Churches, and also a Service in the fourth Church. We were all cheered and helped by his visit and by his encouraging words. During the summer we were also pleased to welcome among us the Rev. John Almond, who was home on a visit to his people in Shigawake. He kindly assisted me, and thus the congregation at Shigawake were able to have some extra Services. The good wishes of all the people were with him on his return to Missionary work on the Labrador. During the months of September and October, I was absent from the Mission, and the work was carried on very acceptably by the Rev. W. Barton. Before closing my report I would wish to express my gratitude for the universal kindness which has been shown to me in the whole Mission. I would also take this opportunity of

thanking the Church-Wardens of the several Churches, the organists, and all others who have assisted in the work of the Church.

STANSTEAD AND BEEBE PLAIN.

The Rev. W. T. Forsythe writes :—

The routine of parochial work in this Parish was interrupted most seriously during the first half of the year by my serious illness, which for three months incapacitated me from doing any work at all, and for the remaining three months prevented me from doing much beyond my Sunday duties. I am thankful to say that now I am able to discharge the full duties of the Parish. During my illness the Sunday Services were ably and efficiently conducted by Mr. J. S. Holah, Divinity Student of Bishop's College, who also helped me afterwards in the special work at All Saints' Church. I also wish to thank my ever kind and ready friend, Rev. A. Stevens, for help in discharging parochial duties during this period, and the Rev. Professor Wilkinson for help on Easter Sunday. I would express my deep appreciation of the unwearied acts of kindness shewn me and mine during my protracted illness by the whole community, not only by Church people, but by people of all denominations.

The Sunday Services at Christ Church have been maintained without interruption, and since Easter the weekly

Celebrations of Holy Communion have been resumed. Since the end of June there have been also Celebrations on the various Saints' Days. The congregations on Sunday mornings have not been quite so large as in the past few years, owing no doubt to the interruption of the ordinary routine of Parish work alluded to above. Our great work during the year has been the organization of a plan to liquidate the debt which our attempt to be self-supporting has in the course of eleven years accumulated, viz., \$1,100. We have canvassed the whole Parish with the result that \$200 per annum has been subscribed until the whole debt is liquidated. We acknowledge with thanks a liberal donation towards this purpose from Hon. E. J. Price, and promised conditional help from R. Hamilton, Esq., and our Diocesan. The S. Andrew's Brotherhood continue its useful balm of love. Its members have kept up with varying success a Sunday School at Caswellboro' School-house for several months, helped me at Marlow, and done much other active work. From Christmas to the commencement of September (with the exception of May and June) there was only a Sunday afternoon Service at All Saints' Church. With the advent of Rev. F. G. Vial, we resumed our regular morning and evening Sunday Services, and Sunday School and parochial work in this section. We began this revival of parochial energy by wiping out our whole debt, and so started again with a clear financial sheet. We owe this possibility of having an Assistant Clergyman in the Parish to the kindness of our Bishop.

Our Marlow work has undergone various changes during the past year. During January and February the Services were conducted by the members of the S. Andrew's Brotherhood, under the leadership of our Lay Reader, Mr. Duncalf. They were suspended during March and April, resumed by me and kept up with good congregations during May and June. In July the Methodist Society built a new place of worship about a mile away and gave up their Services at Marlow. This took away the greater number of our attendants, but left us with a small number of regular Church members. We now have Services every Sunday afternoon, and a small Sunday School has been organized under the superintendence of Mr. R. Brodie. The other School-house Services have been suspended during the past year, but I hope soon to reopen those at Judd's Mills and Moulton Neighbourhood. We had the pleasure

of a visit from our Diocesan on Sunday, September 12th, who held Confirmations and preached at Stanstead, Marlow and Beebe Plain.

S. GEORGE, BEAUCE.

The Rev. H. S. Harte reports:—

In reviewing the work of the year our first thoughts are those of gratitude to the Giver of All Good for permitting us to accomplish as much work for Holy Churches as it has been our privilege to do within the year.

To begin with, we have built a new Parsonage at S. George, which, when completed, will have cost about four-hundred dollars. We were permitted to take up residence in the same early in October, and trust ere these items are in print the finishing touches will be put on it and it handed over to the Church Society. In this connection we would like to place on record the deep sense of gratitude which we entertain towards those kind friends in Quebec and Sherbrooke whose liberality made our task of building comparatively easy and pleasant.

At Cranbourne, on September 1st, under the direction of Miss Nora K. Hodgson, of Frampton, we opened the first Dissident School in this locality, putting into use again, after a lapse of over twenty years, the old log-school-house. We are grateful to Mr. Robert Hamilton for giving us funds to procure maps and a blackboard, and to Mr. Henry Atkinson for the wherewithal to make the outside of the building withstand the winds of our northern winter.

During the year we were enabled to raise in the Mission sufficient funds to finish clapboarding S. James' Church, Cranbourne, and to re-shingle S. Paul's Church, Cumberland. It is our intention (D. V.) to thoroughly renovate the latter building during the summer of 1898.

With the sanction of the Bishop of the Diocese, and acting under the licence of the Bishop of Maine, we have opened up a permanent Mission Station at Dennistown,

about ten miles across the Maine border line. Since inaugurating this Mission in January last we have administered the Sacrament of Holy Baptism to nineteen persons, about half of whom were adults, and have presented for Confirmation seventeen Candidates.

During the summer months Mr. Philip Callis, of the Brotherhood of Lay Readers of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, resided in this Mission, and under the direction of the Incumbent kept up regular Sunday and week-day Services. The members of this new Mission have given gratuitously a handsome site for a Church—the corner stone of which was laid by the Bishop of Maine on October 21st, 1897—and all the lumber required for the entire frame of the Church, so that early next summer we hope to have the edifice ready for the worship of Almighty God.

The angel of death has paid us several visits during the year. At Cumberland, in January, Mrs. Richard Wintle was taken away from a large family who could ill-afford their loss; and at Christmas Mr. and Mrs. Robert Laweryson were called upon to mourn the loss of a little boy. But it was at Cranbourne we suffered our severest loss. In October the wife of our Warden, Mr. S. S. Armstrong, died a victim of consumption, and within seven weeks three of the little ones she left behind followed, being cut off by that dread disease diphtheria. Mr. William Armstrong, a member of the same congregation, was also called upon to mourn the loss of two bright children from the same scourge. May they all rest in peace, and may light perpetual shine upon them.

## ST. URSULE.

The Rev. E. U. Brun writes:—

St. Ursule Mission owes its existence to the generosity of T. H. Dunn, Esq., of Quebec City, who, out of love for his birth place, built a nice Church for the worship of Almighty God and to accommodate the few French people who belong to the English Church. One interesting feature is that all the Services are in French, though several people understand English somewhat, but prefer the French. There is a day-school connected with this Mission. Not long ago, Mr. Dunn gave two beautiful large lamps for the Chapel, costing over \$10.00. He also has kindly consented to give a Font, which is much needed, and an Altar Cloth and frontal. The water from the aqueduct has been put in the Parsonage, and that is a great improvement, for which I am very thankful to Mr. Dunn. The people have built a wood-shed and bought a small stove for the Chapel. As I have been in St. Ursule but five months, I cannot make a lengthy report. The work is quietly but steadily carried on. The morning Service is always well attended, but the other Service is usually poorly attended. Originally the Services were held in the Church at Louiseville, when the Rev. Mr. Merrick was in charge of the Mission. But, as the Church people of Louiseville died or moved away, Mr. Dunn built a Church at St. Ursule, where there are twenty-five Communicants. We have yet two or three Communicants in Louiseville, and a small stone Church, and a cemetery, which is used for burials for the people of St. Ursule and Louiseville. Recently Mr. Grant, a good churchman, entered into rest in his seventy-fifth year, being the last one of his family.

## THREE RIVERS.

The Rev. H. C. Stuart writes :—

The Services at S. James' Church have suffered no interruption during the year. The attendance is usually fair for the small number of Anglicans here. We are scarcely twenty families, all told, and as none are in independent circumstances, and probably half of our people contribute very little, if anything, to our Sustentation Fund, it will readily be understood that the maintenance of the Church here is an ever-increasing source of anxiety. We are united, however, and it gives me pleasure to say that the cheerfulness with which our few people put their shoulders to the wheel, and disdain to think of despondency, is indeed beyond all praise. It devolves upon a small number to contribute through offertory collections, etc., about \$250.00, leaving about \$150.00 to be raised by special efforts to meet the Rector's stipend of \$800.00. In addition to this are the necessary expenses of the Services, which, needless to say, are kept as low as possible. It is painful to record the low state of our resources, and humiliating to us all, but it is necessary, in view of the smallness of our offerings to outside objects, and of no contributions being sent to very important funds, both within and without the Diocese. It is not the will but the way, in this case, that is at fault.

I regret to record the death of one of the Church's best friends and supporters at Three Rivers, Mr. Younger Hooper, for many years People's Warden. This is a heavy blow to us all, making as it has, a break in our numbers difficult to mend. There are indications, however, of a revival of English life and prosperity here, and we feel that our work at present is to maintain our position until the return-tide sets in ; but so long have we watched the tide flow, so wearily have we waited for it to ebb and oft been disappointed, that we fear now to build much upon rumours however welcome.

Turning now to the brighter side of the picture, the past year has witnessed an important strengthening of our position, pleasing to record. This was the donation of \$800.00 from Miss Hooper, for covering the roof of the Rectory with tin, and repairing, straightening and tinning the belfry of the Church. This very needful work was done, and well done, during the past summer. Miss Hooper and her family will always be gratefully remembered by our people here, for this and many other substantial helps they have

given to the Church, and without which we could scarcely have maintained our position. I also gratefully acknowledge a donation of \$10.00 from Mrs. Geggie towards our endowment, accompanied with the pleasing remark that although the Geggie family is now scattered through the world, its roots are at Three Rivers.

The work at Radnor has gone on under the Lay Readers appointed by the Bishop some years ago. Owing to the difficulty of getting my place here supplied, I have been unable to celebrate the Holy Communion there but once during the year. The Rev. Mr. Gomery, now connected with the S. P. C. K., kindly took charge of the Services one Sunday during the summer—a privilege for which the people of Radnor were very grateful.

VALCARTIER.

The Rev. Dr. Riopel writes:—

The Services as usual were fairly attended throughout the year. The Sunday has to be very stormy if we do not have present at Divine Service many who had to travel seven or eight miles over bad roads across mountains, and perhaps all the way on foot. The usual payments to the Diocesan Board have been made and the ordinary local expenses have been defrayed, but the farmers complain that it is very hard for them to procure the money wanted; that their farm produce not only fetches a low price, but store-goods instead of cash, for the most part, is all they can get in exchange. This state of things, they say, may be favourable enough to the comforts of the farmers homeliving, but very embarrassing when cash payments have to be made. The stable and coach-house promised last spring were completed in the fall; and now with a few dollars' worth of paint and some repairing of the Church all the necessary buildings of the Mission will be fully supplied and in good order. The house is warm and comfortable in winter, and offers a pleasant and healthful

residence in summer. The Church certainly for these parts is all that can be expected. The walls were built of poor stone and bad mortar, but the inside is well finished, at least as well as the worth of the walls warrant. The inside is incomparably superior to the outside.

WATERVILLE.

The Rev. Ernest A. Willoughby King reports:—

More Sunday Services than ever before in this Mission. Increase mainly in those held in the Swedish tongue. The average attendance of members and Communicants increased at North Hatley both winter and summer, in Eustis since opening of new Church, and in Waterville a little—but very little—over that of last year. Nowhere in the Mission is it what it ought to be. The offertory at North Hatley and Eustis was larger, whilst that for general purposes at Waterville was precisely the same, even to a cent. Notwithstanding last year's unusual increase of \$1,181 over the preceding year and the responsibilities thereby incurred, the values for all purposes secured for the Church (although not all yet paid) fall but little short of that large amount and this year reach \$2,005.88. Our hard-working and "almost ubiquitous" Bishop paid two much valued visits to each of the three stations within a year.

*Waterville.*—The work of the Swedish assistant, Rev. A. Andrén, B A., covered a period of about six months. The results have not been all that were expected. Two Swedish men and a young girl were among the confirmed, and some children were baptized. Mr. Andrén at my request lived one month in North Hatley, one in Eustis and four in Waterville. After all that has been done for them both this year and last it is very surprising how few Swedes attend the English Services, although most of them know our language, at least in a conversational way. A property adjacent to St. John's Church, very desirable for a Church Hall and for horse-sheds, has been bought for \$450.00, and is to be utilized as a Victoria Diamond Jubilee Memorial, when the means can be found. On this spot

fifty-eight years ago (and probably even earlier) Church Services used to be held in the school-house, which was succeeded by the present structure till this was changed from school to dwelling in 1886. Towards the proposed enterprise \$25.00 each have been generously contributed by the Lord Bishop, by Rev. T. L. Ball, and by the vendors, Messrs. F. and A. Gale. For the balance (\$350.00 and interest) a small sum only is yet in hand.

*North Hatley.*—The Church, opened for use January 23rd, 1894, was consecrated by Bishop Dunn September 10th, 1897. The sheathing from floor to roof-point had just been well done in excellent ash. Prayer-desk, pulpit and credence-table of simple and uniform pattern and made of birch now replace the temporary ones. A Font, designed by Mr. Goodhue, architect of the building, and also of curly birch, enclosing a large metal bowl, was presented by Miss Jennie Daves, of Baltimore, as a memorial to her brother Frank. It is unique in style and beautifully made (by Mr. H. Knowlton). A large brass alms-basin, by the ladies who boarded at Mr. A. C. LeBaron's, and Bible-markers, by Miss Williamson, are additional donations. A memorial window is promised by Mrs. Daves and family. The grounds about the Church have been well graded, but at heavy expense, owing to peculiar difficulties. This much appreciated work was planned and superintended with loving care and professional capacity by Mr. C. Fisher Satterthwaite, C. E., of New Jersey, as a personal offering to God's service. A horse-shed is much needed. Rev. E. H. Ingle, of Baltimore, gave valuable help in the Services upon two Sundays. The summer visitors as a body—although many did not belong to our communion—gladly worshipped with us very regularly, and in a generous and harmonious way, contributed through the offertory and otherwise to Church purposes. In August, Mr. George Pott, of New York, a devout churchman and a visitor for the first time, died here of paralysis at a ripe old age. Mrs. E. Thomas, of Washington, who had visited North Hatley for several years, and built a fine house on the Lake shore, was called to her rest in September. She will be much missed for many reasons. Mrs. Thomas, as well as her daughters, was always warmly interested in the welfare of the Mission. It is hoped that some memorial to one who was such a general favourite may be placed in the little Church she loved so well.

*Eustis and Capelton.*—The first anniversary of the opening of Christ Church was celebrated November 5th. A beautiful Chancel window was given by Rev. T. S. Chapman (\$15.00), Mr. C. N. Martin (\$25.00) and the Sunday School children (\$1.60), also a very pretty quatrefoil gable window by Mrs. C. N. Martin, whilst the cost of the side windows was collected by Mr. Thos. Wheeler. The Victoria Guild has been very active and successful. The interior of the Church is now plastered between the studding preparatory to sheathing. Towards this and further completion the venerable and generous S. P. C. K. has granted thirty pounds, and the Church Society leads us to expect some additional help. The sound of a new bell is being heard by anticipation. Warm thanks are due to the students of Bishop's College, who for several months took charge of the Sunday School. It is now being admirably superintended by Mr. Martin. Mrs. Sprigings at North Hatley and Miss Bradley at Waterville perform similarly important duties with a like earnestness.

## WAY'S MILLS AND BARNSTON

The Rev. A. E. Whatham writes :—

I have but little to report this year, since the work of the Mission has been carried on quietly and in much the same order as last year ; but the little that I might say is a record of success for which all concerned devoutly thank God. The prospects of the Church's work in Barnston, so long discouraging, are brighter than at any time since the erection of our little Church in that village. The trying and "sifting" period through which this congregation has passed, has had the effect of drawing out and confirming in their principles those who were really with us, and of increasing their helpfulness and strengthening their devotion to the Church. We have now two staunch Church-Wardens, Messrs. Walker and Jordan, and the increased assessment, now \$60.00 per annum, is duly met. Miss Cole, the model school teacher at Barnston, most kindly acts as organist. To Mr. and Mrs. Buckland, Mr. and Mrs. Walker, Mrs. Jordan and Miss Webster, as well as my faithful Wardens I am indebted for much valuable help in this part of my Mission. At Way's Mills the Services are held as usual, and the work goes on hopefully. Here the assessment, increased to \$100.00, is paid with the same promptness as it was when lower. I regret to say that Miss Phœbe Davidson, who had been organist in our little Church here since its erection, has removed from our midst, and a very great loss she is. Her long and faithful services, her devotion to the Church's interests, and her readiness at all times to help on the good work were recognized by her fellow worshippers in a small purse, which however in no sense was a measure of their feelings of gratitude and good-will. Miss Stella Corey has taken her place at the organ and bids fair to succeed well. The Ladies' Guild here continue their good work. At Barnston, too, a Guild has been organized and is succeeding admirably. In addition to Services at Way's Mills and Barnston I go to Sutton, Baldwin's Mills, Fairfax, and occasionally to King's Croft and Libbytown. At none of these places have we many Church people. In spite of the many difficulties which beset us, I cannot but feel that the Church is making progress in these parts ; slow though it may be, yet is it sure and steady. I am moreover thankful to say that peace, harmony and general good-will prevail throughout the Mission. If I mention

that during the past year I have preached two hundred and seven times, it will be seen that I have not, at least, been idle.

WINDSOR AND BROMPTON.

The Ven. Archdeacon Roe writes:—

There is, I think, some ground for encouragement and thankfulness in the history of this Mission during the past year. The finances are certainly in a more healthy condition. The assessments of the two congregations have been collected and paid punctually and honourably. A handsome new fence has been placed round the Brompton churchyard, the Ladies' Aid providing the money to pay for it. This organization continues to do its excellent work quietly and unostentatiously, for which they have my warm approval. Best of all, a considerable sum of money,—a large sum considering the means of the congregation,—has been contributed for religious and charitable objects outside the Parish, one of the best tests, I think, of the healthy religious life of a congregation. The Choir in St. George's, Windsor, has been reorganized and is now composed of men and boys, not yet in surplices. A supplementary Choir of Ladies in the front seats of the nave adds materially to the effectiveness of the music.

The congregation of Christ Church, Brompton, has been numerically satisfactory, and the Communion in both Churches uniformly large. For whatever he sees of encouragement, the Pastor thanks God.

For three years now in succession my kind friends in Brompton have sent me as a gift a large double team load of oats. I value deeply the feeling which prompts this liberality.

NOTE.—As some of the Clergy appear not to have observed the notice which was printed on page 131 of the Annual Report for 1895, and again on page 124 of the Report for 1896, the Secretary ventures to repeat the request therein made and to call the attention of his brother Clergy in question to the subject matter involved. "Collecting forms are sent out each Autumn to the Clergy, small ones for the use of their individual collectors, and large ones, headed "Alphabetical List," on which the names of all subscribers are to be alphabetically arranged, and ready for the press. And yet many of the Clergy, ignoring the larger forms, send in the smaller ones only, with names, regardless of order, written by the individual subscribers, and this too in many cases with a lead pencil. To be obliged to refer to old Reports for help in deciphering names, and then to arrange these in alphabetical order is a task which it is unreasonable to expect of the Secretary. The Society expects each Clergyman to see that his Lists are properly executed; if unable to attend to it in person, he might surely depute the work to some member of his band of collectors to whom all names are familiar; and see that all names are legibly written. The Secretary would also ask the Clergy, when writing their Reports, to use one side of the paper *only*. The majority of the Clergy observe these rules; and to them the Secretary feels very grateful."

The Investments paid in yielded an average of 5½ per cent. Those purchased will nominally pay 4.80 per cent; but, charging premiums, the actual rate received will be only 4.62 per cent.

Investments have been found for all the funds in hand at the end of last year, and for all maturing investments excepting those received during the last month of this year.

Nothing has yet been realized on the Toronto mortgage in default, and the property is producing no revenue. With the exception of a part of the year's interest on three small mortgages, all other revenues have been collected.

The Widows' and Orphans' Fund received a legacy of \$500.00 from the late Miss Margaret Hall, of Quebec, and the Clergy Trust Fund \$450.00 from the late Mrs. Richard Parker, of Ranboro'.

The capital of the Shigawake Endowment Fund has reached \$3,600, and the revenue becomes available.

It is no doubt a good sign that there is an increase in our contributions for Foreign Missions, because this shows that we are getting better to realize our responsibility to convey the Gospel Message to all the world. At the same

time it must be remembered that the Domestic Field may rightly be regarded as a Foreign Field, inasmuch as it is entirely outside our own "Domus" or Diocese, and it certainly has paramount claims upon our attention. The Committee therefore trust that, in response to this year's Ascensiontide appeal, there will be a very large increase in contributions towards the Domestic Fund of the Missionary Board. It is desirable of course that as much special assistance as possible should continue to be offered to Algoma, especially since its Bishop has been chosen from, and is so highly esteemed, in this Diocese; but, beyond this, our prayers should ever be going up before God for His blessing on the work that is being done throughout the Domestic and Foreign Fields, and our alms should be more and more concentrated upon the Domestic Field.

The Committee have again the pleasure of drawing attention to the Report of the Woman's Auxiliary of their work for the year ending May 20th 1897.

We have had many letters of thanks and encouragement from well-wishers in the different parishes, where it has been our privilege to render assistance. The committee and general meetings have been held as usual; the former monthly, except in July and August, and the latter in May and October. We would like to see a larger number of members attend these meetings, and show an interest in the work being done.

The collection for the Church Society in this district and neighborhood was again undertaken by some of our members.

The annual sale was held in the Church Hall on the 22nd September, also a supplementary sale a little later on; the amount realized was \$208.02. In the month of October, a letter having been received from a lady who had spent the summer on the Labrador coast, stating that poverty and sickness prevailed there, it was decided that during the winter articles of clothing should be collected to send in a bale to the Rev. Mr. Almond, St. Clement's Mission, Mutton Bay, by the first schooner in the spring; \$50 were also set aside to be spent on blankets and flannel underwear. The money collected a year ago to purchase a boat for work on the Magdalen Islands has been returned to us by His Lordship the Bishop of Quebec, it having been found unnecessary to furnish one. The amount is \$60.

Mr. E. Pope, Treasurer for the Diocese of Quebec, having received from the Colonial and Continental Society, England, 30 New Testaments for distribution in the Diocese, has asked our Association to take charge of them. We have consented to do so, and we will dispose of them as occasion arises.

We are again indebted to His Lordship the Bishop of Quebec for his generous donation of \$25; also to Mrs. Eno for annual gift of \$5, and Miss Agnes Brown, England, for \$4.86.

## FORMS OF BEQUESTS AND DEVISES BY WILL.

I. *A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.*

I give and bequeath to "The Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, the sum..... (or.....Shares of Stocks in the Bank of.....standing in my name in the Books of the said Bank, or of Debentures, describe them briefly,) upon trust to be by the said Church Society applied to and for the uses and purposes of the said Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation and none other.

II. *A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures, for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.*

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italics say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Mission Fund.

Or,—Towards the support of Missionaries and Clergymen of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the Clergy of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund for endowing the Church in the Mission of.....(or at .. ..) held by the said Church Society, subject to the conditions of a Deed of Trust passed between the said Church Society and the Incumbent and Church-Wardens of the Church in the said Mission (or at.....)

Or,—As the commencement of an endowment for the Church of St.....in the Mission of.....(or at ..... ..) and to provide for the future maintenance of divine worship in conformity with the principles of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or.—For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of day schools and Sunday-Schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, and Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of Churches according to the principles of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage-houses,—the setting apart of burial-grounds and church-yards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

### III. *A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.*

I give and devise unto “the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec,” incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, all and singular, &c., (describe the real estate clearly) to have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors for ever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof *to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.*

**IV. A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.**

Same as in No. 3—only instead of the words in Italics insert the specific purposes, as in No. 2.

**V. A Devise to the Society of a site for Church, &c.**

Same as in No. 3, down to the words "for ever"—then go on as follows:—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say—upon the trusts to hold the same for ever hereafter as and for the place and site of a Church and church-yard, and burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the place adjacent to the said site and premises within the said Diocese of Quebec, according to the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, and for no other purposes, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.
