## DANCE HOUSES IN DAWSON

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper Asks Information About a Letter to Mr. Ogilvie.

MORE STRINGENCY IS REQUIRED

In the Suppression of Vice Attending Barrooms With Female Bartenders.

Ottawa, March 6.—(Special)—Sir Charles H. Tupper proposes to question the Government as to the authenticity of the following letter, which he says Commissioner Ogilvie of the Yukon Council lately received from Mr. Sifton:

"Dear Sir—I have read a good many complaints, most of them a good many complaints, in regard to the fact that women of bad reputation are permitted to be employed in the barrooms and drinking places, where they are used for the purpose of decoying people into such places, and in regard to the lack of effort in suppressing gambling. It is also charged that the fault of failing gamblers is indirectly a license to them to continue their operations. I have not heretofore interfered in this matter, because it seems to me that you, as the commanding officer of the Mounted Police should have been able to decide what ought to be done, and from information which I have received it seems to me that a considerable increase in stringency is required. I see no reason why what is known as dancing halls, which are in reality, as I understand it, barrooms, with women selling liquor, should not be summarily suppressed. I desire, therefore, that you will take the necessary steps to carry out these views without delay. I am sending a copy of this letter to the commanding officer of the Mounted Police, with whom, no doubt you will require to consult, but who will be directly charged with the carrying out of the above instructions. It would be just as well for you, after the receipt of this letter, to intimate that the matter has been considered and a resolution has been arrived at on the above lines, so that the people generally will understand what is going to be done and govern themselves accordingly. (Signed) Clifford Sifton, Minister of the Interior."

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### DUTY OF THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY.

The Conservative party ought to take an early opportunity of placing itself on record in the House of Commons as still maintaining its old traditions in favor of protection and the National Policy, of its opposition to a one-sided trade preference, and of its support of Canada making every effort to extend its trade with colonies like Australia and South Africa, on the line of mutual preference, and that the time has arrived when the tariff should have special provision for adequate duties being imposed on the goods of countries which have a tariff hostile to Canadian produce, either by a high tariff or a maximum and minimum tariff, and enforcing the maximum against this country. The World has long upheld these ideas, and we think the time has arrived when they ought to be expressed in Parliament as the policy of the Conservative party.

### SCHOOL OF PRACTICAL SCIENCE.

The Government should deal with the overcrowding in the School of Practical Science with a business that had exceeded the capacity of its store. As the latter would have no hesitation in enlarging its premises, but on the contrary would rather like pleasure in being forced to provide additional accommodation to meet the requirements of its growing business, so the latter should regard the necessity for enlarging the School of Practical Science as an evidence of prosperity and as a proof of substantial progress in the development of the province. The School of Practical Science is crowded because the country is in need of trained engineers for the construction of railways and canals; for the development of water power; for the erection of manufacturing buildings; for the treatment of minerals and for other such like purposes. No school or college in the country is doing better work than the one provided over by Prof. Gairdner with the material development of the country, and in the benefits of that development we all share to a greater or less degree. The duty of the Government in regard to the School of Practical Science is to seek to take advantage of the school. Ontario has just entered upon her career as a mining country. Our iron and nickel resources will absorb the services of hundreds of skilled engineers, and our manufacturing industries will need men and women in the coming Ontario election.

### MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP.

In discussing the question of municipal ownership, the so-called "better classes" are wont to discredit the theory by referring to the incapacity and dishonesty of the men who would be called upon to manage great business undertakings under municipal control. This argument is plausible one at first blush, but R. T. Ely, Professor of Political Economy in the University of Wisconsin, in an article in the North American Review, reasons back a little further, and shows that the representatives of the people are corrupt the so-called "better classes" are largely responsible for the corruption. ## DEVELOPMENT ON SOO LINE

Rocky Wilderness at Victoria Mines  
Station Transformed Into a  
Thriving Community.

Eighty thousand dollars spent.

And the Prospects Are of Great Promise for the Nickel Industry—  
British Capital.

Montreal, March 6.—(Special).—From a rocky wilderness to a considerable sized town in a few months. This is the remarkable transformation worked at Victoria Mines Station, about 25 miles north of Sudbury, on the Soo Line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and all this is the work of one man. Already \$80,000 has been expended. Half a million of dollars will be the total sum spent within the next 12 months on experimental work, and the permanent investment will reach something over a million dollars.

This enormous expenditure at Victoria Mines is being made by Dr. Ludwig Mond of London, England, one of the firm of Brunner, Mond & Co., one of the largest chemical manufacturing houses in the world. Dr. Mond is many times a millionaire, and one of the greatest living authorities on Italian iron. He became interested in the enormous nickel-copper deposits of the Sudbury district about two years ago. The first of which Dr. Mond is one of the principals, owns the patents of the Solvay process of separating copper from nickel. A series of experiments made with the copper and nickel of the Sudbury district led to the discovery of the best working of the ore to such an extent that the commercial value would be almost doubled.

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

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
