Ottawa, Aug. 21-(Special.)-Fire insurance companies doing business in Canada found 1902 a prosperous year, according to the report of the Superintendent of Insurance. Cash received in premiums amounted to over ten and one half millions, exceeding the receipts of 1901 by over a million dol-

The amount paid for losses was \$4,-152.289, which is less by \$2,622,667 than the losses paid in 1961.

The gross amount of policies, new and renewed, taken during the year by five companies, was \$892,049,886, which is greater by \$70,527,032 than the amount taken in 1901.

The premiums charged in 1902 amounted to \$13,087,250, being an increase of \$1,398,292 over 1901.

The increase on risks taken in 1902 was \$44,251,814 among Canadian companies and \$14,500,593 among the British companies, and \$11,724,625 among American companies. In 1901 the increases in amount written among Canadian, British and American companies was \$16,042,198, \$1,693,252 and \$358,-750, respectively.

Premiums received on inland marine amounted to \$515,222; the losses were \$395,095, and the losses paid were \$407,132. The inland marine business was less favorable in 1901.

Thirty-eight life insurance companies carried on business in Canada last year. The total amount of policies taken during the year was \$80,552,966, which exceeds the amount taken in 1901 by \$6,653,738. The Canadian companies show an increase in 1902 of \$7. panies show an increase in 1902 of \$7,583,420, while in 1901 they had a decrease of \$247,202. The American comcrease of \$247,202. The American companies have a decrease of \$1,194,956, while in 1901 they had an increase of \$5,909,292, and the British companies have an increase of \$655,274, whilst in 1901 they had a decrease of \$658,954. The total insurance in force is \$508,812,305, an increase of \$45,043,271. The business of Canadian companies increased by \$23,517,975; British companies, \$1,340,059, and American companies, \$20,185,237.



First test was made with the north line of shafting, consisting of about 18 feet of 3 7-16 diameter, 221 feet of 2 15-16 diameter, including couplings and several pulleys; total weight about 8400 pounds. All the journal boxes were full of oil and in first-class condition. After running this line about half an hour to insure good and proper lubrication, several readings of the meters were taken during an interval of another hour. The average of these showed that the power required to drive this line was 5.46 horse power.

After substituting the double ball bearings in this line, four readings of the meters were taken during one hour's run, which showed that an average of 0.96 horse power was required to run the line under the changed conditions; practically one horse power.

Another test was made with the line south of the former. This consisted of 239 feet of shafting 2 15-16 diameter, with couplings and several pulleys; weight about 9000 pounds.

All the journals being filled with oil, a run of half an hour was made to insure that a film of oil had worked between the shaft and boxes. During an interval of another hour's run, four readings of the meters were taken, and showed that an average of six horse power was required to drive this line.

After substituting the double ball

bearing in this line, another test was made of about one hour's duration, luring which time several readings of during which time several readings of the meters were taken, from which we found that an average of 1.29 horse power was required to drive the line. After beiting the above-mentioned lines together, another test was made with double ball bearings, running about half an hour. During this period four readings of the meter were taken, showing that the average horse power required to run these two lines together was equal to 2.37.

The average power required to drive the two shafts separately was 0.96 plus 1.29, equal to 2.25 horse power. Therefore, there is a difference of 0.17 horse power more absorbed when driving the two lines together. This is accounted for by the extra load caused by the pull of the belt used to connect the two lines of shafting.

On the south wall of the building is a third line of shafting, 2 7-16 feet diameter and 114 feet long; the weight of which, including couplings and pulleys, will be about 2300 pounds. With the three lines belted together, another test was made, all fitted with the Chapman double ball bearings. The result showed that the power required during this test averaged 2.61 horse power.

The speed of the shafting during all the tests averaged 310 revolutions per



Argentine reports state weather is generally favorable for farm work.

The weekly crop report to Dun's Review from branches of R. G. Dun & Co. in important crop states shows marked improvement this week in some sections of the middle west as to corn, and decided gains as to the condition of cotton in the leading cotton states. Three or four weeks of hot weather in the middle west would insure a gold yield of corn. In most sections the nights continue too cool, in Ohio the weather is still very unscasonable, and in the southern part of the state rain is needed. The grain forming on the cob is small and irregular. In Indiana the nights are too cool, but the crop is making fair progress. In the Missussippi Valley, where the acreage in corn was unusually large owing to late planting in the flooded districts, rains have improved the condition of the crop, and it is now making excellent progress. In Western Missouri the crop is growing very rapidly, and the weather is exceptionally favorable, with ample moisture. In Iowa conditions are only 65 per cent. is now antichated. In Neitraska the crop continues to grow very rapidly, but the weather is too cool. In Scothern Kansas the crop is growing well and a yield of 65 or 75 per cent. is anticipated.




