London, Aug. 22.—The gates of Hatfield House were closed at midnight, with the announcement that their had been a change in the patient's condition since early in the evening, and no other bulletin was expected until morning.

The Associated Press correspondent is able to confirm, from the best source at Hatfield House, the Lancet's statement that Lord Salisbury is suffering from Bright's disease.

For thirty-five years a statesman of cabinet rank, Lord Salisbury has had a personal experience of the affairs of nations unequalled in Europe.

Hatfield House is situated in a magnificent park, which skirts the quiet town of which the Marquis of Salisbury is practically the owner.

# ALTERED DEMONIOUS BILL PASSED ITS FINAL STAGE

## Conservative Members Suggest Measures for Future Safeguarding of Municipal Rights.

Ottawa, Aug. 21.—(Special)—After a long and hazardous journey, the Toronto and Hamilton Railway bill passed its final stage in the House of Commons to-night.

R. L. Borden suggested that in order to avoid such struggles as had taken place in the Railway Committee each bill should be submitted to judicial review.

DEBATE RUNS ALONG.

Opposition and Defence About Equally Divided Yesterday. Ottawa, Aug. 21.—(Special.)—The debate on the national transcontinental railway project developed no arguments of startling originality to-day. A. Broder of Dundas sent home some well-pointed truths and Urial Wilson indulged in some vigorous criticism.

Charles MacNeil of Bonaventure had the floor at the morning sitting of the House. He commented with his eloquence, for something like the sixteenth time, the scattered portions of this young Dominion.

There was a voice from the height of land when Thomas MacKay of Renfrew rose to commend the government's railway policy to the House. Mr. MacKay stated that he had traversed the country north and south of the height of land, and knew whereof he spoke when he promised the government in timber alone traffic sufficient to keep the new railway going for at least ten years.

Mr. Lavelle of Leeds and Grenville pointed out several flaws in the contract and criticized the scheme in its general features. From R. F. Sutherland of North Essex came an unqualified defence of the contract. He insisted that the scheme found favor in the sight of the public. Mr. Hackett of Prince Edward Island moved the adjournment of the debate.

FIRE AT CENTRAL PRISON.

Caused \$15 Damage—Wind Causes Small Blaze. The firemen had two runs last night. The first call was from box 156, at 8.30, to 202 Palmerston-avenue, owned and occupied by R. Dunlop. A gust of wind blew a curtain over a gas jet, which quickly blazed up, doing about \$15 damage.

PROHIBITION AND PARTISAN.

Canadian Baptist: The cause of prohibition in this province has been and is still being crushed and cursed by the rabid and extreme partyism that everywhere prevails. It needs no elaborate argument to establish this dictum. There are electors by the score who easily pass as prohibitionists during nine months of the year, but who, on the eve of a political contest, invariably bolt. On all ordinary occasions they are ready to argue in favor of prohibitive legislation with much gusto, but when asked to give their support to a temperance candidate, irrespective of party, they become mute as oysters. As polling day approaches, they throw overboard the sentiments and convictions they have been carrying through the year, and work and vote solely for the salvation of their political friends, regardless of all other considerations.

HERE'S AN IDEA.

Canadian Baptist: During the Conservative picnic in this city last week the Grand Trunk Railway prevented the shunting of cars at the foot of Yonge-street, where all going to or returning from the Island pass this dangerous trap. This suggests one of two things; either that the railway authorities suspected that the picnic would have an influence over the delegates that they would not be able to take care of themselves, or that the lives and limbs of strangers are of more account than the safety of the thousands who are compelled to rush that crossing every day, often after tedious waiting for an opening or the passing of long freight trains on two or three tracks. The railway has shown what can be done. Now let our city legislators see that they do it always.

UP TO MR. GRANT.

The Beaverton Express, which supported George D. Grant in his election campaign, says: The people of North Ontario have their eyes fixed upon George D. Grant, M.P., just now. He is on trial, as it were, and we are anxious to see if he is to be classed as the thick-skinned partisan or a patriotic legislator. Judged by the views set out by himself in an address yet fresh in the memory of the public he favored the public ownership idea and made it a special feature of his appeal. The sincerity of these views are now to be tested and North Ontario will judge Mr. Grant accordingly.

SPENCE STILL DOUBTFUL OF NEW RAILWAY BILL

Money for '66 Monument Accepted - Elections on New Year's Day.

At the meeting of the Legislation and Reception Committee yesterday, Ald. Spence expressed himself as being not satisfied with the present shape of the Toronto and Hamilton Railway bill, and asked the Mayor to call a special meeting of the Council to pass a resolution protesting against the passage of the bill in any shape, as the Dominion government had no moral right to grant charters to purely local railroads.

World Create Precedents. Ald. Spence was fearful of the precedent of creating a dangerous precedent for future occasions. The government might pass this bill and then be asked to create and control municipal corporations, of whose powers and privileges the legislatures are also empowered to create and control municipal corporations.

Whereas the right to charter and control railways of a local character is vested in provincial legislatures, which have the right to create and control municipal corporations, of whose powers and privileges the legislatures are also empowered to create and control municipal corporations.

Whereas the granting by the Dominion parliament of a charter for the Toronto and Hamilton Railway Company, constitutes an unwarranted invasion of the rights of municipalities in this province, is a dangerous precedent, and opens the door for further objectionable and mischievous interference with the powers and privileges of municipalities.

Therefore be it resolved that this Council protests against the passing of the said Toronto and Hamilton Railway bill, and calls upon the House of Commons, the Dominion Senate, and the Governor-General, respectively, to refuse and reject the application of the said railway for Dominion charter powers which are not necessary for any action that is not prejudicial to the public interest.

AS BETWEEN NEGRO AND WHITE BY LAKE AND RAIL.

General Roadmaster Ferguson returned from Wharton yesterday, where he has been making arrangements for the laying of a mile of track into the big cement works that are being built there. He says that the work will be done in the largest plant in Canada, employing 400 men—250 as many as the big works at Durham.

The twenty-one miles of road being built for the G.T.R. tracks between Brantford and Paris. The high grades are being lowered in places some 15 to 20 feet. In the low spots the tracks are being raised 10 to 15 feet.

The R. & O. Co. have decided to replace the burned steamer Montreal. The new craft will cost \$400,000, will be 545 feet long, 60 feet beam, 45 feet deep and will displace 11,000 tons. Her speed will be 16 knots, and a Glasgow firm of shipbuilders have the contract.

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DREAM GAVE HIM WARNING SAW HIS OWN DEAD BODY

J. Brook Sutherland Took Out Accident Policy and Presentment Came True.

Penetanguishene, Aug. 21.—A very serious shooting accident, by which J. Brook Sutherland was crippled for life, occurred at Oak Bay. He was at his summer camp, and had got up early and gone out alone, taking a gun with him. How the accident occurred is not known. Dr. W. H. Laughlin of Milltown, who was camping near, heard his cries for help, and found him lying with one foot shot off and the other injured. Mr. Sutherland was brought to the Chatham Hospital, where the left leg was amputated. He has not recovered from the shock and his life is hovering in the balance. Some weeks ago in a dream he saw the express wagon with a body in it covered by a sheet. On rising the sheet he saw it was his own body. The dream was repeated three nights in succession, and he then thought he had appeared in a dream and warned him to prepare for an accident. The matter so impressed him that he took out liberal accident policy about a month ago.

Gentlemen,—In conjunction with Mr. E. R. Simpson, M.E., of Boston, Mass., I have conducted a series of tests on the lines of shafting in the Machinery Hall at the Toronto Exhibition.

First, to ascertain the power required to drive the shafting with the ordinary self-oiling journal bearings.

Second, after removing the self-oiling boxes and substituting Chapman's Double Ball Bearings, supplied by your company, to again ascertain the power required to drive the before-mentioned shafting.

The following method of testing and the results I now submit for your consideration:

All tests were made by a 12 horse power engine, belted to and driving an electrical generator, wired to a motor; all the electrical appliances being supplied by the Consolidated Electrical Company, Toronto, Ont.

First test was made with the north line of shafting, consisting of about 18 feet of 3 7/16 diameter, 221 feet of 2 1/8 diameter, including couplings and several pulleys; total weight about 8400 pounds. All the journal boxes were full of oil and in first-class condition. After running this line about half an hour to insure good and proper lubrication, several readings of the meters were taken during an interval of another hour. The average of these showed that the power required to drive this line was 5.46 horse power.

After substituting the double ball bearings in this line, four readings of the meters were taken during one hour's run, which showed that an average of 0.96 horse power was required to run the line under the changed conditions; practically one horse power.

Another test was made with the line south of the former. This consisted of about 12 feet of 2 1/8 diameter shafting, with couplings and several pulleys; weight about 9000 pounds.

All the journals being filled with oil, a run of half an hour was made to insure that a film of oil had worked between the shaft and boxes. During an interval of another hour a run, four readings of the meters were taken, and showed that an average of six horse power was required to drive this line.

After substituting the double ball bearing in this line, another test was made of about one hour's duration, during which time several readings of the meters were taken, from which we found that an average of 1.29 horse power was required to drive the line.

After belting the above-mentioned lines together, another test was made with double ball bearings, running about half an hour. During this period four readings of the meter were taken, showing that the average horse power required to run these two lines together was equal to 2.37.

The average power required to drive the two shafts separately was 0.96 plus 1.29, equal to 2.25 horse power. Therefore, there is a difference of 0.17 horse power more absorbed when driving the two shafts together. This is accounted for by the extra load caused by the pull of the belt used to connect the two lines of shafting.

On the south end of the building in a third line of shafting, 2 7/16 feet diameter and 114 feet long; the weight of which, including couplings and pulleys, will be about 2300 pounds. With the three lines belted together, another test was made, all fitted with the Chapman double ball bearings. The result showed that the power required during this test averaged 2.61 horse power.

The speed of the shafting during all the tests averaged 310 revolutions per minute.

These tests demonstrate that with the Chapman Double Ball Bearings only one-fifth of the power was required to run these shaftings that was required to run the same under the original conditions, with self-oiling boxes of best design.
