

Expenditure Far Outstrips Revenue

Fielding Admits A Waning Surplus

Claims Country is \$15,000,000 Ahead for Fiscal Year Just Closed

Hon. Mr. Foster Declares Surplus is a Most Convenient One and Depends for Its Existence on a Mere Juggling of Figures That is Without Reason.

Ottawa, July 6.—(Special.)—With the proverbial flourish of trumpets, Hon. W. S. Fielding to-day introduced the budget.

There was lots of sparkle and a pithy and nicely rounded phrase here and there. For Mr. Fielding, in spite of his heroics, did not have an easy job to tackle. He had to explain, as will be seen in his statement, a largely increased expenditure.

Another fact was made evident, and will continue to do so, that the surplus for the year just closed was not so large as that of last year.

Hon. George E. Foster, criticizing the statement, pointed out the large liabilities of the next few years and uttered a word of warning: Money will have to be raised shortly at the same time when the country is seemingly pledged to the bill for running expenses.

Mr. Fielding, on his part, made his budget speech, with great applause from the Liberal benches. He began by saying that the surplus in 1904 had been one issue.

CLOTHING PRESSERS ON STRIKE

BOOMERANG MASS MEETING

DOCTORS ACCEPT PROPOSAL

Willing That \$200,000 Should Be Given Toward Hospital, With Medical Men's Rights Protected.

The mass meeting of medical men in St. George's Hall yesterday afternoon to oppose the proposal of the board of control to grant \$100,000 toward a new 1,200,000 hospital brought out four hours' warm discussion and eventually a resolution to support the proposal with conditions named by City Medical Health Officer Sheard to the effect that in the new hospital public ward cases shall be available exclusively for the faculty of medicine of Toronto University.

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IT IS CANADA'S MOVE.

The Dominion government shows

some uneasiness over certain trespasses

on Canadian territory in the far

north. Two foreign states have

entered into possession of northern

islands which properly belong to

Canada. Canadian sovereignty over

the islands in Ungava between the

Belgian Congo and the Russian

Empire, and Hon. Chan. Fitzpatrick

thinks the imperial authorities should

make a declaration which would

make Canada's title clear.

There is no doubt good cause for

the government's growing uneasiness,

but why should Mr. Fitzpatrick look

to the imperial authorities to secure

Canadian sovereignty in the far north?

Britain is probably willing to render

services she can put an end to foreign

infringement of our territorial rights,

but why should we look to the grounds

upon which Mr. Fitzpatrick bases his

request? Mr. Fitzpatrick is also

strong believer in the policy that

Canada owes nothing to the mother

country in the way of military assistance.

He would keep down the militia, he

would establish no naval armament,

he would proceed on the principle that

there is only one country from which

Canada need fear invasion, and that

against that country it is folly to at-

tempt to fortify ourselves in a military

sense.

Holding these views it is somewhat

strange that Mr. Fitzpatrick should

clamour for an imperial declaration of

Canada's territorial rights. For

Britain to take that position is to per-

haps plunge her in war with the two

states, which have entered into pos-

session of Canadian islands. And why

should Britain be willing to go to war

for Canada to make herself liable to

the expenditure of millions, to risk the

destruction of a navy created at the

cost of hundreds of millions, and to

add untold burdens to the British tax-

payer when Canada is prepared to do

nothing? Mr. Fitzpatrick has a fine

legal mind. Does this proposition ap-

peal to his judicious way of looking at

things?

Mr. Fitzpatrick and those of his col-

leagues who desire Canada to live and

grow in prestige on the charity of the

British army and navy may as well

understand that his is a policy which

on the great imperial chess board, if

Canada accepts the doctrine that war

is a forbidden expedient in Canadian

diplomacy then Canada has no right to

make issues which may lead to war.

Agreedly she has no right to do so

while we are in danger of involving

an empire to the defence of which we

contribute—NOT ONE CENT. If on the

other hand, Canada takes the view

accepted by all other nations that war

is at all times a solemn possibility, that

she is not to come to come with her

aggressive and that Canada may be

the victim of some of these aggressions

it is the duty of Canada to fortify

herself against the hour of danger.

We have not yet entered upon the

century of the millennium. Nations

are not much less militant than they

were a hundred years ago. War is

very little less remote. In Canada to

declare that nationality is an empty

bubble, that independence has its price

and that absorption is to be preferred

before resistance, is to place ourselves

in a position to fight for it and if

it is not worth fighting for we should

submit to the encroachments in the

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MURDERER BY IMPULSE IS ARRESTED IN PARIS

Dramatic Capture of English Lady's Assassin—London Detectives' Clever Ruse.

Paris, July 4.—At 6 o'clock on Saturday afternoon the Paris police arrested a murderer of the English governess who was found strangled in a lane near Nanterre.

CLAIM KING PATCHED UP. TROUBLES BETWEEN ASTORS

Whether That's So or Not, Story of Struggles for Social Pre-Eminence is Interesting.

New York, July 4.—The American says: The feud of 20 years between the Astor families has been ended. The peacemaker was no less a person than King Edward VII. himself.

News reached New York yesterday, and it caused keen surprise, that Mrs. John Jacob Astor (who was Miss Walling) is the guest of William Waldorf Astor, and that all branches of the family have been reconciled.

This ending of a family feud that began over the question of social precedence and threatened to continue during the lives of the heads of the Astor family, is due, it is declared, almost entirely to the mediation of the king, who delights in noting the role of a peacemaker, not only between nations, but also in patching up family differences.

The Astor feud began with the death of William Waldorf Astor's mother, Mrs. John Jacob Astor, in 1847. The widow of the second John Jacob Astor, William Waldorf, Sr., declared that the mantle of social leadership in New York should descend by right to his own wife and not to Mrs. William Waldorf Astor, who was the widow of his younger brother.

To this ruling, Mrs. William Waldorf Astor, widow of William Waldorf Astor's uncle, and mother of the present Col. John Jacob Astor, demurred. She alleged that she alone should wield the social sceptre.

Mrs. Astor was supported by society in New York. It speedily became apparent that Mrs. William Waldorf Astor was the recognized social leader of the "400" and William Waldorf Astor's wife in the social world of the city.

But William Waldorf Astor did not yield without a struggle. He printed the genealogy of his family. He directed the postoffice to have letters addressed to Mrs. Astor sent to his wife. She, he insisted, was the Mrs. Astor.

This caused a multitude of orders and counter orders to be given to the postoffice officials at Newport, and all the while the feud got wider. The Waldorf Astors gave magnificent entertainments, and Mrs. William Waldorf Astor, as mentioned "Mrs. Astor" as the hostess.

The climax came in 1887 when William Waldorf Astor transferred his allegiance to the British crown and made England his permanent home. Two years after he had settled in England his wife died.

Col. John Jacob Astor, who is now on the ocean on his way to England, has, it is declared, taken with him to William Waldorf an olive branch from his aunt, and an invitation to visit her here.

FRUIT MEN BADLY OFF. Cherries Arriving in Bad Shape for the Commission Men.

Yesterday was a good all-round day for the growers, but it is questionable if as much can be said for the commission men in general. The reason for this is given in the unfortunate condition in which the bulk of the cherries are arriving. Cherries are coming in some cases in fairly good state, are sold to customers throughout the city at their face value, and in many cases they are returned the next morning utterly unfit for eating or preserving purposes.

WILL CONTROL THE RATES. Electric Commission to Ascertain Cost and Price of Power.

Hon. Adam Beck has been out of the city the last few days and nothing has yet been done to organize the power commission, of which he is a member. The official document outlining the duties of the commission provides, among other things, that they ascertain the rates that would have to be charged consumers of electrical power in order to meet all expenses, and to ascertain the savings that would accrue annually by the substitution of the present rates for the rates now paid; like electrical power undertakings, capacity, etc. These instructions indicate what has already been stated, that the government contemplates controlling the rates to be charged by the various development companies.
