STORY OF OCCURRENCE OF THE PRECIOUS ORE

How It is to Be Sought For and Distinguished in the New-Fields Up North.

The World has been following the Porcupine gold discoveries for some time now, and has interviewed a great many people in connection therewith including mining engineers, prospe tors, investors, and the like, and it proposes this morning to give the pub-lic an outline of what the actual situa-

In the first place it is best to get an idea of what the mining engineers and geologists say as to the quality and character of the country. They say in substance that the prevailing rock formation up there is mostly schist (more or less slate), and that gold-bearing quartz is often found in this schistose rock. Therefore, as far as this is concerned, there is a great belt of schist country up there, and some of it contains gold-bearing quartz. Now as to the occurrence of this gold-bearing quartz the geologists and en-gineers say that there are well de-fined veins in Whitney and Tisdale standing up out of the ground, and as The World correspondent said the other day, standing out as distinctly as a passenger car stands out of the railway track, with a kind of round top, and straight up and down sides, clearly in view as you approach them. 

In other words these quartz-bearing boulders may go down one thousand feet or more, and if you get thru one and exhaust it you can continue down until you find another. But the proper thing to do is to go down not only in the hope of finding another, but several of them in succession. But it will not take much depth to be re-

> But this occurrence of quartz in these veins is not regular and continuous, and it is to bring out this point that The World submits the following




TOP VIEW OF VEIN.

The first one shows a vein, say ten feet wide, and 100 feet long. It will be noticed that the miners have various names for these blocks or boulders of quartz, viz., some call them "beads" and some "knobs," and other terms of that character are used.





The taking of stock by the municipality and the issuing of debentures by them would prima facie place the whole financial burden upon the township at large, but that I do not take to be the meaning or the intention of the act. Where a bylaw to provide a bonus, which does not involve the taking stock, has been carried by the required majority of votes, it shall be the duty of the council to pass the bylaw. This withdraws all discretion, but that is not this case. I think the council may have good ground for grave hesitation in committing the whole municipality to the primary burden of the entire \$15,000 debt. 

HUGE CRANE UPSET, KILLS MAN Fatal Accident at Niagara Falls-Second Workman Injured.



How Auditors Are Hampered In Their Work by Being Unable to Secure Valuations.

Says The Montreal Gazette editori-

The other day the Law Guarantee Trust & Accident Society, an English institution of which a Mr. Ronard was manager, went into voluntary liquidation, its entire paid up capital of £1,200,000 sterling having been lost and a deficiency of at least £200,000 created. It was known in Montreal as a guarantor of local securities. Until recently the shares stood at 100 per cent. pre-mium. Dividends of 10 per cent. per annum were paid. The shareholders were for the most part lawyers, Including here and there a judge, 'ike Sir William Grantham, who is a heavy

The collapse, which shocked London, is ascribed to bad loans, investments and guarantees of mortgages in conection with hotels, breweries, flats and other real property, which have greatly epreciated of late. The company's affairs were regularly audited by auditors of high standing, and the shareholders want to know why their amaxing weakness was not discovered long To this the auditors reply that their statements were not mendacious at all. According to the recognized practice of auditing, they carefully checked the balance-sheet from "ear to year; but then the balance-sheet does not profess to show the prices which the assets might be expected to fetch if realized, and it was not their duty to go behind the balance-sheet. There is an interesting article on this branch of the case in The Londor onomist of Dec. 18, in which the

writer says: "This view of the auditor's duty reduces his functions to those of a bookkeeping expert, who has to sec that the balance-sheet of the company gives an accurate summary of the company's books, and pay no heed to the question whether the book value of the assets corresponds to their true price in the market. In other words, it reduces balance-sheets to a waste paper value, or worse, since they con-stantly mislead the public, which perists in believing that the prices put on assets are supposed to represent what they might be expected to fetch. Luckily, most auditors improve on the law in their practice, and frequently in their certificates call attention the absence of provision for depreciation ,and otherwise exceed their legal duty by giving advice. But

their activities in this respect are hampered in the first place by the restraint which the legal view of their duty imposes on them, and in the second, by their necessarily limited knowledge concerning the value of many of the assets in a commercial balance-sheet. In the ase of the Law Guarantee Society. for instance, it would evidently by unfair to expect the auditors to be able to give an expert opinion on the properties the valuation of which has been proved to be so lamentably at fault.

The Economist argues that the auditor should be obliged to do better and that balance-sheets should take ac-count of the realizable value as assets as well as of their face value; but it it not hopeful apparently, of any sate Isfactory change being made - yet awhile. The question is of interest to
