SERBIANS WIN MORE SUCCESS IN MACEDONIAN ADVANCE

Belgium Asks Active Intervention of U.S. to Stop Deportations

ELECTION MAY COME QUICKLY SAYS FIELDING

Preparedness Called for at Eastern Ontario Liberals' Conference.

RESSENT IMPUTATIONS

Resolution Declares Party Has Not Failed in Duty to Empire.

Ottawa, Nov. 16.—Four hundred Liberal delegates from the counties surrounding the city of Ottawa gathered here today and in conference assembled voiced their views on the problems of today and the future, and discussed the general question of organization.

The gathering comprised representatives of the various political organizations in the counties of Leeds, Grenville, Stormont, Glengarry, and Lanark. Renfrew, Dundas, Russell, Prescott and the city of Ottawa.

The conference was opened by D. E. Rochester and Hon. G. H. Ross and M. Racine, M.L.A. for Russell, acted as joint chairman. There were present also, on the platform, Hon. W. S. Fielding, Hon. Sydney Fisher and Hon. Senator Clouston.

Shadow of Election. The keynote of the conference was struck by Mr. Fielding, Liberal, he declared, were asked to observe silence. It was contended that patriotism at the present moment forbids criticism of the government, and all the time, declared the ex-minister, finance, the country was hanging under the threat of a general election which might come at any moment. With the exhortation on the part of the government that the Liberals should maintain silence, should have some the clear-cut assertion that within a specified time there should be no general election precipitated. "There must be an election some day," he declared. "Perhaps not this year, perhaps not next; but Liberals must be organized. The work you are doing today as necessary work so long as the government keeps the shadow hanging over you."

Liberal Party's Loyalty. The following resolution was unanimously adopted: "That this convention of representative Liberals of eastern Ontario in session assembled at Ottawa this 16th day of November, 1916, takes this earliest opportunity of placing upon record its unwavering loyalty to the King and Empire; pledges ourselves to assist in the untiring and vigorous prosecution of the present war to ultimate success; and at the same time to record our resentment at the reported remarks of certain Conservative politicians impugning the loyalty of the great Liberal party; which remarks we consider as entirely unjustified, and an insult to the thousands of true Liberals, who today mourn their sons and brothers, who have given their lives at the front as proof of their loyalty and love of the British Empire.

"And that this convention expresses its condoleance and heartfelt sympathy with all Canadians who have lost sons and relatives at the front."

King George Congratulates Gen. Haig on His Victory

London, Nov. 16.—King George today telegraphed congratulations to Gen. Sir Douglas Haig, British commander in France, upon the "great success" of the last few days, reflecting credit on all ranks. Gen. Haig replied with a message of thanks.

ALL FRANCE MUST AID SAY POSTERS IN PARIS

BRITISH TO MAKE MORE ADVANCES

Gains in Ancre Valley Fore-run Equally Important Successes.

TO GIVE FOE NO REST

Allies to Prevent Germans From Consolidating New Positions in Winter.

London, Nov. 16.—Major-Gen. F. B. Maurice, chief director of military operations at the war office, in an interview with the Associated Press today, predicted that the British gains in the Ancre valley were only the forerunner of further equally important advances which would be made on the western front during the winter months.

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WAR SUMMARY THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

MACEDONIA continues to be the theatre of important military events as seen by the recent and continuous Serbian and French successes and the advance of the allies to a front within four miles of Monastir. The Serbians have fought an unbroken chain of victorious actions in the past five days, but, although they are constantly beating the enemy, he has not yet been sufficiently punished to be incapable of making a further determined stand.

The present unbroken string of Serbian successes at first sight would apparently betoken a collapse of the German and Bulgarian defence, but the ability of the foe to fight stubbornly after several reverses suggests other reasons for his mishaps. One may be shortage of munitions, owing to the vast expenditure against Roumania and the allies on the Somme front. Another may be the arrival of cold weather, and its finding of the enemy's soldiers without warm clothing, for the British blockade first of all cut off woolen shipments to Germany and the German mills have long since had to close down. For the winter of 1915-16 a great amount of shoddy had to be used in soldiers' garments, and for the coming winter of 1916-17, apparently no wool at all is available, and the supply of cotton has also been cut off for many months, so that the uniforms of the Germans are mostly reduced to rags or to made-overs. BELGIUM ASKS ACTIVE AID OF UNITED STATES

Intervention to Stop Deportation of Belgian Workmen Called for.

FORCED INTO SLAVERY

Germans Virtually Compel Belgians to Fight Against Own Country.

Washington, Nov. 16.—An appeal for active intervention by the United States to stop the deportation of Belgian workmen into Germany was today presented to the state department by E. Havenstein, the Belgian minister.

The American government already has interested itself in the situation, and Charge Grew of the embassy at Berlin has been instructed to discuss it with Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg. No formal representations are authorized, but the charge is directed to point out to the chancellor that Germany's course cannot but have an unfortunate effect upon neutral opinion, particularly in the United States, where great interest is felt in the Belgians.

Minister Havenstein submitted the following communication to the state department: "The German government is forcing thousands of Belgian workmen who are unemployable in their own country to work in the quarries, in manufacturing concerns and in the lime kilns, under pretext that they are a charge upon public charity."

"The Belgian government protests energetically against this coercive measure, which is contrary to the law of nations and the laws of humanity. The government of the king asks the active intervention of the Government of the United States to obtain the cessation of this deportation of Belgian workmen into Germany, and to obtain the liberation of those who have already been deported."

"The Germans claim that these workmen are not employed in war industries. It should be remarked, however, that they are employed in industries directly connected with the war, and that the employment of this Belgian labor releases a great number of German workmen, who are sent to the front. Thus, these Belgian workmen are compelled practically to fight against their own country."

Business Paralyzed. In making public the communication the minister issued the following statement: "The Belgian minister calls attention to the fact that the employment of Belgian workmen is due entirely to the German government, which has requisitioned all the supplies of raw materials and destroyed the industrial plants by requisitioning the machinery. The German government has absolutely paralyzed all business in Belgium. Furthermore, the German government has imposed a war tax of forty million francs a month (about twenty times the normal amount of Belgium taxation) for the past two years, upon a country which is without business and which Germany herself has impoverished by war and devastation."

"At the beginning of the war, the German Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg acknowledged that Germany was waging a great wrong in invading Belgium, but in spite of this confession of guilt, Germany is, every day, adding to her crimes against this innocent and small nation."

ALLIES CONTINUE DOBRUDJA MARCH

Roumanians Keep Up Withdrawal in Two Carpathian Passes.

HOLD IN NORTHWEST

Mackensen Still Burns Villages as He Retires Along Danube.

Special Cable to The Toronto World. London, Nov. 16.—In the regions of the Dobruja and the Roumanian northwestern frontier in Transylvania, the Roumanians and the Russians continue their advance, while in the Red Tower and the Vulcan passes of the Transylvania Alps the Roumanians are still withdrawing a little to the bulk of their forces to attack the allies on the front north of Bucharest.

But snow is beginning to fall quite heavily, the ground winter having set in, and it is expected that fighting will be almost impossible in a week or so. The weather has already become intensely cold.

The retreat of von Mackensen in the Dobruja is accompanied by his burning of villages as he retires. Tormenting rains are falling in this theatre of the war.

The Roumanians report the winning of several successes against the enemy who has been attacking them on the Moesian frontier. The Russians report an offensive of the Teutons north of Tolest, south of Dorna Watra, and in a stubborn battle they captured a fortified height southeast of Tolest, taking 101 prisoners and three machine guns.

In the region of Campulung in Roumania a heavy battle is proceeding. The Teutons are supporting their attacks with bombardments by a great number of heavy guns. The Roumanians are suffering enormous losses from the failure of their infantry attacks. Up till the present the Roumanians have beaten back every one of the assaults and they have not given any ground.

Obstinate fighting continues along the Alti and Jiu Rivers. Red Tower and Vulcan Passes, where the Roumanians have been back every one of the assaults, are still held by the Roumanians. The Germans claim that in the Red Tower and Vulcan Pass regions they took prisoner 1200 Roumanians yesterday. They deny that the Roumanians have occupied Boaslo in the Dobruja.

FOOD CONSERVATION MEASURES FAVORED

British Parliament Passes Resolution Without a Division.

London, Nov. 16.—The house of commons without division today carried the resolution introduced yesterday by William A. S. Hewins, Unionist member for Hereford, prior to the statement on the question of food supply by Walter Runciman, president of the board of trade. The resolution follows: "In the opinion of the house it is the duty of the government to adopt further measures of organization to increase and conserve the national food supply, and to diminish the risk of shortage and serious increase of prices in the event of the war being prolonged."

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SERBIANS SMASH NEW LINE CARRY MORE STRONGHOLDS

COMING OF RUSSIAN AID ENDS ROUMANIAN CRISIS

Petrograd Experts Believe Likelihood of Teuton Advance Has Been Removed.

Petrograd, Nov. 16, via London.—Intermittent activity still continues on the three main sectors of the Russian southwest front—the region of the Stokhod, the Heltiz-Brazany front and the thickly wooded country of the Carpathians, where the Austro-Germans have recently concentrated forces in an attempt to drive a wedge between the Russian and Roumanian armies.

Russian attention is now directed mainly toward the Roumanian theatre, where most of the Russian military experts believe the crisis is past. The recent arrival of Russian forces on the Transylvanian front is thought to have eased the situation in that quarter and removed the likelihood of an advance there for the present.

VIOLENCE OF FIGHTING ON ANCRE DIMINISHES

British Take Three Hundred Additional Prisoners—French Retake Saillisel Houses.

London, Nov. 17, 1 a.m.—In the Ancre region of France where since Monday the British have made notable gains over the Germans, the fighting apparently has lessened greatly in violence. The latest British official communication reporting only bomb attacks by the Germans on the newly won front to the north of the stream. An additional six officers and 297 men have been taken prisoner by the British in this region during the past 24 hours.

FOE LOSES HEAVILY IN SOMME ATTACKS

Attempt to Break Thru French Lines Proves Costly Failure.

USE THREE DIVISIONS

Germans Employ Many Troops on Small Front to No Purpose.

Paris, Nov. 16.—The German attack on Ablaincourt and Pressoir, on the Somme front, yesterday was an attempt to break thru the French lines over an extent of two and one-half miles. The attacking forces consisted of a division and a half in the morning and a division and a half in the afternoon, the whole strength being directed against two villages.

The divisions were formed of select regiments, chiefly Prussians, of whom some were of the Guards and Hanoverians.

Six successive waves swept down upon the villages between 7.30 o'clock and 10.45 in the morning, and before the afternoon had ended Pressoir had been attacked twelve times. It is reported that in the course of these attempts, now rendered vain by the French operations of last night, some of the regiments engaged lost 60 per cent of their effectives.

Bulgar-Germans Continue to Be Driven Back Across Monastir Plain Towards Old Serbia.

Special Cable to The Toronto World. London, Nov. 16.—Continuing their pursuit of the Germans and the Bulgarians, the Serbians encountered them on a new line that runs from Yarashok on the left or eastern bank of the Cerna River, which had long been fortified, and after determined fighting, they have succeeded in breaking seriously into this front at several places, according to today's Serbian official report issued at Salonica. On this line the Serbians have already carried the villages of Chogel, Baldenti, Nagochani and the Yarashok monastery.

On the right bank of the Cerna in the direction of Monastir the Serbians are also concluding their successful advance, aided by the French, and they have compelled the German and Bulgarian to abandon their principal line of defence and to retire towards Monastir. In the course of advance the allies have already driven the foe from the villages of Bukli, Gorn-Jegri, Sredni-Jegri and Don-Jegri, as well as from the town of Kenali. In this fighting the Serbians have already taken prisoner 500 Germans and Bulgarians.

On Monastir Plains. The fighting is now proceeding on the plains of Monastir in the midst of a violent snow and sleet storm. The Bulgarian-Teutonic line has been broken back at some places to within four miles of Monastir.

French, Russian and Italian forces west of the Cerna attacked the lines of the foe during a rainstorm and they carried the whole system of defence round Kenali, according to Reuters' Salonica correspondent. At some places the men were up to their necks in water. The Serbians counter-attacked the lines during the night and retook part of the trenches. This was definitely expected in the morning, and he has been ordered to withdraw up the Bistrica River.

On the eastern bank of the Struma River British troops captured the village of Karulica on the night of the 14th. This was a brilliant action.

The Franco-Russian forces in pursuit of the foe have reached the right bank of the River Virova, four miles south of Monastir, and they have occupied four villages and those of Jabynki, Fopodina and Yabynki.

The Germans report on the fighting in Macedonia as follows: "Prepared new positions in the river Cerna and the whole system of defence round Kenali were abandoned. The Bulgarians admit that heavy fighting in the Cerna bend resulted in the withdrawal of their troops to positions north of Teveski and Cragal.

Berlin Alleges Rowanmore Had Contraband in Cargo

Berlin, Nov. 16, via Staville.—The Overseas News Agency in its summary of the details published by the German press regarding the sinking of the British steamer Rowanmore, points out that the cargo included 10,000 tons of oil, 10,000 tons of cotton, 10,000 tons of oil, together with acids, explosives and steel, and in addition 2000 tons of wheat. The value of the cargo was estimated at approximately 12,000,000 marks. The steamer was sunk by the submarine after an examination of the sea cargo disclosed the carried contraband, the summary states.

STAND OF WILSON SHOWS FIRMNESS

Paris Papers Praise Action Taken Regarding Deportation of Belgians.

REVOLT OF NEUTRALS Germany's Barbarous Methods Stirring Non-Belligerents to Make Move.

Paris, Nov. 16.—Secretary of State Lansing's instructions to Joseph E. Grew, the American charge d'affaires at Berlin, to discuss with the German Government to discuss with Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the German imperial chancellor, the question of the deportation by Germany of Belgians from their native land, is regarded here as an act of great importance. The newspapers discuss it appreciatively as a step towards adding to the "interventions without fear of contingencies." The Paris Mail sees in the instructions of Secretary Lansing the beginning of a revolt of neutral nations against what it calls "the barbarous and illegal measures of the central powers."

MEDICATED WINE MUST BE NASTY

Board Will Prosecute Druggists Who Sell Too Palatable Tonic.

PENALTIES ARE HEAVY

Commissioners Persuaded Alcoholic Beverage is Sold as Medicine.

The circular prepared by the Ontario License Board as a warning to druggists...

The circular, which was completed yesterday, reads: "The sale of medicated wines having of late greatly increased in volume, investigations have been made which have led to the conviction that since Sept. 15 the majority of these so-called 'medicated wines' are used for beverage purposes."

Law Ignored. "This provision appears to be very largely ignored, with very injurious results. This cannot be allowed to continue, and persons engaged in the sale of such of these wines as are so used are incurring risks, possibly without being aware of it."

The Ontario Board of License Commissioners think it proper to call attention to the provisions of this act so that persons so convicted may not be able to say that they have not received notice.

CITY HALL NOTES

The publicity bureau is to meet next Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the city hall.

Mr. Adams Beck will address a meeting of the Ontario Hydro Radio Union at the council chamber on Tuesday, Nov. 21.

Ex-Ald. Hilton, of Hilton Bros., baker, says the city council cannot assist the citizens by purchasing large quantities of flour for resale.

Upon Ald. McBride's suggestion the board of control decided yesterday to take up with Chief Smith the advisability of doing away with the regulation which prohibits the sale of fire department equipment over the age of thirty years.

Fire Chief Smith blames the works department for the failure to secure a high pressure at the Adams fire Wednesday night, and Commissioner Harris replies that it is the chief's own fault that the pressure was not greater.

In a lengthy letter to Mayor Church, White & Co., wholesale produce merchants, declare that there is absolutely no combine among dealers to boost prices of potatoes. Nothing but the old law of supply and demand regulates the price, the letter says.

"These bills are getting altogether too high," declared Mayor Church when the demand of the hydro radial union for an extra \$450 from Toronto came before the board of control yesterday.

City hall officials have estimated that there will be 103,945,000 cubic feet in the new \$15,000,000 departmental store at College and Yonge streets, and at 16 cents per cubic foot this means they ask a fixed assessment of \$10,941,500.

The board of control yesterday decided to take full advantage of the power given them under the high cost of living order-in-council. A resolution was passed expressing the opinion that excessive charges are being made for food products, particularly milk, bread and potatoes and coal.

TRAIN TOO SWIFT AT THE CROSSING

G. T. R. Must Pay Damages to Owner of Motor Truck.

AGREEMENT HOLDS

Seller of Property Must Not Back Out of His Deal.

At Osgoode Hall yesterday Mr. Justice Britton awarded W. W. Minor \$1,000 damages and costs from the Grand Trunk Railway. Plaintiff was the owner of a motor truck which was struck and destroyed by a G. T. R. train at a point near Port Colborne, where the tracks and highway intersect.

Mr. Justice Britton gave judgment in favor of the plaintiff in the action whereby Dr. Edmund Alexander Mooney, of Vankeek Hill, sought for a specific performance of contract for sale of land, purchased by him from the defendant, Dr. W. J. McCuaig, of Chicago.

The blaze was discovered by the men on the city dredge at Mugg's Landing, and Capt. Leslie, one of the island firemen, the men of the dredge gave warning to the residents of the island by blowing their whistles.

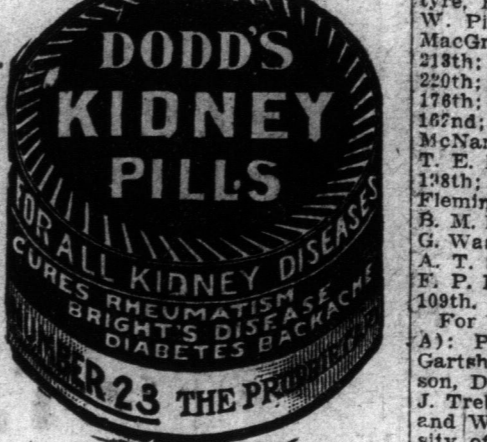

DEVOTION OF TORONTO WOMAN RECOGNIZED

Mrs. Innes-Taylor Has Risked Death in Service of Belgian People.

Well-earned recognition has come to Mrs. Innes-Taylor, well-known in Toronto and who since the outbreak of the war has given her time in providing as far as possible for the needs of hundreds of Belgian children and their teachers, the Belgian nuns.

It will be remembered that Mrs. Innes-Taylor works in co-operation with Mrs. Agn. Adamson and Miss Margaret Saunders, also well-known to Toronto, and the three together have done such magnificent service that they alone, even if no one else had moved in the matter of patriotic work, would have shown the world that Toronto had women endowed with the highest form of patriotism.

In the middle of her labors with the Belgian children, the district about Furnes in Flanders was raided by a German aeroplane. The daughter of the mayor of the town was killed and Miss Margaret Bell Saunders wounded while Mrs. Innes-Taylor suffered so from shock that her health was undermined, and she nearly fell under the influence of poison, which she contracted from a patient whom she was nursing. She had part of a finger amputated and spent some time in a hospital, but after a slow convalescence returned to her work among the children. She has recently been decorated with the Croix Civique by the King of Belgium.

FUND HAS PASSED MILLION AND HALF

Contributions to British Red Cross Still Pouring in.

STRIKES NEW FIGURE

Total Received is Million Five Hundred and Thirty-Eight Thousand.

The British Red Cross Fund for Ontario, including contributions of resources committee has now passed the \$1,515,000 mark, which was the amount raised last year. In fact, total contributions to date are now \$1,538,000, and they still keep pouring in.

Among the large amounts received by the treasurer in the last few days are the following: Sarnia \$12,106, Guelph \$8742, Galt-\$2281, Stratford \$15,000, (with over \$11,000 still to come), Oxford County grant \$10,000, Brockville \$3647 (council grant \$1000 still to come), Wingham \$4600, Campbellford \$3000, Paris \$3370 and Oakville \$3270.

Contributions received or notified to the central committee, which have not been published heretofore are given below. The list includes a number of good contributions from the rural communities, including \$5714 from London Township, Middlesex County. The Flood of Gold

Since the war commenced Great Britain and France have shipped to the United States one billion dollars of gold. This amount of gold increases the ability of the American banks to extend credit to the extent of five billion dollars.

The Wall Street Journal chides U.S. investors for their apparent unwillingness to purchase British and French Government securities. A British or French Government bond, it says, is just as good security as a bond issued by the government of the United States.

Both English and American capitalists seem to have blundered at one time or another in their anxiety to get hold of gold. When the war broke out there was due from the United States to England about one hundred and fifty million dollars for which gold was demanded.

But later on our friends in the United States lost a good deal of business they might have retained by insisting on the British and French Governments paying a considerable portion of the purchase price in gold.

There may be some foundation for the rumor that another Anglo-French loan, this time for one billion dollars, will be offered in the United States.

Nevertheless, it is plain to see that many of the financial authorities are anxious to have foreign issues absorbed in the United States, so as to put a stop to the further inflow of gold.

A few years ago the financial wisecracks told us that there could be no money except gold, or paper money supported by a one hundred per cent gold reserve.

Every boxer in the world who is anywhere near the weight of Frederick Hill Thomas, who under the ring name of Freddie Welsh, captured the lightweight championship of the world, is feverishly anxious for a fight with the Welshman. The titleholder is unquestionably one of the most chiselled champions in the history of pugilism. And he is by long odds the least responsive to challenges.

Johnny Dundee, the champion of the world, accompanied by an offer of an \$18,000 guarantee to the titleholder, Welsh was ready to busy himself with fighting for such a small amount of money.

Johnny Kilbane impudently dared Welsh to enter the ring with him at 133 pounds, and guaranteed to the champion of \$10,000.

While Freddie has not declined this offer he has not accepted it, and it will be interesting to see what he does about the matter. Welsh always has claimed that he would fight Ritchie on the same terms as in the battle in London.

When Ritchie got \$25,000 and a beating involving the loss of the title, therefore if Ritchie comes across with a like amount it does not seem that Welsh can find a loophole for declination.

Will Stand Half the Pursa. Ritchie in discussing the matter said: "I am willing to agree to anything that is fair, and will go in with the promoters that formerly possessed it. Twenty-six thousand dollars is a lot of money to guarantee one fighter, but if I am to fight with the Welshman, I ought to be satisfied to go along with me."

Naturally I would prefer to get Welsh in a forty-five round bout, but I am so sure I can trim him in twenty rounds that I will accept that sort of a condition. Just what sort of a deal we can make, and how far he is willing to go, I will be doing most of the gambling as it will be the Welshman's money that is at stake. I will be sure to keep my body or jeopardizing my chances."

Amsterdam, via London, Nov. 16.—The Cologne Gazette, commenting on the British reply to the American note regarding blacklists, says: "Everything remains as before. England is mistress of the sea, and whoever wants to carry on commerce can do so only with her permission and under her supervision. Is not this navalism a thousand times more complete and more oppressive than anything German militarism—which really does not exist—is supposed to have done?"

ITALIANS IMPROVE LINE BY SMALL ADVANCE

Regain Forward Trenches Recently Lost on San Marco Heights.

Rome, Nov. 16.—The Italian war office made public today the following official communication: "On the Trentino front the artillery of both sides was active. In the Adige Valley area and in the upper basin of the Astico enemy troops and a transport column were shelled by our batteries."

Brantford, Nov. 16.—The Distinguished Conduct Medal has been awarded to Corp. W. Roy Smith, who left here with the 19th Battalion quartermaster at Exhibition Grounds, Toronto. His father is with the 15th Battery, and a brother with the 52th Battalion. Both are training in the old land.

WILSON UPHOLDING CAUSE OF HUMANITY

Concern Shown Over Deportation of Belgians is Hopeful Sign.

London, Nov. 16.—Commenting on the announcement from Washington that instructions had been sent to the American charge at Berlin, to take up with the German Government the matter of deportation of Belgian civilians into Germany, the Manchester Guardian says the plain man will think this amounts to a protest.

RUBBER CONCEALED IN SHIPMENT OF COFFEE

Exporter Alleges Plot to Have Him Put on British Blacklist.

New York, Nov. 16.—George Philip Nieder, a New York export merchant, was today named defendant in a suit for \$50,000 brought by Leon P. Main city, who alleges that Nieder caused his name to be placed on the British blacklist by inducing him to ship contraband rubber in 250 bags of coffee.

"Need Concerted Action." "But," continued M. Cruppi, "in default of action, immediate and concerted, Roumania becomes embroiled; if the thrust of the central powers coming from the north or west succeeds; if Von Mackensen and Von Falkenhayn join their armies in the direction of Dobruja, then we will see, instead of a definite encroaching of the central powers, the doors of the Balkans opened widely to the enemy."

COLORED MAN GUILTY OF ABDUCTION AND PERJURY

W. Thompson Kidnaped and Married Sixteen-Year-Old Girl—Sentence Deferred.

Chatham, Nov. 16.—William Thompson, colored, arrested a week ago on his return from his honeymoon unaccompanied by his wife, was arraigned in the city police court on three serious charges, two being the abduction of Bernice Hawkins, whom he married before leaving the city on Oct. 31, and married Smith, her companion. He was further charged with perjury, having sworn at the time of securing the marriage license that Bernice Hawkins was over 18, while it is alleged that the girl is just 16. He pleaded guilty to the charges of abduction, and was remanded a week for sentence.

Yardman Run Down by Engine Has to Have Legs Amputated

Niagara Falls, Ont., Nov. 16.—John Whitty, a G. T. R. yard helper, while coupling the air brakes between engine 1272 and a freight car at 11:05 last night in the G. T. R. yards here, was knocked down by engine 1271 in charge of Engineer A. Stewart and Fireman R. Kellman. Four or five cars passed over Whitty's legs, crushing them so badly that they had to be amputated, one above, the other below the knee. Whitty's condition is very serious.

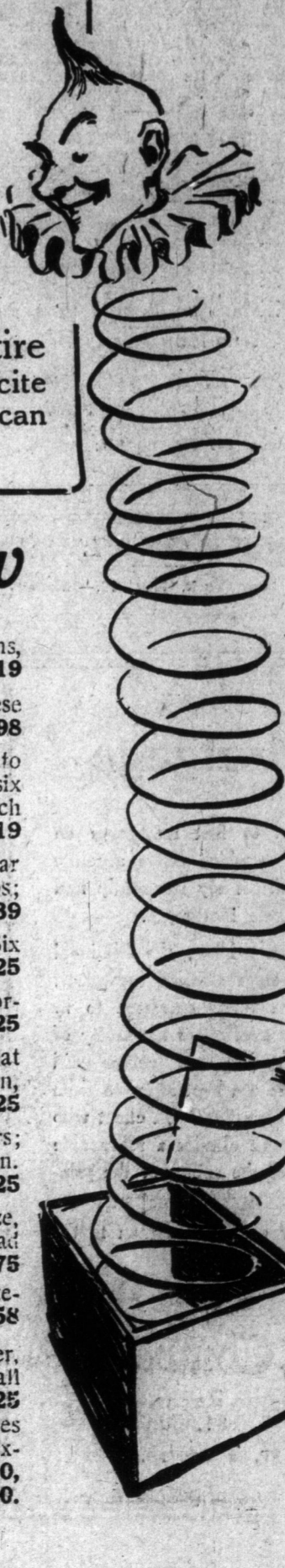
