The casualty list brings sadness and anxiety to many homes throughout the maritime provinces. The list is one of the longest received in the lower provinces and gives fresh evidence of the severity of the fighting ten days ago and of the heroism of the maritime men who met the enemy without regard to the danger of wounds and death. The number of casualties reported among the men from Halifax and throughout Nova Scotia is especially large and the list contains a sadly large number of those who have fallen on the field of battle and have given their s for the cause. London, Sept. 29.—An attack by British troops on the Somme front early today resulted in the circum of a strongly defended farm 500 yards southwest of Le Sars, the war office announces. The official statement follows:

"The night was quiet on the greater part of our front. The positions we have won north of Thierwal were heavily shelled. Our bombing parties were active in the neighborhood of the Schwaben redoubt and the Hessian trench, parts of which are still held by the enemy. A strongly defended farm, about 500 yards southwest of Le Sars was captured by our troops early this morning. North of Ytres two miles south of Bethincourt and southeast of Bapaume our aeroplanes observed a huge explosion, as if a large ammunition dump had blown up. The smoke ascended 9,000 f cet."
