

One thousand new subscribers were added to the Saint John Civic Hydro Commission lists during the year and thirty per cent. more current sold, according to the report, covering the last six months, submitted at the Commission meeting last night by Roy A. Willet, secretary and accountant. The city is buying 10,000,000 kilowatt hours annually from the N. B. Electric Power Commission for distribution. This year 8,000,000 kilowatt hours are being used as compared with 6,000,000 in the first year of operation.

The financial results in the last six months were more encouraging than i pect the disposal of the entire ten miles.

The financial results in the last six months were more encouraging than in the same period the previous year, which showed a deficit of \$19,597.13. This had been cut down by nearly \$12,000 to \$7,683.46. In December there was a surplus of \$4,247.81. The coming six months were the best of the year as regard supply of current, and it was expected that the commission would have a further profit to set against the deficit.

# RUSSIA TO CARRY Yesterday In **EXILES BY AIRPLANE**

Political Offenders to Be Taken

Canadian Press.

KEM, Northern Russia, Jan. 23.—Russia soon will inaugurate an aerial service between this port and Solovetsky island, in the frozen White Sea, for transporting political and other offenders against the Soviet State who have been exiled to Solovetsky monastery. Communication with the island has been carried on by sleighs over the frozen ice or by boat when the ice thaws in the spring.

Situated in the middle of the frozen White Sea, the island is one of the loneliest places in the world, and is the most dreaded prison in Soviet Russia. From the fifteenth century it was used by the Czars as a place of banishment for ecclesiastical, political and secular dignitaries.






