
The Vindictive Shifted

Unsuccessful attempts have been made by the Germans to dredge a passage away between the two old cruisers sunk in the harbor of Zeebrugge. A German destroyer, sunk this week by bombs dropped by British naval airmen, lies close to the cruisers.



KRUPP DIRECTOR KEPT A DIARY

It Was Brought Across Swiss Frontier and Made Public

Germany Willed the War, and Could Easily Have Prevented it Had She Chesen to do So

London, May 23-The Daily News London, May 23—The Daily News has received from Berne, Switzerland, a diary compiled by Dr. Muehlon, one of the directors of Krupp's during the first three months of the war. After laying undisturbed in Germany for three years the diary recently has been brought across the frontier and will be published next week. The text remains unchanged, but Dr. Muehlon is withholding from publication sections of his diary dealing with the activities of Krupp's firm. The names of personalities mentioned in the diary are also withheld, but they all, as can easily be understood, figured and still figure among the greatest in Germany.

The diary was compiled by one who was head of the political department at Krupps, and it will help historians not only to fix the responsibility for the war, in so far as that has not been settled by Prince Lichnowsky, but to know, also, the sentiments which prevailed in high German circles at its outbreak. I have been permitted to read the manuscript, and I send in summarized form a few entries. The first gives at somewhat greater length the text of Dr. Muehlon's well-known charges against the German government. Others are:

Aug. 16—News from Berlin—A man who has just conferred with the naval and foreign office secretaries and military chief tells us all are in high spirits. Evrything goes like clockwork, and in a few days the German army will be has received from Berne, Switzerland, a

Excrything goes like clockwork, and in a few days the German army will be all over France. He says the German fleet has looked for the British fleet in

Aug. 27—Under the direction of the foreign office great and unscrupulous efforts are being made to capture governments, deputies, writers, journalists and all neutrals. I will not speak here of the methods, but I doubt their success.

Aug. 28—I spoke yesterday about my doubts with a large circle of prominent men, but nobody shared my views. "We must win the war by any means," is their refrain.

Sent. 5—I had another conversation

Sept. 5—I had another conversation with the great industrial magnates about the division of the spoils. An unabashed robber policy prevails. One speaker declared that his industrial colleagues, Thyssen, Stinnes and Kirdorf, have thrown all their influence upon the side of a policy of force.

Sept. 29—Laconic, but informing messages from the front, from a man who has come from headquarters where the emperor received him, says the outlook is unsatisfactory. I need not go into the disputes, but it is clear the German higher command did not reckon on a serious opposition from the French near Paris and had not seen an enemy army which hurled our army back. which hurled our army back.

Oct. 4—An important man who has returned from general headquarters says the emperor is seen there only for a mort time daily. Von Moltke is somewhat apathetic. The real motive force and the coming man is von Falkenhayn, who is supported by all.

Oct. 5—I have had a talk with one of our best known financiers. He says he "only" wants Longwy and Briey from France because of their ore wealth and the greater part of Belgium, including Brussels and Ostend. The present imperial chancellor and foreign secretary seem to him unfitted for obtaining such terms.





SWISS CHARD.

There is one vegetable not yet mentioned in this series and very little known to Canadians, that should really take a prominent place in the war time garden, that is to say, Swiss Chard. It is a succulent vegetable, easy to grow, easy to cook, easy to can. No vegetable glves more bountiful returns for a small amount of labor or offers a greater variety of uses. A row twenty feet long planted about this time will give an abundant supply for a family of five for the whole season if only the outer ribs are cut each time and the remainder of the plant is left to grow.

With the price of asparagus out of reach of ordinary mortals, Swiss Chard is really an excellent substitute. It can be served as a hot vegetable with sauce, or as a salad with French dressing or mayonnaise. The young leaves can be cooked in the same way as spinach and the largest ribs cut in small pieces and cooked like celery. Or again, they can be cut in five-inch pieces, boiled for from twelve to fifteen minutes and chill-

LUDENDORFF IS TEUTONS' HOPE

The Real Ruler, Says Member of Reichstag

rnishes The Brains

Directs Strategy and Cooks the Official Reports — As Ruthless as Hindenburg

Speaking in the Reichstag some little time ago Haase, Socialist leader, said: "The truth, gentlemen, is that Count von Hertling is only a sign, which covers the all-powerful military party; the real ruler is Ludendorff."

The notion that the Kaiser is the brains of Germany is dispelled by the fact that the German army has some first-class brains in its round skull, and a glance at the photograph of the Crown Prince would establish his own alibi, as the ball-players call it. For a long time Hindenburg was supposed to be the master spirit of the Central Powers' military exertions, but those in a position to judge are almost unanimous in saying that the best brain in the high command of the German army is behind the broad, bulging forehead of Ludendorff, whose title is lieutenant-general quartermaster, and in whose honor a bridge has been named by the Kaiser.

Hindenburg, they say, is the arm; Ludendorff is the brain. In a recent article in La Revue, Captain Carre, of the French army, discusses Ludendorff, and lays emphasis upon the creed of force and cruelty of the man as revealed by his utterances and his acts. In appearance Ludendorff does not impress like Hindenburg as massive and trooperlike. If there is any science of physiognomy, Ludendorff is a much swifter, clearer thinker than Hindenburg. Ludendorff is quite as ruthless as Hindenburg, as the following passage, which is translated from an interview by the New York Times, indicates: "War is not any more a war of armies, but a struggle of nations against nations. All the means used to weaken an enemy nation become legitimate—by killing women and children, for example, one destroys the mothers and future defenders of the country." Similarly by putting out the eyes of the young girls of the country, one makes them less attractive to lovers, and thus tends to keep them single, which would be an advantage if the plan is to decrease the birthrate of the next generation." This single statement of Ludendorff is enough to reveal the man's character, in so far as it is a matter of concern to civilization. One is not astonished to learn that it was Ludendorff who planned the wholesale deportation of Belgians.

One of the most important duties discharged by Ludendorff is not directly a military one. He may advise Hindenburg as to strategy, and that Hindenburg relies upon him in this matter is indicated by the fact that the people of Berlin call the field marshal "Wassagst-Germanism Pure and Undefiled.

GOVERNMENT LOST ANTI-TRUST SUIT

Supreme Court Refused to Dissolve United Shoe Machinery Company

Washington, May 28-Through an opinion which some construed as indicating a new attitude toward big business, and on which the court divided four to three, the Supreme Court has refused to order the dissolution of the United Shoe Machinery Company of Massachusetts and its subsidiaries, forming the so-called "Shoe Machinery Trust." While admitting the magnitude of the

This suit, instituted by the government in 1911, is the first under the Sherman Anti-Trust Act to be decided by man Anti-Trust Act to be decided by the Supreme Court in a number of years, and for the first time in recent history a complete victory has been won by an organization attacked by the government. In the proceedings the government not only sought the dissolution of the company, which it contended to be an organization in restraint of trade, but also the abolishment of the so-called "tying leases," by which the company retained control over shoe machinery leased to shoe manufacturers. Staffs Heavily Reduced by War

MORE than half the men in the banks of Canada are now on military service, and the number which remains is being steadily reduced.

Women clerks have been employed in thousands and have done splendidly, but they have not the experience of the men they replace. It would be out of the question to expect them to work as rapidly or with the same knowledge of banking as officers of many years training in the profession.

The drain upon the number of experienced officers has new reached a point where it is necessary to ask the public to take into consideration this decrease in efficiency, and to lighten, as far as they can, the burden thus thrown upon those left to run the business. Canada was never so busy as now and the volume of banking business is greater than ever before.

Transact your banking business in the morning as far as possible, and as early as possible. Try to avoid a rush at closing time.

Do not draw any more cheques than are absolutely necessary. Instead of paying small accounts by cheque, draw the money in one amount and pay in cash.

On and after June 1st banking hours will be: 9.30 to 2.30; Saturdays 9.30 to 12.00.

This arrangement will give the staff more time to complete the large amount of work which cannot be taken up until after the office is closed to the public.

Special Services Discontinued July 1st.

Certain services must of necessity be discontinued, for a time

On July 1st banks will discontinue receiving payments for tax bills and the bills of gas, electric and other public service corporations.
