DETAILS OF GERMAN PLOT IN IRELAND REVEALED

(Continued from page 1.) was ripe for execution and that the Germans only awaited definite information from Ireland as to the time, place and date.

The British authorities were able to warn the Irish command regarding the probable landing of an agent of Germany from a submarine. The agent actually landed on April 12 and was arrested.

The new rising depended largely upon the landing of munitions from submarines and there is evidence to show that it was planned to follow a successful German offensive in the west and was to take place at a time when Great Britain presumably would be stripped of troops.

According to documents found on his person, De Valera had worked out in great detail the constitution of his rebel army. He hoped to be able to muster 5000 men. There is evidence that German munitions actually had been shipped on submarines from Cuxhaven in the beginning of May and that for some time German submarines have been busy off the west coast of Ireland on other errands than the destruction of Allied shipping.

It will thus be seen that the negotiations between the executive of the Sinn Fein organization and Germany have been virtually continuous for three and a half years. At first a section of Irish Americans was the intermediary for most of the discussions in Ireland, and the entrance into the war communication with the enemy has tended to be more direct. A second rising in Ireland was planned for last year, and the scheme broke down only because Germany was unable to send troops.

"This year plans for another rising in connection with the German offensive on the western front were maturing and a new shipment of arms from Germany was imminent.

An important feature of every plan was the establishment of submarine bases in Ireland to menace the shipping of all nations.

"In the circumstances no other course was open to the government but to issue a proclamation against the common enemy, Germany, in a letter printed in the Manchester Guardian.

Appeal by Redmond's Daughter. London, May 25—Mrs. Max Green, formerly Miss Johanna Redmond, daughter of the late John E. Redmond, makes a strong appeal for unity between Ireland and Great Britain.

Government Mem. Edinburgh, May 24—Premier Lloyd George said yesterday regarding the action taken against the Sinn Feiners that no units would direct the government to give away the sources of its information.

London, May 25—The Official Press Bureau, through Reuters' Limited, has issued a statement regarding the Irish arrests and the revolutionary movement in Ireland which culminated in arrests last night.

The story of the active connection of the leaders of the Sinn Fein movement with the German government is disclosed by documents in the possession of the British government, falls into two parts—the period prior to and that since the abortive Irish rebellion of Easter, 1916. The events of the first period are dealt upon in some detail, but those of the second period permit of no more than a summary as a full statement of the facts and documents in the possession of the government would disclose the names of persons who were bound to Great Britain and the channels of communication through which the German government maintained contact with it.

The story of the period before Easter, 1916, takes up in full the work of German agents, prominent among whom was Count Von Bernstorff, former German ambassador to the United States.

FINE BILL THIS AT THE OPERA HOUSE

Another Banner Collection of Vaudeville Acts, With the Mystery Ship

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KRUPP DIRECTOR KEPT A DIARY

It Was Brought Across Swiss Frontier and Made Public

Germany Willed the War, and Could Easily Have Prevented it Had She Chosen to do So

London, May 25—The Daily News has received from Bern, Switzerland, a diary compiled by Dr. Muehlon, one of the directors of Krupp's during the first three months of the war.

The diary was compiled by one who was head of the political department at Krupp, and it will help historians not only to fix the responsibility for the war, but also to see how Germany could have prevented it.

Aug. 16—News from Berlin—A man who has just conferred with the naval and foreign office secretaries and military chief tells us all are in high spirits.

Aug. 27—Under the direction of the foreign office great and unscrupulous efforts are being made to capture governments, deputies, writers, journalists and all neutrals.

Aug. 28—I spoke yesterday about my doubts with a large circle of prominent men, but nobody shared my views.

Sept. 6—I had another conversation with the great industrial magnates about the division of the spoils.

Sept. 23—Lacenic, but informing messages from the front, from a man who has come from headquarters where the emperor received him, says the outlook is unsatisfactory.

Oct. 4—An important man who has returned from general headquarters says the emperor is seen there only for a short time daily.

Oct. 5—I have had a talk with one of our best known financiers. He says he "only" wants Longwy and Brye from France because of their own wealth and the greater part of Belgium, including Brussels and Ostend.

Nov. 1—It is worth mentioning that I met today a great German industrial chief, who does not share the prevailing hatred and blindness.

The final entry, which is not dated, reads: "Today I met one of our most representative Germans who told me, to my amazement, that we had willed the war and could easily have prevented it."

In a brief and moving preface to the diary, Dr. Muehlon urges the German people to seek the whole truth.

"We are here today in the face of the greatest realities that ever have been the call to sacrifice and service. It is an equal call to the women, and has been responded to with equal devotion and patriotism."

"We stand together without need of message. The honor roll just read is evidence of that. The thousands of men who have left their homes need no message, we need no message other than that."

"This is not the place to speak of what Canada has done, but I would not be representing my king and our people if I did not say that we all know that Canada is heart and soul in this war."

"And after the war—when the war is ended, and when peace has come, the only peace we will ever contemplate, when victory is established, and when we set to work on reconstruction, I see on the horizon, not only all the countries of Britain, and the whole of the British Empire, but all the English-speaking nations, with the same ideals, the same purposes. We will be able to achieve benefits which battle description, but will benefit the world and the whole human race."

PLAYGROUNDS.

In view of the interest being aroused in playgrounds in St. John the experience of Ottawa is worthy of attention. The Journal-Press says that the city of Ottawa had granted the civic playgrounds \$6,500 this year and the control of the grounds was invested in a civic committee.

CHANGED RELATIONS.

The general public do not always agree with the utterances of President Waters of the Dominion Trades and Labor Council, but his recent remarks at Ottawa concerning the changed relations of labor and the government are a source of universal satisfaction.

The growing co-operation between the government and organized labor is a sign of healthy development. It is seen in the United States and Great Britain as well as in Canada. It will make many problems more easy to solve.

THE BOY AND THE COURT

The Ottawa Journal-Press enters a protest against a policy of too great leniency toward bad boys. Its remarks apply to St. John as well as to Ottawa. We quote: "The accepted theory of juvenile court and children's aid work is that there must be careful avoidance of anything that would tend to create in the mind of the youthful offender an enmity toward society."

"Every effort should be made to teach the erring boy to do right, but he must be made to see that he will not be permitted to do wrong—that in that kind of a game he cannot win. Just now, when so many fathers are away in England and France or more than ordinarily busy with work here, discipline in many homes is relaxed. And it is a bad thing for the young boy to be without discipline."

Halifax Echo: Children who have no place to play are the coming offenders against law and order. Play is essential to good health and good morals.

RAISE MORE SHEEP.

Bradstreet's, in an article urging that in the country districts of the United States more interest should be evinced in the raising of small flocks of sheep, says: "In parts of the far northwest the banks are doing much to encourage sheep-raising by stimulating the growth of boys' sheep clubs. Some banks advance funds at 6 per cent. to the boys, and organization is brought about by the local schools working in conjunction with the country community centres."

A vigorous effort is now being made to secure the establishment of a Child Welfare Bureau for Canada. Mrs. Cain Campbell of Winnipeg has been most active in the agitation and has circulated literature and addressed many public meetings. Women's organizations are now taking up the subject.

The Times received this week from Mr. H. G. Marr, who is now on the Pacific coast, a picture post card showing the Lincoln Playground in Seattle. The picture is one that makes a citizen of St. John extremely envious of Seattle, which has many playgrounds, and which in the one shown in this picture provides a perfect baseball diamond, outdoor gymnasium, fine pavilion, charming open square, large wading pool, and every convenience for free and safe play.

U. S. Troops to Italy. New York, May 24.—Secretary of War Baker announced in an address here tonight in celebration of Italy day that American infantry, American machine gun units and American artillery soon would be fighting shoulder to shoulder with the Italians on the front.

The steamer Empress which plies the St. John-Digby route has been laid up for a week for repairs.

Lord Milner: "France may be assured that British efforts at the front as well as behind the lines, will be co-ordinated to the utmost. The unshakable French confidence during the last few days has greatly comforted us."

War Garden Bulletin

PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACK-YARD GARDENERS ENLISTED IN GREAT-BRITAIN PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN

Issued by the Canada Food Board in Collaboration With Experts on the Staff of the Dominion Experimental Farm

SWISS CHARD.

There is one vegetable not yet mentioned in this series and very little known to Canadians that should really take a prominent place in the war time garden, that is to say, Swiss Chard. It is a succulent vegetable, easy to grow, easy to cook, easy to can. No vegetable gives more bountiful returns like vegetables of the plant is left to grow.

With the price of asparagus out of reach of ordinary mortals, Swiss Chard is really an excellent substitute. It can be served as a hot vegetable with sauce, or as a salad with French dressing or mayonnaise. The young leaves can be cooked in the same way as spinach and the largest ribs cut in small pieces and cooked like celery. Or again, they can be cut in five-inch pieces, and served for from twelve to fifteen minutes and chilled before serving.





LUDENDORFF IS TEUTONS' HOPE

The Real Ruler, Says Member of Reichstag
 Brines the Brains
 Directs Strategy and Cooks the Official Reports — As Ruthless as Hindenburg

Speaking in the Reichstag some little time ago Haase, Socialist leader, said: "The truth, gentlemen, is that Count von Hertling is only a sign, which covers the all-powerful military party; the real ruler is Ludendorff."

The notion that the Kaiser is the brains of Germany is dispelled by the fact that the German army has some first-class brains in its round skulls, and a glance at the photograph of the Crown Prince would establish his own alibi, as the ball-players call it. For a long time Hindenburg was supposed to be the master spirit of the Central Powers' military exertions, but those in a position to judge are almost unanimous in saying that the best brain in the high command of the German army is behind the broad, bulging forehead of Ludendorff, whose title is lieutenant-general, quartermaster, and in whose honor a bridge has been named by the Kaiser.

Hindenburg, they say, is the arm; Ludendorff is the brain. In a recent article in La Revue, Captain Carré, of the French army, discusses Ludendorff, and lays emphasis upon the creed of force and cruelty of the man as revealed by his utterances and his acts. In appearance Ludendorff does not impress like Hindenburg as massive and trooper-like. If there is any science of physiognomy, Ludendorff is a much swifter, cleverer thinker than Hindenburg. The latter frequently indulges in furious bursts of passion, and makes his subordinates shiver, which, perhaps has something to do with the great respect that is shown him by his butler-like colleagues. He bumps the table with his fist, and gives vent to profanity, and one recalls other men who have built up a reputation for force of character on a better foundation than ill-manners, a formidable countenance, rude manners, and the lavish use of the word "hell."

Germanism Pure and Undiluted.

Ludendorff is quite as ruthless as Hindenburg, as the following passage, which is translated from an interview by the New York Times, indicates: "War is not any more a war of armies, but a struggle of nations against nations. All the means used to weaken an enemy become legitimate—by killing women and children, for example, one destroys the mothers and future defenders of the country." Similarly by putting out the eyes of the young girls of the country, one makes them less attractive to lovers, and thus tends to keep them single, which would be an advantage if the plan is to decrease the birth-rate of the next generation." This single statement of Ludendorff is enough to reveal the man's character, in so far as it is a matter of concern to civilization. One is not astonished to learn that it was Ludendorff who planned the wholesale deportation of Belgians.

One of the most important duties discharged by Ludendorff is not directly a military one. He may advise Hindenburg as to strategy, and that Hindenburg relies upon him in this matter is indicated by the fact that the people of Berlin call the field marshal "Wassgast."

du!" This is the result of his answering questions so frequently by turning to Ludendorff, and saying, "What do you say?" Ludendorff may plan the great strokes of the war, but his most useful service to Germany, perhaps, has been his manipulation of official reports. If one had no other source of information than the German bulletins, he would inevitably come to the conclusion that Germany had not lost a battle, had not since the struggle began. many had not lost a battle, had not since the struggle began. Speaking of these reports, Captain Carré says: "Cunning, tortuous, a forger and a liar, thus appears Ludendorff in the course of this special work." All the official reports the people pass through his hands. If there is a German repulse, he represents the ground lost as unimportant, and lays emphasis upon the fixed policy of the higher command to use sparingly the lives of German soldiers. If it has to be admitted that the enemy gained a mile, he says that the intention had been to gain ten miles, and that it was therefore a failure. Sometimes he invents stories of battles that never occurred, and concludes with German victories. As a chief of staff he must be accorded high rank. His Roumanian campaign, even though founded on treachery, was organized with great flexibility. Once it began, it would have taken a miracle to turn it into a German defeat. On the whole his western campaign will not turn into a crown of laurel. It has had successes, but as many checks. It has failed to do what he intended it should do, what Hindenburg was so incautious as to announce it would do. And, so far as Ludendorff is concerned, the worst is yet to come.

CATHOLIC CHURCH AIDS SALVATION ARMY DRIVE

Pastor of St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York, Calls on Parishioners to Give to War Fund

(New York Times)

With only two days left in which to get the last \$75,000 of New York City's quota of \$250,000, the Salvation Army campaign was spurred yesterday by an appeal to Catholics to support the drive, which was issued by Mgr. M. J. Lavelle, Pastor of St. Patrick's Cathedral, and secretary to Cardinal Farley. Addressed to all Catholics in the archdiocese, the appeal was:

"One of the most striking changes brought about by the war, and the necessity of raising great funds for charitable work under the direction of the various organizations best fitted for it, has been the practical raising of old walls of religious insularism. These various drives have brought Jew and Gentile, Catholic and Protestant, and the non-denominational shoulder to shoulder. This war has had a wonderful effect in bringing people together, making them waive differences of religion and party, and causing them, without the slightest diminution of loyalty to individual belief, to join hand in hand and stand together in every enterprise calculated to promote the welfare of our common country.

"We Catholics have striven to do not only our share, but our utmost, in the financial support of the government and of all the war charities. We appreciate cordially the aid we have received from our non-Catholic fellow citizens in the Catholic war drive; consequently we are deeply concerned in the success of the Salvation Army's present drive. I wish it well, and shall lend it every assistance. We know that the money thus raised—like that of the Y. M. C. A. and the Jewish Society—will be wisely used for the welfare and comfort of our soldiers in the camps and on the battlefield. This unanimity of sentiment in the present issue is of great value to the country at all times, but especially in these days of danger and stress.

At the headquarters of the campaign, 148 West Fourteenth street, announcement was made last night that the campaign total now stood at \$75,000. Among the larger givers were Cleveland H. Dodge & Co., \$10,000; Mrs. R. A. Wellington, \$1,000; Clarence MacKay, \$1,000; Mrs. Walter Damrosch, \$1,000; R. G. Dunn & Co., \$800; American Telephone & Telegraph Co., \$1,000; New York Telephone Co., \$1,000, and \$500 from Liggett & Myers.

A factory girl, who has relatives at the front, approached a Salvation Army

manager of the American Lithographic Company, 52 East Nineteenth street, called his employees together at noon and talked to them about helping the campaign. With R. E. Newberry, a member of the firm, he rounded up all the men in the big plant and started to auction off doughnuts at \$2 apiece and pies at \$1 a portion. The auction brought forgotten yesterday when John Beck, Commander Evangeline Booth yesterday issued an order directing the Army workers to give one day to helping the Red Cross in its drive next week, besides helping all the other duties. The Salvationists have already donated forty-six ambulances to the Red Cross, and furnished several drivers, who have won honors.

"CAN'T BE HALF FREE AND HALF PRUSSIAN"

What Honorable Eihu Root Says About World Situation

The Lesson of Life — Universities That are Giving Sons and Daughters Will Benefit Later

"The democracies of England, France, Canada, South Africa, Australia, and the United States are united to make future life possible by driving the monster of brutality and lust for power which is called the German Empire," said the Hon. Eihu Root at Varsity convocation, Toronto, last week, "and that can be done only by victory. The freedom of our lives and the security of our homes depend upon our winning this victory by force of arms."

After expressing his thanks for the honor conferred upon him by the University by admitting him to the degree of doctor of laws, the distinguished visitor said:—"I believe that the half-million of soldiers from the United States who are in France and Flanders, the one and a half million who, we are told, will be there before the close of the year, and the many millions more who will be ready to take their place, and with the energy and devotion of the one hundred million who are behind the soldiers, I believe that all these are going to stand with you and your men across the water and the men of England, Scotland, Wales and, aye, Ireland, in the battle for common liberty until by force of arms victory is won with the downfall forever of the beast of German autocracy."

Many Things in Common.


In referring to the alliance between the United States and Canada he said:—"We have tenets in common of the same principles of liberty, the same surety of justice, the same independence of individual manhood, and the same democracy. We are fighting for the same individual common heritage when we stand side by side upon the same battle line in Flanders."

"Why has there been peace between Canada and the United States for a hundred years? Because they are two democracies whose fundamental conception is universal liberty and justice. A democracy cannot conceal the sinister aggrandisement of autocracy like that of Germany. Each of these countries, Canada and the United States, stood up for a well-honored purpose, and therefore there was no deep suspicion and therefore no war came."

"The world cannot be half-free and half-Prussian," continued Mr. Root. "For peace in the world democracy must slay the foe whenever it finds it. Lose Lives and Save Them."

"I was thinking as I saw the slender ranks of this once crowded university, and as I thought of the same in all the great universities in the United States, shall not these universities which lose

their life save it? Has not a new day come in education in the lessons of these young men and young women leaving in these days of war? Has education in the western continent done its full duty and reached the heart of democracy which it has undertaken to do? The German education led the people away forever from the high ideals, and then in their schools a false doctrine was assimilated in the German mind—that is the supremacy of the state and the dependence of the individual to the state. Democracy is fundamentally the reverse. "We have forgotten in the western continent that liberty that didn't come as air comes to all who choose to

breathe. We have forgotten that not only eternal vigilance is the price of liberty, but also eternal struggle is the price of liberty. The war has come to save us from the sad results of that forgetfulness. May our great universities in the future carry out the lessons we are learning today in the conflict we are carrying out in France and Flanders. May they teach patriotism, love of liberty, teach young men and young women how to serve their country, liberty, and justice, as well as Latin, Greek, and applied science."

With the operation of the sanitary wagon soldiers may undress, take a shower, and while they are so engaged have their clothes washed, dried, and fumigated, all ready for them to don after the bath.



BRITAIN BUILDING SHIPS FASTER THAN GERMAN SUBS. CAN SINK THEM.

That Germany is straining every nerve to strike a decisive blow before the American armies can be brought into the field was the statement made by David Lloyd George in an address on the occasion of his being tendered the freedom of the city of Edinburgh. The Allied commanders, who knew best what the prospects were, he added, felt most confident about the result.

Mr. Lloyd George said that while the United States was rushing its men into France, the present strength of those armies was not the equivalent of one-fifth of the fighting strength which was gained by the Teutonic allies through the collapse of Russia.

The prospects of using the entire force of the Allies were very bright, said Lloyd George, in discussing the united command of the Entente armies in France. He sounded a note of warning during his address regarding Germany's proposals saying that the Prussian auto-

cracy did not intend to bring the war to an end "until its basket is as full as it can hold."

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

The British troopship Moldavia, with United States troops on board, has been torpedoed and sunk. Fifty-six of the soldiers are missing and it is feared they were killed by the explosion.

The steamer Inniscarra, bound from Fishguard to Cork, has been torpedoed and sunk. Thirty-seven members of the crew are missing and believed lost.

Prince Arthur of Connaught, who is on a special mission to Japan, called on President Wilson in Washington yesterday.

Corporal George Mackenzie Dickson, son of Dr. M. S. Dickson, of Halifax, was killed in the recent German raid on a hospital back of the lines. Dr. Hogan,

surgeon, of Halifax, was slightly wounded in the same raid.

Lieut. Lorenzo Moore, son of Mrs. Arthur Gin, of Riverside, who was reported wounded and missing April 19, is a prisoner of war in Germany.

Judge Barry, at Gagetown, yesterday, announced that decision on the application of A. R. Slipp, counsel for Robert Kierstead, convicted of murdering his wife, for a new trial on the grounds of insanity, would be reserved for consideration by the court of appeal in June.

Meanwhile, sentence is suspended. York Hotel, Fredericton, was damaged by fire yesterday.

John McKinnon, boys' secretary at central Y. M. C. A., Montreal, is at present in the city visiting his mother at

Lansdowne avenue. He will be well remembered here, having formerly been prominent worker in the local Y. M. C. A.



WHEN THE GERMAN DANGER COMES

Telling Truth of Britain To Meet Hun Propaganda

United States Leaders Striving to Overcome Century of Hatred of Old Land—Reasons for Real Friendship

London's wonderful welcome to United States troops on their way to France is impressing on many writers in the United States the changed feeling in the relations between the two countries.

There is no concealing the fact that the delay in the United States entering the war was in some part at least due to the old antagonism toward Britain, which had been fostered for over a century, and which it was quite impossible to eradicate in a few weeks or months.

In the last few months, realizing the price paid for the teaching of one-sided history, the United States has been hastening to overcome the errors of the past by doing justice to Britain in new books and in newspaper comment.

That message of friendship surely closes the issues of the Revolution, remarks Dr. Prentice, who had already quoted the fact that Burke and Chatham, together with a host of English Whigs, fought the battle for the American revolutionists, no less bravely and staunchly than did the armies of the Americans themselves.

During the American Civil War there was a good deal of feeling in the North against Britain, owing to an apparent British friendship for the South, but Dr. Prentice says:

"Bright Forster, the Duke of Argyll, and Tom Hughes spoke effectively to convince England that the United States was fighting the great battle of humanity. The question of intervention between the Federal and Confederate governments arose early in the war. It was virtually considered only by England and France. The letter was far more inclined to such action; it proposed it earlier, more frequently and in a more extreme form. When the purpose of the emancipation proclamation was understood the

propaganda is obvious. It is dangerous today to advocate sympathy for Germany, but if German agents can sow seeds of distrust among the allies and can divide England, France and America, they hinder their perfection of co-operation. Germany will be the gainer."

Dr. Prentice refers to the common slating of George III, in which most Britons would probably join nowadays, but points out even this stubborn monarch said to Mr. Adams, the first United States minister to Great Britain:

"Sir, I wish you to believe, and that it may be understood in America, that I have done nothing in the late contest but what I thought myself indispensably bound to do by the duty which I owed to my people. I will be very frank with you. I was the last to consent to the separation, but the separation having been made, I have always said, as I say to you now, that I would be the first to meet the friendship of the United States as an independent power."

heart of the English people responded to it with an impulse no power could understand and which no government could defy. A great public meeting was held in London on New Year's Eve, which called the dawn of an era of universal freedom and of closer friendship between England and America.

How Britain Changed. "At the same time a similar gathering in Manchester, stricken as it was with the cotton famine, adopted similar resolutions addressed to the President of the United States. At Sheffield a vast gathering passed resolutions to the effect that it was the duty of England to give her sympathy and moral support to the northern States. All England took up the cry within the next few weeks.

Deputations waited upon the American minister with addresses of sympathy and encouragement. At least two members of the cabinet, the Duke of Argyll and Milner Gibson, spoke publicly for the federal cause. A vast meeting at Spurgeon's Tabernacle and at Exeter Hall applauded the name of Lincoln and cried down that of Jefferson Davis. In Gloucestershire any apparent complicity of England with the Confederacy in the equipment of warships was condemned and in almost every considerable city or town in England, Scotland or Wales such sentiments were expressed at great popular assemblies. An increasing number of statesmen, including such men as Lord Fitzroy and Lord Derby, openly espoused the federal side."

Events since that time have evinced varied feelings, but such incidents as Britain's moral aid to the United States at Manila Bay in 1898 and the support of the Monroe Doctrine in face of German hostility to it, have made for strong friendship wherever they have been perceived and understood.

OPENING OF AIR MAIL SERVICE: NEW YORK-WASHINGTON

The first regular airplane mail service in the world was inaugurated between Washington and New York on last Wednesday. With the exception of an accident to one of the airplanes between Washington and Philadelphia, it was a complete success. Leaving Belmont Park at 11:30 in the forenoon with 144 pounds of mail, Lieutenant Torrey H. Webb arrived in Philadelphia at 12:30, from which point the mail was relayed through the air by Lieutenant J. C. Edgerton, who delivered it in Washington at 2:30 p. m., the actual flying time of the two couriers, deducting the six minutes' intermission in relaying at Philadelphia, was three hours and twenty minutes. Although this record was not quite up to the ninety-five-mile average, which the aviators were expected to make, it was considered satisfactory for the initial trip with new machines.

The Canadian Bankers' Association Invites the Co-Operation of the Public on Behalf of the Banks. Staffs Heavily Reduced by War. MORE than half the men in the banks of Canada are now on military service, and the number which remains is being steadily reduced. Women clerks have been employed in thousands and have done splendidly, but they have not the experience of the men they replace. It would be out of the question to expect them to work as rapidly or with the same knowledge of banking as officers of many years training in the profession. The drain upon the number of experienced officers has now reached a point where it is necessary to ask the public to take into consideration this decrease in efficiency, and to lighten, as far as they can, the burden thus thrown upon those left to run the business. Canada was never so busy as now and the volume of banking business is greater than ever before. How the Public Can Help. Transact your banking business in the morning as far as possible, and as early as possible. Try to avoid a rush at closing time. Do not draw any more cheques than are absolutely necessary. Instead of paying small accounts by cheque, draw the money in one amount and pay in cash. Change in Banking Hours June 1st. On and after June 1st banking hours will be: 9.30 to 2.30; Saturdays 9.30 to 12.00. This arrangement will give the staff more time to complete the large amount of work which cannot be taken up until after the office is closed to the public. Special Services Discontinued July 1st. Certain services must of necessity be discontinued, for a time at least. On July 1st banks will discontinue receiving payments for tax bills and the bills of gas, electric and other public service corporations. The banks desire to render all essential services including many special ones arising out of the war. In order to do this they make this appeal for co-operation in the manner suggested above.
