G. P. R. CONSTABLE IS UNDER ARREST

Suspicion of Stealing Where He Was Employed to Guard

Joseph A. Harris, a constable for the G. P. R., doing duty on the West Side, was arrested yesterday for stealing three silver watches from the possession of Sergeant Finlay and Policeman George A. Foss. He was taken on suspicion of stealing two dozen pocket knives from a case in No. 6 shed on the night of the eleventh, also stealing three silver watches from a case in the same shed on the night of the eighth, and opening a case last night which was missing from time to time. He was arrested on suspicion. When searched two knives were found on the person.

BRUSSELS STREET ROW TOLD OF IN COURT

Case Against Three Negroes—Name of the Fourth Man Comes Out in Evidence

The preliminary hearing in the case against three negroes charged with assaulting Frank E. McHugh, tramcar driver, at the intersection of William Street and the police court this morning. Mr. McHugh told of the attack made on him on the afternoon of March 16. He said he was coming up Richmond street and turned his horse down Brussels when William Dickson, who is still in jail, jumped on the sloven and called out to McHugh that one of the wheels was against the street. The three negroes, who walked along the sidewalk a little ahead of the team. He stopped at the back of the team, and went in with a chain to be repaired. Dickson then got off the sloven and said to McHugh that he thought he could beat him, at the same time calling out "fight". Then the other three rushed up and kicked at him and some of them tried to walk into the blacksmith shop. He told McHugh he could do the same with him. The witness said he went to the blacksmith shop and saw the four colored men acting as he went. He said that he saw Dickson, who he thought was the man who had jumped on him, although he could not be sure just which one it was. They came into the shop and Dickson was struck with a rap in his hand and Scott with a hatchet. Currie and Dickson were both held, the witness said, and Currie pointed a revolver at him saying he would shoot. The gun was held so close that McHugh could see the down the barrel. Launchin, he said, pulled out a pair of metal knuckles and said he could shoot also. Scott came along then with a hatchet and attention was turned towards him. Three of them got him down and took the hatchet from him. They also took the rap from McHugh and Currie chased after him flourishing it in his hand. McHugh dodged round the sloven. Currie finally caught up to him and hit him over the head with the weapon. Scott and Launchin were then taken to the streets with the rap in his hand. McHugh and Scott then went back to the blacksmith shop and took refuge there.

MORE SIGNS OF C. P. R. INVASION OF THE GOVERNMENT ROAD

W. A. Cowens, recently appointed divisional engineer for the L. C. R., with offices in Truro, was in the city today on his first visit of inspection since his appointment. WITH HEAD CUT

A short time after he had been arrested last evening in Sneythe street on a charge of drunkenness, Thomas Keating was found in the L. C. R. lock-up with his head cut and bleeding. Police man Rankine summoned Dr. Dunlap for medical treatment was given the man. He was ordered to the hospital where he was taken in the ambulance. MATTER OF PLEBISCITE ON HOSPITAL EXPENDITURE

Mayor Frink has received communications asking whether the common council would express an opinion regarding the necessity of the advisability of having a plebiscite on the proposed expenditure of \$200,000 for the new hospital building. There has been no opportunity as yet for the council to discuss the matter. It is said that it is not likely that the matter will be brought up by the council, but it is a matter involving the expenditures of such a large sum.

Pledge Broken; Federal Prisoners Slaughtered

Two Hundred and Thirty Put to Death By Rebels Because They Refused To Join Constitutionalist Forces

Mexico City, March 20.—Two hundred and thirty-two Mexican Federalists were slaughtered by Constitutionalist forces at San Buenaventura, Coahuila, on Tuesday afternoon. They had surrendered on a pledge that their lives would be spared. A force of Federalists under Col. Amelio Salinas was trapped by two constitutionalist bands south of Buenaventura. The Federalists fought their way to the town and then offered to surrender. They agreed to give up their arms and promised to quit the government army and fight on neither side.

London, Eng., March 20.—With striding audaciousness, the outlook in Ulster has become one of great gravity and there are predictions that the long threatened "war" is now only a matter of days. A rumor current last night that the British government was preparing for the military occupation of the province.

SILVER FALLS ROAD PROPERTY IS BOUGHT

The property on the Silver Falls Road, consisting of about fifty acres of land, on which there is a lake, dwelling and barns known as the Armstrong property was purchased this morning by J. King Kelly, K. C., acting for James D. Beves, of Little River. The price is said to be in the vicinity of \$10,000.

SOME-ONE STARTED THE TROLLEY, SEVEN KILLED, 17 PEOPLE INJURED

Chaparral, N. Y., March 20.—An investigation by officials of the Buffalo, Lockport, and Rochester, and Corning Electric Belfort, yesterday under secret orders. Unionists say they are convinced that the authorities are contemplating some coup. It is said in military circles that the government has a comprehensive plan for precipitating a crisis in the province within twenty-four hours and for holding all strategic points by an overwhelming force and that the officers commanding in the different districts received their instructions a month ago.

HON. H. BOSTOCK LIBERAL LEADER IN THE SENATE

Ottawa, March 19—In the common today another story was told of the care the Borden government exercises in making appointments. W. H. White, Liberal member for Victoria, Alberta, gave an instance in which it was shown that a law-breaker who had been convicted was given a government appointment through influence. Ambrose Gray, said Mr. White, had been defeated as Conservative candidate against Hon. Wilfred Gidley in the Alberta provincial elections. Two weeks later he was appointed homeassistant inspector for the riding in which he had lost. Now he was opposing and making things troublesome for those who had voted against him.

Levi Thompson, M. P. for Qu'Appelle, added more troubles to those of Hon. Dr. Roche by referring to the appointment of J. K. Smith, a convicted perjurer at Moosejaw. Hardly any defence was offered from the government benches in either case.

Hon. Robert Rogers appeared in new role in the house today. He pleaded for "cleanliness" and "purity" in elections, but the force and eloquence of his plea were lost because it was he who made it, and his record caused such utterances to be received with skepticism.

Hon. Dr. Roche introduced his act to amend the Indian Act which was given its first reading.

Third reading was given the bill respecting merchant shipping and North Sydney harbor.

At a meeting of Liberal members of the senate this afternoon Hon. Hewitt Bostock, senator for Kamloops, B. C., was chosen leader to succeed the late Sir George Ross.



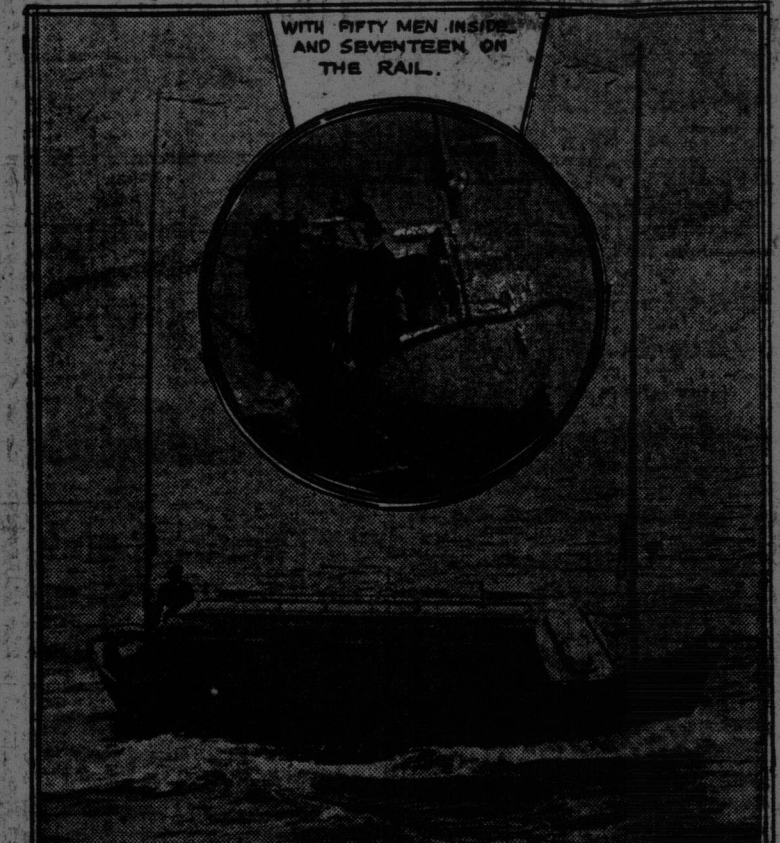

NEW HOUSED LIFEBOAT WITH WIRELESS.



The boat, known as the Lundin housed lifeboat, can be entirely closed in by watertight iron doors and ports, and in tests of stability she carried fifty men inside the cabin with seventeen hanging to the guard rail on one side. Rowlocks just below the portlights permit of her being rowed with six sweeps. Her propeller works in a tunnel, well protected from drift. Forward and aft she carries large reels, on which life lines are wound, and they can be shot aboard a ship.

The boat's bottom is double, with air compartments and scuppers making her self-bailing. Such a boat, as the tests demonstrated, can pass a towline and pull a whale stang of other life boats.

The sides of these boats are heavily padded with Balsawoold, which enables them to stand heavy bumping without damage. A small compartment within the cabin of the boat is virtually insulated, so far as sound is concerned, from the rest of the boat. This is called the silence cabin and is set aside for the wireless operator.

RICH YOUNG MR. BOND'S WILD RIDE IN AUTO

Bandit Style Caused Reign of Terror Near London

FINALLY CAPTURED

Attempt at Suicide Followed Arrest—At Revolver Point He Forced Chauffeur to do His Bidding

The cable a few days ago told of the wild automobile ride of rich young H. Lee Bond in London suburbs, holding up people right and left with revolvers. Here are details from the Weekly Scotsman—

After an extraordinary motor journey of thirty hours through Wiltshire, Dorset, Hampshire, and Somersetshire, in the course of which he alleged to have threatened a number of persons with revolvers, H. Lee Bond, a wealthy young man, aged twenty-nine, living at Lyndhurst, Hampshire, is under arrest.

Mr. Bond hired a motor car from a garage at Lyndhurst, the driver being a man named John Saint, aged nineteen. In the course of an interview, Saint said he was at the Mill House, Mr. Bond's residence, with the car about two o'clock on Saturday afternoon, when Bond told him to get ready to start. They went through Durley, Ringwood and Poole to Weymouth, where his suspicious were first aroused on account of Bond not saying where he was going, which was contrary to the usual practice.

"I was about five p.m.," said Saint, "and refused to go any further. Bond then pulled out a revolver, and said if I did not go on he would shoot. He said he shot to kill, and that it would be best for me to go on. There were many people about but he hid the firearm under his coat, and no one could see what he was taking place. Then we ran out of petrol, and that was the first time I got out of the car to fill up, but he kept me to go on.

"We drove through Dorchester to Poole, where he appeared to be about half past four. Bond ordered some petrol and two head lamps, and the man wanted to get into the car when the head lamps were lit, and holding the revolver at my head, said 'Drive like fury.' We went back into Dorchester, and then towards Bournemouth. There had been a fair at Dorchester, and there were a lot of people on the road. Some of them Bond held up. He seemed to prefer by-lanes.

"Presently we came upon a young lady and a man, who wanted a lift, as they had three miles to go. Bond pulled out his revolver and said 'Your money or your life!' The girl ran away screaming, and the man ran in front of the car and warned the other people in the road.

"Lady's Fright

"Then we overtook a young lady and a man on bicycles. Bond stopped the car and wanted to talk to the young lady. She backed away from him. The young man called her to come, but she would not do so, and Bond fired over her head. She was more frightened than ever, and ran down the road screaming and jumping through a gap in the hedge and disappeared. I backed the car, but Bond made me go on again. The man had disappeared.


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A Dramatic Arrest

The details of Bond's arrest show that observation was kept upon Mill House for several hours, and Bond was seen passing the lawn, but it was not until about eleven o'clock at night that an opportunity occurred to capture him. Superintendent Wakeford, taking a powerful acetylene lamp, entered the garden and approached Bond, followed by Police Sergeant Long and Police-Constable Pelling, the former carrying Bond with a revolver. As the superintendent drew near, Bond swung round, whereupon the superintendent sprang forward, and seized him, holding his arms close to his body. The sergeant and the constable advanced at the same time and took two loaded revolvers from the hands of the captive.

Bond was removed in custody to the Lyndhurst Police Station and it was intended to convey him to Dorchester. Before doing so some lunch was ordered for him from a local hotel. It is said that when the police handed him the tray they did not notice a knife on it, but Bond detected one beneath the cloth, hastily seized it, and drew the edge across his throat before he could be prevented. Police-Constable Pelling who discovered the knife from Bond received several severe cuts on the hands. Bond was removed to the Southampton Hospital, where he is said to be making satisfactory progress.

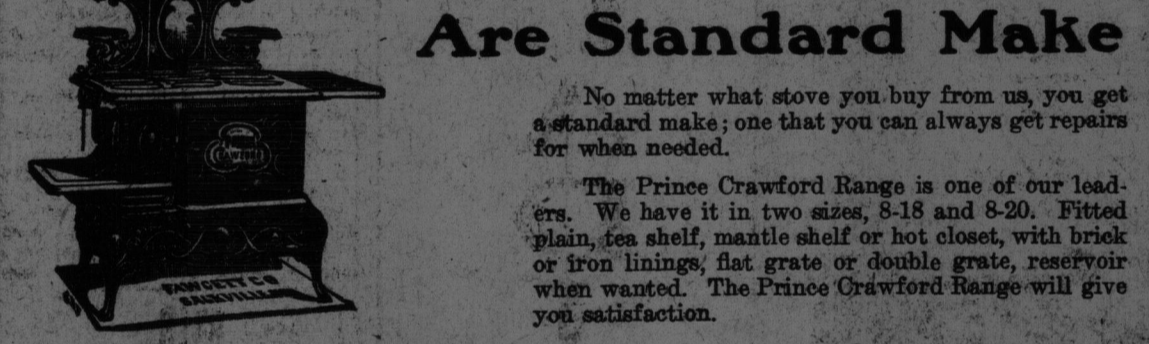



QUEBEC GIVES MONEY FOR IMMIGRATION WORK Sherbrooke, Que., March 20—At a luncheon of the Eastern Townships Associated Boards of Trade, Hon. George Eric, and Hon. P. S. G. MacKenzie were the principal speakers. The provincial treasurer said that the government granted the petition of the boards, which asked \$2,000 per annum for maintenance of a central office in Sherbrooke which all immigration and repatriation work would be directed, the secretary of a special Eastern Townships office in England and Scotland as well as in New England states, \$5,000 for assisted passage to farm help from the old country. All this work will be carried on by the Eastern Townships Immigration Society, a branch of the associated boards.

CONDENSED DESPATCHES The Prince of Wales, who arrived at Christiania yesterday, realized \$605,570 from his Duchy of Cornwall estates last year, as compared with \$788,680 in 1912. Of this sum, \$465,722 goes to swell the prince's cochequer. One of the largest cotton crops ever grown, amounting to 14,137,269 equivalent to 200 pound bales of lint and 689,785 of linters, was produced by the farmers of the United States during 1913. Dawson, Yukon Territory, March 20—This city is preparing to install city owned telephones, water, light and power plants. There also is an agitation against annexation of the Yukon Territory to British Columbia. E. G. Berry, chief of police at Brandon, Man., will be the new chief of the Regina force, at a salary of \$5,000 for the first year. The Lachine, Que., council last night voted to insure civic employees against accident and death, free cost to the workers. About thirty will be affected. The plan will cost the city \$800 a year. The impeachment of the Japanese cabinet on account of the recent naval scandals was petitioned for today by the opposition party in the Japanese chamber of deputies. The conference of the trans-Atlantic shipping companies broke up today without reaching any settlement. The representatives of the British and continental steamship companies decided to adjourn until May 1. J. A. Fabians, a farmer living near Oak Park, Georgia, today killed his wife and two daughters as they slept, set fire to his home and several other farm buildings and then fired a bullet through his forehead. Physicians say he cannot live. The Copper River and Northwestern railway between Cordova and Chitina, Alaska, is blocked by snow and no mail has been received or dispatched to the interior since March 10.

Two British warships arrived here today, equipped for actual service. One thousand armed troops are being poured into Ulster from the west of Ireland to meet any hostile movement on the part of Unionists, led by Sir Edward Carson, Capt. James Craig, Sir George Richardson and other radical leaders of the anti-home rule force. The transfer of troops into the north of Ireland, after the British cabinet had decided against such action, indicated a change of attitude on the part of the government.

EXECUTED AND HEADS CARRIED THROUGH STREETS Mexico City, Mex., March 20—Lieut. Felix Belders and six Federal soldiers, were captured by rebels at Arroyo, state of Sonora, Mexico. The seven men were decapitated and their heads carried through the streets on poles. One pole bore the severed head of a Federal soldier. "All people who help the rebels will meet the same fate."

REFERENDUM WILL NOT BE GRANTED (Continued from page 1.) It is said that the government has assured the Nationalist leaders that Bonar Law's referendum offer will not be accepted. "The effect of last night's debate," says the Morning Post, "can only be to aggravate what is already a serious crisis. In face of the gravity of the situation the solemn trifling of the premier's speech is nothing less than deplorable. The government may not mean to deliberately provoke Ulster, but it can hardly be surprised if most people feel with Carson that their present tactics amount to something like gambling with human lives." The Daily Telegraph says: "We have got to what is by far the worst phase of this black business. The coalition are in the mood for a policy of reckless violence, while over Ireland the cloud of civil war hangs blacker than at any earlier moment. Our information leaves us doubt that a plan for breaking Ulster, for provoking an outbreak and crushing it in blood, is in existence. If Britain's aim is to set it right, it will come as the result of such a policy."

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"HOLY GHOSTS" TO TAKE NEGROES TO AFRICA FOR COLONY

Mystery Ship Curityba, Which Has Arrived in Portland, is to Leave For Gold Coast With Sanford Converts

Says a Portland, Me., despatch—The mystery which surrounded the coming of the Cuban steamer Curityba to Portland is cleared. The ship arrived in this port with 22 negroes and seven white men. While "Chief" Sam (Alfred Charles Sam), a negro of the African gold coast, had not arrived, it is known that he plans to take a large number of African negroes to Africa and there establish a colony in the land of their ancestors. "to escape persecution and worship God in peace."

"Chief" Sam is a convert to the Holy Ghost and Us Society, having been converted some years ago when the Rev. Frank W. Sanford visited the African Gold Coast. While the stockholders in the Akim Trading Co. Limited are religiously affiliated with the famous Maine religious organization it is claimed that the followers of Sanford are not interested financially in "Chief" Sam's movement.

It was learned that the Curityba came to Portland through the efforts of a local man and because the followers of "Chief" Sam had believed that they had not been fairly dealt with in Brooklyn, N. Y.

The ship will be thoroughly overhauled and fitted here for the trip to the African coast and while she may take all the converts on board here it is probable that she will take others from southern ports.

The letter received by a Portland man interested in the coast business stated that the Curityba would take 1,000 passengers when she sailed from Portland, but this statement is doubted as the Curityba is only a 1,600 ton ship.

Capt. L. S. McKennie, who was in command of the Curityba on the trip from New York to Portland, came ashore soon after her arrival and entered the ship as arriving at the customs house. He said that the ship had come to Portland light and was not taking out any cargo from there, but he refused to answer several questions asked by customs officials and had evidently left instructions to those on board to "keep their mouths shut" as a reporter was refused permission to go on board the Curityba and a dozen negroes, who appeared on deck and peered over the rail of the vessel said that the interviewer would have to see the captain for any information regarding the ship or those on board.

Formerly on Barracouts

Capt. McKennie, formerly commanded the Holy Ghost and Us Society Steam yacht Barracouts, which is now at anchor in the upper harbor. Shortly after the Curityba had dropped her mud hook off the Eastern Promenade two small boats from the Holy Ghost and Us Society proceeded down the harbor and men from the Sanford yachts boarded the new arrival. Later Capt. McKennie was brought ashore in the Sanford's power boat and called at the custom house.

The man left in charge of the boat bringing Captain McKennie ashore refused to give out any information and would not even admit that he had brought the captain ashore.

At any rate all those on board the Curityba have cultivated the Holy Ghost's ability to retain a sphinxlike silence when asked for information.

Captain McKennie said that he completed his contract by bringing the Curityba to Portland, but further than saying that there were twenty two negroes and seven white men on board, and that the ship came to Portland light and would not take out cargo he refused to make any comment to customs officers. He did, however, admit that the ship had been bought by the Akim Trading Company for about \$60,000.

The twenty-two negroes and seven white men on board the ship came to Portland as the crew and it is reported that others will come to Portland by rail and join the vessel here for the trip to Africa.

"Billy" Sunday, baseball evangelist, invited to New York to draw a crowd for the evangelistic committee at its opening at Carnegie Hall, certainly delivered the goods. As far as bringing his slang battery with him is concerned "he was there with bells."

One naturally drops into slang in recording the coming of the evangelist to the diamond. There were three thousand church members there, who had vaguely heard some of the expressions which the speaker used and some of them no doubt looked up others in the slang dictionary after they went home. The Rev. William Sabath and "Billy" Sunday played hide and seek all through the sermon. He took a text from Matthew, being the words "it is I," and he kept it to his indignity.

His discourse was devoted principally to pointing out to church members their general sloth and lack of zeal in extending the membership. The hitting average of some of the professors of religion was very low, in his opinion.

No evangelist ever came to New York with a more rapid delivery than did "Billy" Sunday. The words of his address at times telescoped as they went over the home plate. In a given space of time he can get by with more words than the minute that customary. If there had been many baseball fans present he would have won the hearts of all of them by that opening sentence of his, to the effect that he had not faced a crowd in New York for twenty years and that was when he played once at the Polo Ground.

A Harsh Blow.
It was too much. Every Sunday old Adams, who blew the organ, would continue blowing after the music had stopped, thereby producing most undesirable sounds.

Time and again had the organist taken him to task for it.

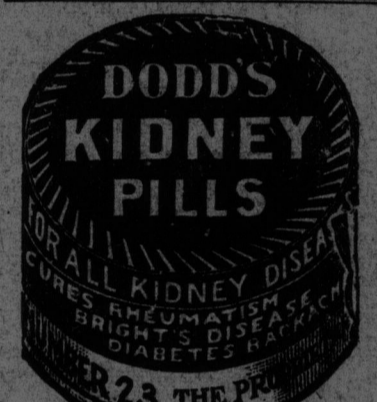

THE MORNING TUB

It seems rather strange in these days that a doctor should make a definite pronouncement against bathing, says the Westminster Gazette. But in the American Journal Health and Culture we find Dr. Elmer Lee, who is well known in America, writing seriously against the morning tub:—"Bathing is an acquired habit, unnecessary and even harmful. Cold or hot water showers or sprays, and any form of immersion, will be injurious in the end. Man is an air animal, not a water-beast. A bathtub is an enemy in the house. It is expensive and adds to the toll of women. Bathing begets false security against disease, weakens and injures the skin, extracts bodily energy and magnetism, and entails on society a needless habit. All of which sounds very dreadful, but not the least convincing. As a matter of fact bathing is not absolutely necessary to health. The Lapplanders and Eskimoes, who do as little washing as possible, are healthy and strong. On the other hand, the Japanese, who like ourselves, are fanatical for the bath, boil themselves daily, yet have exceptional strength and endurance. Frequent hot baths seem to do them no harm. An American writer suggests that one objection to the hot bath would be overcome if people would make a practice of always oiling the body thoroughly after the bath. This has, of course, been the practice in the east for thousands of years, and the Greeks and the Romans followed it. But it does not sound very pleasant, and the average man who followed it would certainly jump into his bath again, after the experiment."
