#### SESSION XLIV.

#### DIET I.

At Toronto, and within St. Andrew's Church there;—Wednesday, the Seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one years:—

Which day the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland met, according to appointment, after sermon by the Rev. Solomon Mylne, Minister of Smith's Falls, retiring Moderator, on this text, Isaiah XXXII. 2; "And a man shall be as an hiding place from the wind, and a covert from the tempest; as rivers of water in a dry place; as the shadow of a great rock in a weary land;" and was constituted with prayer by the said Rev. The Synod, having learned that, during the past year, no fewer than six of their number have been removed by death, agree to express their deep sense of the loss which the Church has sustained by the removal of these brethren; and in their removal would humbly and devoutly acknowledge the hand of Him who does all things wisely and well.

THE LATE REV. HUGH URQUHART, D.D.

In the death of the Rev. **Hugh Urquhart,** D.D., the Synod has to lament the loss of the oldest acting Minister of this Church, and of one who was as venerable for his sterling qualities as for his years. A pastor of the same congregation for nearly half a century, he acquired the warm attachment and entire confidence of his people; and the esteem in which he was held by them, as well as by his fellow-townsmen, gave rise to a more than ordinary manifestation of feeling at his death and funeral. A member of this Court ever since its formation, he contributed much to the harmonious and judicious character of its proceedings, and his brethren who met with him at our annual meetings will long retain a pleasing recollection of his prudence and large experience, his intellectual culture and gentlemanly bearing, his good sense and genuine piety.

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THE LATE REV. JAMES GEORGE, D.D.

The Rev. James Ceorge, D.D., held a high position in this Church both as a Minister and as a Professor of Theology in Queen's College. As a Minister, he laboured for many years at Scarboro' with great success, and latterly at Stratford, where the cause of our Church revived and flourished under his ministrations, and where his memory will long be fondly cherished. As a Professor, he manifested a deep and tender interest in the welfare of his students not only while under his charge, but throughout their subsequent career. His lectures were clear, thoughtful, and practical; and his method of presenting the truths which he taught was in a high degree calculated to awaken the enthusiasm and arouse the energies of the young. The keenness of his intellect, the earnestness of his manner, the vigour of his language and the force of his convictions made his pulpit services eminently impressive: nor was he less distinguished for the zeal and fidelity with which he discharged the other duties of a christian pastor.

THE LATE REV. GEORGE THOMSON, M.A.

The Synod resolved to place on record the high estimation in which the late Rev. **George Thomson,** M.A., was held as a faithful labourer in the vineyard of our Lord. During the nineteen years of his incumbency of McNab and Horton, he won and retained the confidence of his own congregation and the respect of the whole community where he resided. His memory will be fondly cherished by many for his genial disposition and his abilities as a minister of the gospel.

THE LATE REV. GEORGE MACDONNELL.

The Rev. **Ceorge Macdonnell,** for 18 years a minister of our Church in this Province, has been removed in the midst of his labours, and when years of usefulness seemed still before him. Mr. Macdonnell was one of our most devoted Ministers; sincere in his piety, gentle in his disposition, quiet in his demeanour, genial in all his intercourse with the brethren, and taking, as he did, a deep interest in the religious education of the young, and in home as well as foreign missionary efforts, he was universally esteemed, and has gone from amongst us regretted by all.

THE LATE REV. ALEX. WALLACE, B.A.

The Rev. Alexander Wallace, B.A., was cut down suddenly in the midst of his usefulness. As Minister of Huntingdon, to which charge he was ordained in 1845, and where he continued to labour with faithfulness and acceptance till his lamented death, Mr. Wallace was held in high estimation for his many excellent and amiable qualities both as a christian and minister of the gospel.

The late Rev. **John Barr** entered on the ministry at a late period in life, and was not long spared to perform the duties of the pastoral office which he loved, but during his few years of service he was enabled to do a good work for his Master, carrying into the ministry the same conscientiousness, humility, and kindliness which had characterized him in private life. He never made an enemy and he gained the love and respect of his brethren in the ministry, of his congregation, and of the community in which he lived.

#### ELECTION OF MODERATOR.

It was moved by Mr. Mann, seconded by Mr. Robert Campbell, and carried unanimously, That the Rev. Duncan Morrison, M.A., Minister of Owen Sound, be Moderator for the year; and he being present took the chair and thanked the House.

#### THANKS TO THE RETIRING MODERATOR.

On motion of Dr. Jenkins, seconded by Mr. Mann, and passed unanimously, the Moderator tendered to Mr. Mylne, retiring Moderator, the thanks of the Synod for the appropriate discourse preached by him this day and for his whole conduct as Moderator.

#### COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS.

The Moderator, the Clerk and Mr. George Bell were appointed a Committee to arrange the order of business that may come before the Court.

#### HOURS OF MEETING.

It was agreed to adopt the following hours of meeting during the present session, with a view to afford more time for the meetings of Committees than has hitherto been allotted, viz:—in the forenoon, from twelve to one; in the afternoon, from three to half-past five o'clock; and in the evening, from half-past seven to the close of the Diet.

There was also read a lengthened reply to the Synod's Address of last year to His Excellency the Governor General.

# TRUSTEES OF QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.

The Synod proceeded to the election of three Trustees of the University of Queen's College in room of the Rev. George Bell, the Rev. Dr. Jenkins and the Rev. D. M. Gordon, who retired pursuant to the

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terms of the Royal Charter; when it was unanimously agreed to re elect these members of the Board of Trustees of Queen's College.

## REPORT OF THE TEMPORALITIES' BOARD.\*

The Synod next called for the Report and accompanying financial statements of the Board of Managers of the Temporalities' Fund. These were presented by the Secretary, Mr. Croil, and referred for consideration to a Committee consisting of Mr. Robert Burnet, Convener, Messrs. Tawse, Mylne, Livingstone, M. W. McLean, James S. Hunter, Macmurchy (Nottawasaga), Macmurchy (Toronto), with instructions to report to-morrow.

# BILL ANENT PRESBYTERIAL PROCEDURE ON DEATH OF A MINISTER.

There were read Returns on the Bill anent proceedings to be taken by a Presbytery on the death of a Minister, sent down by the Synod at last meeting to Presbyteries for consideration, from the Presbyteries of Perth, Ottawa, Victoria and Saugeen, expressing approval simpliciter, and from the Presbytery of Kingston, suggesting an amendment to the same. Inasmuch as a majority of Presbyteries have not intimated dissent, the Moderator, in terms of the Barrier Act, declared this Bill to be passed into a permanent enactment of the Church.

#### RETURNS ON BOOK OF CHURCH POLITY.

There were also produced and read Returns on Books II. and III. of the Form of Church Polity, sent down by the Synod at last meeting to Presbyteries for consideration, from the Presbyteries of Perth and Kingston, expressing approval simpliciter, and from the Presbyteries of Montreal, Ottawa and Saugeen, recommending that the same with certain specified amendments be passed into a permanent enactment. These Returns were referred to the Committee on Form of Church Polity, with instructions to give attention to the suggestions embodied in them and Report at a subsequent Diet.

# REPORTS OF DELEGATES TO OTHER CHURCHES.

Mr. Smith, on behalf of the Deputation appointed at last meeting to wait on the General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church, convened in Toronto, and convey to that body the Christian and fraternal greetings of this Synod, reported that they had fulfilled this appointment and had received a cordial welcome from that Court.

Dr. Jenkins, one of the Delegates appointed at last meeting to attend the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America and reopen friendly communications with that Church, reported that the Delegates had been prevented by circumstances from fulfilling the appointment intrusted to them.

Mr. Clark, Convener of the Committee appointed to consider the propriety of originating a Mission to the Province of Manitobah, made a verbal Report, whereupon the following motion was proposed by Mr. Macdonnell, seconded by Mr. McGillivray and passed unanimously; Approve the report; discharge the Committee with thanks; and remit the subject to the Committee on the British Columbia Mission, with the recommendation that they procure, if possible, a Missionary for some part of Manitobah.

## REPORT ON MISSION TO BRITISH COLUMBIA.\*

Professor Mowat, Convener of the Committee on Mission to British Columbia, presented the annual Report. After lengthened discussion, further consideration of the subjects embraced in said Report and questions cognate thereto was postponed until a subsequent Diet.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning at noon, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

The Rev. Dr. Jenkins was elected Chairman, and Messrs. W. C. Clark and Alexander Mackay were re-elected members of the Board of Managers of the Sustentation Fund.

# REPORT OF THE WIDOWS' FUND.\*

The twenty-third annual Report of the Board of Managers of the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund, together with the Treasurer's financial statements, was called for and read by Mr. Robert Campbell, Chairman. At Toronto, and within St. Andrew's Church there; Friday, the ninth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one years:—

Which day the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland met pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with prayer.

Devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. Robert Chambers. The minutes of yesterday's Diet were read and sustained.

#### DAY OF THANKSGIVING.

The Moderator intimated that he had received a telegraphic despatch from the General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church, recommending that Thursday, November 16th, be observed as a day of Thanksgiving, and requesting the concurrence of this Synod in setting apart that day for this purpose. The Synod unanimously resolved to concur with the Canada Presbyterian Church in the observance of said day as a day of Thanksgiving.

#### REPORT OF TEMPORALITIES' BOARD.

Mr. Robert Burnet, Convener of the Committee appointed to consider the Report and financial statements of the Temporalities' Board, gave in a report. Said report is as follows:—

The Committee beg leave to report to the Synod—

1. That, after having carefully examined the documents committed to their oversight, they find them correct and very satisfactory in the shape in which they are presented.

2. That the Synod should express hearty acknowledgement of the care which has characterized the discharge of their duties on the part of the Board. The statement of Revenue and Expenditure for the next half-year is clear and gratifying.

3. That the Synod should express their great satisfaction at the consolidation of the monetary affairs of the Board, exhibited by the fact that there had been so little necessity for change in the investments. The Committee, however, cannot refrain from calling the attention of the Synod to a feature of the investments, which has more or less impressed them, viz., the large amount of investments in two of the Banks in Montreal. They feel sensibly alive to the necessity of the utmost caution with regard to a large investment in any particular Institution, from the lesson taught by the double amount originally invested in the Commercial Bank. They would respectfully suggest that

4. That the Synod should approve of the change in By-law

5. That the Synod should express the pleasure entertained by members of Court that the Contingent Fund has been merged in a scheme likely to further and successfully carry out the objects originally contemplated by its introduction.

6. That the Committee, in common with the Board, regret the loss which the Church and Board have sustained in the

lamented decease of Dr. Urquhart.

7. That the Committee respectfully suggest that Dr. Jenkins and Mr. Lang be added to the Board in place of the late Dr. Urquhart and Dr. Barclay, to secure as far as possible a quorum in Montreal for any business of emergency.

The Synod unanimously agreed to decern in terms of the report and elected the Rev. Dr. Jenkins, the Rev. Gavin Lang, the Hon. Alexander Morris and William Darling, Esq., members of the Temporalities' Board, in room of those who retire pursuant to the terms of the Act of Incorporation.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON UNION.\*

Principal Snodgrass, Convener of the Committee appointed to confer with similar Committees of other Presbyterian Churches in the Dominion on the desirableness and practicability of Union, presented a report, embodying the Minutes of the Conference held on this subject at Montreal with representatives of the Canada Presbyterian Church, the Presbyterian Church of the Maritime Provinces in connection with the Church of Scotland, and the Presbyterian Church of the Lower Provinces. The Synod, after hearing explanations on the several points embraced in this report from those members of the Committee who were now present, resolved to go into Committee of the whole House. The Moderator called on Mr. George Bell to take the chair. After lengthened discussion, it was moved by Dr. Jenkins, seconded by Mr. James Gordon:—That the Synod adopt the articles comprising what is termed the Basis of Union for the United Church, to be known under the name of the "Presbyterian Church of British North America," viz.:—

- That the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testament, being the infallible Word of God, are the supreme standard of faith and manners.
- 2. That the Westminster Confession of Faith shall be the subordinate standard of this Church; it being understood, (1). That full liberty of opinion in regard to the power and duty of the Civil Magistrate in matters of religion, as set forth in said Confession, be allowed; and (2).

\*Appendix M.

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That the use of the Shorter Catechism be enjoined as an authoritative exposition of doctrine for the instruction of the people.

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3. That this Church shall maintain fraternal relations with Presbyterian Churches holding the same doctrine and government and discipline; and that Ministers and Probationers shall be received into the Church, subject to such regulations as the Church may from time to time adopt.

To this it was moved in amendment by Mr. Lang and seconded by Mr. Macdonnell, That the articles in question be adopted as the Basis of Union, with the third article amended so as to read as follows:—
"That this Church shall maintain fraternal relations with Churches holding substantially the same doctrine, and that Ministers and Probationers shall be received into the Church, subject to such regulations as the Church may from time to time adopt."

A vote having been taken, the motion was carried by a large majority and became the resolution of the Committee. The Moderator having resumed the chair, the Committee reported progress, and the Synod unanimously concurred in the resolution of the Committee. The consideration of the remaining portion of the Report of the Committee was adjourned until to-morrow.

# REPORT ON THE "PRESBYTERIAN."

Mr. Croil, Convener of the Committee appointed to consider the propriety of entering into negotiations with the "Lay Association of Montreal" with a view to render the "Presbyterian" more directly the organ of the Church, gave in a report. Said report is as follows:—

The Committee beg leave to report—

That, with a view of extending the circulation of the "Presbyterian" and rendering it helpful to the various Schemes of the Church, it is recommended that the Synod appoint a Committee to confer with the "Lay Association of Montreal," for the purpose of ascertaining whether the Association are willing to transfer the management of the paper along with the pecuniary responsibilities therewith connected to the Synod. And further, that, in the event of the Association agreeing to this proposal. the said Committee have full power to effect the said transfer and to take charge of the publication of the "Presbyterian" from the 1st January next, and to report to the next meeting of Synod. It being understood (1) that a reduction shall be made in the price of the publication; (2) that greater publicity shall be given to the proceedings of Presbyteries and to the reports of the Conveners of the several Schemes of the Church; and (3) to the acknowledgment of individual contributions to the said Schemes, all of which announcements shall be regarded as advertisements and be paid for by the Conveners of Committees, on a uniform scale or tariff proportionate to the amount required for defraying the annual expenses of the publication.

On motion of Mr. Clark, seconded by Mr. D. P. Niven, the Synod unanimously resolved to receive and adopt the report now read; appoint the members of the Presbytery of Montreal to be the Committee referred to therein, Mr. Lang to be Convener; and record their warm thanks to the "Lay Association of Montreal," the publishing Committee of the "Presbyterian," and especially the Editor, Mr. Brymner, for the manner in which during a lengthened period they have maintained and conducted a paper so conducive to the interests of the Church as the "Presbyterian" has proved to be.

#### SCHOLARSHIP AND BURSARY SCHEME.\*

The Report of the Committee on the Scholarship and Bursary Scheme, having been called for, was presented by Dr. Williamson, Convener, and read. Whereupon it was moved by Mr. Ross (Chatham), seconded by Mr. Cameron, and passed unanimously, That the Synod receive the report; thank the Committee for their diligence; regret the decrease in the contributions to the Fund during the past year; enjoin Presbyteries to press on congregations the importance of making a collection for the scheme; urge individual Ministers to seek out and encourage young men of piety to dedicate themselves to the work of the Ministry; and reappoint the Committee with the addition of Professor Ferguson and George Macdonnell, Esq., B.A.

#### FRENCH MISSION SCHEME.

The Report of the Committee on the French Mission Scheme was given in by the Convener, Dr. Jenkins, and read. After due libera-

## MISSION TO THE LUMBERMEN.\*

Mr. D. M. Gordon, Convener, presented and read the annual Report of the Committee appointed to manage the Mission to the Lumbermen in the valley of the Ottawa and its tributaries. It was moved by Principal Snodgrass, seconded by the Rev. William Cochrane, and passed unanimously, That the report of the Committee be received; that the thanks of the Synod be tendered to the Convener and other members of the Committee, as well as to the brethren who have been engaged in the work of the Mission; that the Committee be re-appointed; and that five hundred copies of the Report be printed for general circulation in the interests of the Mission.

#### REPORT ON WIDOWS' FUND.

Mr. Lindsay, Convener of the Committee appointed to consider the Report of the Managers of the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund, gave in a report. Said report is as follows:—

The Committee recommend to the Synod the following as a deliverance—

That the Synod receive the report; rejoice in the prosperity of the Fund; recommend it anew to the liberality of the Church; approve of the diligence and zeal of the Board in the management of their trust; and especially thank Archibald Ferguson, Esq., for his unwearied zeal as Treasurer of the Fund.

That the Synod express regret that so many congregations have failed to take up collections for so important a Fund, and anew urge upon Presbyteries the duty of attending to this matter and taking the necessary steps to have collections taken up in all the congregations within the bounds.

That the Synod recommend that, instead of giving a bonus for the current year to annuitants, as proposed by the Board, such an increase be made in the annual allowances as the state of the Fund may warrant.

That the Synod recommend the Board to take the legal steps necessary to permit it to increase the annual income of the Fund

to thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000).

The Synod unanimously resolved to decern in terms of this report.

#### ARRANGEMENTS FOR COMMUNION SERVICE.

The Moderator announced that the hour of three o'clock in the afternoon of to-morrow had been recommended by the Committee on arrangements as a suitable hour for the Synodical observance of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. The recommendation was adopted and the Moderator was requested to preside at the administration of the solemn ordinance.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place on Monday morning at half-past ten o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

Devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. James Fraser.

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The Minutes of Saturday's Diet and of the Sabbath's Communion Services were read and sustained.

# REPORT OF THE EXAMINING COMMITTEE.

The report of the Examining Committee was presented by Mr. Ross (Chatham), Secretary, bearing that the Committee have carefully examined Mr. P. S. Livingston, who was referred to them, on the prescribed subjects of examination; and that they have been highly satisfied with his proficiency and attainments. In terms of the recommendation of the Committee, the Synod granted leave to the Presbytery of Toronto to take Mr. Livingston on public probationary trials for License.

Further, the Committee reported favourably on the application of Mr. Robert Laing; and the Synod unanimously agreed to accord to Mr. Laing the status of a student of Divinity, who has completed two years of the Theological curriculum.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON UNION.

The Synod resumed consideration of the Report of the Committee on negotiations for Union with other Presbyterian Churches. On motion to that effect, the Synod resolved itself into Committee of the whole House, with Mr. George Bell in the chair. The Committee unanimously agreed to send a telegraphic despatch to the General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church, intimating the intention of the Synod, when reappointing the Committee, to enlarge it so that it shall consist of six Ministers and six Elders.

The Synod unanimously agreed to accept the recommendation of the Montreal Conference in regard to Collegiate Education, viz:—

The joint Committee resolve to recommend that the earnest attention of the United Church should be given, at the earliest possible moment, to secure the maintenance in thorough efficiency of a Presbyterian University and of such Theological Halls as may be found requisite to provide the necessary facilities for the education of the Ministers of the Church in the various Provinces of British North America.

The Committee further resolved to appoint a Committee, consisting of Dr. Snodgrass, Convener, Dr. Jenkins, Messrs. James Bain, George Bell, Kenneth Maclennan, Macdonnell, D. M. Gordon, James S. Mullan, Cameron; Croil, Macdougall, Craig, with instructions to prepare a Scheme for the disposal of the Temporalities' Fund after vested rights shall have lapsed, and to present the same to-morrow morning.

The Committee rose and reported progress to the Synod.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning at half past ten o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

A Missionary Meeting, addressed by the Rev. Dr. Jenkins, Messrs. Tanner, Lang, James B. Mullan, Sieveright and Croil, was held this evening under the auspices of the Synod.

The Rev. John Malloy, of Lingwick, a Minister of the Canada Presbyterian Church, being present, was asked to sit and deliberate with the Court.

ADDRESSES TO THE QUEEN\* AND GOVERNOR GENERAL +

Addresses to Her Majesty the Queen and His Excellency the Governor General were read, adopted and ordered to be transmitted in the usual way.

#### DELEGATE TO THE C. P. ASSEMBLY.

The Rev. Dr. Cook was appointed a Delegate to convey to the General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church, now convened in Quebec, the Christian and brotherly greetings of this Synod.

#### REPORT ON PRESBYTERY RECORDS.

Mr. John S. Burnet, Convener of the Committee appointed to revise Presbytery Records, gave in a report, which was read. Said report is of the following tenor :-

The Committee, appointed to revise Presbytery Records, beg leave to report as follows:

1. That the Records of the Presbyteries of Montreal, Glengary, Ottawa, Perth, Kingston, Victoria and Saugeen have been carefully and correctly kept.

2. That in the Record of the Presbytery of Toronto, at page 171, it appears that the Presbytery agreed to proceed with the settlement of a Minister, although the usual guarantee of stipend had not been obtained.

3. That in the Record of the Presbytery of London the dates of meetings are not inserted in words at length in the following cases: June 29, 1870; July 5, 1870; January 4, 1871.

4. That in the Record of the Presbytery of Quebec it appears that at the meetings of June 3rd and 4th, 1870, Mr. Bennett acted as Clerk pro tem., but there is no minute of his appointment to said office.

5. That in the Record of the Presbytery of Hamilton dates, &c., are frequently inserted in figures instead of words at length.

# REFERENCE FROM THE PRESBYTERY OF HAMILTON.

There was read a Reference from the Presbytery of Hamilton, transmitted by the Committee on References, Complaints and Appeals. In accordance with the deliverance recommended by the Committee, the Synod unanimously decerned as follows:—

That the Presbytery, as appears from an Extract Minute, dated April 19, 1871, transmitting this Reference to the Synod, condemned the conduct of the Managers of St. Andrews' Church, Fergus, in shutting the Church against the Members of Presbytery. In this condemnation the Synod concur and thus far sustain the reference. Further, the Presbytery, in the same Extract Minute, expressed their opinion that parties ineligible had been elected Trustees of the congregation. The Synod fail to discover the grounds on which the Presbytery arrived at this conclusion.

#### MEMORIAL FROM FERGUS.

There was next taken up a Memorial from certain Elders and Managers of St. Andrew's Church, Fergus, accompanied with a deliverance suggested to the Synod by the Committee on Complaints. Papers in connection with the case were read and parties heard in support of the same. It was moved by Mr. James B. Mullan and seconded by Mr. Robert Campbell, That the Synod decern in terms of the deliverance recommended by the Committee. To this it was moved in amendment by Mr. Alexander Mackay and seconded by Mr. Cochrane, That the report of the Committee be received and laid upon the table; that Principal Snodgrass, the Rev. Gavin Lang and Mr. Croil be appointed with full Synodical powers, in accordance with the recommendation of the report, to take such steps as may secure a speedy arrangement of existing difficulties, and may result in the early settlement of a Minister over the congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Fergus; and that the Synod reserve a deliverance on the rest of the report until the said Commission report to the next meeting of Synod. The roll having been called and the votes marked, the amendment was carried by a majority of voices and the Moderator declared the same to be the judgment of the House.

# REPORT ON APPLICATIONS FOR LEAVE TO RETIRE.

Mr. Robert Campbell, Convener of the Committee for considering the applications of Ministers for leave to retire, gave in a report. In terms of its recommendations, the following deliverance was unanimously adopted by the Synod, That the Synod accede to the request of the Rev. William Barr, and permit him to retire from the active duties of

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ates, ls at the Ministry, retaining his full allowance from the Temporalities' Fund. That the same privilege be extended to the Rev. Dr. Barclay; and that, while granting it, the Synod record their appreciation of the many and valuable services he has rendered to the Church—their deep sorrow for the occasion of his making this application—their sincere sympathy with him in his affliction—and their earnest prayer for his speedy and entire recovery. That with regard to the application of the Rev. Archibald Walker, late Minister of Belleville, in the circumstances of the case, the Temporalities' Board be advised to grant him two hundred dollars (\$200,) annually for three years, on condition of his producing testimonials satisfactory to the Board; but that, as he is no longer under their jurisdiction, the Synod have no power to facilitate his retirement from the active duties of the Ministry.

Further, in regard to the Rev. John Whyte, whose leave to retire from the active duties of the Ministry for three years, with the retention of his allowance from the Temporalities' Fund, expires at the present meeting, and from whom no application for an extension of the term has been received, the Synod agree to grant him his full allowance as a Commuting Minister for another year, and instruct the Secretary of the Temporalities' Board to correspond with Mr. Whyte as to the state of his health and intentions for the future, and to report to next meeting of Synod.

The Rev William Johnson appeared and made a statement to the Synod to the effect that his health was much restored and that he hoped, in the kind providence of God, soon to be able to resume active duty as a Minister. In these circumstances, the Synod instructed the Clerk to communicate with the Temporalities' Board, and direct them to pay to Mr. Johnson his full allowance from the Fund for another year.

# REPORT ON CORRESPONDENCE WITH THE COLONIAL COMMITTEE.\*

Mr. Mackerras, in the absence of the Convener, presented and read the annual Report of the Committee appointed to correspond with the Colonial Committee of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. It was moved by Mr. Livingstone, seconded by Mr. James B. Muir, and passed unanimously, That the Synod adopt the report; renew the expression of their warm thanks to the Colonial Committee for the generous aid which they have accorded to the weak congregations and mission-fields of this Church; and reappoint the Committee, with Mr. Mackerras as Convener, and Mr. Lang as a member in room of Dr. Barclay.

The roll having been called and the votes marked, the amendment carried by a majority of 26 to 25, and the Moderator declared the same to be the judgment of the House.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON UNION.

Principal Snodgrass gave in a report from the Committee appointed to prepare a Scheme for the disposal of the Temporalities' Fund, after such rights as are declared to be vested shall have lapsed. The Synod resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House to consider the same, with Dr. Jenkins in the chair. After lengthened discussion, the proposals suggested by the Committee were amended in some particulars, and on motion of Mr. Tanner, seconded by Mr. Smith, the report thus amended was adopted. The Committee rose, reported progress, and the Synod unanimously concurred in the resolution of the Committee. The finding, thus adopted, is as follows:—

As regards the Temporalities' Fund—Resolved that it shall remain, as at present, in the hands of a Board, the membership of which shall be continued after the consummation of the Union by the remanent members having power to fill vacancies caused by death, resignation or otherwise, and the administration of the Fund shall continue on the same principles and for the same purposes as at present until all vested rights shall have lapsed, and these rights shall be held to be the following:-(1) The annual receipt by Ministers now receiving four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450), four hundred dollars (\$400), or two hundred dollars (\$200), of the same amount during their lifetime and good standing in the Church; (2) the annual receipt of two thousand dollars (\$2000) by the Treasurer of Queen's College; and (3) the annual receipt of two hundred dollars (\$200) by all other Ministers who shall be on the Synod Roll at the time of the Union, and by all recognized Probationers and Licentiates, during their lifetime and good standing in the Church. That so soon as the Fund, or any part of it, shall no longer be required for these purposes, it shall be appropriated (1) to the formation of a Fund for the benefit of Aged and Infirm Ministers of the United Church, retired from the active duties of the Ministry with the sanction of the said Church, in the proportion of six-ninths; (2) for the maintenance and extension of the Theological Faculty of Queen's College in the proportion of two-ninths; (3) to the

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Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the said United Church, in the proportion of one-ninth:—these calculations to be based on a capital Fund of four hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$450,000); and the residue over and above this amount, up to forty thousand dollars (\$40,000), to be devoted to the maintenance of the Theological Faculty of Morrin College. Resolved further with regard to the Sustentation Fund of this Synod, the object of which is to provide an annual allowance of two hundred dollars (\$200) to every Minister on the Synod Roll, to whom the benefit of the Temporalities' Fund does not yet extend, that it be recommended that the payment of the said annual allowance of two hundred dollars (\$200) to every such Minister shall be the first charge on the Home Mission Fund of the United Church.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning at ten o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

The Minutes of yesterday's Diet were read and sustained.

CORRESPONDENTS TO THE SYNOD OF NOVA SCOTIA AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

Messrs. Robert Campbell and Macdonnell were named Correspondents to the Synod of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; and the Clerk was instructed to grant commissions to any other members of the Court, who may desire to attend the ensuing meeting of that Synod.

The Rev. James B. Duncan, a Minister of the Canada Presbyterian Church, being present, was invited to sit and deliberate with the Court.

# DEPUTATION TO THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.

The Synod had their attention directed to the propriety of appointing, in the present circumstances of this Church, a Deputation to wait on the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland at the next meeting of that Venerable Court. Whereupon the following resolution was unanimously adopted: Whereas this Church has ever cherished and does still cherish devoted attachment towards the Church of Scotland; and whereas at any time it would be appropriate to

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convey by Deputation to the Mother Church an expression of our filial affection and profound esteem, but in the prospect of a Union of all the Presbyterian Churches throughout the Dominion of Canada it is especially becoming thus to express our devotion and our desire for her continued sympathy—be it resolved that this Synod appoint, and they do hereby appoint, John Cook, D.D., Minister of St. Andrew's Church, Quebec, William Snodgrass, D.D., Principal of the University of Queen's College at Kingston, John Jenkins, D.D., Minister of St. Paul's Church, Montreal, and James Croil, Esq., Montreal, Agent of the Church, such Deputation, with instructions to appear before the Venerable the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland at its next annual meeting, to assure the Assembly of the undiminished attachment of this Synod to the Parent Church, and to communicate to the Assembly full information regarding the position of this Church, and especially as to the reasons which weigh with this Synod in their attempt to advance the interests of Presbyterianism in this part of the Empire by the consolidation of the several branches of the Presbyterian Church under the jurisdiction of one General Assembly.

## DELEGATE FROM C. P. ASSEMBLY.

There was produced and read an Extract Minute of the General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church, convened last year at Toronto, appointing the Rev. John Jennings, D.D., Minister of the Bay Street Church, Toronto, a Delegate to this Synod. In connection with this there was also read a communication from Dr. Jennings, regretting his inability to be present and fulfil his appointment, owing to his necessary absence at Quebec as a member of the General Assembly of this year, and expressing the sentiments of Christian esteem and brotherly regard which he individually and in his representative capacity cherishes towards this Church.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON UNION.

The Synod resumed consideration of the Report of the Committee on Union. After lengthened deliberation the following resolution was unanimously adopted: That the Synod adopt the report and record their satisfaction with the manner in which the Committee have discharged their important trust; that the thanks of the Synod are due and are hereby tendered to the members thereof and especially to the Convener; that the Committee for the present year be constituted as follows:—

The Synod further unanimously resolved to empower this Committee, in their deliberations with the Committees of the other negotiating Churches, to insert in the Basis of Union the "Larger Catechism" as one of the subordinate standards of the United Church, and to give careful consideration to such other modifications as may be proposed. The Committee are hereby instructed to report to a special meeting of Synod to be called by the Moderator on the requisition of the members of the Committee and to be convened at Toronto, in order that said meeting of Synod may be in a position, should it deem proper, to send down the report of the Committee to Presbyteries and Sessions, with a view to these sending up their opinions thereon to the next annual meeting of Synod.

#### MEMORIAL FROM FERGUS.

The Committee on Memorials and Complaints, to whom the Synod last evening sent back their report on the Memorial of the Managers of St. Andrew's Church, Fergus, with instructions to amend the same, presented the report thus amended:—

The Committee recommend the following as a deliverance in the matter referred to them :—

That the action of the Presbytery of Hamilton, at its meeting on December 21, 1870, in setting aside the deliverance of the Synod on June 7, 1870, with reference to the status of certain elders, who had received certificates of dismission from St. Andrew's Church, Fergus, is, and is hereby declared to be null and void.

That the Presbytery at its meeting on August 17, 1870, in refusing to grant moderation in a Call, exercised its undoubted right, and there appears to be no ground of complaint.

That the action of Mr. Burnet in calling and presiding over a meeting of the Kirk-Session of St. Andrew's Church, Fergus, on Oct. 17, 1870, for the purpose of electing a Representative Elder, was illegal, for the reason that Mr. Burnet had not been appointed by the Presbytery to this duty. On this account, as well as because persons, who had been declared by the Synod to be no longer elders of St. Andrews' Church, Fergus, sat and voted as members of Session, the election of Mr. Fordyce as Representative Elder is, and is hereby declared to be, invalid. The Presbytery of Hamilton is instructed to order the deletion of the minutes of said meeting.

With regard to the allegations contained in paragraphs nine,

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twelve and thirteen of the Memorial, the Synod decern that said allegations must either be withdrawn or made subject of libel before the Presbytery.

The Synod hereby appoint a Commission, consisting of Principal Snodgrass, the Rev. Gavin Lang and Mr. James Croil, with instructions to proceed to Fergus and there take such steps as to them may seem best with the view of securing a speedy arrangement of the difficulties existing in the congregation of st. Andrew's Church, Fergus, and of effecting the early settlement of a Minister in said congregation. In order that the steps, which may be taken by the said Commission, may not fail to attain these ends, the Synod invest their Commission with full Synodical powers to act in the premises, and ordain that, if need be, the said Commission may disjoin the said church and congregation from the Presbytery of Hamilton, and connect it with another Presbytery; and it shall be the duty of the Presbytery, to which the charge may be transferred, to place the same on their Roll so soon as the Commission shall intimate their decision to them; and, in order that the said Commission may have no difficulty with respect to the membership of the Session of St. Andrew's Church, the Synod hereby declare, in accordance with their deliverance at last meeting and the shewing of the Record of the Presbytery of Hamilton, of date December 21st last, that Messrs. A. S. Cadenhead and John Brockie are not members of said Session.

The Synod unanimously decerned in terms of the report, Mr. George Bell dissenting from the judgment so far as it relates to the election of Mr. Fordyce as Representative Elder.

The Rev. Andrew Kennedy, a Minister of the Canada Presbyterian Church, being present, was invited to sit and deliberate with the Court.

## SYNOD AND COMMISSION RECORDS.

The Synod heard and adopted the report of their Committee appointed to revise the Synod and Commission Records, bearing that the same have been carefully and correctly kept, and instructed their Moderator to attest them accordingly.

# JUVENILE MISSION AND SABBATH SCHOOL SCHEME.\*

The Report on the Juvenile Mission and Sabbath School Scheme having been given in and read by Professor Mowat, it was moved by Mr. Mann, seconded by Mr. Rannie, and passed unanimously, That the Synod approve the report; thank Miss Machar, the Secretary-Treasurer, for her efficient services; and appoint the following Committee to take charge of the Scheme, viz.:—Professor Mowat, Professor Ferguson, Mr. George M. Macdonnell and Miss Machar:—Mr. Macdonnell to be Convener, and Miss Machar, Secretary-Treasurer.

## REPORTS OF QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.

Principal Snodgrass presented and read the annual Report of the Board of Trustees of the University of Queen's College, and in connec-

tion therewith a Report from the Executive Committee appointed to provide a Supplementary Endowment for that Institution. Whereupon it was moved by Mr. D. M. Gordon, seconded by Mr. Macdonnell, and passed unanimously, That the reports with accompanying financial statements be received; that the Synod anew express their confidence in the judicious and careful management of the affairs of the College; record their great gratification at the remarkable progress of the Scheme for the endowment of the College; and gratefully acknowledge their obligations to the Very Reverend Principal Snodgrass and to Professor Mackerras for their indefatigable exertions in connection with that Endowment, and to the Venerable the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland for authorizing their Colonial Committee to make a special donation of two hundred pounds sterling (£200 stg.) towards the current expenses of the College.

## SALE OF LAND IN EAST WILLIAMS.

There was read an Extract Minute of the Presbytery of London, of date May 10, 1871, embodying an application from the Trustees and Managers of the congregation of East Williams, craving leave to sell the lot on which the Church now stands, as it is not conveniently situated, with a view to the erection of a place of worship in a more eligible locality The leave craved was granted.

# UNION OF CHARGES IN PORT HOPE.

The Clerk of the Presbytery of Victoria submitted an application from the Managers of the congregation of Port Hope, stating that a congregation in that town in connection with the American Presbyterian Church proposed to unite with our congregation, and hold their church property in common, and craving the sanction of the Synod to the sale of the church now belonging to us, in case the interests of the joint congregation should require this to be done. The Synod unanimously resolved to grant the application and empower the Presbytery of Victoria to carry out the wishes of the congregations interested to unite and form one charge; but, before sanctioning said union, to see that the Model Constitution of the Church is adopted and the property of the united congregation secured by deed in the usual way.

# DISSENT AND COMPLAINT: RANNIE vs. THE PRESBYTERY OF LONDON.

The Synod took up a dissent and complaint of the Rev. John Rannie against a judgment of the Presbytery of London, of date January 4, 1871, declining to reconsider a resolution adopted at a meeting of that Presbytery on September 1, 1870, giving the status of a Catechist to a Minister who had been suspended *sine die* on January 6, 1870. Papers having been read, parties were called. Mr. Rannie appeared for himself and Mr. James Gordon for the Presbytery. Parties, having been

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heard, were removed. The Synod unanimously resolved to sustain the complaint and instruct the Presbytery of London to reconsider their action in giving to the person referred to the status of a Catechist.

#### SYNOD FUND.\*

The annual Report of the Finance Committee and accompanying financial statements of the Synod Fund were read by Mr. Kenneth Maclennan, Convener. The following deliverance thereon was moved by Mr. McEwen, seconded by Mr. Joshna Fraser, and passed unanimously, Adopt the Report; approve of the scale of assessment recommended for payments by congregations to the Fund; enjoin Presbyteries to give attention to the enforcement of the payments exacted; instruct the Committee to take such steps as may be found desirable for acknowledging in the way suggested the valuable services of Mr. Bell; thank the Committee for their diligence; and re-appoint them for the present year.

## REPORT ON FORM OF POLITY.

Mr. George Bell presented and read the Report of the Committee on Styles and Forms of Procedure together with Forms of Questions and Formulas for License and Ordination. Said report recommended the adoption of certain amendments in Book III as follows:—

II. 5. To the first sentence add the words; "and the process shall be conducted in such manner as to allow the slandered individual the same opportunities of sifting the evidence as he would possess in a formal trial."

III. 2. After the first sentence insert the following clause: "In the case of a Minister or Probationer such accusation shall be a formal libel."

V. 7. Insert the words "or suspended *sine die*," so as to read, "A Minister deposed or suspended *sine die* for scandalous conduct, &c."

The Committee further recommended that Books II and III, as so amended, be passed into permanent enactments of the Church, no Presbytery having intimated dissent. The Synod agreed to the amendments so recommended, and enacted, as they hereby do enact, Books II and III into permanent laws of the Church, and the Moderator declared accordingly.

The Synod hereby transmit to Presbyteries Book IV of the Form of Polity together with the Questions and Formulas for use at License and Ordination, now submitted, for their consideration, instructing them to send up their opinions thereon to next meeting of Synod. The Synod re-appoint the Committee as follows:—

Principal Snodgrass, Messrs. George Bell, Mackerras and Kenneth Maclennan; Mr. Bell to be Convener.

Said Questions and Formulas are as follows:—

1. Do you believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the Word of God, and the supreme rule of faith and manners?

2. Do you believe the Westminster Confession of Faith, the subordinate standard of this Church, to be founded on the Word of God and agreeable thereto?

3. Do you own the purity of worship practised in this Church, and

do you promise to conform to the same?

4. Do you believe the Government of this Church by Kirk Sessions, Presbyteries, Synods and General Assemblies, to be founded on the Word of God and agreeable thereto, and do you promise to submit to

5. Do you engage, in dependence on the aid of God's Holy Spirit, faithfully and diligently to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ, as you shall have opportunity

6. Do you promise, through the grace of God, to lead a holy and cir-

cumspect life, showing yourself an example unto others?

#### FORMULA.

I do hereby declare that I believe the Westminster Confession of Faith, the subordinate standard of this Church, to be founded on the Word of God and agreeable thereto, and I engage as a Preacher of the Gospel to adhere to the same; that I own the purity of worship practised in this Church, and I promise to observe all public Ordinances as they are authorized; that 1 believe the government of this Church by Kirk Sessions, Presbyteries, Synods and General Assemblies to be founded on the Word of God and agreeable thereto, and I engage as a Preacher of the Gospel to conform to the same.

#### QUESTIONS FOR ORDINATION.

1. Do you believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the Word of God, and the supreme rule of faith and manners?

2. Do you believe the Westminster Confession of Faith, the subordinate standard of this Church, to be founded on the Word of God and agreeable thereto?

3. Do you own the purity of worship practised in this Church, and do you engage to conform to the same, and to observe all public

ordinances, as they are authorized?

4. Do you believe the Government of this Church by Kirk Sessions, Presbyteries, Synods and General Assemblies to be founded on the Word of God and agreeable thereto, and do you engage, as a Minister of this Church, to conform to the same?

5. Are not zeal for the honour of God, love to Jesus Christ, and desire of saving souls, your great motives and chief inducements to

enter into the Holy Ministry?

6. Do you engage, in dependence on the aid of God's Holy Spirit, diligently to instruct the people, committed to your charge, out of the Holy Scriptures; duly to administer the sacraments, according to Christ's institution; and faithfully to discharge all other parts of the Ministerial work?

7. Will you be diligent in prayer, and in the reading of the Holy Scriptures, and in such studies as help to the knowledge of the same, that you may be able by them to teach wholesome doctrine, and to withstand and convince the gainsayers?

8. Do you promise to submit yourself in the spirit of meekness to

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9. Do you engage in the strength of Jesus Christ, our Lord and error and schism? Master, to lead a holy and circumspect life, so that you may be an

10. Have you used any undue methods, either by yourself or others, example to the flock?

11. Do you accept and close with the Call to be the pastor of this in procuring this Call? Congregation, and promise through grace to perform all the duties of a faithful Minister of the Gospel among this people?

Add the following paragraphs:—

When Ordination is not accompanied by Induction to a Pastoral charge, omit questions 10 and 11.

In the case of a translation from one charge to another, the follow-

ing questions shall be asked :-1. Do you adhere unto and promise in the strength of Divine grace to perform the solemn obligations entered into by you on receiving Ordination?

2. Same as 10 at Ordination. 3. Same as 11 at Ordination.

# FORMULA TO BE SIGNED BY INTRANTS AT ORDINATION OR INDUCTION.

I hereby declare that I believe the Westminster Confession of Faith, the subordinate standard of this Church, to be founded on the Word of God and agreeable thereto, and I engage, as a Minister of this Church, to adhere to the same; that I own the purity of worship practised in this Church,—and I promise to observe all public ordinances as they are authorized; that I believe the government of this Church by Kirk Sessions, Presbyteries, Synods and General Assemblies to be founded on the Word of God, and agreeable thereto; and I engage, as a Minister of this Church, to conform to the same; and I promise, in the strength and grace of Jesus Christ, to discharge diligently and faithfully all the parts of the Ministerial work, to the edification of the Body of Christ.

#### CHURCH PROPERTY

The Synod appointed Mr. Kenneth Maclennan to be Convener of the Committee on Church Property in room of Dr. Barclay.

# MISSION TO BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The Synod resumed consideration of the Report on the Mission to British Columbia. It was moved by Mr. George Bell, seconded by Mr. D. M. Gordon, and passed unanimously, That the Synod receive the report; thank the Committee; renew the expression of regret that so few of the congregations within the bounds of the Synod have contributed to this Scheme; enjoin Presbyteries to see that collections are made in all the congregations within their bounds in accordance with the injunctions of this Court; appoint the following Committee for the ensuing year, viz:-Mr. Macdonnell, Convener, Messrs. James Bain, George Bell, Kenneth Maclennan, Carmichael (West King); William Mitchell, Macmurchy (Toronto), George Wilson, John Gibson (Scarboro') and James Wright (London), Mr. Wilson to be Treasurer; and instruct the Committee to make the one hundred pounds sterling (£100 stg.,) promised to the Church of Scotland Mission in British Columbia a first charge on the funds at their disposal—to take steps towards the appointment of a Missionary to Manitobah—and to receive any contributions which may be forwarded by congregations for the Church of Scotland's Mission to the Aborigines of India, which is hereby commended to the favourable attention of the Church.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning at half-past nine o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

#### DIET VIII.

At Toronto, and within St. Andrew's Church there; Thursday, the fifteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one years:—

Which day the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland met pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with prayer.

Devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. Professor Mowat. The Minutes of yesterday's Diet were read and sustained.

# DELEGATES TO PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF U. 8.

There was produced and read a Commission from the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America, appointing the Rev. John Hall, D.D., of New York, the Rev. B. C. Megie, of Rockaway, and the Hon. John Hill, Delegates to this Synod. There was also read in connection therewith a letter from Dr. Hall, explaining the inability of the Deputation to attend this meeting, conveying to this Synod the fraternal greetings of the Church they represent, and expressing the warm interest which they take in the welfare of this Church as a member of the great Presbyterian family. The Synod resolved to record the expression of their regret that, owing to unavoidable circumstances, they had not been favoured with the presence of these Delegates, and appointed the Rev. George Bell, the Rev. Kenneth Maclennan, and James Michie, Esq., a Deputation to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America at its next annual meeting, with instructions to tender to that Body the cordial congratulations of this Church on the many and strong indications of their spiritual prosperity, and to assure them of our warm sympathy with them in their works of faith and labours of love.

# OVERTURE ANENT CHRISTIAN LIFE AND WORK.

There was produced and read an Overture, signed by the following members of Synod, Messrs. Macdonnell, Mowat, Kenneth Maclennan,

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James Gordon, McEwen, Spenser, Snodgrass, Mackerras and D. M. Gordon, craving the Synod to appoint a Committee to inquire into and report to the next annual meeting of Synod on the state of Christian Life and Work in the various charges within the bounds of the Synod, and especially to consider and report on the best means of securing the cooperation of the office-bearers of the Church and others in the supervision of congregations and in Christian work in general. The Synod unanimously resolved to decern in terms of the Overture and appoint the following as a Committee in terms thereof, viz.:—Messrs. Morrison, Donald Fraser, Rodgers, David Ross (Leith); Mr. Morrison to be Convener.

#### OVERTURES.

There were read and laid over to next annual meeting of Synod the following Overtures:—

1. On providing a Fund for the payment of expenses of members attending the meeting of Synod.

2. Anent the scarcity of Candidates for the Holy Ministry.

3. Anent the adoption of means to secure joint meetings of Elders and Managers, when deemed necessary.

4. Anent the status of Retired Ministers.

5. Anent Book I., paragraph 17, of Form of Polity.

## ACT FOR SPECIAL COLLECTIONS.

The Synod renewed the act for regulating Public Collections as follows:—

The Synod appoint the following Public Collections to be made in all the churches during the ensuing year, viz.:—

I. For the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund—on the First Sabbath of January.

II. For the Sustentation Fund—on the First Sabbath of March.

III. For the Mission to British Columbia—on the First Sabbath of May.

IV. For the French Mission—on the First Sabbath of July.

V. For the Sustentation Fund—on the First Sabbath of September.

VI. For the Scholarship and Bursary Scheme—on the First Sabbath of November.

Provided always that when the Lord's Supper shall be observed on any of the said Sabbaths, or when any of the said Sabbaths shall be deemed unsuitable, then another day may be selected by the Session within three months thereafter; Provided also that congregations preferring to raise their contributions in any other way, as by subscriptions and donations, or to furnish them out of any fund under their control, shall be at liberty to do so.

The Synod takes this opportunity of anew recommending to Kirk-Sessions and Congregations the Schedule system as a systematic and

Scriptural method of contributing as the Lord hath prospered them to the advancement of His Kingdom.

All Ministers of the Church are appointed at least to exhort their Congregations to contribute towards the maintenance and spread of the Gospel of Christ on all the days above specified; and, on a Sabbath preceding that on which a collection is to be made, to give due intimation from the pulpit, together with such information on the object of it as they may have been able to acquire. The Conveners of the several Committees and Boards for the management of the Schemes herein specified are required to forward, in good time, to all the Ministers, notices of these appointments as they become due, together with such statements as it may be of use and interest to read along with their intimations; and, in particular, the Synod enjoin the several Presbyteries, at their meetings next after the times specified, to inquire into the diligence of all their Ministers and congregations in this matter, and record reports thereof in their Books, and likewise instruct the Committee of Synod for revising Presbytery Books to notice how far Presbyteries attend to this injunction; and the Synod, while rejoicing at the increased fruits of Christian effort in this Church, yet considering that the means hitherto supplied are quite inadequate to the extent of the field daily opening up to the operations of the Church, and far within what might be expected from the gratitude and love due to a crucified Saviour, earnestly urge on all the people seriously to consider the duty of contributing liberally for the advancement of Christ's cause, according to the ability wherewith God has blessed them. This act shall be annually renewed, with such amendments as the Synod may deem called for, and the expense of printing it for distribution among Ministers shall be borne equally by the several Schemes, and the funds of each Scheme shall be charged with all the expenses of its own management.

## COMMISSION OF SYNOD.

The Synod appointed their Commission to meet in St. Paul's Church, Montreal, on the Wednesday after the second Tuesday of November next, at noon; in St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, on the Wednesday after the third Tuesday of January next, at noon; and oftener by adjournment when and where the Commission may choose.

Nine Commissioners shall be a quorum, of whom five must be Ministers. In all their actings the Commissioners shall proceed according to the Act of Synod, 1859, anent the nature, powers, and duties of the Commission of the Supreme Court of this Church.

### VOTES OF THANKS.

It was moved by Mr. Clark, seconded by Mr. Spenser, and carried by acclamation, That the thanks of the Synod are due, and are hereby given, to the friends of the Church in Toronto for their generous hos-

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ried by hereby us hos pitality to the members in attendance at this meeting, and especially to the Minister, Elders and Managers of St. Andrew's Church, for their diligent and successful efforts to provide for the comfortable accommodation of members; and the Synod further record their thanks to the Grand Trunk Railway Company as well as to such other Railway and Navigation Companies as have granted to members attending this meeting a reduction in the rates of travel. The Clerk was instructed to give intimation thereof to these Companies.

The thanks of the Synod were also accorded to the "Globe" and "Telegraph" for their full reports of the proceedings of this meeting. The Minutes of this Diet were read and sustained.

## CLOSING OF SESSION.

The Moderator then addressed the Synod and, after praise and prayer, said—

In the name of the LORD JESUS CHRIST, the KING and ONLY HEAD of this Church, and in the name of this Synod, I dissolve this meeting, and appoint the next annual meeting of Synod to convene in St. Andrew's Church, Kingston, on the first Wednesday of June, Eighteen Hundred and Seventy-two years, at eleven o'clock, A.M.

Of which public intimation was made, and the Moderator pronounced the Apostolic Benediction.

# REPORT OF MANAGERS OF THE TEMPORALITIES' BOARD.

The Board for the management of the Temporalities' Fund have the honour to lay before the Synod an abstract of the receipts and disbursements of the Board during the past year, along with the usual financial statements in detail duly audited.

No changes calling for notice have been made in the investments of

the Board since the date of last Report.

By a resolution of the Board dated 8th November, 1870, By-law No. 4 for the management of the Temporalities' Fund was repealed, and the following By-law substituted, subject to the approval of the Synod:

"BY-LAW No. 4-The annual meeting of the Board shall be held on the second Wednesday of May in each year for the transaction of business: and adjourned meetings may be held at such times as a quorum of the Corporation shall direct."

The Contingent account, formerly incorporated with the Temporalities' account, was closed on the 30th June last. The receipts for the half year ending at that date amounted to \$4739.12, including the Synodical deduction \$1789, and private contributions \$1558, the whole of which was applied to the payments which then became due, and in

which all the Ministers on the Synod's Roll participated.

The revenue of the Board for the half year ending 31st December, 1870, being the interest derived from its investments was applied, in conformity with the instructions of the Synod, 1st, to payment of the claims of commuting and privileged Ministers; 2nd, to the payment of \$1000 to Queen's College; and 3rd, to the payment of \$100 each to thirty non-privileged Ministers in the order of seniority: the names of the remaining 52 Ministers having been transmitted to the Chairman

of the General Sustentation Board. With deep regret the Board have to advert to the death of one of their number, the Rev. Dr. Urquhart of Cornwall, than whom no member of this Board was ever more regular in attending its meetings, and whose long experience and wise counsels were eminently serviceable to the Board, while his amiable and genial disposition had endeared him to every member of it.

The Board anew record their acknowledgements to Messrs. James Mitchell and George Templeton for their valuable services in auditing

the books and accounts of the Board. The retiring members of the Board are the late Rev. Dr. Urquhart, the Rev. John Barclay, D.D., Mr. William Darling and the Hon. Alex.

Morris. Respectfully submitted.

# REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee of the Board for the management of the General Sustentation Fund beg leave to report that in November last there were transmitted to your Committee from the Temporalities' Board the names of fifty-two Ministers entitled to receive at the rate of \$100 each from the Sustentation Fund on the 31st December, 1870, at which date it was found that the gross receipts of the fund amounted to \$4,353.03, a sum less by \$936.42 than the aggregate of the apportionments made by the Synod in June last.

From the general statement of receipts herewith appended it appears that fifteen congregations made no remittances to the Fund during the first half year, and that several congregations contributed less than was expected of them, while a few others forwarded their contributions too late to be available for the December payments.

The number of Ministers to be paid from the Sustentation Fund on the 30th June next, is forty-two, and the sum required \$4,200, over and above the expenses of management. This being a smaller sum than was received last half year the Committee confidently anticipate there ability to meet all claims on this Fund in full on the 30th June; and as several congregations who did not forward contributions during last half year have since implemented their engagements, and as the Committee trust that the remainder will yet do so, it is hoped that then may be formed the nucleus of a "rest," which will not only enable the

# REPORT OF GENERAL SUSTENTATION BOARD.

In submitting their first annual Report to the Synod, the Board have much pleasure in expressing their sense of the gratifying measure of success which has attended the inauguration of this very important

effort of the Church.

Along with the report of the Executive Committee will be found a detailed statement of receipts and expenditure and also a copy of the By-laws framed for the guidance of the Board. From this report it will appear that the sum of \$4353.03 was received on behalf of the Sustentian Fund for the half-year ending 31st December last, out of which amount an equal dividend of \$86 was paid to each of the Ministers having a claim on the Fund.

The full sum of \$100 would have been paid but for the fact stated in the report referred to, that, while a less amount has been received from certain Congregations than had been expected, from others, among which are three having Ministers, viz. —Point Levi, Russeltown Flats, and Dundas, no contribution whatever has been received.

The remissness of certain other congregations in not forwarding the amount of their contributions also appears to have been one of the causes which prevented the Board from paying the full amount of \$100.

It is hoped that even yet, such contributions may be obtained from the congregations referred to, as will enable the Board to make up the deficiency in the payments to Ministers for the last half-year. In terms of the recommendation of the Executive Committee, the

In terms of the recommendation of the Executive Committee, the attention of the Synod is directed to the desirableness of giving greater publicity to the acts and proceedings of the Board and of the Committee more particularly in respect of the contributions received in support of the Fund, it having been suggested to the Board that some means should be devised whereby the columns of the "Presbyterian" may be rendered more helpful to the advancement of the schemes of the Church, than under its present management.

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1. The Sustentation Board shall hold an annual meeting on the second day of the sitting of the Synod in each year, at such hour as the Moderator thereof shall appoint, for the purpose of ascertaining the amount of money which it will be necessary to raise by voluntary contribution throughout the Church for the ensuing year in furtherance of the objects contemplated by the Synod in the creation of this Board. To this end the Secretary shall lay before the Board at its annual meeting a certified list of the names of all the ministers of the Church, for whom the Temporalities' Board are unable to make an allowance or grant from their funds for the said year.

2. Adjourned meetings of the Board may be held at such times as a quorum of the Board shall direct. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the Chairman, at any time, or, on a requisition in writing signed by any five members of the Board, at such time and place as the Chairman shall appoint, ten days notice thereof having been given to the several members of the Board-exclusive of the day on which

such notice was posted.

3. In absence of the Chairman, a quorum of the Board may appoint one of their number as Chairman to preside at any meeting and to discharge the duties devolving upon the Chairman for that meeting.

4. No business shall be transacted at any meeting of the Board until the minutes of the previous meeting have been read and approved.

5. The Board shall have power to elect and appoint such officers as

may be found necessary for the transaction of its business.

6. The Secretary shall keep a correct account of the proceedings of the Board in a book to be kept for that purpose, and to which any member of the Board may at any time have access; and shall discharge all such other duties as the Board shall from time to time require of

7. The Treasurer shall give security satisfactory to the Board for the faithful discharge of the trust and duties of his office. He shall receive all moneys accruing to the Sustentation Fund from congregational or other sources and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Fund in such Bank as the Executive Committee shall from time to time deter-He shall sign cheques against the Bank Account of the Board, which shall be countersigned by the Chairman, for the half-yearly payments to ministers and all other authorized expenditures. He shall keep a regular set of books containing the accounts of the Fund, and shall make and deliver for the use of the Board at its annual meeting a report and statement of all monies received and paid by him during the previous year.

8. All the Accounts of the Board shall be examined by two Auditors

to be appointed yearly by the Board for that purpose.

9. Vacancies occurring in the Executive Committee shall be filled from time to time by the said Committee from the remaining members of the General Board.

10. The travelling expenses of members of the Executive Committee, attending meetings duly convened, shall be paid.

# APPENDIX C.

# REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The Finance Committee beg leave to submit their Report, together

with their annual statement, for the past Synodical year. The Committee have received within that period \$580.82 from the contributions of congregations and the sale of printed matter, the pro-

perty of the Synod.

The large amount of \$970 is still due to the Fund. The Committee call the attention of the Synod anew to the necessity of requiring Presbyteries to see that the amounts due to the Fund be regularly and fully paid by the congregations under their supervision.

With this report is submitted a revised scale of assessment for cengregations, which it is believed will better represent than the one now in force the relative ability of congregations, and enable the Committee to meet the obligations which from time to time they are required to

incur for services rendered to the Synod. Representations having been made to the Committee as to the inability of the congregatons of Lochiel, N. Dorchester, Dundas, and Caledon to meet in full the amounts for which they are now held liable, it is asked that direction be given to the Committee to make such arrangements with the congregations referred to, as they may find desirable in the circumstances.

The Committee venture to represent to the Synod the propriety of acknowledging, in a substantial form, the valuable services rendered to the Synod for several years by the Rev. George Bell, in the preparation of the Polity now under the consideration of the Court, and to suggest that they be authorized to appropriate for this purpose out of the Fund under their control a sum not less than (\$100) one hundred dollars, to be used in such manner as the Synod may direct, or as may be most agreeable to the feelings of Mr. Bell.

It is suggested that East Oxford be added to the list of congregations assessed at the rate of \$4, and St. Mark's, Montreal, at the rate

of \$5 annually.

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## APPENDIX D.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF QUEEN'S COLLEGE.

To the Reverend the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland.

The financial position of the College is fully and clearly exposed in the statements of the Treasurer herewith submitted, for the year ending 10th April. From the Endowment Scheme, since the commencement of it in January, 1869, there has been realized \$72,777 45, exclusive of subscriptions and other receipts on account of revenue (\$3,720 85), and disbursements in connection with the Scheme (\$710 92). results of the effort, together with the rigid economy observed in the ordinary expenditure of the College, are beginning to tell very satisfactorily on the decrease of income caused by the suspension of the Commercial Bank and the discontinuance of the Legislative Grant. The amount of the decrease was \$6,280 per annum. The actual deficiency in revenue reported to the Synod in 1869, was \$3200 19, in 1870, \$3084 76; this year it is only \$1,522 95. The total deficiency is Of this sum only \$1,635 36 is shown in Statement No. 5 to have been borrowed from the Endowment Fund, but the whole of it, although for temporary use it has been obtained from other sources, must be regarded as a loan from the Fund, to be restored to capital as soon as the revenue from Endowment shall admit of repayment. Being a debt, it is, in the meantime, an unavoidable cause of delay in completing the realization of the proposed minimum Endowment of \$100,000. It is hoped, however, that the practical effect of reporting it, on the present occasion, will be to stimulate to renewed exertions in behalf of the Scheme.

One of the investments reported in Statement No. 5, is an expenditure of \$5,747 35 on the College Buildings. These are the old buildings, the wings of which have been converted into very commodious and comfortable dwelling houses now occupied by two of the Professors, and the centre part of which is the Principal's house. The annual return upon the outlay will be \$450. The investment is considered to be a good one, while the changes effected by means of it have given the

buildings a greatly improved appearance.

In Statement No. 1 is shown an expenditure of \$507 76 upon repairs in the College, that is, the new building formerly leased to the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons. The repairs consist chiefly of alterations deemed necessary for the accommodiation of the classes, library and museum. The Trustees believe that the Institution has now as fine a suite of class rooms for College purposes as there is in the country. The increase of convenience and comfort enjoyed during the past session has been much appreciated, and fully justifies the removal from the old building to the new. Deducting this extra charge, the expenditure for general purposes is the very moderate sum of \$741 04.

## Appendix D; Report of Queen's University.

The highly competent gentlemen serving the Board as Auditors, after faithfully discharging their duties for the year, report that the Treasurer's Books are kept in an admirable manner, that the funds of the College are most carefully and properly handled, and that the investments on account of the Endowment Fund have been safely and

advantageously made.

The full and careful records kept by the Senate for University Examinations, and by the several Professors for monthly written examinations and ordinary daily class work, show that the students as a body make very satisfactory progress from year to year. But there are other means of testing the education given at the College, as to its character and results, more deserving of notice because of their strictly independent application. Occasionally an alumnus finds his way to a British University, and entering into competition with the ablest students, both gains distinction for himself and brings honour to his Alma Mater. Going back but three years, at Edinburgh University, Robert Jardine, who, in January last was appointed President of the Church of Scotland's College at Calcutta, carried alone and with the highest commendation the degree of Doctor of Science, by the excellence of his examinations in Mental Philosophy. Last session at the same seat of learning, Robert Campbell, after a severe contest, won the "Bruce of Grangehill and Falkland Prize" for Logic and Metaphysics, his strongest fellow-competitor being a first class honour graduate of the University of London, and the second prize for Political Economy, a Master of Arts gaining the first by a majority of only 9 marks. In this country too, when opportunity offers, competitions appear to lose none of their interest, by a representation from Queen's. At recent Law Examinations in Toronto, for example, among candidates from all quarters, our graduates have taken highly creditable places. In 1869, Duncan Morrison, in passing as a Barrister, stood second in the order of merit, and was exempted from an oral examination. In the same year Francis H. Crysler competed for the third year scholarship, and though he gained considerably more than the requisite number of marks, he lost the scholarship by a difference of 18 between him and the successful competitor. In November last he competed for the fourth year scholarship and gained it. At his first intermediate examination he was fourth in the order of merit. At the last Barrister and Attorney Examinations James Muir and John F. Bain were the only candidates from Queen's. The latter stood fourth among 13 as Barrister and fifth as Attorney, passing without an oral examination. The former was first among 25 Attorneys, passing without an oral and coming within a very few marks of the maximum. At their intermediate examinations Muir was first and Bain 3rd of 23 candidates. To pass without an oral examination it is necessary to obtain three-fourths of the maximum.

Leaving these facts to speak for themselves, the Trustees deem it proper to observe that, with the efficient staff of Professors, the first class accommodation, and the varied appliances of which the College is possessed, much more work can be done, without any increase of expense, than is at present performed. It is greatly to be desired that the young men of the country, more especially of the Church, would come forward in larger numbers to take advantage of the benefits which are placed within their reach. All the Trustees can do, apart from the exercise of their influence as individuals, is to make known the position and capabilities of the Institution. The members of the Corporation have much in their power, and their assistance is earnestly solicited.

The course of weekly evening lectures on literary and scientific ment. subjects, referred to in last report, was followed, during the past session, by a more extended course. The assemblies which almost always filled the Convocation Hall afforded a gratifying proof of appreciation on the part of the public. The proceeds derived from the sale of tickets were devoted to a somewhat expensive undertaking-the introduction of gas into the Convocation Hall. It has been a pleasing duty to the Trustees to express their gratitude to the Professors for their liberality and the very valuable improvement effected by means of it.

Since last report two liberal benefactions have been received for the benefit of students for the ministry, the one, \$500 from Mrs. Glass, of Sarnia, to form the foundation of a Scholarship in memory of her deceased husband, Henry Glass, Esq.; the other, \$400 from a gentleman in New Brunswick, with this interesting stipulation on the part of the donor, that candidates may belong to any Presbyterian Church in the

To all friends who in any way forwarded the Endowment Scheme or Dominion. made donations to the Museum, Library, Scholarship and Prize Funds, during the past year, the Trustees take this opportunity of offering their grateful acknowledgments.

## APPENDIX E.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE ON THE ENDOW-MENT OF QUEEN'S COLLEGE.

To the Reverend the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland.

In the course of last summer the following Charges were visited:— Georgetown, Ormstown, Huntingdon, Elgin and Athelstane, Russeltown, Beauharnois, Laprairie, Chatham, Que., Point St. Charles, Mel: bourne, Sherbrooke, Lancaster, Pittsburgh, Dundas, London, West-minster, Glencoe, Chatham, Ont., Georgina, Tossorontio and Mulmur, Scott and Uxbridge. In their intercourse with the members and adherents of these congregations the Deputation kept steadily in view the main object of their mission, without losing sight of those other important purposes to which reference was made in former reports, and experienced (your Committee rejoice to say) a renewal of that hearty welcome and earnest co-operation which from the first have been so serviceable in lightening the labours connected with the prosecution of the Scheme, and in rendering these labours successful. Taking into account such circumstances as are entitled to consideration, the Charges named have done their part. In the case of most of them the liberality exercised exceeded expectations. The aggregate of the subscriptions obtained in them is \$7,052.04.

By way of reviewing the progress of the Scheme since its commencement in January, 1869, the following statistics are submitted. 73 Charges have been visited. At the dates, in the order of succession, of the reports to the Synod, of which the present one is the third, the total amounts subscribed are \$70,000, \$100,000, and \$107,000 che total amounts subscribed are \$70,000, \$100,000, and \$107,000 che total amounts subscribed are \$70,000, \$100,000, and \$107,000 che total amounts subscribed are \$70,000, \$10,000, and \$10,000, \$16,500, and \$22,500, the value of each scholarship being \$500—number of nominations 46, 122, 190, representing respectively \$4,600, \$12,200, and \$19,000, the value of each nomination being \$100. The sum of the collection, namely, \$82,495.40 includes \$4,296.85, contributed to revenue, and therefore spent, and \$714.68 disbursed on account of expenses incurred in conducting the Scheme, leaving \$77,483.87 at the credit of permanent endowment. Of this capital \$70,197.60 has been placed in first-class securities, which yield \$4,717.79 per annum for the use of the College, being within a very small fraction of an average rate of seven per cent.

The decrease of income caused by the suspension of the Commercial Bank and the stoppage of the Government grant, for which it is the first and principal object of the Scheme to provide was \$6,280 per annum. To this should be added \$250, the annual rent received from the Medical College until last year, and say \$500 for class fees, this portion of the revenue having ceased in consequence of the granting of nemination privileges in connection with subscriptions to endowment, making a total decrease of \$7,030. To the income from investments now reported an addition of \$2,312.21, and to the capital an addition of \$33,500, are therefore required, in order to meet the whole deficiency, without making any provision for certain improvements, dependent upon enlarged pecuniary resources, which it is very desirable to introduce as soon as possible. It is necessary to remark that the work of simply restoring the revenue to the position in which it was prior to the suspension of the Commercial Bank will be un-

avoidably delayed by the annual short comings of the past three The total deficiency for that period amounts to \$7,807.90. This is included in the sum herein reported as having been collected for permanent capital, and must, therefore, be regarded as a loan from capital, to be gradually repaid after income and expenditure have been equalized. Another cause of delay lies in the fact that of the \$107,000 reported as having been subscribed, it is believed that owing to the death of subscribers and other reasons about \$3,000 cannot be collected. Notwithstanding these causes of delay in the completion of the Scheme your Committee believe that there is abundant reason why the Synod should indulge in sentiments of gratitude and confidence. Immediately after this meeting of Synod the Deputation from the College will proceed with the work intrusted to them, full of hope that the congregations to be visited during the present summer will respond as cheerfully and liberally to their appeal as those which have

Before the preparation of this report was completed, your Committee had the extreme gratification of learning that the College Treasurer had received a donation of £200 stg. (\$981.08) from the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland, with the special sanction of the General Assembly to this appropriation from their funds, and to its application to the current expenses of the College. The value of this seasonable contribution may be appreciated when it is stated that the effect of it will be to prevent the recurrence of a deficiency in the revenue of the College for the present year.

## APPENDIX F.

### REPORT OF THE MANAGERS OF THE MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Board have great satisfaction in reporting that the Fund committed to their management continues to prosper. Two circumstances evince that the Scheme is becoming increasingly popular—the number of congregations failing to contribute to it is every year growing less, and the collections show a steady advance in liberality. Last year the increase in this direction amounted to upwards of \$280. The success of the Synod's Sustentation Scheme has also secured the regular payment of all the Ministers' contributions to the Fund, a circumstance on which the Synod is to be congratulated. There has been also a slight increase of income from this source.

The Board have, however, to repeat the regret which they have had annually to record that a great many congregations are defaulters in respect of this Fund. In all 30 have failed to send in collections since the 1st of January. It is true, several of these have made contributions to the Scheme since the last meeting of Synod; but, then, such contributions have had to be placed to the credit of a former year; and it is desirable in the interests of the Ministers' families as well as of the Fund that no congregation should be in arrears. It remains with the Synod to provide some way of seeing that vacant congregations shall have an opportunity of contributing to the Scheme. It is as much the interest of vacancies as of congregations supplied with Ministers to see that of vacancies as of congregations supplied with Ministers to see that the Fund is kept in a prosperous condition; and liberal contributions from them are amongst the sources on which the Fund has to rely for

The heavy losses in the death of Ministers sustained by the Church during the past year have necessitated the placing on the roll of annuitants of no fewer than six widows and eight orphans. One widow has died during the year. The number of beneficiaries is now, wherefore, 34 widows, and 41 children, besides Miss Mair, who contherefore, 34 widows, and 41 children, besides Miss Mair, who continues to receive an annuity. On representations made to them by the Presbytery of Victoria the Board have also agreed to grant the sum of \$65 for the present year, on account of Thomas McMurchy, eldest son of the late Rev. John McMurchy, of Eldon, who, though he has attained to his majority, yet by reason of personal infirmities, is unable to provide for his own maintenance, and they ask the Synod to

On account of the greatly increased number of claims coming upon the Fund during the year, the Board did not feel justified in increasing the scale of payments to widows, as was suggested in last report, at least until it should be seen whether the increase in the contributions to the Scheme would keep pace with the increased demands upon it. They are glad to be able to report that the income for the year just closed, notwithstanding the enlarged expenditure, shows a greater surplus to be carried to the capital fund than that of any former year. But as one year's experience supplies scarcely sufficient data on which to base their calculations, and as any change in the scale of payments requires to be made cautiously, the Board, desirous of giving the widows the benefits of the prosperity of the Fund, in the meantime think it would be better to grant a bonus to the annuitants of 50 per cent. for this half year, leaving it to be determined in the future whether the scale should be altered; and ask the approbation of the Synod to their proposal.

The Board would also call the Synod's attention to the fact that a portion of the By law No. 15, printed with the Minutes of Synod for 1868, has never passed the Board, viz.: That clause which reads thus: "When the youngest daughter shall have attained the age of 21 years, the Managers may allow to each unmarried daughter during years, the Managers may allow to each unmarried daughter during the period of her natural life an annuity not exceeding \$50." The former regulation, which read thus, "When the youngest daughter shall have attained the age of 21 years, and it appears to the Managers that the family are in destitute circumstances, they may, where there is more than one daughter, allow an annuity not exceeding one-half of what would be paid to a widow," is therefore still in force. The Board deem it only right to intimate that, though it was submitted for the Synod's opinion, it has never been adopted by the Board.

The Board would furthermore direct the attention of the Synod to the necessity of applying to the proper Legislature so to amend the Act of Incorporation, as to allow the Board to enjoy an annual revenue larger than that to which it is at present limited, namely, \$6,000, as the extension of the Church and the increase of the Fund make a change necessary in this particular.

The thanks of the Synod are eminently due to Mr. Ferguson, the Treasurer of the Fund, for his indefatigable exertions on its behalf; as the forwarding of its interests in every way seems to be to him a labour of love.

## APPENDIX G.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SCHOLARSHIP AND BURSARY SCHEME.

The Committee on the Scholarship and Bursary Scheme beg leave to submit the following Report:—

Your Committee regret to state, that, as appears from the accompanying Report of the Treasurer, the financial condition of the Scheme during the past year has been by no means such as it ought to be, or even as it has been in former years. In 1867 the number of congregations contributing was 32, and the amount contributed was \$343.95. In 1868 the number of contributing congregations was 34, and the receipts \$410.51. In 1869 \$441.10 were received from 30, and in 1870 \$444.34 were received from 31 congregations. Up to the period of last report, therefore, while the number of congregations contributing during the four preceding years had remained nearly the same, the annual receipts exhibited a small but gradual increase. During last year, however, only 26 congregations have made the collection, and the amount received has been only \$252.39. The consequence has been an excess of expenditure over revenue of \$164.11.

It is deeply to be regretted that this should be the case. The reasons for the liberal support of the Scheme, which have been fully stated in former reports, still exist, and, if possible, in still greater force. The importance of the object for which it was instituted, and which it seeks, as far as the funds placed at its disposal will allow, to promote, namely, the encouragement and aid of those who desire to study for the Ministry, and are likely to be faithful and useful labourers in the work of the Lord, can scarcely be overestimated. No less than nine removals of Ministers from the roll of the Synod have taken place by death and otherwise since its last meeting. How are their places even, and the places of others in coming years, to be supplied? And how are the extension of the Church, and the spiritual wants of an ever growing population in preaching stations, and the remoter parts of the Dominion, to be provided for? It is impossible, if we have scarcely a third part of the number of probationers required from year to year to fill our vacancies. If even the present number of our Ministers is to be maintained, if it is, as it ought to be, to be annually increased, presbyteries and congregations ought to consider it one of their first duties to look out for suitable students for the

Ministry, and lend them a helping hand when necessary, as in most cases it will be, particularly in the beginning of their studies.

The temporal provision for the support of a Minister and his family is in general small, and moreover, before he can be settled, eight years must elapse, during which his expenses at college, and for preparatory training, at an annual average of \$140, amount to at least \$1120. It is different with the students in law and medicine. In the one case five years, and in the other four years only of preparatory study are required, while their parents are generally of a more wealthy, though not a more worthy class, than those whose sons are found willing to devote themselves to the work of the Ministry. During the long period of training for the pastoral office, and especially in its early portions, the student can do very little for his own maintenance, while, if he were employed regularly on the farm, or in the store, for which the education of the Grammar School might suffice, he would from the first be more or less able to maintain himself, instead of needing continued support. Hence it is that, not to speak of those of less means, farmers even in ordinary circumstances are for the most part, however willing, not able to pay annually \$140 for a series of years for the education of their sons for the Ministry. Young men of piety and talent, who give promise of future usefulness, must, therefore, be sought out and taken by the hand by the Church, as they are by the Canada Presbyterian Church. More liberal contributions must be made to the Scholarship and Rursary Scheme, in order that there may be a Fund to which presbyteries and congregations can at once point them as ready to provide what is needed to supplement what their parents can afford. Without this the number of our ministers must continually decrease instead of increasing such means for the support and encouragement of students for the Ministry found to be in the Canada Presbyterian Church, that in Knox's College nine Scholarships are announced for the ensuing year for the best examinations and essays in Theology, besides eight others for undergraduates in Arts, and, in the Theological College in Montreal, there are no less than sixteen Scholarships, besides the liberal exhibitions open to the competition of students in Arts in McGill University, to which it is affiliated. Again, in the Presbyterian Church of the United States, any student with proper credentials has no difficulty in obtaining \$150 a year from the Board of Education for his support at Princeton, or any of the other Theological Colleges connected with the Church, besides the privilege of board and lodging in the College buildings at a very moderate rate.

What then do both the reason of the case, and the experience of our own and other Churches, show us to be the urgent duty of all our Congregations and members in this matter? Evidently that every means be taken to seek out suitable young men who may be willing to dedicate themselves to the work of the Ministry, and, as there are comparatively few who do not need some assistance, that due provision be made for that assistance being given to those who shall, after examination, be approved of by the Presbytery and College Senate. Increased collections from every Congregation, according to its means, are necessary, so that the Scholarships awarded shall be of such an amount as not to leave as they now do, even at their highest value, from \$60 to \$80 a year to be defrayed by the relatives of the Students, not unfrequently a burden heavier than with the other claims on them, A collection of \$8 on an average from each of 100 Congreations would enable your Committee to award 8 Scholarships of \$100, and we cannot safely aim at less. In order, however, that this may be effected there must be a united effort. Every Congregation

would require to give something, however small the amount, if it were only \$5, and your Committee would respectfully suggest, that in view of the great importance of the object of the Scheme to the interests and prosperity of the whole Church, Presbyteries be enjoined to see that each of the Ministers within their bounds shall duly make the col lection appointed on its behalf, and remit the amount to the Treasurer, so that the Scholarships which may be awarded after the examinations at the commencement of the ensuing College Session may be provided Your Council.

Your Committee further trust that the Synod will again recommend this important Scheme to the sympathy and support of the Church, and will renew its recommendation that, on the day appointed for the collection, prayer be offered up for our Colleges in all its Congregations, and the attention of their members be directed to the claims of the Gospel Ministry upon young men of piety and talent.

## REPORT ON FRENCH MISSION.

The Committee of the French Mission Scheme beg leave to report,
That amid some discouragements, yet not without hope, they have
attempted to fulfil the trust committed to them by your Reverend Court.

The importance and need of Missionary operations amongst French Canadian Roman Catholics has from year to year been confessed by the Church in her annual convocations. It may be truly said that never, since the time of the Reformation, were activity, earnestness and self-denial in the defence and propagation of Gospel Truth of greater moment than at present, as is indicated by the condition of Christendom, both European and American. If there is value in the principles for which the Fathers of the Reformation contended and suffered, then must it be owned that the times upon which we have fallen call loudly for their strenuous maintenance.

Your Committee cannot but believe that the conviction and indeed purpose of the Church are in favour of sustaining and strengthening the work in which the Synod, amid innumerable difficulties, has been so long engaged; the more that Providence has at length beckoned us to action by raising up within the Church earnest and able Frenchmen as Missionaries and Ministers.

Your Committee are glad to report an increase in the amount of last year's contributions to the Fund. At the Synod of 1870, the whole sum reported as having been sent to the Treasurer was \$789.52. Today the Committee report the receipt, during the year now closed, of \$1,278.63, being an increase of \$489.11. This is exclusive of some 500 dollars raised by the Ladies' Association of Montreal for repairs on the Manse, and towards the building of a French School House adjoining the Church. This sum is reserved by the Association for these purposes, and it is respectfully suggested that the sum thus raised for these very needful purposes might be easily augmented by a little effort on the part of the Ladies of the Kirk in other cities and towns within the bounds of the Synod.

The increase now reported is due not so much to Congregational Collections, though these exceed those of the previous year by \$162.70, as to special donations. The Young Men's Association of St. Gabriel's Church, Montreal, have transmitted to the Rev. C. A. Doudiet, for the benefit of the Fund, the sum of \$164 the proceeds of a series of winter evening lectures and conversaziones. The Committee would suggest that other Associations of Young Men throughout the Church might, with the best results to the Mission, follow this most praiseworthy example. A generous friend at Huntingdon in the Presbytery of Montreal has forwarded to the Convener by the hands of the Rev. S. McMorine, the sum of \$80 as a donation to the Fund. These special contributions have greatly encouraged the Committee and have also relieved them in part at least from the financial embarrassments under which they have laboured. They accept these facts as evidence that in some quarters there still lives an interest in the French Mission work.

work.
Gratifying as is the increase now reported, the Committee regret to be obliged to state that the demands of the year now closed largely exceed its income. The Committee began the year with a balance due to the Treasurer of \$185.96 which they have paid in full; and with a balance due to the Synod's Missionaries, Messrs. Doudiet and Tanner, of \$213, which has not been paid. To this sum must be added \$381.81

due to these Missionaries for services rendered during the past year. This indebtedness the Committee feel should be at once discharged. If it could be so done by means of a special effort, there can be little doubt that henceforward the regular income would meet the annual

expenditure.

But the Committee are not satisfied with the present narrow limits of the operations of the Mission. The Church is able, were it only willing, to extend this work to at least the extent of employing two or three Colporteurs or Catechists in addition to the present staff of The tardiness of some of the congregations in transmitting their contributions, and the total neglect of others tend greatly to discourage both your Committee and their Missionaries. smallness of the sums which the majority of the contributing congregations transmit from year to year is another cause of discouragement. It will not be maintained that a whole Presbytery does its duty in this work by contributing five dollars for the year, as is the case with one of our Presbyteries, or by contributing ten dollars, as is the case Even with regard to Presbyteries that fall not with another. so low in the scale as these, it will not be held that forty-one dollars represent what the Churchhas a right to look for from a Presbytery containing twelve congregations, situated too in one of the wealthiest agricultural districts of the West; or that fifty-three dollars are worthy of another Presbytery no less favourably situated, containing also twelve congregations, some of them amongst the largest and ablest of the country congregations. The Committee also submit that one of the two largest Presbyteries can scarcely be judged zealous for Protestant truth while it remits to the Treasurer only ninety-five dollars. Attention is directed by the Committee to the financial statement appended to this report, by which it will be seen that of the whole number of congregations fifty-nine only complied with the Synodical direction in regard to contributions to this Scheme. If this is a work worthy of our energies and our prayers let the churches by all means faithfully prosecute it. It were more manly and reputable to abandon the French Mission than to carry it on feebly and half-heartedly.

REPORT OF FRENCH MISSION WORK FOR 1870-71.

To the Rev. Convener of French Mission Committee.

REV. AND DEAR SIR:-

The year which has now elapsed has not been without encouragement for the friends of the Mission. Several new members have joined the Dorchester St. Congregation, three of these leaving the R. C. Church. The constant losses we suffer, owing to emigration, keep down the number of our adherents, and induce superficial observers to think that our work of evangelization is a failure. Our present membership numbers sixty-one souls; if we add to this forty-eight who left Montreal since 1868, the total, one hundred and eight, would give a better estimate of the success of our labours. All these, as far as I know, are to this day staunch Protestants; and, in several instances, those who left us for other parts of this Dominion have become, to a certain degree, missionaries among their countrymen in

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without enw members leaving the emigration. cial observur present forty-eight ght, would iese, as far several inn have betrymen in

their present places of residence. There are, of course, always a few who return to their errors after a certain time; but their number is small in proportion to the whole. The regular attendance at morning service has averaged twenty-five for the past year. There has been a manifest improvement this spring, some meetings reaching forty.

The Sunday School Roll shows a decrease of eight scholars, but several new admissions this spring lead me to hope that it will soon

regain if not exceed its former prosperity. I have held English meetings through the winter on Sabbath evenings, although not largely attended they have been and are still steadily The liberality of those who attended has enabled us to meet the bulk of the expenses connected with the Church, and thus benefit the general funds of the Mission. The collections for all purposes have amounted to \$120. Twenty dollars of this amount have been sent to the Sustentation Fund, and smaller amounts to two or three of the other Schemes of the Church.

In conclusion, I would mention on behalf of our Kirk Session, that the French Presbyterian families, connected with us, desire to convey to all the kind friends, whose liberality has enabled us to keep up the French Mission, their heartfelt thanks and the wish that they may not be weary in well-doing. Our isolated position in the midst of hostile R. C. makes us appreciate at its full value the sympathy of Christian brethren, and gather from it new courage to persevere in our difficult work.

There are other places in which the adherents of our Church are similarly situated as they were till lately in Victoria, and require to be cared for in the same way. If a helping hand is now extended to them they will be kept together, will grow in number, and will in time be self-sustaining; but, if now left altogether to their own resources, they will become discouraged, and will be lost to the Church. Hence the extreme importance of affording them sympathy and assistance at the present stage of their history, and not deferring the practical expression of our interest in them until they have fallen into a state of religious indifference, and would not welcome our offer of aid, or have connected themselves with some other denomination, and would resent our interference.

At the date of the last report only \$206.50 had been received for the Mission, and, in compliance with the injunction of Synod, your Committee issued in the end of June a special circular to the congregations which had not contributed The Convener also wrote privately to a

number of ministers. These appeals were not so successful as had been hoped, and the Treasurer was able to forward to the Colonial Committee only £74 1s. 3d. stg. for the last fiscal year, leaving a deficiency of rather more than one-fourth of the £100 stg. which the Synod engaged to contribute annually. This deficiency would not have occurred if the members of Synod had duly appreciated the claims of the Mission itself, and our own obligations to the Parent Church for the liberal aid she has given and is still giving us The sum promised by us is not one-seventh of what she expended last year for Missionary work within the bounds of our own Synod.

The amount received for British Columbia this Synodical year is \$195.33—a sum still smaller than was in our Treasurer's hands at the

corresponding period of last year.

As instructed by the Synod, your Committee have considered the feasibility of taking some part in the Church of Scotland's Mission to the aborigines of India. This Mission has recently been instituted after full enquiry and deliberation, and under favourable auspices; and your Committee are strongly of opinion that the Synod should appoint an annual collection to be made for it. The much smaller Synod of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick entirely supports a Missionary to the South Pacific Islands, and surely our Synod, if possessed of equal zeal, ought to be able to contribute at least as largely to a similar Mission in one of the most interesting of foreign fields. So far as is known to the Committee, only one or two of our congregations at present make an annual collection for missions to the heathen. But it is reasonable to expect that many of our congregations would gladly join in the good work of spreading Gospel light in the dark places of the earth, if their attention were turned to a specific mission, and the scheme were expressly recommended by the Synod to their prayers and liberality.

The Synod is aware that not one of the Committees which have charge of its Schemes has its headquarters within the bounds of the Presbytery of Toronto, and it is respectfully suggested to this Venerable Court that the Committee on Foreign Missions be now reconstituted, and that the new members be chosen from that large and influen-

tial Presbytery.

## APPENDIX J.

REPORT ON THE INDIAN ORPHANAGE SCHEME AND JUVENILE MISSION.

It is pleasant to be able to report that during the past year the interest of the children of the Church in this useful Scheme has been well sustained, and that, although, for some time subsequent to the departure of Mr. Paton, the zealous and efficient Secretary of the Scheme, there appeared to be a slight tendency to relaxation of effort, the ground thus apparently lost seems to have been fully regained.

The contributions during the past year have amounted to very nearly \$800, and if, as is to be hoped, seven schools not yet heard from shall ere long send in their remittances for the orphans they support, the amount will be, including two remittances usually sent direct to the amount will be, including two remittances usually sent direct to Edinburgh, little short of \$1000, a sum considerably above the average, and very little below the maximum amount contributed in any enast year. It is very desirable that the lacking contributions should be past year. The Canadian School at Kidderpore has also met with a fair share of liberality, both from supplementary contributions of schools also supporting orphans; and from the willing offerings of those schools which are not strong enough to contribute the sum necessary for the maintenance of an orphan, but which are thus enabled to share in supporting a most useful branch of the Mission.

The Orphanage at Colombo in Ceylon, at which five orphans have been maintained by our schools, no longer exists. In consequence of the prevalence of a bad fever, the Orphanage had to be closed and the children sent to their homes, nor is it considered advisable by the Home Committee that this Orphanage should be re-opened, it being thought that the funds which maintained it can be more profitably expended in other parts of India. Care has, however, been taken not to loose sight of the children, of whom satisfactory accounts are received, and it is hoped that, as by means of this Orphange they have been its light to their dark homes. Those of our schools, who have sent in them at other Orphanages, as can also be done for those schools who have not yet sent in their usual remittance, should they still desire to

The Home Association are, as usual, energetically pursuing their operations in connection with the various Orphanages, and endeavouring, as far as possible, to extend them. In connection with the Madras Orphanage three day schools for caste girls, on the same principle with the Canadian one, have been opened, one at Blacktown, another at Washerman and a third at Triplicane, and are doing a good work. It is gratifying to observe that in the report given by Mrs. Clark, of Madras, she especially notices the valuable assistance she receives from Rebecca, good deal of important work in the Orphanage," Rebecca daily accompanies Mrs. Clark to the Schools, where she superintends the sewing, stance should be very encouraging to her supporters, showing them already very fair results from their past efforts, and leading us to hope much from the future labours of these carefully educated Hindoo girls.

would do credit to any English or Canadian girl, and the writer vividly and touchingly describes the darkness of the "social, moral and religious condition" of most of her country women. After showing their utter lack of all education, and the seclusion in which they are kept both before and after their early marriages, she goes on to say:—

"After being placed in the Zenana, they are forever shut up from all external, social and moral influences, and are consigned to live in perpetual darkness, the walls of the Zenanas being impervious to the light of knowledge. Generally speaking, they are of very tender feelings, hospitable and kind towards strangers, affectionate to their relatives and friends, obedient to their husbands, whom they almost worship, very devout, and consequently most superstitious.

"Female schools are here and there established in and around Calcutta. Though their numbers are few, educated young men are fully alive to the importance of female liberty and enlightenment; they have read and can feel what influence an educated mother may extress upon her children, and what help an educated wife may render to her husband in regulating and managing the concerns of a house. But they cannot break through the long-established customs of the country, and cannot therefore abolish the system of early marriages, and many other social evils which stand in the way of female education. Christian Missionaries have considered all their difficulties, and have suited their plans to meet them. In addition to female schools, they have opened Zenana Missions, and it is through the influence of Zenana teaching that Hindoo females are now beginning to receive the blessings of education and morality, some indeed having given up all Hindoo prejudices and become Christians."

Such a letter speaks for itself, and may well lead the friends of the Mission to thank God and take courage. Similar letters have been received from orphans, still pupils in the Orphanages, which, though less advanced in thought and style, speak more directly, though very simply, of the faith in Jesus which it is the chief aim of our Missionary efforts to impart. It would be well if the interchange of letters between orphans and their supporters were more generally promoted, as such a correspondence is interesting to both parties, and very much adds to the reflex benefits which this Scheme confers upon the children contributing to it, in fostering self-denial and Missionary zeal, enlarging their sphere of mental vision, and widening and extending their

Christian sympathies.

The Zenana Mission, referred to in the letter above quoted, is one of the most interesting features of the Female Missions, and is now being vigorously prosecuted in Calcutta. The Zenanas, or female apartments, the secluded abodes of the wives of the male members of the joint families often found among the upper classes, now afford a most interesting field for the female Missionary, who is willingly admitted by the inmates, anxious to learn the feminine European accomplishments which she can teach, and which they are ambitious to acquire. Having thus gained their confidence and favour, she is soon able to introduce the precious Gospel Truth, of which she is the bearer, and which is heard usually with interest, and sometimes, it is hoped, with

It will have been observed also, from the letter already mentioned, that the tide, which has set in towards the advancement of female education generally, has reached even benighted India, and the men are willing and often anxious for the better education of the female members of their families. Carried by the general diffusion of education and enlightenment, above the degrading superstitions which formerly held them in bondage, they yet cannot set themselves free from

their trammels, while the wives and mothers remain sunk in Heathen darkness. Indeed it is to be feared that, without Christian female influence, superstition would only give place to a general rationalistic infidelity. While the method of diffusing the blessings of Christian education among the young has already done good service, it is from the influence of Christian wives and mothers that the richest results may be expected, and it is to this end that the efforts of the Association are so earnestly directed toward the conversion and instruction of Hindoo women.

As there are comparatively few Christian ladies having sufficient command of Bengali to conduct the work of Zenana visiting alone, the girls from the Orphanages have already been exceedingly useful as interpreters, and it is intended in this way gradually to train them for becoming, when qualified, Zenana visitors themselves. In this way the benefits of the Christian training at the Orphanages will be propagated, we may trust, to an incalculable extent, and they, who through the Missionary efforts of our children have been brought to the saving knowledge of the only Redeemer, will thus become well fitted instruments for diffusing that knowledge, until the dark mass of Heathenism shall give way and disappear under the light giving rays of the Son of Righteousness.

It would be a pleasant arrangement if some of our Schools, not at present contributing to the Mission, nor able to undertake the support of an orphan, could unite in employing a Zenana Visitor of their own, selecting, if possible, one who had been trained in one of the Orphanages, and supported by Canadian contributions. We should then feel a more direct and special interest in a work in which the labourer, as well as the Mission, should seem to be so peculiarly our own. The cost of supporting a Zenana female Missionary is £14 14s, per annum.

Thanks are due to the Editor of the *Presbyterian* for inserting intelligence of interest respecting the Mission, and to Ministers and Sabbath School Superintendents who have taken pains to interest their young parishioners in the Scheme. Taking into consideration the fact that this is the only effort which, as a Church, we are making in the important and interesting work of Foreign Missions, and in view of the results already realized, and of those which, in dependence on the Divine blessing, may yet be looked for, it is confidently hoped that this Scheme will continue to receive the cordial approbation and fostering care of the Synod, and will be aided by the earnest prayers, warm sympathy, and generous support of the Church at large.

#### APPENDIX K.

#### REPORT OF THE MISSION TO THE LUMBERMEN.

In presenting their third Annual Report, the Committee on the Mission to the Lumbermen desire to acknowledge the goodness of the Great Head of the Church in the success which has attended their labours, and to recognize therein a renewed call to diligence and fidelity.

Your Committee were enabled to secure the services of two ordained Clergymen during part of last winter, viz: of the Rev. Hugh Cameron, who was, however, unable to engage in the work as long as he expected or desired, and of the Rev. H. J. Borthwick, who spent two months in visiting the shanties in the districts of the Gatineau, Colonge and Black River. The nature and extent of the work accomplished by these Clergymen may best be shewn by abstracts of the detailed reports which they presented to the

The Rev. Mr. Cameron reports as follows: —

By the appointment of the Rev. H. J. Borthwick, A.M., to the Mission field of Litchfield and Colonge, I felt happily relieved from visiting the shanties on the Colonge & Black River. There were, however, a few shanties on McGillivray Lake and some other neighbouring lakes, which could not be conveniently reached by Mr. Borthwick, and which I visited and supplied with literature, staying one night in each shanty and conducting Divine Service. The remainder of the literature I sent to shanties on the Madawaska and Ottawa, that could not be visited by any of our Missionaries. After my return home, lists were sent to me, containing subscriptions in aid of the Mission to the Lumbermen to the value of \$58.00. This money was wholly unsolicited by me and was contributed by men of all denominations. It is, in the opinion of your Missionary, of the greatest importance that this Mission be not only prosecuted with still greater energy,

by the Rev. H. J. Borthwick:—
"I left Ottawa on the 20th January last for Fort Colonge, in the Township of Mansfield, at the mouth of the Colonge River, and arrived there on the 28rd. Having consulted with the Hon. George Bryson, who is much interested in the continuance and success of your Mission, I proceeded to visit the shanties accessible from his neighbourhood. As a general rule, it is of little use, as far as Missionary operations are concerned, and as far as my experience goes, to reach the shanty before night-fall, as the men are not accessible till then, and it is the most appropriate season for addressing them. On one or two occasions, however, I was enabled, from the kindness of the 'bosses' to hold my service after dinner, thus overtaking two shanties instead of one in the day. In this district the shanties are generally at a considerable distance apart, so that rarely could more than one shanty a day be overtaken. Permission to address the men was invariably, and with courtesy, granted by Roman Catholics and Protestants alike. I made it a point never to introduce controversial subjects as between R. Catholics and Protestants, but only to preach the simple Gospel, and this, I believe, had the best effect. Such subjects were frequently referred to by individuals afterwards, and then, of course, I did not hesitate to point out the errors of Romanism, and I have reason to believe, from information subsequently received, that more than one family has been brought to renounce these errors from these and similar conversations.

" Having visited the lower Colonge shanties, I then struck in through the Townships of Leslie and Thorne to the shanties of Messrs. Gilmour & Co. on the Kazabazua and Pickannock, feeders of the Gatineau. Among the French R. C. settlers in the neighbourhood of Otter Lake in this district an interesting movement has for some time been in progress towards a purer form of faith. Several conversions, and I believe genuine ones, are reported, and many are wavering. I had every facility afforded me and encouragement shewn in reference to my work by Mr. Lunam, the agent of

Messrs Gilmour & Co. at Otter Lake Depot. "Having spent about ten days in this neighbourhood, visiting also and holding family worship in all Protestant private houses, I retraced my steps to the Colonge to prepare for an extended tour up the Black River. I spent over three weeks in this tour, but was unfortunately overtaken by a heavy storm, which prevented travelling by conveyance on the side roads leading to the shanties. I tried to visit these on foot, starting from the depots as central points, but this I found too fatiguing in the soft snow. On one occasion I walked over 15 miles with my pack on my back, on another 10, but I found this was to be no profit either in time or labour. As there seemed to be no prospect of the storm abating, I concluded it was better to head down stream again, with the consolation, however, of having reached the highest shanty on the river. This Black River trip involved a journey of upwards of 300 miles, a large part of it through very hard roads and during very unfavourable weather. I was everywhere received with the greatest kindness, and all attention was shewn me by all parties.

As an unfavourable idea as to the usefulness of your Mission has been abroad among some persons, I made it a point to enquire on this head of all who, I thought, might be able, from their position, influence, or education, to form an opinion on the subject. I conversed on the topic with proprietors, foremen and workmen, and the universal result was gratification at its initiation, and regret at its not being more extensively carried out."

"I may mention that, besides my own labours, I heard also of the Rev. W. McEwen, of Pembroke, having this winter devoted a considerable por-

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tion of time to this work; also of several Wesleyan Methodist Ministers having done the same. These separate individual efforts, were they all emanating from one Central Committee of the different Churches, would have a better effect and be productive of more influence in behalf of the cause.

"I spent, in all, two months in the work of the Mission, visited 51 shanties, addressed about 1600 persons, one third of whom were Pretestants, and travelled about 1000 miles. I received from shantymen and others the sum of \$47.00 as free contributions to the funds of your Mission. I have to record with thankfulness the assistance and material encouragement received. in the prosecution of my labours, from Messrs. Bryson, of Fort Colonge, Messrs. Caldwell and McTiernan of Black River and others. It is a matter of sincere thankfulness also to our Heavenly Father that in this tour of over 1000 miles, prosecuted during a period of about two months, I met with no accident, was not a day sick, and returned in better health and strength

than I had when I set out on my Mission."

In addition to the work accomplished by the Rev. Messrs. Cameron and Borthwick conducting service and distributing religious literature among the shantymen, your Committee were enabled during the past winter greatly to extend the circulation of suitable literature. Large supplies were received by them from various sources. The Religious Tract Society, of London, sent through the Clerk of Synod two valuable cases of their publications for free distribution. The French Canadian Missionary Society forwarded, through Col. Haultaine, 10,000 pages of French tracts. Donations of suitable magazines and papers were received from R. A. Ramsay, Esq., of Montreal, and from Mrs. Johnson of Ottawa. The Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland sent one case of mixed religious literature, which was not, however, received in time for distribution; and your Committee purchased 2000 numbers of the "British Workman," a periodical peculiarly suitable for workingmen. To the Societies and private individuals who have thus rendered them very material assistance your Committee tender their grateful acknowledgments.

From these supplies your Committee were enabled to prepare large parcels of mixed appropriate literature, which were readily distributed among the shantymen, not only by the Clergymen engaged in the work of the Mission, but also by several of the employers, and by some of the young teamsters who were willing to circulate them among their fellow-workmen. In this way many of the shanties which could not be visited by the Clergymen were yet furnished with excellent and attractive religious literature, both in English and French. In the selection of tracts particular care was taken that none of a controversial nature should be distributed, for, while in all their work your Committee desire to act in a purely non-denominational Protestant spirit, they at the same time endeavour to avoid all possible cause of strife between the Roman Catholic and Protestant lumbermen.

Your Committee have been much gratified and encouraged by the increasing testimony which they receive from different quarters regarding the value of this Mission. They are well aware that the agency at their command is very small when compared with the vast extent of the field which they attempt to cultivate. They still cherish the hope that eventually they may be able to secure the services of Missionaries, whose special work shall be to carry the Gospel to the shantymen, and they would hail with delight the co-operation of other branches of the Protestant Church in this most important field of home-mission work. At the same time, they think that the method which they have hitherto pursued is, under existing circumstances, the best possible one, and they have reason to believe that their labours during the past winter have been more extensively useful than during any previous season, on account of the great increase in the amount of religious literature which, from different sources, has been suphodist Ministers s, were they all Churches, would in behalf of the

Deeply impressed by a sense of the paramount importance of the work, and encouraged by the measure of paramount importance of the work, and encouraged by the measure of success they have already experienced, they desire to continue and extend their labours with a living trust in the Lord of Missions. His blessing alone can give adequate strength or permanent success, but that blessing may be confidently expected to attend every true Christian work and every earnest worker. Humbly, therefore, they hope that this Mission may assist in advancing Christ's Kingdom in our beloved land, of hastening the time when "the wilderness and the solitary place shall be glad, and the desert shall rejoice and blossom as the rose."

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REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CORRESPONDENCE WITH THE COLONIAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee appointed to correspond with the Colonial Committee of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland beg leave

respectfully to report:—
That since the date of their last report they have held two meetings, one on June 6th, and the other on November 8th, 1870.
That an application from the congregation of Chatham, Ontario, for aid in liquidating the debt incurred by the erection of a new place of worship, was submitted. Your Committee, having given full considerworship, was submitted. Your Committee, having given full consideration to all the circumstances of this case, especially to the commodious ation to all the circumstances of the edifice—the liberality of the people in

contributing so large a proportion of its cost from individual and congregational resources—the prominent position occupied by Chatham in the Western section of the Province, unanimously resolved to recommend the same to the favourable opinion of the Colonial Committee. That Committee have with their wonted liberality intimated that they will be prepared to grant £75 Stg. towards the same, so soon as they have received the usual certification that all debt on the structure, with the exception of this amount, has been liquidated.

That a similar application from the congregation of Carleton Place was laid before your Committee and, after its merits had been duly weighed, was transmitted to the authorities of the Parent Church. The Colonial Committee have generously promised a contribution of £40 Stg. as the last instalment towards the extinction of debt upon the

building.

That the congregation of Lochiel have by their self-denying exertions and the persevering energy of their minister been enabled to claim the grant of £120, promised to them two years ago, and that payment

of the same has been received.

That the Presbyteries of Perth and Ottawa, having complied with the conditions required by the Colonial Committee, viz:—the raising from local sources an amount equal to the grant and the furnishing a detailed report of the results of their Missionary labours, have received payment of the £50 granted to each: and intimation has been received that these grants will be renewed for the current year.

That a memorial from the Managers of the charge of Milton, praying the Colonial Committee to make an annual grant of £25 Stg. for three years in aid of the stipend of their Minister, was submitted to your Committee. In view of the inability of the congregation to maintain religious ordinances by their own unaided efforts, and the desirableness of retaining our hold of that field which has so long been occupied by us, this Memorial was favourably recommended to the Colonial Committee. To this an answer has been received, that the grant would be made for the year ending December 31, 1871, subject to a renewal on a fresh recommendation.

That the third semi-annual payment of the grant of £50, supplementary of the stipend of the Minister of London, has been received.

That the Rev. Francis Nicol, labouring as an Ordained Missionary within the bounds of the Presbytery of Toronto, had another year added to the term of years covered by his commission as a Missionary on the staff of the Colonial Committee.

That the Rev. James Kidd has been transferred from the Presbytery

of Saugeen to the Presbytery of Montreal.

That the Rev. Smith Hutcheson, lately on the staff of Missionaries appointed by the Colonial Committee, has been inducted to the charge of Mulmur.

That the Rev W. M. Black has been settled as Minister of St. Mark's Church, Montreal, formed mainly by his exertions; the Colonial Committee having agreed to accept the said congregation in lieu of the Presbytery of Montreal as the party to be held responsible for payment of the half of his salary guaranteed up to October 1, 1872.

That your Committee cannot use terms too strong to convey their sense of the promptness and generosity with which the Colonial Committee have responded to all their recommendations—of the warm interest which they have manifested in all that concerns the welfare of this Church—and of the unvarying courtesy which has marked the communications addressed by the officials of that Committee to your Board.

### APPENDIX M.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON UNION.

To the Reverend the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland.

Your Committee assembled, according to notice from the Convener, in St. Paul's Church, Montreal, on Tuesday, 27th September, and by prearrangement were joined by members of the Committee of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces in connection with the Church of Scotland. There were present of your Committee, Dr. Cook, Principal Snodgrass, James Croil and Sheriff McDougall, and of the other Committee, Rev. Allan Pollok, Rev. George M. Grant, Rev. Donald McRae, Hon. John Holmes and James J. Bremner. Views were interchanged touching the practicability of Union, the doctrinal basis on which it might be effected, and the manner in which the leading interests of the several Churches might be combined, and the Churches themselves incorporated under the jurisdiction of one General Assembly. record was taken of the results of deliberation.

On the following day the above named members of your Committee, with the addition of the Hon. Alexander Morris, met with the members of the Committees of the other negotiating Churches, and meetings for conference were held from day to day until the evening of Friday of

A very remarkable unanimity was found to have characterized the preparatory deliberations of the Committees in respect of particulars pertaining to the doctrine and government common to the negotiating Churches, and for this reason the drawing up of articles embodying these in a basis of union was easily and speedily effected. The other class of subjects demanding attention with a view to such agreement as is necessary to an abiding, harmonious union, consists of matters of detail, bearing upon the affairs and operations of the Churches in their present state of separation, and felt to be of varying importance according to the extent to which the several Churches believe their status, life and prosperity to be affected by them. Such details have reference to modes of worship, ecclesiastical polity, church property, home and foreign mission schemes, collegiate education, &c. results arrived at were put in the form of recommendations to the proposed United Church, and in order to bring them under the notice of the negotiating Churches, it was resolved to report by transmitting the minutes of the meetings to the Supreme Courts of the Churches. A copy of the minutes, duly signed and attested, is, therefore, herewith submitted to the Synod.

Your Committee call special attention, first, to the minute respect ing the Temporalities' Fund of this Church, from which it will be seen that the future appropriation of it is left entirely in your hands, and, secondly, to the minute respecting collegiate education, with the remark that by the term, "a Presbyterian University," is not intended the foundation of a new Institution with University powers, but the All which is respectfully submitted in the name and behalf of the Committee.

MINUTES OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCHES, IN THE PROVINCES OF BRITISH NORTH AMERICA, ON THE SUBJECT OF UNION.

At Montreal, and within St. Paul's Church there, on the 28th September, 1870, the Committees appointed on the subject of Union by the Supreme Courts of the followings Churches, viz.: The Presbyterian Church of Canada in connexion with the Church of Scotland—The Canada Presbyterian Church—The Presbyterian Church of the Maritime Provinces in connexion with the Church of Scotland and the Presbyterian Church of the Lower Provinces met according to the

call of the respective Conveners of these Committees.

Present, The Rev. Dr. Cook, the Rev. Principal Snodgrass, D.D., Ministers, with the Hon. Alexander Morris, Mr. James Croil, and Mr. Neil McDougall, Elders of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connexion with the Church of Scotland; The Rev. Dr. Taylor, the Rev. Robert Ure, the Rev. Dr Topp, Ministers, with the Hon. John McMurrich, Mr. David Mackay, and Mr. Thomas McRae, Elders of the Canada Presbyterian Church; The Rev. Allan Pollok, the Rev. G. M. Grant, and the Rev. Donald McRae, Ministers, with the Hon. John Robertson, the Hon. John Holmes, and Mr. James J. Bremner, Elders of the Church of the Maritime Provinces in connexion with the Church of Scotland: The Rev. Dr. Bayne, the Rev. James Bennett, and the Rev. G. Christie, Ministers, with Mr. Henry Webster, and Mr. David Laird, Elders of the Presbyterian Church of the Lower Provinces.

The Rev. Dr. Cook was appointed Chairman, and the Rev. Dr. Topp,

Secretary.

The meeting was constituted with prayer by the Rev. Dr. Taylor. Extract minutes of the Supreme Courts of the various Churches appointing the Committees were read, as also the letter of the Rev. Dr. Ormiston, of Hamilton, on the ground of which, and of the sentiments expressed therein, the said action of these Churches was taken.

The Chairman opened the business by referring to the desirableness and expediency of Union between the Churches represented by this meeting, inasmuch as they hold the same doctrine and government

and discipline.

I. All present were of opinion that, for many and strong reasons, it was desirable to have a union of the Presbyterian Churches within British North America, and that there was on the ground of principle no obstacle to said Union, if it were accomplished on the basis of the Holy Scriptures, as the Supreme standard of faith and manners, with the Westminster Confession of Faith, as the Subordinate Standard, it being understood, 1st, That full liberty of opinion in regard to the power and duty of the civil Magistrate in matters of religion, as set forth in said Confession, be allowed; and 2nd, That the use of the Shorter Catechism be enjoined as an authoritative Exposition of doctrine for the instruction of our people.

The meeting also resolved to record their opinion that this United Church should maintain fraternal relations with Presbyterian Churches holding the same doctrine and government and disciplineand that ministers and probationers should be received into the Church, subject to such regulations as the Church may from time to

IV. It was also agreed that the general polity, laws and forms of procedure be settled by the United Church, and compiled from such rules as may have been in force in the respective Churches, or from other books of Presbyterian law and order—and that in the meantime Church Courts conduct their business according to the recognized principles and forms of the Presbyterian Church.

Adjourned to meet at 3 o'clock, and closed with prayer.

At 3 o'clock, same day and place, the joint Committee met and was constituted with prayer by the Rev. Dr. Bayne. Sederunt as before. The Rev. Dr. Cook, Chairman, the Rev. Dr. Topp, Secretary. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and sustained.

V. There was now submitted for the consideration of the meeting the question of the application of the Temporalities' Fund in the hands of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland. The unanimous opinion was, that the vested rights of the present beneficiaries of the Fund must be conserved. The matter of a Sustentation Fund was brought up in connexion with the question now under discussion. After lengthened deliberation it was resolved that, whilst a general Sustentation Fund may not be in the meantime practicable, though highly desirable, the efforts of the United Church should be strongly directed in favour of Home Missionary or Church Extension purposes. And as to the future appropriation of the Temporalities' Fund as vested rights gradually lapse, it was thought best to express no special opinion at present, inasmuch as the decision on the subject rests with the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connexion with the Church of Scotland.

VI. With regard to Modes of Worship, it was, after some conversation on the subject, resolved, that the practice presently followed by congregations in the matter of worship, should be allowed, and that further action in connexion therewith be left to the legislation of the

John Robertson, was unanimously adopted, viz:—The joint Committee resolve to recommend that the earnest attention of the United Church should be given at the earliest possible moment to secure the maintenance in thorough efficiency of a Presbyterian University, and of such Theological Halls as may be found requisite to provide the necessary facilities for the education of the Ministers of the Church in the various Provinces of British North

The matter of a Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the United Church was then taken up, when it was unanimously agreed to recommend the establishment of an efficient Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the United Church, to which all Ministers and congregations will be expected to contribute, and that in the meantime the services of an actuary be secured to value the different Funds now in existence, and to submit an equitable plan for the establishment and future management of the Fund.

The meeting appointed the following Committee, viz:—The Chairman and Secretary, with the Conveners of the respective Committees, the Hon. Alexander Morris and the Hon. John McMurrich, to prepare a document embodying the results of these meetings which might be submitted to the respective Churches.

Adjourned and closed with prayer.

"The members of this Committee, in bringing their deliberations to was unanimously agreed to. a close, desire to record their great satisfaction at the entire harmony of sentiment which has prevailed among them on the subject of Union, and generally with regard to all matters of detail affecting the practicability of the contemplated Union and now, in the belief that the hopes of the negotiating Churches will through the blessing of God be realized, unanimously resolve to report to their respective Churches that the following articles be recommended to be adopted as the basis of Union for the United Church to be known under the name of 'the Presbyterian Church of British North America.

1. That the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testament, being the infallible word of God, are the supreme standard of Faith and

2. That the Westminster Confession of Faith shall be the subordinate standard of this Church, it being understood: 1. That full liberty of opinion in regard to the power and duty of the Civil Magistrate in matters of religion, as set forth in said Confession, be allowed, and 2. That the use of the Shorter Catechism be enjoined as an authoritative

exposition of doctrine for the instruction of the people.

3. That this Church shall maintain fraternal relations with Presbyterian Churches holding the same doctrine and government and discipline, and that Ministers and Probationers shall be received into the Church, subject to such regulations as the Church may from time to

The joint Committee, in order to bring the other matters considered by them under the notice of their respective Churches, resolve to report, as they hereby do, by transmitting the minutes duly signed and

The Committee unanimously resolved to meet at 8 o'clock this evenattested." ing to engage in religious services, in prayer and thanksgiving to God fot the spirit of unity and brotherly love, poured out upon them in all

their deliberations. Adjourned and closed with prayer.

To His Excellency Baron Lisgar, P.C., G.C.B., G.C.M.G., Governor General of Canada, &c., &c.,

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

We, the Ministers and Elders of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland, in Synod assembled, desire anew to tender our expressions of loyalty and regard to you as Her Majesty's Representative in this Dominion.

We sincerely congratulate your Excellency upon your recent elevation to the Peerage, and rejoice that Her Majesty has been pleased thus to show Her appreciation of your long and faithful services in this and

- 3. Book IV. of Form of Polity. Also Questions and Formulas for use at License and Ordination. (Minutes, pp. 41, 42, 43).
- 4. Presbyteries are required to inquire at each ordinary meeting and record in their minutes, what congregations within their bounds have made the Special Collection or Collections in behalf of the Schemes of the Church falling due since their previous meeting. (Act anent Public Collections, Minutes, pp. 46).

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
