

Tokio, March 19. — A small naval dirigible caught fire and fell late today in Ibaraki Prefecture, northeast of Tokio, killing the crew of five men. The body of the commander was the only one found, the other four prob-ably having leaped from the blazing airship before it plunged into a forest. The dirigible was on the way from the Kasumigaura naval aviation school to the Yokosuka naval base.


Export Warehouses. Reference has been made to his re-marks about the Government not get-ting any credit from the Temperance Alliance with respect to the abolition of the export warehouses, and after dealing with that matter, he took up the many illicit stills—some sixty-five— that the provincial prohibition officers had discovered and seized, and the large quantities of liquor amounting to nearly \$200,000 they had also seiz-ed after it had been smuggled across the border, and said if the Federal officers had done their duty the Pro-vincial officers would not have had more time to carry on their portion of the work. The seizure of stills and the detection

more time to carry on their portion of the work. The seizure of stills and the detection of smugglers was not any duty of the provincial officers. The Federal Gov-ernment took the liquor and stored it in their warehouses and confiscated it to their own use. The province has no power only to detain until the Federal official arrives, and then he must do the rest. The Premier then very rap-idly pictured conditions in St. Stephen where the Federal Government had given an export license to a firm, and in Northern New Brunswick where vessels were arriving and landing liquor, and there were no Federal offic-ers to detect them, and then he asked if the Temperance Alliance did not by the Federal Government. He would not undertake to say that wanted it; that was impossible with-out co-operation from Ottawa.
