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FIRST EDITION. BURCHELL'S CELLS.

RENEWELL'S DESTRUCTION TAKEN TO THE JAIL AT WOODSTOCK.

WOODSTOCK, Ont., March 15.—When the express from the Bridge rolled into the station today there was a large crowd waiting to see Burchell. The latter had to walk the length of the road to reach a cab which was waiting, and this gave everyone present the opportunity of seeing him. He wore rather a nervous sort of smile as he glanced furtively at the crowd, as if he recognized old friends or to see if any demonstration would be made against him. The most perfect silence was preserved. The party having reached the jail, the prisoner jumped nimbly from the cab and walked boldly in, with a smile on his face. He shook hands with Jaffer Cameron and others, and chatted and talked with a nonchalant ease that surprised him. He was faintly dressed, his face was unshaven, and his general demeanor would impress one with the idea that his great weight but lightly on his shoulders.

He gave his name as J. R. Burchell, gentleman by profession, aged 29, born in England, and belonging to the same name in England. When asked if he was married he replied "Yes." As all parties who drink at all are entered in temperance, he was entered in the list. The warrant of commitment specifies that J. R. Burchell did, on or about 17th February, 1890, in the township of Emsheim, in the county of Oxford, feloniously, wilfully, and of malice aforethought kill and murder F. C. Bennett, late of London, England. The prisoner was taken upstairs to his cell. The only furniture in it is a small table. He will sleep in another cell, opening into the corridor which leads to the first one. The mention of the fact that he would have another cell to sleep in provoked a smile and a joke about the suite of rooms. He shook his head and said that he had no objection when they were leaving and invited them to call and see him again. He took Detective Murray's name and address and grasped it warmly. "I'll do anything I can for you outside this case," said Murray.

He requested that he be allowed to have his meals brought in to him, and was granted the first one. 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SECOND EDITION. DYNAMITE IN THE FIRE.

AN ITALIAN CAUSES AN EXPLOSION THAT KILLS TWO MEN.

TWO OTHERS PROBABLY FATALLY INJURED. The Italian Tried to Lighten Young Men Who Were Watching Dynamite Being Put Out, and Exploded 30 Pounds of the Stuff.

ROCKVILLE CENTRE, L. I., March 15.—Two men were killed and two probably fatally hurt by the explosion of 30 pounds of dynamite, half a mile east of this village, this morning. The killed are Marcello Capobianco, Italian, 45 years old, blown to atoms; Walter Smith, 17, residing at Baldwin, killed by concussion. The injured are Dallas Rogers, 16, both legs blown off; Thomas Baldwin, 17, of Baldwin, seriously bruised; Walter Harvey, 17, of Baldwin, seriously injured. Joseph Eastman of Rockville Centre had his clothing torn off by the force of the explosion. Near the scene of the explosion a large gang of Italian workmen were engaged in putting dynamite in place round a brook. The dynamite was being used for the purpose of clearing a road. 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THIRD EDITION. BURCHELL'S DEFENCE.

THE PRISONER HAD NOT TIME TO WALK FIFTEEN MILES.

SPECIAL TO THE GAZETTE. TORONTO, March 15.—A telegram from Woodstock yesterday, stated that the principal line of defence to be raised by Burchell's counsel would be that the prisoner could not possibly have walked fifteen miles from the station to the place where the body of Bennett was found. There is evidently a mistake in this statement as the scene of the murder is about midway between Princeton and Woodstock or a little nearer Princeton. Eastwood is about eight miles west of Woodstock and Woodstock is about eight miles east of Princeton.

Burchell's body was found in the swamp four and a half miles east of Eastwood and three and a half miles west of Princeton, and the supposition is that after leaving Woodstock, Burchell returned to Eastwood, where he took the train for Hamilton and Buffalo. When Burchell's body was found it was brought to Princeton. The distance Burchell had to walk from Eastwood to the spot where Bennett's body was found and back again to Eastwood is, near as possible, nine miles four and a half miles each way. He had four hours in which to accomplish this, and for a practical pedestrian, an athletic young man like Burchell, that was a comparatively easy task. Burchell's defence is that he had an unenviable opportunity in obtaining three-quarters of a mile in width and several times that distance in length and less three-quarters of a mile north of the Grand Trunk track.

ST. JOHN PROPER. The civic election which takes place on Tuesday, April 1st, is even at this early date attracting no little attention. The candidates themselves are busy getting out nomination papers, while their respective friends and supporters are busy canvassing the wards. Kings promises to be keenly contested as well as Queens. In Wellington the names of the present incumbent alone have been mentioned. In Dukes only A. H. Tuffin and Billard are on the ground. Mr. S. DeForest told a Gazette reporter this morning that he would not be a candidate as he has been removed. Mr. F. DeForest denies the report that he is out for Kings. Messrs. Smith and Case have made a ticket. Mr. James Straton, whose name has been mentioned in Wellington, is an alderman, has not definitely settled whether or not he will stand. Horncastle, who will offer for re-election, Messrs. Moses Cowan, Isiah Holder and Edward Rowan have been talked of as candidates. Messrs. Holder and Lingley will likely be the two opposition candidates as Mr. Cowan decided today not to run.
