POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word.

A Government cable to Casco, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.

Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Public Notice

The following Regulations, under the provisions of the Inspection of Foods Act, respecting the sale of condensed or evaporated milk, approved by His Excellency the Governor in Council, are published for general information:—

1. No person shall sell or expose for sale any condensed or evaporated milk containing less than eight per cent of milk fat.
2. The Medical Health Officer, Government Analyst, or any Inspector appointed for the purpose of the Inspection of Foods Act may enter any store or any other place where any condensed or evaporated milk is kept or exposed for sale, and may take or purchase any reasonable sample of such condensed milk for the purpose of having the same analysed.
3. Any person who shall sell or offer for sale or expose for sale any condensed or evaporated milk which is found on analysis by the Government Analyst to contain less than eight per cent of milk-fat shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, or in default of payment, to imprisonment for a period not exceeding thirty days.
4. These Regulations shall come into effect on the 1st January, 1918.

Harold Russell killed in Action

A message was received here from Ottawa this week conveying the sad intelligence that Pte. Harold Russell, with a Canadian Ammunition Column in France ever since the outbreak of the war, had been killed on Aug. 15th. The entire family are on the Labrador, and the sad news was sent to them by the Rev. S. Bennett. One after another our boys are paying the awful price of this war in giving up their lives. What are we at-home doing? The message follows:—

Royal Visit to the Nfld. Hospital Wards

At the meeting of the Committee of the St. John Ambulance Association, held Monday afternoon in the Chief Justice's Chambers, the President, Sir William Herwood, read a letter received from Lord Ranfurly informing the Committee that the Queen recently visited the St. John's Hospital at Etaples and inspected the Newfoundland Wards. Her Majesty afterwards unchained at the Hospital with Lord Ranfurly and expressed her great approval of every thing. This Hospital is said to be second to none in its Medical and Surgical appliances and in its treatment of the sick and wounded. Newfoundland supports two wards there, and at the time the letter was written there were Newfoundlanders among the patients.

Shelters have been provided by the Cot Fund at Giford House and also in France to enable the wounded to receive open air treatment. At Giford House some of the occupants are men of the Newfoundland Regiment. The Shelters being opened in France is in connection with a Hospital at Le Treport.

Convicted of Manslaughter

Edward Warren, who was arrested last winter at Burgeo, charged with the murder of a young woman with whom he had been keeping company, has been found guilty of manslaughter by a special jury at Burgeo, which was tried by the Supreme Court in circuit, and was sentenced by Judge Kent to six years imprisonment with hard labour. It will be remembered that sometime after the death of the girl in question, suspicion was aroused that foul play had been used, and the body was exhumed, and an examination of it made by a doctor, who found marks on the throat. Warren was thereupon arrested and information implicating him gradually came to light.

The Reasons For a Slump

We have already given them several times in this paper, but will go over the ground again. (1) We have not got the vessels to take it to market. (2) The catch is likely to show an over plus of a quarter of a million quintals. (3) Exporting merchants can't lay in big stocks, it costs too much money at present rates, and they'll get no banks to carry them and take the risk. (4) Codfish at present prices, when it reaches the market of consumption, is getting too high for the people. Under these circumstances we imagine that the man who sells early sells best.

CODDIL—There is a mystery about coddil that is not easy to understand; that is to say, dealers are puzzled to think that while Common coddil can bring \$26 a ton, they find it impossible to lift the price of refined or cod-liver oil over the \$1.50 per gallon limit. "It ought to be worth more," they say, but they can't get it and all exporters quote the same figures. Some people are bad enough to say that there is a combine, but we must honestly say we have seen nothing to warrant this opinion.—Trade Review, Aug. 25.

Sell Fish Early

We deem this to be a good motto for the fisherman this fall. The feeling is general that the man who sells his fish earliest this fall will get the highest price. Outside of their own dealers the fish merchants are not going to buy heavily as in other years, unless they see a better prospect of getting fish to market than now exists. The freights and insurance on the few vessels that are available are so high that there is no inducement to stock up heavily from all comers as in other years.—Trade Review.

White Flour First Produced in City of Budapest

We all mourn the death of the white loaf. We look with disfavour upon its brown success, and we think of this dingy edible as something new—"owing to the war." We have forgotten that with our grandfathers a quite white loaf was a rarity.

English millers had the shock of their lives when they discovered the whiteness of foreign flour. Nothing could be produced by our mills to satisfy the baker, who in turn had to please his customers with white bread. Imports of flour increased alarmingly, and all because the British public were enamored of white bread. Rumors of wonderful machinery producing white flour in Budapest caused English millers to visit Austria-Hungary. The result of this deputation was that in 1878 the first complete plant to reduce wheat to white flour was installed in England. So started the home manufacturing of white bread. We have had to bid farewell, not to an old friend, but to an enemy alien invader.—Answers.

The Best Prices

It is believed that the highest prices for the season are now being paid for fish. There is such a large catch to come in and the means of getting it to market are so uncertain a decline in prices is looked for in a few weeks. There is a Spanish vessel in port loading for Spain, and the F.P.U. through Hon. W. F. Oaker sold 6,000 qts. to the Captain last week at \$10.50 for No. 1 Merchants. The general price is \$10.00 amongst the merchants. The Spaniard is under less expense in getting the fish to market than any other exporter and can afford to give this price.—Trade Review, Aug. 25.

Nelson's Love-Letters

Just three weeks before Europe was plunged into war, a remarkable series of love-letters written by Nelson to his wife appeared at Christie's, the well-known London sales room, especially of antiques and rare books. Although the well known firm of Quaritch was not armed with a commission at the sale, Mr. Edmund Dring, the manager, felt it to be a patriotic duty to save and hold the collection for England, and, accordingly, he beat all comers at \$2,200. This gentleman now states that, after nearly two years, an enthusiastic patriot has made the effort to buy the letters, and, moreover, has promised that they shall remain in Great Britain. He has also hinted at his wish some day to leave them to the nation.

At the present time these 230 letters have a vivid interest, particularly those passages in which the great admiral writes proudly about the British Fleet. A few extracts will suffice to prove their truth today.

Sept. 11, 1793.—"The perseverance of our Fleet has been great, and to that only can be attributed our unexampled success."

The Navy Was Supreme March 4, 1794.—"My seamen are now what British seamen ought to be—all most invincible."

July 1, 1795.—"Thank God the superiority of the British Navy remains, and I hope ever will."

In a letter dated Sept. 15, 1795, Nelson wrote some words which tersely sum up the European situation as it stands at the present moment: "As for the German generals, war is their trade and peace is ruin to them, therefore we cannot expect they have any wish to finish the war."

With these fascinating letters is a manuscript account of the Battle of the Nile, written by E. Pourielque, the French Controller-General of Expenses in those days. On the first leaf of this Nelson wrote an illuminating comment: "This gentleman seems to know so much more of the battle than I do, that I will not venture to contradict him. I am satisfied with it, if he is."

Last, observe the note of cheery optimism when he lost his eye—in a spirit which animates so many of our wounded heroes today: "You will expect me to say something about my eye. It is no blemish, so my beauty is saved."

Letter from Harry Russell

Moore Hospital, Eng., July 29th, 1917.

Dear Father—I am well and fairly good except my wound bothers me a little, but will soon be over, as it is not very dangerous, because the bullet went through the fleshy part of my shoulder, just below the joint, and the doctor found a piece of shrapnel in my elbow, which I didn't know anything about because my shoulder pained so bad. I didn't know whether I had any arm or not.

Well, father, I have seen some things I never shall forget. Would like for you to be over in France to see how the boys go to it when they are given the order to charge. As for myself I was a little scared for the first day or so, but I soon got over that. I saw lots of fighting the few days I was in the trenches. But the night I got hit was the worst I seen for the time I was there as the Germans came up, battalion after battalion. We had enough of it before we got them on the go. I was in the fight 19 hours before they got me, and the fight only lasted 23 hours. I was only wounded four hours when I was back of our lines in dressing station. I lost quite a little blood but not enough to make me weak.

I have a German helmet to bring back with me, which I took off a dead German Sergeant. I have a couple of months off before I go back again, but I won't go in the trenches when I return as I am going with my old battery, and that is behind the trenches. Now I will close as I can't write any more. Take care of yourself. Love to all. From your loving son, Gunner Harry Russell.

[The above is a copy of a letter from Gunner Harry Russell, son of Mr. Asariah Russell, formerly of Country Road, but now residing in Millinockett, Maine, U. S. A. Harry volunteered for the Navy in St. John's at the beginning of the war, but being rejected as too young he went to the United States with his parents. While in Millinockett he thought he would try again, so in 1916 he went to St. John, N. B., and enlisted as a private in a Canadian regiment.—Editor.]

Battle on the Labrador, is making itself famous again this Summer. Nothing like the fishery there this season has been seen for 40 years. Fifty vessels carrying from 800 to 900 quintals of fish have already loaded and left for home ports in Newfoundland. About 70 others were there last week, all well down in the water. It is estimated easily that 80,000 quintals of fish will come out of Bateau this Summer. Value this at \$8.00 a quintal, we get \$640,000. Nearly all the schooners fishing there are from Trinity Bay and Bonaville Bay.

Wedding Bells

A very pretty wedding took place at St. Mary's Church, Glace Bay, C. B., on August 7th, when Miss Lorena Mercer, daughter of John and Selina Mercer, Mercer's Cove, was united in marriage to Mr. William T. King, of New Aberdeen, C. B.

The bride who was charmingly attired in a gown of white silk with wreath and veil and carried a handsome bouquet of white lilies, was given away by Mr. L. Evely, of Carbonear. She was attended by Miss Effie Corkum, while Mr. Jabez King, brother of the groom, acted as best man. At the reception which followed the ceremony only the immediate friends of the contracting parties were present. The number of presents were large, which show the esteem in which the young couple were held. Mr. and Mrs. King will reside at New Aberdeen.

Grandma's Fruit Cake

One cup dried apples, one half cup sugar, one and a half cups molasses, one half cup shortening; one half tea spoon cloves, one half tea spoon salt, two tea spoons cinnamon, two eggs, one cup sour milk, two and one half cups flour, one and one half tea spoons soda. Cut the dried apples in small pieces, soak over night in water to cover. In the morning add one cup of the molasses and cook slowly until the apple is tender; let cool; add remainder of molasses, sugar, well beat on eggs, and sour milk, add melted shortening. Lastly add flour, into which has been sifted soda, salt and spices. Bake in moderate oven. This cake is better for being kept a few days, and if wrapped in paraffin paper and kept in covered cake box will keep for two or three weeks.

Public Notice

The attention of the Public is called to Section 32 of the Post Office Act, 1891, which provides that the P. M. ORDER IN COUNCIL

Made under The War Measure Act, 1914-1916

"All stocks of Salt held by mercantile firms, or their agents in St. John's, at Battle Harbor, and at such other places as may hereafter be designated by proclamation, are hereby placed under the control of the Tonnage Committee of the Executive Council, and no such Salt shall be sold, delivered or otherwise dealt with except under the authority of the said Tonnage Committee."

The violation of this Order shall be an offense triable before any magistrate; on conviction the offender shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars and in default of payment to imprisonment not exceeding three months. Published by Authority

For the information of persons belonging to Newfoundland who propose to go to the United States of America, notice is hereby given that the Immigration Laws of the United States, which came into effect on the first May last, provide:

1.—That all aliens entering the United States shall pay a tax of \$8, but children under sixteen years of age, accompanying their father or their mother, shall not be subject to such tax. In the case of persons not remaining sixty days in the United States, the said tax will be returned upon their leaving the country.

2.—All aliens over sixteen years of age, who cannot read the English language, or some other language, will not be permitted to enter.

3.—Amongst other classes of aliens not admitted into the United States are the following:—Idiots, insane, epileptic, paupers, those physically defective and children under sixteen who are unaccompanied.

Cases have been brought to the notice of the Government where Newfoundlanders for one or other of the above reasons have been refused admission to the United States, and much disappointment and inconvenience, as well as expense, has been the result.

Shipbuilding

It looks as if Newfoundland is going to do its share in shipbuilding and help to make up the ocean tonnage of sailing vessels so badly depleted the past two years. The latest news in this connection is that there is another firm—American-making enquiries about purchasing a site on the water front at Harbor Grace to establish a shipbuilding dock, in addition to the one already in course of construction there by the Hannavig Shipbuilding Co., near Ship Head. There are no less than twenty-two large wooden ocean-going vessels of between 100 and 400 tons now in course of construction throughout Newfoundland which will be completed before next summer. Most of them will be launched before close of this year. The Anglo-Development Co. (Harnsworth) will build three large ones to take their pulp and paper to market.

Mother and Child Killed by Motor Car

Fatal Accident on Goulds Road Near St. John's

Mrs. Ethel Chafe, wife of Theodore Chafe, aged 27, and her three-year-old son, Douglas, lies dead, and another five-year-old child is at his home, on the Goulds road, near St. John's, seriously injured, as a result of being struck by a motor car near their late home, on the Goulds road, Sunday afternoon last about six o'clock. The owner and driver of the car, Pte. John Parker, was before Mr. Morris, K. C., Monday morning and formally charged with manslaughter. The facts in connection with the tragedy are substantially as follows:— Sunday afternoon Pte. Parker, accompanied by Sergt. Major Gardner and Ptes. Hogan and Curran and Parker's chauffeur, W. Baker, left the city for a motor trip countrywards. Pte. A. Hogan, who is a patient at Waterford Hall, left the party at that institution and was not with them at the time the accident occurred. Mrs. Chafe and her two children were walking east, on the left hand side of the Goulds road, she having the two children by the hand proceeding to a neighbor's house to meet another daughter who had been sent there on a message and was slow in returning. The deceased woman had not gone twenty yards from her home when the car was upon them. Evidently, when the car struck them two wheels of the motor were in the side drain and the woman had taken care to get on the extreme left of the road, believing that the car would pass there safely. Some few screams were heard by people in the near neighborhood, but ceased almost immediately. Those who arrived first on the scene are of the opinion that Mrs. Chafe's death was instantaneous, as her lifeless body terribly mangled, was found just by the road side. An examination by Dr. Tait it was found that the dead woman's neck had been broken, her lower jaw broken, her right leg almost severed from her body, the left hip was also badly crushed and several deep flesh wounds inflicted on other parts of the body. The three-year-old boy Douglas, had his left leg broken, the other apparent injuries would not cause death, and the medical men say his death, which occurred four and a half hours after the accident, resulted from shock. The elder child was restored to consciousness at an early hour Monday morning, but it is not yet known whether he will live. Drs. Brehm, Fraser and Anderson, the latter two live near by, were quickly on the scene. The poor mother was beyond human aid, and they devoted their attention to saving the lives of the children, which, it is hoped will be successful in the case of the elder child.

The news of the tragedy reached St. John's shortly after six o'clock. Inspector General Sullivan immediately took up the case. Dr. Tait, who had also been telephoned for, went out by motor car, with the Superintendent of Police and Detective Sergt. Byrne.

Having cared for the dead and injured Inspector General Sullivan enquired for the owner of the car, Pte. Parker. He found him at a house some distance away, where he had gone soon after the tragedy occurred, in a dazed condition. The Inspector General placed him under arrest and accompanied him to the police station, where he had him locked up on the charge of manslaughter. The accused was not questioned, but Detective Byrne was left at the scene to continue the investigation and collect evidence.

Having returned to town undertaker Collier was notified and he proceeded to the Goulds and took charge of the bodies. As a post mortem had to be held it was deemed best to take the bodies to town. This was done and mother and child placed in the morgue, where a post mortem was held.

The news of the terrible affair spread rapidly and the Police Court was crowded in anticipation of the court proceedings. At 11 o'clock Pte. Parker was brought into court. He was represented by Mr. W. J. Higgins. The defendant was not asked to plead to a charge of manslaughter. On motion of Mr. Hutehings K. C., who appeared for the Crown, a remand of eight days was granted; the prosecution, the preliminary hearing being set for Sept. 3rd. Pte. Parker's count

High Cost of Printing

In the printing business in Canada the cost of material has increased from 25 to 300 per cent and the 1917 wage schedule has brought up the cost of labour from 24 to 35 per cent. Book paper has increased from 64 per cent on news-print to 129 per cent on egg-shell book. Manilla has gone up 150 per cent, on Kraft wrapping and coated enamel from 51 to 66 per cent. Bond papers have increased in price from 50 to 140 per cent. Ink, of all grades, has increased from 25 to 300 per cent over the pre-war prices.—The Montreal Financial Times.

The S. S. Thetis arrived from Labrador Tuesday. A partial report of the fishery follows:—St. John's Tickle—Schrs. Billow, Eerger, F. P. U., Mary Rose, Minnesota, Etta May, Stanley Taylor, Annie Gladys, Gertrude Bureau, Anchorage, 250 qtls. each; Lillian Jane, loaded. Farm Yards, N.—Schrs. Josie F. 600 qtls.; Josephine, 500; M. Pearl 900; Rosaline, 350; and one other in Creek well fished. Farm Yards S.—Schooner Transvaal doing well; fish very plentiful.

Hopedale to Ilac—Very little doing. E. & W. Turnavick—Crews about 100 qtls. each; Dunn's crew have a fair voyage landed. Iron Bound Island—Doing well. Several schooners loaded. Hierlihy's schooners 1200 qtls. Ragged Island—Poor fishing. Cape Harrison—Poor fishing early part of season; crews 100 to 300 qtls. doing well when Thetis was coming south. Holton—Traps 200 to 400 qtls.; not much doing. Emily Hr.—Poor fishing. Horse Hr.—Poor fishing. White Bears—Nil. Indian Hr. to Smekey—Fishery fair. George's Island—Two schooners here well fished. Paek's Hr.—Nil. Long Island—Nil. Grady—Plenty of fish. McRae, 8,000 qtls. ashore. Black Is.—Crews from 300 to 500 qtls.; doing fair. Wolf Islands—Schooners 400 to 600 qtls.; fish plentiful. Indian Tickle, Red Point, Romino, Spotted Island, Gaiffin's Hr., Black Tickle, Batteau, Sandy Island and vicinity, where the great majority of crews fish, all have big trips. Salt ran short three weeks ago, and fishing had to be discontinued. Batteau—About 150 schooners loaded here. Griffin's Hr.—Biggest fishery in 40 years. Two crews report for 2300 qtls. Flat Islands—Munn's crew haul for 1100 qtls, taken at Sandy Is-lands. Webber's Cove—Crews 200 to 300 qtls. Seal Island—Not much done. Comfort Bight—Poor fishing. Bolter's Rock—Poor fishing. Ship Hr.—Very little done. Fishing Ship's Hr.—L. Dawe has 7000 quintals landed. Francis Hr.—Crews 150 to 200 qtls. Further up the shore the fishery has not been good.



Whereas We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint Terms or Sessions for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our Island of Newfoundland, at the several times and places hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, declare to all our loving subjects in Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island, shall be open and holden—

At Brigus on Friday, the Sixteenth, and Saturday, the Seventeenth days of November next;

At Harbor Grace on Monday, the Nineteenth, Tuesday, the Twentieth, Wednesday, the Twenty-first, and Thursday, the Twenty-second days of November next.

At Carbonear on Friday, the Twenty-third, and Saturday, the Twenty-fourth days of November next.

And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods hereinbefore prescribed at each of the respective places, as aforesaid provided the presiding Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do, by these Presents, further order and direct that in the event of a Judge who may preside in the said Court in the Northern District of Our said Island being prevented by unforeseen circumstances from appearing, Our said Court in any of the days hereinbefore appointed, or if the said Judge should be indisposed at any of the places hereinbefore named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and shall deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those hereinbefore specified; and to keep the same open for the respective periods hereinbefore stated, as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of gaols; and all other officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Our Mail Cars

A few years ago, during Christmas week or the week previous, a mail car was burnt near Clarendville with practically all its valuable contents. The mailman, Cashman by name, was severely censured, and if we remember correctly, was afterwards sentenced to a term in the penitentiary.

As there were considerable loose ends about mail car regulations at the time, strict orders were issued to mail clerks that nobody but sworn persons in the employ of the Post Office Department should be allowed to enter or remain in the mail car. A printed notice to this effect was posted in each mail car, and for a while was strictly observed.

But after the lapse of a few months some of the mail clerks got weary in well doing, and not wishing possibly to be alone, the rule was ignored. To-day it is quite a common thing to see persons who are not officials of the Post office Department travelling in these cars. By doing so they are grievously breaking the rule.

Our mail cars should be kept as private as our postoffices, where important documents, letters, newspapers, registered letters and parcels are deposited for transmission from one place to another.

This is one of many things that should demand the attention of the Postmaster-General, and we trust the matter will be quickly attended to.

And still another four appointments to the Legislative Council, and all residents of "the only place" in the country—St. John's. Better drop the word Newfoundland altogether, and call the Island St. John's. While we are doing that, let us have just one big district and call it St. John's. We really do not see that it would make much difference. Things would be, no doubt as well as they are now, and it would mean a big saving to the Treasury.

It is therefore unlawful for letters to be handed to passengers or conveyed by passengers clear of the Post Office, and any person may, and every person employed in the Post Office service shall seize any letters so unlawfully collected, sent or delivered in violation of the Act, and take them to the nearest post office and give such information to the Postmaster as he is able to give and is necessary for the effectual prosecution of the offender."

"All stocks of Salt held by mercantile firms, or their agents in St. John's, at B. G. Harbor, and at such other places as may hereafter be designated by proclamation, are hereby placed under the control of the Tonnage Committee of the Executive Council, and no such Salt shall be sold, delivered or otherwise dealt with except under the authority of the said Tonnage Committee.

"The violation of this Order shall be an offense triable before any magistrate; on conviction the offender shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars and in default of payment to imprisonment not exceeding three months.
