United States Revenue Cutter Orders Canadian Schooner Bayard off Grounds—Was Pursuing Otter Legitimately

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 16—A brand new international issue—more of many international issues playing their parts in the checked history of the sealing industry—is raised by information that has just reached Thomas Blacklock of this city, the senior member of the well known West Coast firm of Stockman & Dawley, whose schooner Thomas F. Bayard, is one of the fleet dispatched in the pursuit of sea otter until the time arrived for the opening of Bering Sea to the hampered sealers of British Columbia.

WOULD DRIVE OUT CANADIANS. Niagara Falls, N. Y., Sept. 15.—In a resolution presented at a meeting of the common council the city clerk was directed to communicate with the secretary of state to the end that conditions now existing in the employment of Canadian workmen in the city be remedied.

POLITICAL MATTERS. Campbellton, N. B., Sept. 15.—Ever since last session, when Wm. Currie, M. P., complained in the legislature about the sheriff of Restigouche county dispensing the government patronage, because he had been a candidate at the last general election, several efforts have been made by the Conservatives to hold a convention to nominate candidates for the coming elections, upon whose shoulders would be placed the responsibility of patronage.

MANUFACTURERS DISCUSS TARIFF

Hamilton, Ont., Sept. 15—The most important business before the Canadian Manufacturers Association at this morning's session was the tariff report, submitted by Henry Cockburn, of Bradford, shortly before noon. It was discussed behind closed doors.

The committee to take charge of the new legal department will not be appointed until after the new president is elected tomorrow afternoon.

The report of the railway and transportation committee presented by J. C. Walsh of Toronto, provoked a lively discussion, as to whether the services of the specialist in charge of the department should be continued in collecting rebates and overcharges from the carrying companies.

Some of the delegates thought it was lowering the dignity of the association to meddle in private affairs. It was decided, however, to continue the practice of assisting individual members.

Another resolution was introduced asking express companies to reduce the minimum charge of 25 cents on small packages to 20 cents. Objection was taken to that part of the resolution which threatened to take the matter to the railway commission or ask the government to lower the rate or packages up to two pounds.

The resolution, with the objectionable clauses struck out, was approved and referred to the railway commission.

Discussion on the question of appointing a permanent tariff commission lasted for fully two hours, at the end of which the president informed the press that the association had decided in favor of the proposal.

Chief Campbell and Chief Detective Carpenter received an interesting visitor yesterday in the person of Professor John J. O'Brien, late inspector of police in Japan. His mission to the two chiefs was to see whether they would consider the advisability of allowing their men to learn Jiu Jitsu, which is the Japanese secret of defence. However, the chiefs wanted some practical demonstration to prove the efficacy of the Japanese overlevering methods, and they were convinced when Professor O'Brien had overthrown a couple of burly policemen and rendered them harmless.

The professor is of small stature, but has acquired the art of how quickly to overpower a big or a man who attempts to resist the police.

Jiu Jitsu is one of the physical courses which a policeman in England had to undergo and it is more than probable that as a result of Professor O'Brien's visit it will be adopted in Montreal for the police. He has already signified his willingness to give some lessons.

BIG DAY AT THE FREDERICTON FAIR

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 15—Although the weather today was cloudy and threatening the attendance at the provincial exhibition more than came up to expectations. Upwards of 2,300 people passed the turnstiles, which is 1,200 more than the second day last year and makes an increase of 1,500 for the two days.

Competition among the Ayrshire breeders is exceptionally keen and the outcome of the judging is being awaited with much interest. The largest herd of this breed is being shown by McIntyre Bros., of Sussex. Their herd consists of twenty-one pure bred animals, including the imported bull Sunrise and twelve grades. For the Ayrshire they have the imported cow Culivag, which already has several victories to her credit. Other exhibitors of Ayrshires are M. H. Paries, of Sussex; C. A. Archibald and Reiton Bros., and George Symes, of Midgie. Reiton Bros. came out from Scotland a few years ago and located on a farm near Truro. This is their first appearance in the capacity of exhibitors at a Canadian show.

Prof. Broadwick, aeronaut, was unable to make an ascension this afternoon on account of a strong wind which made it impossible to inflate the balloon. Conditions were more favorable this evening, however, and he made a successful ascension of about 2,000 feet, and while descending in a parachute he landed on the telephone wires in Government lane. He was rescued by an assistant in a few minutes, but not until he had received an electric shock. The balloon fell in the river and was picked up by a motor launch.

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 15—The preliminary examination of George Pass, of McAdam, charged with stealing jewelry from a C. P. R. train, was finished in the court this afternoon, and resulted in his discharge from custody.

The magistrate decided that the evidence was not sufficient to justify him in holding the accused for a higher court.

TYPHOID THREATENS HAMILTON, ONTARIO

Hamilton, Ont., Sept. 15—Hamilton is threatened with a typhoid fever outbreak. A number of cases have come in from Cobalt and six nurses at the city hospital have been stricken.
