Miss Sadler sang a solo and danced several more to satisfy the audience, while to illustrate her songs Mrs. Young and Miss Penny gave an exhibition of a dance that certainly caught the fancy of the house.

**DERAIL DEVICE FOR CROSSING**

Safeguard for C. P. R. Street Railway Crossing, at Fairville— Other matters before Commission

The St. John Railway Company was ordered by the Railway Commission of Canada, which was in session here yesterday morning, to place a derail device at the crossing with the C. P. R. at Fairville. The request of the farmers for a lower rate on milk shipped from St. John to Vanceboro was left for consideration at a later date.

H. L. Drayton, K. C. of Ottawa, chief commissioner, S. J. McLean and R. Richardson made up the commission that held the session. H. C. Groat, of the C. P. R.; H. M. Hopper of the St. John Railway Co., and F. R. Taylor, their counsel, were present as well as J. King Kelley, Councilors Bryant and Golding with Warden McLellan.

The milk question was introduced by Messrs. Schofield and Thompson of the Farmers and Dairymen's Association. The railway representatives tried to show that there was home market for all milk produced in the province but the farmers contended that there was a third-more produced than consumed.

It was finally decided to allow the matter to stand until the farmers had had a chance to submit more evidence by mail.

A. R. Sillip, M. L. A., R. F. Randolph, G. D. Palmer and C. Fred Chestnut, of the Fredericton Board of Trade, appeared before the commission. They complained of discrimination in excursion rates from Fredericton points west, as compared with rates from St. John, Moncton and points further east.

Chairman Drayton understood the western excursions were bad for the Maritime Provinces, therefore the higher the rates the better.

Mr. Sillip said that Fredericton, being further west than St. John, should not have to pay a higher rate but a lower rate to give relative justice. That was wanted. He asked that an effort be made to consolidate C. P. R. and I. C. R. traffic in one station at Fredericton.

Mr. Drayton said the commission had no authority in that matter. A fencing complaint from the North Shore was settled.

**G. F. PALMER RESIGNING**

Mr. Palmer said that while at the moment he was not in a position to say what he intended to do on leaving the Norton Griffiths Co. he had something else in view.

"The only thing I can say," said Mr. Palmer, "is that I expect to be in St. John or the vicinity all this summer and hope to remain in Canada for good."

Mr. Palmer has been in charge of the work at Courtenay Bay ever since it was started and his genial personality has made many friends in St. John. While his friends may regret to learn that he is severing his connection with the work of developing a new harbor at Courtenay Bay, they will be pleased to know that he intends to remain in Canada.

**THE COURTS.**

Exchequer Court

The case of the King, on the information of the Attorney-General of Canada, vs. Lemuel J. Tweedie came up for trial yesterday morning before His Lordship Mr. Justice Audette. This case involves a question of damages in connection with the expropriation of certain lands at Chatham for the purposes of the I. C. R. The crown admits the right of the defendants to a wharf and offers to pay \$215 for the same, but denies that the defendant has a title to other lands where the boom is situated. The defendant claims to have a good title to these lands if not by deed by possession of upwards of twenty years and claims \$20,800 damages for the expropriation of his lands, taking away his right of approach by the building of an embankment and destroying the booming possibilities. The session was taken up with the receiving of documentary evidence concerning the question of title. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C. and A. A. Davidson, K. C. are appearing for the crown, and M. G. Teed, K. C. and R. A. Lawlor, K. C. for the defendant.

Hon. L. J. Tweedie and David H. Buckley testified yesterday and the case will be contended this morning. Several witnesses were examined in Chatham Saturday evening.

**REPORTS AND ACCOUNTS OF CITY NOW ISSUED**

The reports and accounts of the city of St. John in book form made their appearance yesterday. The volume contains more than three hundred pages and shows the accounts and reports for the year ending December 31, 1914.

During the year 1,181 miles of pavement was put down besides general repair work. The streets treated with heavy asphalt oil and sand was 3,333 miles, while 1.8 miles was treated with calcium chloride, and 21,376 yards of asphalt was laid for streets and sidewalks.

In the water and sewerage department the water extensions amounted to 7,010 feet, new sewers to 5,833 feet. In renewal work 10,107 feet of water main was laid.

The total number of rate payers in the city last year was 14,102. The total value of real estate was \$18,334,300; personal property, \$9,967,700. Income taxes amounted to \$4,895,200. These totalled \$33,197,200.

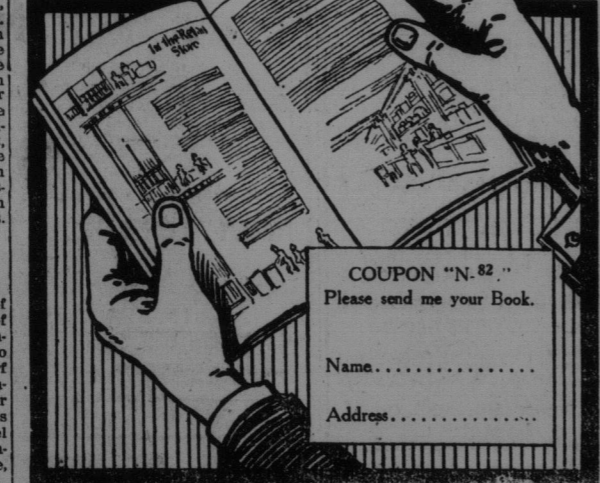

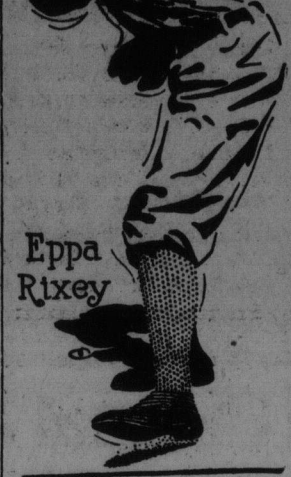
