Hay Making.

It is generally supposed that every farmer knows how to make hav: but many of them manage their having very badly. I consider the following points applicable to the case .-1-Get ready for having in advance. See that your machines are in good order, and as far as possible EXTENSIVE SALE guard against delays by breakage, the loss of nuts, &c, by having duplicate parts of machines that are most liable to get out of order; and also keep a supply of nuts on hand, to be used in the case of losing one while the machine is at work.

2-Begin your haying early if you have much to cut, as you lose less by cutting a part of your grass before it is ripe for the machine than you do by waiting till all of your grass is ready to cut; and then have to cut a part of it a week or two after it ought to be cut.

3-When the time comes to commence mowing, which should be when there is a prospect of fair weather, go ahead, and do not wait till the dew is off, on account of any injury the hay may sustain, as you will never be able to see any difference in value between hav from grass cut with or without the dews upon it -Of course, men differ on this point, and they will differ to the end of LAST of JULY.

4-Just as soon as the sun has dried the upper surface of the grass the spreading operation should commence; and you should have help enough to do the work well.
