Alderman Armstrong's Work Is Very Favorably Commented On.

To the Editor of the Advocate: I have taken considerable interest in civic affairs since the incorporation of this town and with your permission I would like to make a few remarks in reply to a letter signed "Newcastle" which appeared in the last issue of your paper.

The writer of the letter in question evidently wishes to convey the impression that Mr. Donald Morrison is about the only man in the town of Newcastle who is qualified to be its Mayor.

Now Mr. Morrison may be, and no doubt is, a very capable man, but I would be long sorry to think or believe that there is not another man in the town capable of filling the Mayor's chair. Indeed I am of the opinion that there are several citizens of this town who could shed a lance about the Mayor's chair which would not be surprised by Mr. Morrison. I believe that the composition of the present Town Council is one representative of the best class of citizens of Newcastle and that the affairs of the town are being administered in a business like way. We have at the head of the Board of Works, Mr. Armstrong. No man is doing more to advance the interests of this town than he. Mr. Armstrong is an active and progressive worker and merits every praise and encouragement in his work which he has undertaken. Ben Johnson once said that the man who is prejudiced in a matter of public concern is an enemy to his country. I for one am honest in my views on this question when I declare that Mr. Armstrong should be our next Mayor. I believe the town disregarded his best and try of every part that he happens along with an axe to grind and I listened to the small voice of reason. Incidentally in our citizens honest, broad minded views and the work of our best citizens will be recognized and appreciated.

A though I believe the Advocate is doing a good work and expressing the right sentiments I would like to see it a little more pronounced on some subject notably among which is the one I have referred to.

There was no hope of a speedy disappearance of the depression in the lumber trade.

Mr. Ritchie's observations on the political situation in Great Britain were somewhat pessimistic and no one could see what the future would be. The resignation of Mr. Wyndham, Chief Secretary for Ireland had been quite a stir.

JAPS GATHER IN REMNANTS OF CZAR'S ARMY

Many Russian Officers and Men Are Surrendering Every Day.

SITUATION HOPELESS.

Correspondent Declares Further Mobilization in Russia Is Impossible.

(Special to the Advocate.) Tokio March 14th, 11 a. m. A telegram received today from head quarters in the field says the direction of the enemy forces have been changing. The enemy has been dislodging the other forces from the direction of the Shikho river all of our forces are continuing the pursuit of the remnant of the enemy and many Russian officers and men are surrendering to the out post guards in the mountainous districts east of the Tio Pass road.

PERHAPS SO New York March 14th.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Chicago Globe declares that further mobilization is impossible in Russia at present if the mass of the people should declare itself against war.

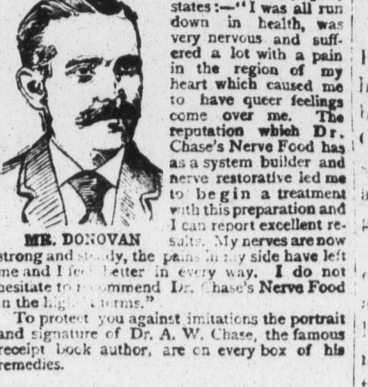

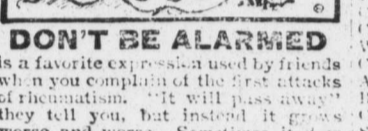

DEGRADING OUR TOWN.

In a recent issue of the Chatham World there appeared a lengthy account of a public meeting held in Newcastle for the purpose of taking steps to improve the moral tone of the town. Now we do not believe that immorality exists here any more than it exists in Chatham or any other town in Canada and we deplore the publicity given to the proceedings of the meeting mentioned above.

The St. John Sun and the Moncton Times announced two days before Nomination Day that Murray had been elected by acclamation. There is really nothing like having a reliable prophet on a newspaper.

THE MORE THE BETTER

In this issue there appears a letter deploring the publicity given to New Brunswick as a resort for big game. We cannot agree with the sentiments expressed by the writer. He is surely doubtless aware that there are vast tracts of land in this province which are absolutely worthless for agricultural purposes and that they are of little or no importance save to the lumber operator and to the interests involved in the pursuit of big game.

Failure of Prospective Candidate to Show up Gives Robert Murray His Election

#### VACANCY NOW FILLED

Saturday was nomination day in the Northumberland county by election to fill the vacancy in the Legislature caused by the resignation of Mr. W. S. Loggie, M. P. Mr. Robert Murray of Chatham was nominated by the supporters of the Tweedie Government and as there were no other nominations was declared elected by acclamation. The proceedings passed off very quietly. The day before nomination day Mr. Councillor Ephraim Hayes of Newcastle was in Newcastle and announced his intention of opposing Mr. Murray as an independent opposition candidate. He gave all whom he met the proverbial election handshake and he got quite a number of promises. A nomination paper was put in circulation on behalf of Mr. Hayes by his Nelson friends and it is said over 100 signed it in one day. Mr. Hayes was not nominated however so Mr. Murray has to face no possibility of defeat. What led Mr. Hayes to change his mind so suddenly will perhaps never be known.

In the course of his address from the throne Governor Snowball observed:—"It is a matter of congratulation that the year just closed has been a period of contentment and average prosperity. In connection with the lumber industry, however, I regret that during the past year considerable depression existed in the trade, particularly in the English market and for this reason, many of those engaged in the business have limited their operations during the present season. But it is gratifying to note that this depression, which it was feared would continue for a considerable period, has largely passed away. This industry is so important and gives employment to such a large number of our people, that its condition must always be a matter of the greatest concern to those who are charged with the duty of administering the affairs of the province."
