## SWIM COLLAPSES AFTER SENTENCE

Condemned Man Bears up Well in Court When Chief Justice McKewen Names July 15 as the day of Execution

Benny Swin is to pay the extreme penalty for the crime of murdering Olive (Swim) Trenchholm at Benton Ridge on March 27.

Friday at 12.45 the prisoner was brought into the court and when asked by Chief Justice McKewen if he had anything to say or any reason to give why sentence should not be pronounced upon him, he replied "No Sir."

The chief justice said: "After a trial in which everything that could be said, or could be done in your defence, the jury was unanimous in taking upon themselves the responsibility of saying you are guilty. I do not wish to add to your burden of grief by keeping you here with any extended remarks. In the few weeks of life that will remain to you before you meet your Maker, as we will all have to do, I would advise you to call in the clergyman of your faith that you may make preparations to meet your God. The sentence is that on July 15, between the hours of 5 in the morning and 5 in the afternoon, you be taken from the county jail to the place of execution and hanged by the neck until you are dead, and may God have mercy on your soul."

While Judge McKewen was deeply affected, as were also the court officials, the doomed man received the sentence with the same coolness and say hearing that has characterized him all through the trial. He was immediately removed to the jail, where he suddenly broke down under the terrific strain that must have been under in the course of his trial. He became wildly hysterical and shouted that he did not want to wait so long for his execution. The court attaches could not quiet him and in his wild ravings he tore his clothes off and hung them in every direction. It was necessary for the administrator to order that he be restrained. His father was present at the court proceedings and seemed stunned by the sentence that was passed upon his son. His mother, who tried so hard to help him in his testimony, was not present, having returned to her home the previous day.

It is understood that no further legal steps will be taken in the case of the condemned man, and his only hope will be through the clemency of the governor-general. Swin was convicted April 27, just one month after Harvey Trenchholm of Bayfield, Westmorland county, and his young bride were shot and killed. (Details of trial next week.)

### TOWN COUNCIL

At the annual meeting of the town council on Monday evening the full board was present except Ald. McLeod and DeWitt, the Mayor presiding. The Marshall reported one arrest for disturbance on the streets and that he had broken up what might have developed to a gambling house. Before taking over the care of the pumping engine he said it should be overhauled by some experienced man. He reported that he had collected by execution the sum of \$253.70 taxes.

The committee appointed to look into the matter of procuring a town pump reported up success and recommended the establishing incinerator. The council instructed the clerk to write the Board of Examiners at St. John to have a man sent here to examine the fire hazard of the town with a view of getting a general reduction of insurance rates.

Next Monday there will be a special meeting to consider the loaning of money under the Housing Act. The treasurer reported that only

about \$500 of back taxes was still to be paid. The street committee have \$500 to expend on sidewalks and there will also have to do considerable filling on Main street near Harry Lippsett's and completion of the sewer on Hillcrest Avenue.

The application of Dr. Macintosh for sewer connection was left to the road committee. Ald. W. B. Nixon reported the recent fire and commended the good work of the firemen. He suggested that suits be procured for them. The police and poor committees had report and a number of bills were passed when certified. An application for an additional water supply for The Observer, Ltd. was left to the water committee.

Aldermen Hagerman, Hatfield and W. B. Nixon were appointed a committee to enquire in the condition of the cemeteries and to ascertain what could be done to better it. A proportion of those outside of the fire protection area was present to find out why they had to pay a higher tax rate while those living inside the fire protection paid less. This evoked heated discussion.

## HARTLAND ESCAPES SERIOUS FIRE

Old Exchange Hotel Building Wrecked on Friday—Was Occupied by Hartland Fruit Co.

On Friday of last week fire broke out in the attic of the old Exchange building, and while the fire corps under the direction of Chief Guy W. McLaughlin did very commendable work and actually saved the town from destruction, the building inside was completely ruined and is considered beyond repair. So well confined was the fire kept that the outside of the building shows very little damage. A high wind was blowing at the time and had the fire got through the roof and out of control nothing could have saved the wooden portion of the town from destruction. The store was occupied by the Hartland Fruit Co. as residence and store. Practically all of the goods were saved in a more or less damaged condition. There was some insurance but not sufficient to cover the loss, and the fire is particularly unfortunate in that it comes just at the opening of the season.

Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Thornton and Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Thornton who were rendered homeless by the blaze are stacking with friends in town and have not yet decided upon what course they shall take.

The Exchange Hotel was built in 1866 by the late T. J. Boyer and was conducted by him as a hotel up to 1881 when he removed to Woodstock. Present owners were B. N. Shaw, A. Thornton, W. F. Thornton. At the time of its closing it was the oldest hotel from the point of continuous operation, on the river.

A sad death occurred yesterday afternoon when Mrs. Annie Belrose of Rockland Road died after an illness of five days. Yesterday at noon the patient was in extremis and as the last hope an operation was urged but her condition was beyond surgical skill. The report that Mrs. Belrose was operated on for appendicitis is altogether incorrect. The deceased was a woman highly esteemed and was a daughter of George Faulkner. Mrs. Bessie Sealey is a sister. Besides the husband several children including a new born infant survive.

## BASE BALL NOW OR NEVER

Meeting Called For Florenceville Friday Evening—All Fans Should Be There

A meeting of baseball fans was called for last Monday evening at Florenceville, and since there were respondents from only two towns the meeting was postponed and is called again for Friday night at McIsaac's Hotel, East Florenceville, and one or two delegates are earnestly requested to attend from Woodstock, Hartland, Florenceville, Centreville, Bath, Bristol, Perth and Grand Falls. It is hoped to re-organize a league somewhat on the principles of last year, and it is much to be desired that professionalism or semi-professionalism should be eliminated. It has been suggested that the American towns be brought in, but one objection that may be put up to this proposition is that the Americans have better material available in the summer months. It is not likely that the rules of the M. P. A. U. will this year govern the local league. What is most desired is to see fewer imported outsiders whose only ability is to play mediocre ball, and the most that is desired is to see more pep and ginger among the home boys, those who will show more eagerness to get into the field and play than to sit on the bench and root.

It costs money to run a baseball team and the players themselves have not, as a rule, shown themselves very keen financiers. Each team requires a strong financial head, and this is really more important than great players, for it is much better and far more decent to close the season out of debt, even though they may come out as the tail end of the league games, than to lead the games and have a deficit of \$1,000 to \$2,000 that somebody has to pay for—and the burden never falls upon the players.

## BUILDING OF N. B. RAILWAY

Messrs. Caldwell and Hanson Want Branch Line Built Between Valley and Eastern Maine Roads

Ottawa, May 1.—Speaking on a resolution of his asking for construction of a branch line connecting the St. John & Quebec Railway with the Eastern Maine Railway, Messrs. Caldwell and Hanson (Progressive, Carleton Victoria) in the House of Commons today said his main purpose was to help to reduce the deficits of government lines in the maritime provinces. This line would pay for itself in ten years. Today railway construction was pretty nearly back to normal and with unemployment still severe, Mr. Caldwell thought the government could consider the motion favorably.

A. B. Hanson (Conservative, York-Sunbury) also urged construction of the road, saying that the project was by no means a new one, but one which had been held up purely of financial stringency.

Hon. W. C. Kennedy, minister of railways, said that he would take up the matter once more with the director of the national railway. He did not think it desirable to say which of the two American roads would be linked up with the Canadian line. The motion was declared "lost on division."
