## Bonaventure Manslaughter Case.

Eloquent Address Made by Mr. Kelly in Behalf of the Prisoner, who has been Acquitted.

(Quebec Telegraph.)

The case of the King vs. Richard Murray, charged with manslaughter in connection with the Cross Point murder case, was continued yesterday, afternoon, when Mr. J. H. Kelly, the young advocate from New Carlisle, who has been conducting the defence of the accused from the date of his arrest in July last, addressed the jury in English. Mr. Kelly made an eloquent appeal in behalf of his client and in a speech that lasted over an hour and a half, fully analyzed all the evidence adduced at the trial in a masterly manner. It is his first case since his admission to the bar last June, and judging from the way he acquitted himself in the performance of an important duty, he is destined to take his place among the foremost eminent lawyers of the country before many years.

Mr. Kelly, on behalf of the accused Richard Murray, reviewed the facts of the case and during two hours pleaded the case of his client with strength and energy. The court house was packed at an early hour all awaiting to hear the address of Mr. Kelly, who had made a very high mark for himself as an orator during the three past years that he had spent in the city of Quebec. He opened his address by asking the jury to consider, not his youth or his inexperience, but only the weight that had rested on his shoulders since he first took up this case, and the importance of the mission that had been confided to his hands, the most important mission that a lawyer in his profession may ever be called upon to perform, the task of defending a man of his own flesh and blood and to plead before twelve of his countrymen for a verdict of justice and equity towards his client.

He asked the jury to come with him in imagination to Cross Point, a little village situated on the river Restigouche, and to view this little country place from the morning of the eventful day that cast sorrow and sadness in many a happy home. On the side of the river, an acre or less from the shore is the home of William Murray, one of the oldest settlers of Cross Point and one of the most respectable families. On the morning of the crime, Mr. Murray and his two sons arose as usual and commenced their work. After breakfast the father went to his farm and the two sons commenced their daily work at the wharf which was being built opposite their home. They worked hard all day and returned home happy for dinner, and after dinner, about five in the afternoon, the father, William Murray, is seated on his gallery and his two sons are working below the little hill along with John Garrahy and under the guardianship of Mr. Jas Quinn, of Cross Point.

He then repairs to the home of the deceased. On the morning of the crime he left home as usual as he had done many a day before and goes to Campbellton and spends his day drinking here and there, and finally at five in the afternoon he takes the ferry boat to cross over from Campbellton on his way home. He is still under the influence of liquor. On the boat he meets Archibald Gerrard, a young man in the flower and vigour of youth. He commences a row with Gerrard and Gerrard strikes Mann a blow sending him falling to the ground. This was the commencement of the fight that ended in the death of Richard Mann.

The boat lands at Cross Point, Mann and his friend, the Indian, Louis Michel, go up the bank and follow the road along the top of the hill. Gerrard and his friend take the road going in the same direction, but below the hill, Gerrard and Allison are sober. They drive along the foot of the hill and stop at the blacksmith shop. Why did they stop their team there? Had they any reason for doing so or were they not waiting for the two drunken men coming up the top of the hill. The events that ensued evidently show that they were waiting for the two drunken men coming along above them. The team is stopped and the two drunken men come in sight. The Indian goes down the hill to where the team was stopped and takes Gerrard by the leg. At that very moment Allison, also a young man instead of starting his horse up the hill jumps down, strikes the Indian and commences kicking him. Mann seeing the fight also comes down. He is standing as a silent witness when Gerrard, who was still in the team, viewing this poor helpless victim standing before him, a man away up in the fifties, jumps down from the truck, and approaching Richard Mann strikes him a blow in the face, which sent him reeling to the ground, draws back and kicks him, and then seeing the blood running from his victim's face, he rushes forward and lands with his two feet one upon the breast and the other on the face, sending the soul of Richard Mann without a moment's notice or preparation on its eternal journey to appear before its Lord and Creator.

What had Richard Murray been doing in the meantime? He was occupied in his work, and seeing the crowd going on, he runs to the assistance of Richard Mann. He pulls Gerrard away from Mann and makes him get on his truck. He does the same with Allison and makes them drive away. He had intervened in the fight to go to the assistance of the man for whose life he now stands accused. The team drives away and Mann is seen rising to his feet. He moves according to the evidence of Paul Wilnot in a stooping reclining position for about ten feet, and hills against the bank. There he lies. A few moments lapse and no one touches him. During those few moments he is motionless. Of all the witnesses heard no one saw Mann move before Richard Murray touched him. He was evidently dead, and had fallen where he lay when seen by the witnesses. Richard Murray seeing this man lying there in the cold approaches him and taking him by the shoulder says, "Get up out of this and go home, you have caused all the trouble." At the same time he gave him a shove with his foot in the thigh and leaves Mann drop and upon looking more closely sees that Mann was dead. Everything had been so quickly done, that he had never suspected that the spark of life had already died away before he had lifted him up. He ran for water, but alas, it was too late, Mann was dead.

These are the facts, Gentlemen of the Jury, such as they took place and such as they have been related to you by the crown's own witnesses. Upon the first part of the row all agree that Gerrard jumped on Mann and kicked him in the face, but about the last part there are contradictions. Upton says that Richard Mann was standing when Gerrard left him, but Paul Wilnot a crown witness, who standing at the same place over 135 feet away, says he was lying down. No two of the crown witnesses agree upon that point. The other crown witnesses Johnson, Day and Dixon say that they saw one kick at Mann but cannot swear that it was the accused Richard Murray. All

these witnesses were standing at a distance of over 150 feet and the hill prevented them from having a clear line of vision. These witnesses had contradicted themselves with the evidence given at the preliminary investigation, with the exception of Johnson. The speaker asked the Jury to place aside the evidence given by these men, viz: Upton, Dixon and Day, and to take the evidence as given by the witnesses who were within a distance of five or six feet, namely: Quinn and Garrahy. The evidence as given by these two men who were within a few feet of the row was in perfect harmony and unity with one another and alone should be taken into consideration, and their evidence substantiate the facts as above related, that Gerrard and Allison commenced the row, that Murray came mixed up with it while going to the assistance of Mann, and that when Mann was lifted up by Richard Murray that he was dead.

There was absence of motive why Richard Murray should have tried to take the life of Richard Mann. Gerrard had a reason—He had been provoked by Mann and had commenced the fight, whereas Richard Murray had gone to his assistance.

Mr. Kelly scored the crown for not having brought Gerrard as a witness. Why had he not been called? If he were innocent he would have been the best crown witness, but the crown had not called Gerrard, for probably had he been called he would have left the witness box to take the place of the accused at the bar.

He also scored the Crown very severely for not hearing Mrs. Dixon as a witness. Why had she not been called? Why had she been called as a witness and not been heard? She had been the principal witness at New Carlisle, and it was her evidence that the accused had been arrested at Cross Point. She had been the instigator of all the stories that had been circulated and her evidence was a mass of contradictions, first with herself and then with the other witnesses heard, and the Crown knew that had she been heard as a witness, their case would have been worse than it really is, and consequently they decided to send her back home without being heard.

Mr. Kelly next made reference to the change of Venue. He had asked that the trial be taken to Quebec. It was not because he did not believe that there were no just men in his own country to judge of his client as it had been circulated. The people of our country are as brave and an intelligent class of people as can be found anywhere. The reason why he had asked for a change of Venue was because public opinion had been aroused against the accused by the false stories that had been circulated by Mrs. Dixon.

and others who knew nothing about the affair, and who had done everything in their power to turn the trend of public opinion against his client. He (the speaker) was asked by his clients to ask for a change of Venue, and he felt it his duty to do all in his power to attain the object for which they were aiming at.

Mr. Kelly's last appeal to the Jury was very touching and every one of the twelve jurymen wept at the recital of the sufferings undergone by his client and his family since the night of the crime, in which the accused at the bar became mixed up with going to the assistance of one for whose life he now stands accused. After the Judge's charge the Jury retired and after ten minutes deliberation returned a verdict of "Not Guilty." Richard Murray was a free man. He had stood his trial and his country, and his peers had found him innocent.

He was followed from the court house by hundreds who had listened to the evidence and who knew he was innocent. The verdict was a popular

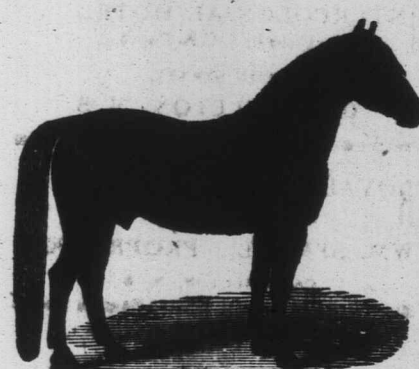

### AN EFFICIENT MINISTER.

Under the above caption the Fredericton Herald has the following to say in regard to our popular representative in the Provincial legislature:

Mr. LaBillette gave a detailed statement of the important matters under his jurisdiction in the public works department and all who heard the honourable gentleman's explanation, and may read his address, must be impressed with the complete grasp he has of his very responsible position."

"The department committed to Mr. LaBillette's care is the largest spender in the government, and the money disbursed through his office is more general perhaps than that of any other. That Mr. LaBillette discharges his duties with a conscientious regard for the best interests of the province, and with a degree of success and fairness that commands admiration is admitted by even the opponents of the government. No more industrious chief commissioner than he ever held the position. He gives his entire time to his position; and the public money under his direction are honestly expended."

"Mr. LaBillette in the agricultural department proved himself an efficient man, and in the public works department he is giving a service that is very sincerely appreciated throughout the province."

IN another column is published the address to the Jury of Jno Hall Kelly, L. L. D., Counsel for the defence of Richard Murray in the manslaughter case of the late Richard Mann.

In considering the case, and knowing that in the interim since the New Carlisle trial, there has been little public sentiment in the matter, our own judgment was that as to the Quebec trial, silence was golden, but for this, by the public we have been censured they must know that there was of the wind up and thus it is we reproduce Mr. Kelly's able and eloquent address. Many may perhaps say, Bonaventure's rising orator at times speaks without a soul, others will applaud, but in that address the speaker must get consideration; he is a lawyer standing before his countrymen when every syllable of expression is directed in endeavor to clear a fellow creature from the pro-

bability of the awful charge of murder. In aught that might be said, the strongest thrust could but at its worst, wound another's feelings, while in the alternative it was safeguarding against a possible charge of the worst of human sins.

In the light of this we think fairness demands will interpret a-right Mr. Kelly's address.

THE Woodmen's Lien Act introduced in the Legislature by Mr. H. F. McLatchy has been withdrawn owing to a settlement being effected between the parties interested. The basis of settlement is as follows:—

The workmen are to receive 64 per cent of the amount due them, providing their aggregate claims do not exceed \$25,000. If they go beyond that amount Edgcombe and George H. Eaton, Calais, who is acting with him will not be required to contribute a sum in excess of \$10,000. The balance now in hands of curator at Quebec amounting to about \$8,000, is to be assigned to them by the workmen so that they will have to put up only half the amount named out of their own pockets. The money is to be deposited in a bank at once by a disinterested party who will be chosen to adjudicate on the claims of the workmen.

### Our Shipping Facilities.

Mayor Murray returned home last Saturday from Ottawa, where he had been for several days in the shipping interests of the town. The several matters brought before the Minister of Railways, and Minister of Marine were all agreed to and orders given to have the additional facilities provided at once. A turn table is to be put at the end of the present Railway track and an additional track laid to the eastern end of the wharf, so that cars can be placed the entire length of the wharf from West to East and loaded from the side of the cars instead of one car at a time from the end.

A moving buoy is also to be placed in the Harbour and a light ship at Oak Point.

Mr. Murray says that Mr. Reid M. P. pressed these matters very strongly on the Minister of Railways and assisted very materially in securing the improvements. Mr. K. Shives was the leading spirit in looking after these matters.

## Bonaventure Public Works

### Grant of 15,000 for Matapedia River Bridge

Ottawa April 16. Mr. McKenzie, chairman of the Bay Chaleur Navigation Company, who was here for some days informed the Department of Trade and Commerce that his company had been unable to find a suitable boat for the service and withdrew their tender.

The contract has therefore been awarded to Mr. Connolly who undertakes to put in a good boat and to run to Campbellton if the channel &c. is suitable. It is thought that Mr. Connolly is negotiating for the Str. "City of Key West" and that to open the season until he has secured that boat he may put in the "Admiral" temporarily.

The promoters of the new company deserve credit for all the trouble and expense they went to to secure a boat. Their action has had the effect of opening the eyes of the old company to the necessity of an improved service.

Messrs Reid, Marcell and McKenzie saw Mr. Prefontaine for the purpose of securing a light ship for Point a la Garde to facilitate shipping to and from Campbellton. The minister promised to have the matter looked into at once. The new light house at Duthies Point, New Richmond is thus

A lighthouse has been erected by the Government of Canada at New Richmond, County of Bonaventure and the light will be put in operation on the opening of navigation 1904.

Lat. N. 48 10 20  
Long W. 65 53 45

The lighthouse stands on the southwest extreme of the point on the east side of the mouth of Grand Casapedia river, locally known as Duthies point, 50 feet back from the top of the bank. The structure is an enclosed wooden tower, square in plan, with sloping sides, surmounted by a square wooden lantern, the whole painted white. It is 33 feet high from its base to the top of the ventilator on the lantern.

The light will be a fixed white light, elevated 50 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 12 miles from all points of approach by water. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric of the seventh order.

Tenders are being called for the following work in Bonaventure County: Paspébiac Wharf, April 28; St. Godefroy Breakwater and Wharf May 11; St. Charles de Caplan Breakwater May 11.

Mr. Marcell's bill to incorporate the Casapedia Manufacturing and Trading Co., with a capital of \$2,500,000 has been adopted by the Commons and sent to the Senate. He has introduced the bill to incorporate the International Railway Bridge Company of New Brunswick between Campbellton and Cross Point.

The Quebec government have informed Mr. Marcell that an item of \$15,000 will be voted this session for the Matapedia River bridge and that work will be proceeded with this summer.

## The Bay Chaleur Boat Service

The New Company Abandons  
Project

In our last week's paper we stated  
that the "Steamer 'Argyle'" had been  
purchased for the Bay Chaleur Service  
but we regret to learn that this was  
a mistake.

The Hull Inspector passed the boat  
and gave a very good report on it. Cap-  
tain Poulliot said the boat was in  
every way fitted for the service. It was  
a couple of days before Mr. McKenzie  
could get the boiler inspector's report  
It was not very satisfactory. He stated  
that he did not know whether they  
would stand in salt water. Mr. Mc-  
Kenzie then wired Mr. Johnson who is  
mechanical foreman with the McLaugh-  
lin people at Annapolis to meet him at  
Ottawa.

Mr. Johnson was of the op-  
inion that if the boilers would stand  
one season she would still be a very  
cheap boat and new boilers could be put  
in during the winter for \$3000.

Mr. Johnson gave the boat a thorough  
examination and reported that the  
boilers would not stand the season in  
salt water and could not recommend  
the purchase. The inspector stated  
that the only other boat suitable for  
the route that might be purchased was  
the "Nimble" owned by the Algon-  
quins S. S. Railway Co. now in dis-  
cussion. They however wired that  
they were negotiating with the Ontario  
Government for a loan and giving se-  
curity on their property. If they did  
not succeed would be pleased to take  
the matter up.

Hon. Mr. LeMieux, Mr. Marcell and  
Mr. McKenzie then decided that it  
would be a waste of time to try and do  
anything further this season. They  
called upon Sir Richard Cartwright and  
stated that they were unable to pro-  
pose a suitable boat and Marcell laid  
before the Minister the importance of  
having the service extended to Camp-  
bellton and received his assurance that  
this would be done.

Coun Murray submitted special reports from the Electric Light and Finance Committees in resume of the past year, which were adopted. The former report will be found in another column, the latter being held over till next issue.

It was moved by Coun Adams, seconded by Coun McDonald that a Com be appointed to impress upon the Minister of Railways the need for better passenger service also to call the attention of the Minister of Marine to the necessity for improving the shipping facilities of the harbour, deepening the channel etc. Carried.

The Mayor and Couns. Adams and McDonald were appointed as above Committee.

A communication was read from Wm Borden Manager of the Borden Clothes Reel Man'g Co. Ltd., asking the town for exemption from taxes and free water supply for a period of five years.

This company have been considering a site for their proposed factory in Flat Lands which will employ about 25 hands all the year but if the town will grant their request they would locate here.

The Communication was referred to the Assessment Com.

Coun Murray moved the following resolution seconded by Coun Miller.

Moved by Councillor Murray, seconded by Coun. Miller. Where-

as on the 20th day of May 1903, the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton, acting under the authority of the Act, 60 Victoria, Chap 58, did by resolution to that effect, authorize the issue of four per cent 'Water and Light Debentures' for the amount of ten thousand dollars, for the purpose of extending the Water and Light systems of the said town, and Whereas owing to the restricted monetary conditions then prevailing especially in the municipal bond market, whereby debentures could not be disposed of at a price which would be considered satisfactory by the council, said debentures were not issued; and

Whereas by resolution of the said Town Council passed on the 27th day of July following, the said bonds were ordered to be issued and hypothecated with the Bank of Nova Scotia as collateral security for a temporary loan to be procured with said Bank at 5 per cent interest, and

Whereas no issue or disposition of bonds, as therein provided, or otherwise has been effected, and

Whereas at a meeting of the said Town Council held on the 25th day of November following the Finance committee reported that a call loan could be effected with a private individual for the aforesaid amount at the rate of 4 per cent per annum interest and a resolution passed authorizing said Finance Committee to effect such a loan and to deliver the bonds to said private individual subject to certain conditions and restrictions therein stipulated, and whereas the aforesaid loan was subsequently effected with Mr. A. E. Alexander at the aforesaid rate of 4 per cent but no bonds were issued.

Be it therefore resolved that the aforesaid resolutions of said Town Council passed on the 29th day of May 1903, the 27th day of July 1903 and the 25th day of November 1903, respectively, as well as the authority therein conferred upon the Finance Committee be, and the same are hereby rescinded and made of no effect.

Coun Murray moved seconded by Coun McDonald that the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton under the authority of the Act 60th Victoria Chap 58 do make and issue a debenture to be called 'Town of Campbellton Water and Light Debenture' for the amount of \$10,000 for the purpose of the extension of the Water and Electric Light Systems of the said town, said debenture to be redeemable on the fifteenth day of March in each and every year at the office of the Town Treasurer of the Town of Campbellton N. B. Carried.

Coun Murray moved the following seconded by Coun McDonald "that the bond authorized to be issued for \$10,000 be hypothecated to Mr. A. E. Alexander as collateral security for the call loan for that amount already received from him and that the Town Treasurer be authorized to pay Mr. Alexander amount of interest due him for said loan up to the 15th day of March, 1904."

Adjourned.
