

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

New York, April 28.
It is understood in Washington that Gen. Robert E. Lee has been invited to call upon President Grant at the White House in order to confer in reference to the reconstruction of Virginia. General Lee is now in Virginia, interested in the Valley Railroad, but intends visiting Washington when he will be the guest of Montgomery Blair.

Quebec, April 28.
The Grand Jury have found a true bill against Chabot for the murder of enigma Whitaker. The trial is fixed for Saturday next.

The river is still covered with floating ice, and ships which have arrived for Montreal are leaving for their destination.

London, April 30.
Advices from New Zealand to Feb. 15, state that a terrible massacre occurred there, during which Lieut. Gossyne, wife and family and six settlers were killed. The settlers arriving in the town report that the stores are closed and enigma flying at full mast.

New York, April 29.
Money continues plenty on good business paper. Gold closed at 134.

London, April 30.
The speech of the Mayor of Cork at the recent banquet in that city was the subject of debates in both houses of parliament this evening. The attention of members being called especially to the Mayor's language regarding O'Farrell, who attempted to assassinate Prince Alfred in Sydney as well as to his reference to the Prince himself. The Tories upbraid the Government with being the indirect cause of the state of Ireland.

THE BRITISH PRESS AND CABINET ON THE ALABAMA CLAIMS.

The rejection of the Alabama treaty and Senator Sumner's speech cause considerable feeling in England.

The Press generally treat Sumner's view as extraordinary and inadmissible.

At a Cabinet meeting the subject had been informally discussed.

Mr. Bright declared that this embarrassment need England right, but he argued that he would not consent to entertain the terms forwarded in Mr. Sumner's speech.

Lord Cardigan expressed his belief that the actual negotiations on the part of the American Government would be far less than the speeches of Senators and articles in the Press.

Mr. Gladstone professed to have good assurances from reliable quarters that the rejection of the Alabama treaty was purely a political stroke. He said the present administration will endeavor to settle the question on liberal and honorable terms.

DISTRESS IN BOSTON.—A meeting of working women was held at Boston, on the 21st ult., to consult over their affairs, and to devise measures of relief in their present most distressed and deplorable condition. At the meeting it was stated that there were 20,000 working women in Boston, and that numerous shops where upwards of a hundred were not more than from sixty to seventy five cents per week—that many have to live on one meal a day, and to secure even that have in many cases to resort to prostitution.

A HORSEBACK MARRIAGE.—The uncontracted condition of Washington county, Virginia, prevented licenses for marriage being issued, a week or two since, and parties near the Tennessee line were obliged to cross into that State to be made "perfectly happy."

The "Abingdon Virginian" tells a story of a young couple, with a retinue of friends on horseback, lately riding down some eight miles to the Tennessee line, and then being met by a clergyman and married, as they sat on horseback, side by side; after which the whole party turned, without dismounting, and rode homeward.

The U. S. Internal Revenue Bureau has determined that hereafter no cases shall be settled, dismissed or compromised, except by the decision of the solicitor, and no assessors, collector or district attorney will be permitted to negotiate on the subject. Compromises will be made only where the evidence shows an absence of intent to defraud and in all other cases the law will be enforced. No subordinate of the Bureau will be allowed to confer with claimants concerning their cases.

WHEREAS by the 27th section of the Act
31st Vic. Cap. 6, intituled: "An Act re-
specting the Customs," it is provided that "in all
cases where duties are charged according to the
weight, tare, gauge or measure, such allowances
shall be made for tare and draft upon the pack-
ages, as may be appointed by regulation made
by the Governor in Council."
And whereas it is desirable to establish a uni-
form practice at all the Ports of Entry in the
Dominion, in reference to the allowance for tare
on sugar—
On the recommendation of the Honorable the
Minister of Customs, His Excellency has been
pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the
following Regulations be and the same are hereby
adopted:
From and after this date, there shall be allowed
for tare on sugar imported in hogheads twelve
per centum, and in tierces, fourteen per centum
of the gross weight of each, and on barrels, an
allowance of twenty-six pounds each. On bags
in which sugar is imported, an average tare shall
be allowed, to be ascertained by weighing one bag
out of every ten.
If in any case, objection is taken to the above
scale of allowance for tare, then the actual tare
according to the original invoice may be allowed,
subject however to such examination, either by
actual weighing or appraisement, as may be
thought necessary by the Collector of the Port,
to prove that the actual weight of the packages
is not less than that stated in such invoice.
