Death of Dr. Dow.

Dr. Dow was born at Lindenville, Ver mont, U. S., on Christmas 1825, and was to Fradericton about 1848, and practised his prefession with marked success, for thirty wears in 1862 he was elected to the Legislative Assembly for York, leading the pell, and sat without interruption till 1870, when he was defeated. He was again re-elected in 1874, and defeated in 1878. Dr. Dow was a warm friend of Free Schools. He had a wide acquaintance in York County, and hosts of friends. The illness which caused was not unexpected.

From what has been published by newspapers friendly to Cleveland, it would appear that he has been guilty of indiscretions, but not of so serious a character, as his enemies represent. His great offence is stated as being improper intimacy with the widow in question, who afterwards took to drink, illtreated her child, which was taken from her by Cleveland's order and placed in an Orphan Asylum, while its mother was taken to an Inebriate Asylum. These facts were sufficient to found a story of seduction kidnapping and brutality, which is now be-

ing used against Cleveland, and apparently not without effect. Nor has Mr. Blaine, the Republican candidate escaped. When Cleveland's private record was being so eagerly scanned, and scandal evolved, where possible or otherwise Cleveland's friends ransacked Blaine's career. and an Indianapolis paper a few days ago published a sensational article in which state ments were made involving the honor of Mrs Blaine and her family. Mr. Blaine who was at Bar Harbor, Maine, when he heard of the article, at once telegraphed to a prominent lawyer in Indianapolis, to bring an action for criminal libel against the newspaper that had published the article. Blaine's denial is indignant and complete, and in the despatch he said :- " I have this moment received the atrocious libel of the Indianapolis Sentinel It is utterly and abominably false in ever statement and every implication. Politica slanders I do not stop to notice, but this editor assails the honor of my wife and my children. I desire you without an hour's delag to employ a proper Attorney and have the responsible publishers of the Sentinel sued for libel in the U.S. District Court of Indiane. It is my only remedy. I am sure honorable Democrats alike with honorable Rehonor of my family if need be with my life."
