# HARRY WILLS TRIMS FIRPO

Last Thursday evening at Boyle's Thirty Acres, New Jersey, Harry Wills administered to Luis Angel Firpo, the most severe whipping he has ever received during his boxing career. From the sound of the first gong to the last one the fight was a one sided affair-all Wills. The big colored man proved himself to be Firpo's superior in strength, boxing ability, ring craftsmanship and resourcefulness. At no stage of the game was he in danger of being knocked out while on the other hand he floored Firpo in the second round, sending him to the mat for the count

Firpo's most dangerous weapon, his terrible right that sent Dempsey over the ropes into friendly arms of newspaper reporters, thereby saving him from a defeat, was able only to draw from Wills pleasant smiles.

#### Editorial

GARVEY'S BLACK GOD.

Marcus Garvey advises black men and women to teach their children that God Himself is black. While we believe such an idea to be fooiish, grotesque and idolatrous, we believe we can see Garvey's reasons for advocating such teaching. He finds, as all black people do that the present color scheme of North America, at any rate, is calculated to humiliate and degrade the spirit of all black people. All things pure, grand and noble are attached to the white race; all standards of excellency are measured from the white race downward. The black race, by the present standard is consigned to the lower levels and to the humbler walks of life. Our children are unconciously taught these standards in school. All fine emotions and pleasing sensations are expressed in terms of "white" while most disagreeable emotions are generally expressed in terms of "black". As for instance: "a black taste," "a yellow streak", a "prue Monday."

Surely it must have been Garvey's idea to correct this error rather than suggest we become a race of idolators. A better thing to have suggested is to pay more attention to the essentials of character rather than the incident of color, for we are taught in His holy word that "God is a Spirit and they who worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth." When a race begins to visualize God in its own color it then begins to worship idols. "Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image; thou shalt not bow down unto them nor serve them." This commandment was meant to save the world from narrow national and racial isolation and from national and racial idolatry. It was meant to help the human spirit to reach the highest plain of indeavour for all people of every age. If other races and other people have made a graven image of color, if they bow down and worship it with even more reverence the general public and all who asthan that with which the worship the sisted, especially those who gave Spirit (God) that should be no reason their services gratis.


