All roads led to Rome in ancient days, but in modern times, at this season of the year, the roads in Western Ontario all lead to London. Many rivals to the Western Fair as a purely agricultural fair have had their epitaphs written, and the whip-poorwill sings his mountful song over their graves. In fairs, as in everything else, it is the fittest that survives; hence the Western Fair grows bigger and better, and is more generously patronized every year. Yesterday was Citizens' day on the programme, but a great many visitors arrived in London in the morning to "take in" the Fair who are not citizens. They are the sharp, shrewd farmers from all over the western part of the Province, who have come early to inspect the live stock and take note of prices, with a view to purchasing. These farmers are working into thoroughbred stock, which they find profitable, and they are willing to pay a good round price for a thoroughbred sire to take home with them. Before night they will have every animal on exhibition "sized up," and to morrow they will begin to "talk money." They have made no mistake; they have come to the right place to get what they want, and if the prices are right a good many of the choicest animals will change hands when the exhibimistake; they have come to the right place to get what they want, and if the prices are right a good many of the choicest animals will change hands when the exhibition closes. "I have got the best flock of Shropshires in Elgin," said a noted Elgin farmer yesterday morning, "and if there is anything better at the Fair I am going to have it, if it is for sale at a price I can touch; the farmer who expects to make a touch; the farmer who expects to make a living hereafter at farming has got to raise the best breed of animals and feed them and the sooner farmers learn this fact

THE REGINA EXHIBIT. The Regina exhibit is one of the most reditable at the fair. It occupies a position in the dairy hall, and has been neatly arranged by Messrs. Joseph Jackson and F. H. Miller, who have it in charge. The exhibit was collected and forwarded by the Regina Board of Trade, and unlike that from Mani-toba it is not assisted by public funds. Messrs Miller and Jackson are Ontario Messrs Miller and Jackson are Untario hoys. The former was raised in Huron and the latter in Middlesex, and they have brought a sample of their products to Ontario to show the old folks what they have been doing in Nick. Davin's "Flower-decked plains of the West." The samples of wheat are as good as are to be seen anywhere and will grade as are to be seen anywhere, and will grade No. I hard. The principal kinds of wheat shown, and raised in the Northwest Territories are the White Fife and Ladoga, the latter ripore sight. 45 bushels to the acre. 45 bushels to the acre. The straw is very bright and long. A binder can only cut a narrow swath and about five pounds of twine is used to the acre. The two-rowed barley shown is a fine sample, and was threshed before Messrs Jackson and Miller left the Territory. rowed barley shown is a line sample, and was threshed before Messrs. Jackson and Miller left the Territory, and yielded 60 bushels to the acre. They have in their collection 65 different kinds of natural grasses, which, in their turn, supply nourishment to stock the year round. Judging from the variety and quality of the exhibit, the Territory, when settled, will count when the world's produce is estimated. There has not been any frost in the Territory yet to injure the crops, and it is more fortunate than Manitoba in this respect.

### CHANGE OF TACTICS.

The Roar of the British Lion Has Quieting Effect on Russia

Berlin, Sept. 21.—Russia has suddenly changed her diplomatic tactics. M. Neli-doff, the Russian ambassador at Constantinople, has informally advised Sir William White, the English ambassador to Turkey, that the alleged occupation of Sigri, on the Island of Mitylene, by a British force, does not in any way concern Russia, and Count von Schouvalofi, the Russian ambaesador at Berlin, has explained to Chancellor von Caprivi that Russia disclaims any special privilege in the passage of the Dartanelles. A remarkable inspired article which ap-peared in the St. Petersburg Novosti yesterday and which was telegraphed here through a semi-official agency, offers the hand of friendship to Great Britain. "The empire of Russia," says the Novosti, "is already too extensive for her to desire to add to it by the conquest of India. If she is forced to undertake the enterprise at some future date, it could only be as an act of retaliation for hostility shown by Great Britain to the Czar's government in Europe. On the other hand, should Great Britain renounce her anti-Russian policy she would have nothing to fear from Russia as regards India." The Novosti concludes by urging the Salisbury Government to enter into a definite agreement with Russia at the present moment, when it could be done under more favorable circumstances perhaps than it could at any available glater terday and which was telegraphed haps than it could at any available later juncture. The article has given rise to the suspicion here that the Czar's Government is about to attempt to effect a compromise with England with a view to detaching her from the driebund.

Reports from several sections of North Wales show that the storm has flooded the valleys in that section of the country, and farmers have suffered severely.

Mr. Peter Moffatt, the petitioner, now advertises that "he was induced to become the petitioner by corrupt promises having been made to him by one Samuel Hughes and one Hugh McDougall; that he had no knowledge at the time he signed said petition, nor has he any knowledge now, nor has he ever had any knowledge of any corrupt practices of John Augustus Barron, either by himself, by his agents, or by other persons on his behalf, before, during or after said election." The

Whatever! may be the private views of Eir John Thompson on the question of Sir Hector Langevin's guilt, it must not be forgotten that he is not free to decide as he pleases and remain a member of the Government. As a lawyer, with experience acquired at the bar and on the bench to sift and weigh evidence, he must have been obliged to put his legal ingenuity to a severe strain to frame the conclusions of the majority report of the Privileges and Elections Committee. But unless he was prepared to leave the Government he could not do otherwise than frame a report which would be acceptable to the First Minister. And Premier Abbott was bound by many ties to stand by Sir Hector Langevin. They are fellow-boodlers of many year's standing They were together in the Pacific Scandal, and they have been together ever since. In the "Papers Relating to the Prorogation of Parliament on the 13th day of August, 1873," George McMullen tells what means were taken to procure the passage of Allan's Pacific Railway charter, and in additions to other payments made by Sir Hugh he says: "Mr. Abbott was authorized to promise Mr. Langevin \$25,000 to aid in elections about Quebec, on condition of his

friendly assistance, and Mr. Abbott reported that he had done so." This statement was confirmed by Hon. A. B. Foster, to whom it was submitted before publication. "I was aware of the agreement with Mr. Langevin to which you refer," Mr. Foster wrote, "as it was frequently discussed between us and Mr. Abbott." Mr. Abbott himself felt bound to qualify this statement in the evidence given by him before the Royal Commission; but his qualified denial is the most unlikely part of his story.

"The statement in that form," Mr. Abbott said, "is entirely untrue, but it is quite true that I had a conversation early in the session with Mr. Langevin about the expenses incurred in the elections at Que-

bec. Mr. Langevin mentioned to me that at the previous general elections he had been obliged to expend a very considerable sum of money, not very large in itself, but large comparatively, and he said he did not think it fair that the burden of those elections should rest entirely on him. He said he thought he ought to have a share in any funds subscribed in Montreal for election purposes to assist in Quebec, which he had not had in previous elections, and that they could not expect much of a subscription in Quebec to help the Government. I agreed with him in thinking that it was unfair that he should bear the burden of the Quebec elections, and I told him that in so far as I could have any influence in the matter I would try that he should have a portion of any fund which might be got up in Mon-

treal for general election purposes."

Then Mr. Abbott went on to say that in the conversation between them it came out that irrespective of Langevin's own election the elections in Quebec district would cost \$25,000 or \$30,000, and Mr. Abbott promised to endeavor to get something like that amount allotted to the district. "I never reported that I had made any arrangement with Mr. Langevin, though no doubt I did mention it to Sir Hugh Allan that if we got up a fund Mr. Langevin should have a part of it to the extent of \$25,000." A very likey story indeed in view of the fact that the money was coming from Sir Hugh Allan, and of Sir Hugh's own account of the way in which he forced Sir George Cartier to come to his terms before any election money was supplied. But it was when the first payment to Sir

THE WORLD'S FOOD SUPPLY.

Shortage of 200,000,000 Bushels in Wheat and Rye.

It is estimated that 500,000 bushels of wheat will be shipped from Deloraine, Man., this fall. It is anticipated there will be over 500,000 bushels of first-class wheat exported from the Antler district, including the territory up to Moose Mountain. So far the yields have been heavier than was expected, and the surplus for export should reach 20,000,000 bushels, probably more, if it could be saved without the waste which appears inevitable in Manitoba.

Accepting the largest estimates of pro-Accepting the largest estimates of production both home and abroad, and even assuming that the United States and Canada can export 225,000,000 bushels, the American Agriculturist still finds a deficit in the world's food supply of at least 200,000,000 bushels of wheat and rye, with the possibility of the shortage being twice as great. Added to this is the almost total failure of the potato crop in Ireland, and a serious curtailment in the yield of potatoes on the continent.
