

AN INTERESTING DISCOVERY.

A great find of ancient papyri in Egypt has been made by Grenfell and Hunt, who are working in behalf of the Egyptian exploration fund. At Behnesseh many ancient rubbish mounds yielded a rich store. In three nounds the quantity of rolls found is arge enough to warrant the assumpion that a part of the archives had bene thrown there. The papyri range from the Roman conquest to early Arab times. Each century is largely represented. Agreed On.

Vessels to be as Speedy as Any of the Ocean Greyhounds.

Ottawa, May 31.-This evening Sir Richard Cartwright, Minister of Trade and Commerce, will move that Parliament ratify the provisional contract made between the Government and William Petersen and Arthur Tait for the fast Atlantic service between Canada and the United Kingdom. The draft agreement assented to on March 13 of this year provides for the construction of four steamships, "to be constructed in all respects equal to say the Lucania and the Campania. They are to be built in conformity with the Admiralty requirements and specifications for auxiliary cruisers. The vessels must be 526 feet in length, and of a draft when loaded of not nore than 25 feet 6 inches. The gross register must be at least 10,000 tons, and the speed 21 knots per hour, or at least 500 knots per day. The vessels must have cargo capacity of 1,500 o 2.000 tons, of which 500 tons at least must be provided with cold storage. They must carry 300 first class passengers, and provide seats in the din-ing room for all of them; 200 second s passengers, and 800 steerage, 150 whom must be carried at a price exceeding \$15 per head. A fast and Harry Lamont, Admire, Kan. er must be provided of the torpede boat type, and at least 22 knots ed, to act as a pilot boat and meet the steamers on their approach to Canadian ports. The steamers are not to call at any foreign port. The ermini of the line will be Liverpool, England, and Quebec, in Canada, during summer, proceeding afterwards to Montreal. In winter they will make their Canadian terminus either a Halifax or St. John, at the option o the contractors, such option to be de lared by them before the date fixed for the commencement of the contract.

For this service it is agreed that a subsidy of £154,500 sterling shall be paid, of which the British Government shall contribute £51,000. steamers must be ready for commis sion before May 31, 1899, and half c the subsidy will be paid for a fortnightly service from that time till May 1900, when the other two vessels nust be completed, and weekly sailings begun. The company is forbidden o accept a subsidy from any foreign country or any colony, provincial or civic authority. No discriminating cates can be levied against Canadian ailway routes, and provision must be made to land either on the north or outh side of the river at Quebec, as he minister may direct. Mails must be landed at Rimouski if required, and all mails must be carried free in consideration of the subsidy. The company must deposit £10,000 in cash and a guarantee of £10,000 additional as ecurity for the fulfillment of the con-

"Mrs. Harriet Holman, who died last week in London, Ont., was for many years a unique figure in the history of the American stage, and the Holman Opera Company, which was managed by her husband, and later by Mrs. Holman alone, was for years an organization of a character which is now not only quite unknown, but incomprehensive as well. No recent development of the cheap companies that have grown up through the country supplied anything to be compared in the variety and scope of the performances with the plan of the Holman Opera Company. Mrs. Holman was called at times "the mother of opera" in this country, and she was doubtless entitled to that rather comprehensive title in view of what she did to make opera popular in cities that heard it first through the efforts of her singers. "Mrs. Holman, whose first husband




