





OAT CROP LIGHT IN MIDDLESEX

Good in Some Places, But on the Whole Crop Is Poor.

TOMATOES SUFFERING

For Lack of Moisture - Corn Crop Lighter Than Last Year - Some of the Others.

The reports concerning the oat crop throughout the county are anything but encouraging. There are some good fields to be seen near the city, and from this fact the persistent optimist has been contending that there is to be bumper crop throughout the county and vicinity. This is anything but the case, however. The farmers themselves estimates that about 10.5 of the land bearing oats will show a first-class crop, while the remainder will be only a fraction of that harvested in

This Looks Bad.

The counties lying west of Middle sex report good yields, and even in some parts of the county, notably those with light soil or on low-lying land, there is a good supply, but otherwise the crop is almost a total failure. The lack of rain has dried up the grain so that the most sanguine estimate places the yield at 12 to 15 bushels an acre. The grain is only standing about a foot high. One farmer remarks that the grasshoppers in his locality are getting bow-legged through trying to reach the grain from the ground. As a matter of fact the shortness of the crop is going to have far-reaching results. Already the results are noticed in the increased sale of horses. Some time ago it was almost an impossibility to buy a horse now the market is overstocked Owners realize that unless there is a sufficient amount of work to do to warrant their keep it is going to be very expensive thing to keep them through the winter. Not only because of the scarcity of oats, but beeause the supply of oat straw which is used considerably for fodder, will be practically nil, and as a result there will be a greater demand on the har

The Hay Crop. Now the hay supply itself will not be as large as last year, though the fine weather that has prevailed through its harvest assures a better quality.
