AUSTRIA'S COMPLETE SURRENDER.

S WITH BULGARIA and Turkey, Austria's submission to the Allies has been complete. No other course was possible, so weakened had Austria become through internal dissension, the heavy blows of the Allied armies and economic and financial collapse. Weeks ago it was apparent Vienna's unconditional surrender was inevitable. The unqualified acceptance of the drastic conditions does not surprise a world well aware the kaiser's main ally was all in. It is keenly interested, however, to learn just how directly the surrender will affect the big boss of the criminal band that tried to bludgeon the world into submission.

No doubt the Versailles conference decided as to the main terms and that with the view of a speedy subjugation of Germany. The terms call for complete demobilization of the Austrian A armies and the right of the Allied forces to march through Hungary and Austria against Germany's back door. With her main armies rapidly disintegrating, unable to cope with the stupendous Allied drive on the western front, it is not conceivable that Germany will prolong the war by rejecting the Allied terms, however deservedly harsh and humiliating they may be. Austria's

EXIT DUAL MONARCHY.

ULGARIA'S surrender was complete and Turkey's capitulation abject and absolute, but great as their downfall has been it has not approached the hopelessly wrecked state of what was once the powerful dual monarchy. Bulgaria appears to be fairly well united internally, and Turkey, after the readjustment in the Near East, will probably retain some of her old sovereignty in Asia under some sort of Allied control, but Austria-Hungary, as such, has gone by the board. There will be no come-back for the Hapsburg kingdom as it stood four years ago. Hungary, Bohemia, Poland and Croatia have cut loose. They are through with the rule of the Hapsburgs forever. If in time they should unite for economic reasons it will be in republican form. The peoples of the dual monarchy are doing for themselves just what Wilson insisted must be one of the main conditions of a peace settlement, self determination as to rulers.

The birth of these new independent states is rogressing under stormy conditions.
