# PRINCESS RINK WAS FILLED; OVERFLOW MEETINGS HELD IN AUDITORIUM AND HYMAN HALL

Crowd of Between 8,000 and 10,000 People Vainly Endeavored to Wedge Into the Big Rink to Hear the Premier of Canada.

# MR. JOHN M. McEVOY WAS GIVEN SPLENDID HEARING BY ELECTORS

Hon. Geo. P. Graham, Minister of Railways, Made a Dashing Speech-Mr. F. F. Pardee, Col. Thompson and Others Gave Addresses.

London flung her gates wide open last night and gave Sir Wilfrid Laurier such a welcome as perhaps had never been given a public man in this city in numbers and enthusiasm. There was a spantaneity about it-a refreshing heartiness-and men used to scenes such as this were swept completely off their feet.

From the time Sir Wilfrid set foot in London until midnight, there were crowds who cheered his name. The memory of the gathering at the Princess Rink will linger long with those who had the good fortune to be present,

It was not "made" enthusiasm. There was no time for long preparation-for drilling choruses of men who would stir enthusiasm at set times. The notice that the Premier would speak in London came so late that many feared the welcome he would receive would not be in keeping with the high position he occupies in Canadian affairs.

# ILLIAM GRIFFITH BIG STRATHROY MANUFACTURER DIED OF INJURIES

A Letter From Head of Furniture Plant, Read at the Rally for Duncan C. Ross, Says Trade Agreement Will Benefit All Classes.

Strathroy, Sept. 8, 1911.

D. C. Ross,
Dear Sir:
Owing to a previous engagement
I regret that I will be unable to
attend your meeting this evening.
The reports current that the
proposed reciprocity agreement
will injure the furniture manufacturing business of Strathroy.
I believe to have been circulated
for political purposes I cannot
see that reciprocity will have any
direct effect on our business either
one way or the other, but indirecity it should benefit us, as it
will be better for the farmers, and
as they are large purchasers of
manufactured goods, it follows
that the demand for our product
should be come greater, to the
advantage of both ourselves and
our employees.
I am not in sympathy with the

I am not in sympathy with the cry of some manufacturers for more protection. It is indicative of selfishness. The duty is high enough on all manufactured goods with which I am familiar. Reviewing the record of the Government. ing the record of the Government, it appears to me that it has been fair to the manufacturer, and while they made some reductions in the tariff, it has done them a much greater good by building up in the West, through a vigorous immigration and transportation

policy, a market such as Canada never had before. I believe in protection, but I also believe that excessive protection is an injury to any industry, as it has a tendency to weaken individual effort, initiative and improvements, and at the same time encourage overproduction at home.

There are other interests to be considered besides those of the manufacturer. The fishermen and lumbermen of our eastern provinces are assured of a better market, and the farmer of the West will be enabled to dispose of a good portion of his products to better advantage than at present. In my opinion, the success of the proposed agreement can only be proven by trying it out, and if it should be that it does not work well, it stands to the credit of those who made it, that provision has been made for cancelling it at any time.







The housing of Indian children in Indian schools was well intentioned, but mistaken work. Under the conditions for which they were not by nature fitted they readily contracted disease.

To take the Indian away from the forest is practically to send him to the undertaker's establishment. If Indian schools are to be a success, they must be planned on the principle of modern sanatoria.

It was a laudable purpose to conserve our forest wealth, but thousands of men were doing the work of the Indian, while he was taken away from his own.

In the outcome much attention has been focussed upon the cause. Among many causes one seems to have been generally selected nd recognized. It is the insufficiency of western education unbalanced by Christianity, and the inadequacy of British administration without the inculcation of the 'Royal Law' which is the Word of God.'

"As a British subject," declared the judge, "I object to any reference to the inadequacy of the British administration."

GERMAN ARMY MOVING




