Battle of Fengwangcheng was a Bloody one with Great Russian Reverses.

Dalny is Reported as Captured by the Japs-Further News from the Far East.

London, May 8 .- Feng-Wang-Cheng has been taken by the Japanese, after a battle in which both sides lost heavily.

Gen. Kuropatkin himself command ed the Russians, and is reported to have been wounded.

The Russians are now in full retreat toward Liaoyang, closely press ed by the Japanese.

The Russians officially admit the occupation of Feng-Wang-Cheng by the Japanese.

In explanation of Kuropatkin's retreat it is given out, semi-officially, that it has been decided not to oppose the Japanese till they have crossed the hills towards Liaoyang.

London, Monday, May 9 .- The Morn ing Post's Shanghai correspondent reports that Dalny was captured or Friday, while the Tokio correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, cabling under date of Sunday, says: - "Dalny wa invested yesterday."

MONDAY, MAY 9. JAPAN'S GREAT VICTORY

By winning the first battle on land Japan has demonstrated her superiority over Russia in military as well as naval warfare. The crossing of the Yalu river by an army of 100,000 men, in the face of an entrenched force of 30,000 Russians was remarkable, and the way in which the gunboats were used to protect the army in crossing on pontoons demonstrated that the Japanese are up to date in all the arts of war. Of the fighting qualities of Japanese troops there can be no question; they are as brave as men can be, and apparently possess the dash and fearlessmess of Scotch Highlanders or Irish Pusiliers. Russia is already well whipped, and so far has gone from had to worse since the campaign opened. That she will ever be able to recover herself and sturn the nide of battle is soubtful. There might be hope of such a thing had she the unlimited credit of Great Britain or the resourcefulness of France or Germany; but with a horde of corrupt officals hanging round the Imperial palace and the official headquarters at St. Petersburg, a depleted treasury, and the hatred of a majority of the people towards her despotic government Russia's chances of victory over Japan are indeed slight.

China cannot be expected to remain passive for long in the face of Japanese victories, and the world need not be astonished, if, some of thèse days the Dragon awakes to new life, and the Bear will, in such a case, be in a pitiable plight.





LANSDOWNE'S TRIUMPH.

What Fermer Governor General of Can-ada Achieved in the Recently Con-cluded French Treaty.

Canadians are bound to feel a special interest in the achievements of Lord Lansdowne. We remember him as one of our former Governor-Generals who evinced more than ordenerals who evinced more than or-dinary thoroughness and capacity for public business. For this reason the Anglo-French agreement, recently executed by Lord Lansdowne, claims our attention. But it is important for other reasons. It touches us very closely in settling the French shore question, and thereby relieving of an embarrassment a colony which an embarrassment a colony which is destined in the fulness of time to be a part of the Dominion. The agree-ment is important also, because it is the most comprehensive international adjustment ever accomplished by purely diplomatic means. By it the two great powers saw off their grievances and wipe out all possible causes of irritation. Lord Lansdowne's report on this sweeping agreement, a personal triumph to him, has just come to hand.

Attempts That Have Failed.

By this document we are reminded that the interest of the British Government in the welfare of Newfoundland is not a recent phenomenon. It appears that successive Governments have fully recognized the enormous disadvantages to which Newfoundland was placed by the fishing privileges conceded to France in 1713, and extended by the treaty and the Royal declaration of 1783. The desire of the Crown to protect the French in the engagement of privileges already conceded induced it to agree to restrictions which subsequent generations found to be inernment in the welfare of Newfoundagree to restrictions which subsequent generations found to be intolerable. Yet, as these restrictions had been guaranteed by treaty, and other assurances, Great Britain exercised its influence and authority to maintain them intact. At the same time for sixty years British Governments have been endeavoring to secure a peaceable release from France. France.

Recognized as a Duty.

Resegrated as a Daty.

Yet the British Government remained hopeful that a solution would yet be found for the problem and recognized that it had a duty in that connection. As Lord Lansdowne remarks: "It was obviously our duty to find some means of terminating the condition of things which I have described. It has been fraught with inconvenience to all concerned. It has involved a constant risk of collisions between two Governments, in consequence of disstant risk of collisions between two Governments, in consequence of disputes as to the rights of persons engaged in the fishing industries, both on shore and at sea. Such collisions have, in fact, been averted only by the tact, moderation and good temper exhibited by the naval efficiers of both powers, to whose cognizance these local disputes have in the first instance been brought."

zance these local disputes have in the first instance been brought."

The negotiations, which have proven successful, were begun as long ago as the Spring of 1903. They were given an impetus by the visit of the King to France, and the return visit of President Loubet te Great Britain, on which occasions a full and frank exphance of ideas were discovered. freat Britain, on which occasions as full and frank exchange of ideas was effected. The British Government frankly conceded that to obtain the abandonment of French claims in Newfoundland it would be necessary ta compensate French fishermen and also the French nation. To do this without detriment to British inter-ests was the problem Lord Lans-downe and his colleagues had to

How France Is Paid.

It was arranged that the French fishermen should be compensated with money and the nation with territory. Great Britain did not hesiwith money and the nation with territory. Great Britain did not hesitate to agree to foot the bill without asking a shilling from the colony which will be benefited by the arrangement. Three territorial concessions in Western Africa were made to France. By a "rectification" of the frontier of Gambia, a French colony, France is given access to the navigable portion of the Gambia River. A group of islands of small extent and of no intrinsic value, but which, in his hands of a hostile power, would be a serious menace to France, has long been held by Great Britain opposite to Kouamenace to France, has long been held by Great Britain opposite to Kouakry, a French possession. These islands are known as the Hes de Los.
They have been given to France by
the British Government. The third
concession is in Nigeria. Here the
French convoys were at the disadvantage of having to pursue a circuitous and waterless route to reach
Lake Chad. A strip of territory has
been conceded, by means of which
a direct route may be maintained.
These are the considerations Great
Britain has given for the extinction
of the French shore claims.

Egypt for Morocco.

Egypt for Morocco.

For the extinction of French claims in Egypt Great Britain has signed a quit claim so far as Morocco is concerned. The Egyptain claim was a serious handicap to development. Under the existing arrangement certain revenues are set aside to meet the interest and sinking funds of the bonds in respect of which Egypt defaulted when Great Britain stepped in as receiver. The surplus cannot be diverted to any other purpose without the consent of France. It appears that since 1890, so successful has British administration been to Egypt, a surplus of \$27,500,000 has accumulated in the bank. The money is lying idle, and is being constantly increased. France has now conceded that the fund shall be used by the Egyptain Government, and it will be used for the development of the country. France also acknowledges the preponderance of Great Britain in Egypt and agrees to give its support to certain reforms which the British Government has in view. On the other hand Great Britain concedes that France has special responsibilities in respect of Morocco, which is constantly bordering on a state of anarchy. France agrees not to annex any territory, but to assist in establishing order and security.


