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DIRECTIONS FOR WORKING PARTIES.—*Useful and inexpensive* clothing of all kinds is very acceptable. Wall pockets are much liked, also sofa cushions and pin-cushions, *not stuffed.* Knitted things of every description (*except "helmets"*), especially long comforters and mitts. A receipt for the last-named can be had on application to Mrs. Wasbrough, 13, Philbeach Gardens, S.W. Children's vests, &c., should be made with *long sleeves.* All woollen materials can be bought of far better quality and at a lower price in England than in Canada. If working parties would with their kind contributions also (as some have already done) send a few shillings towards the cost of shipping, &c., they would relieve the Mission funds of a considerable burden. All gifts of Church work, articles for sale, &c., will be acknowledged in the OCCASIONAL PAPER.

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PARCELS.—All parcels for the Mission should be sent to Miss Mountain, who will be glad to receive contributions, however small, towards the expenses of freight. *The name and address of the sender should be written on the outside of each parcel, and a letter should be sent by post at the same time, stating the contents of the parcel, the value at cost price, and the name of the person for whom it is intended* (unless it is for the general use of the Mission). Articles for bazaars should *not* have prices affixed, as this increases the duty charged on entering Canada. Miss Mountain will be glad if *each article* sent is ticketed with the name of the sender. This will ensure each gift to the Mission being acknowledged on its arrival at Qu'Appelle. The kind senders of parcels are earnestly begged to pay attention to these directions, as by so doing they will save a great deal of unnecessary trouble and correspondence.

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### THE BISHOP'S VISIT TO ENGLAND.

Since the last issue of the OCCASIONAL PAPER, the Bishop has preached and spoken at many places for the great Church Societies, and has given addresses to various branches of the S.P.G. Junior Clergy Association, and has thus had opportunities for giving information about the work in the Diocese of Qu'Appelle. At St. George's, Leeds, he was allowed to appeal for Diocesan funds.

Through the kind co-operation of the Rev. H. B. Cartwright (formerly one of the Qu'Appelle clergy), who has accepted the post of Hon. Sec. for Canterbury and the neighbourhood, he addressed large and appreciative audiences in Thranington Church and in the Crypt of St. Augustine's College at Canterbury. At the latter meeting, the Warden, Dr. Maclear, was in the chair. The Bishop is much indebted to the authorities of the College for the interest manifested in his work.

Prebendary Richards most kindly arranged for a drawing-room meeting for Qu'Appelle at 40, Bedford Square, London. A lady who was present gave an anonymous donation of £28, and £10 10s. 3d. was contributed by others who were present at the meeting.

Through the kindness of Mr. H. B. Joyner, of Fort Qu'Appelle, who made the necessary arrangements, the Bishop preached in the parish Church, Harrow, on the morning of March 28, and in the Harrow School Chapel in the evening of the same day. It was an inspiring sight at the latter service to see six hundred young men and boys—many of whom will doubtless hereafter occupy prominent positions in various parts of our great Empire—listening to the story of the Church's progress in one of the youngest of our Missionary Dioceses. The offertories were: morning £10 13s. 8d., evening £19 13s. 6d. The Head Master of Harrow kindly promised an offertory for the Diocese next year, and thus increased the debt of obligation for his great kindness.

Mrs. Knight arranged a meeting for Qu'Appelle at Great Malvern, on April 21, at which the Rev. R. P. Pelly, Vicar of Malvern, was



good enough to preside. From April 24 to 26, the Bishop was the guest of Canon Liddell, the General Secretary of the Association, and thus was able to talk over many matters affecting the welfare of the Diocese. He also preached for Qu'Appelle in Welton Church.

The Anniversary meeting of the Association will probably take place in the week preceding June 20.

The Bishop's future arrangements are :—

May 6.—At St. Michael's, Northampton, the Anniversary Festival of the Junior Clergy S.P.G.

May 7.—Drawing-room meeting at York, for Qu'Appelle workers.

May 9.—Sermons at Glasgow.

May 10.—Drawing-room meeting at Glasgow for Qu'Appelle, through the kindness of the Bishop of Glasgow.

May 18 to 20.—Four meetings in Carlisle and the Lake District for S.P.C.K.

May 30.—Sermon at Christ Church, Hinton, Bolton-le-moors, with an offertory for Qu'Appelle.

The Bishop hopes (D.V.) to sail per S.S. "Parisian" for his Diocese, on August 5. He has received many offers of service, but cannot give definite replies until he has been over the Diocese, and has made himself fully acquainted with the condition of the finances of the Diocese.

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### DIOCESAN NEWS.

SALTCOATS.—Mr. Teitelbaum writes:—"During this Lent I have been very busy. Besides the usual Sunday Services, I have many during the week. On Mondays we have a meeting of the St. Andrew's Guild. This is a guild of young people, and we have a membership of twenty-five. We meet for one hour each week and study Bible History and Church History alternately. Some of our members have to come in from the country, and they very seldom fail to come, although the weather may be anything but fine. On Wednesday morning we have a Celebration at 10.30. On Thursdays I go to two out stations alternately; one is eighteen miles away, another six miles. At these places we always have good congregations. At the latter place we usually meet about 6 o'clock, and the good lady of the house provides those who have come early with tea, and the Service begins at 7. I should so like you to be present at one of these Services. Everything is so primitive. So very like what we imagine when we read of 'the Church that is in the house of.' On Friday evening we have a Devotional Service at Saltcoats, with a short address. In this manner the weeks pass away. A few Sundays ago I had to go south to two stations I visit monthly, but when I had gone eighteen miles to the first station I began to fear that my horses would not be able to go on to the next station twelve miles further. So I sent word to say I could not come. I was due there on Sunday morning, and on Saturday afternoon a young man came up from the station with his horses



to take me down and bring me back again, leaving my horses at the first station, where they would be ready for me on the Sunday afternoon to go on with. This will give you an idea how people value a Service. This young man is a Communicant, and he communicated on the Sunday morning, but he had travelled with his horses forty-eight miles over a snow-clad open country to get me to the Service. The Sunday I go south is my hardest Sunday. I leave home on Friday or Saturday, drive south thirty miles, and begin at this place on Sunday morning with Matins, Celebration and Sermon. Then without staying for dinner I drive twelve miles to a place where I take afternoon Service, and after this I drive the eighteen miles to Saltcoats and take Evensong and preach. After Service I cannot go to bed, as our only mail and train comes in on Sunday morning, and there are always some letters that must be answered, or else remain over for a week. In this way our life passes, always plenty to do, the time seeming only too short."

INDIAN HEAD.—On February 7th the offertory, amounting to £2 10s., was devoted to the Indian Famine Fund. Since then a subscription list has been opened and very liberally supported.

MOOSEJAW.—The Dupanloup system of catechising (popularised in England by Mr. Spencer Jones) has been introduced in this parish. A "Festival of the Catechism" was held on Septuagesima Sunday, when, after the teachers had given instruction on the lesson for the day, the Rev. W. Watson catechized half the children, and at the close of the Service presented fifteen children with rewards in the shape of Bibles, Prayer Books and Hymn Books.

MAPLE CREEK.—This Church has lately been beautified by several handsome gifts, but it still needs a brass cross, a sanctuary chair, table and chair for the vestry, hangings for the lectern and prayer desk, book markers, and an altar desk.

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### AN APPEAL.

The Rev. W. Nicolls writes from Medicine Hat:—"Last year I opened a mission at Josephburg, thirty-five miles south-east of Medicine Hat, in the centre of a large ranching community, where there are a number of Church people. They are now putting up a small log Church, hauling the timber from town, giving their labour, with what little ready money can be spared. I had collected two altar frontals and a super frontal, a plain dossal for behind the altar, an almsbag and almsdish, with some book-markers, to be in readiness for the opening. These things were taken there and left at a rancher's house. Unfortunately, last week in a very high gale the house was burnt down, and the contents (including the Church things) were entirely destroyed. Might I ask help for the congregation to replace them? The people are good Church people, and are deserving of assistance. These things cannot

be got out here, and it is quite out of the question to buy new ones.

"I should be most grateful for anything to replace the things burnt. Disused altar furnishings could be easily adapted. The size of the altar is 6 feet long by 3 feet 3 inches high, and 2 feet 3 inches wide."

### THE SALTCOATS COTTAGE HOSPITAL.

The Rev. T. A. Teitelbaum writes:—"We have now been at work six months, and during that time we have had every bed constantly in use. Not only has this been the case, but we have been obliged to refuse patients; at this time of writing we have the place full, even the nurse's room is occupied, and she, generous and good girl as she is, sleeps anywhere. I could hardly tell you in words what a priceless boon the small building has already been to the country. We have decided to enlarge the present building, in fact, it is absolutely necessary if we are in any way to cope with the work. I have the plans for the new part ready, but the money is still wanting. However, I am making a big effort to collect what is necessary. The Hon. C. H. Mackintosh, Lieutenant-Governor of this Province, who opened the building last September, wrote me the following letter:

*"Government House, Regina,*

*"January 7, 1897.*

"REV. SIR,—I cannot express in words the gratification it affords me to hear that the Cottage Hospital is doing so much to alleviate the afflicted throughout your country. It is an Institution appealing to the best instincts of the good and charitable, and as I am informed that the premises need enlargement, I trust that all who can will contribute their mite towards assisting so commendable a design."

"Our nurse comes from Eastern Canada, where she had heard of our Hospital, and wrote and offered to come for sufficient money to buy her clothes. At present she is alone, and has night and day duty to do. I know it is too much for her, but what am I to do? We have no room to accommodate another nurse until we are able to get our proposed new part. During the last three months she has had eight and nine patients at one time to attend to. For the last two weeks my wife has been there helping during the day, and I have been left alone to 'batch,' or in other words, to look after myself. But that does not matter as long as the Hospital is doing good.

"It seems very hard to get money just now, there are so many things needing help, and people seem to forget about these isolated parts, where so much good can be done with a little money. Why, £400 would nearly give us all we want. We are trying to raise £120, to erect an isolated ward, in commemoration of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. Such a building is most necessary, and it requires to be some distance from the main building. I do hope some kind friends will help us. The summer will soon be here, and it is so short, but all work must be done in that short time."
