PROGRESS OF THE WAR

[August 10 to August 16] DURING the week under review no important changes were made in the western front, though much fighting occurred from Alsace to the Yser.

As has been the case for many weeks, only the scantiest news has transpired, and that somewhat contradictory. Fierce attacks and counter attacks were delivered in Argonne, and to the north of Arras, and it is believed that in those districts the Entente Powers gained some slight advantage of ground.

The long-looked-for big drive of the Germans in the west has not yet begun.

As in the previous week, interest centred in the eastern arena. While the Russians held their ground at several points, at others they have continued to fall back.

The announcement last week of the evacuation of Riga was premature. The Russians continue to hold that important Port, though Teutonic land forces are close to it in the south, and an attempt by a German fleet to bombard it from the Gulf was repulsed by the Russian navy, with the reported loss of a German war ship.

Fierce attacks by the Teutons on Russian fort took place throughout the week, but none appear to have succeeded. In those parts of the line where the Russians continued to retire, rearguard actions were fought with great determination; and the attempts of the Teutons to effect an embolvement of the Russian centre were all frustrated.

Just how much further the Russians intend to retire is not wholly apparent, though one might conjecture that the final stand has at least been chosen.

In the Dardanelles and the Gallipoli Peninsula much progress has been made by the Allies, who have landed successfully large numbers of reinforcements from the Gulf of Saros.

Only scant details of the operations have been given out, but the news published officially has all been of an encouraging kind. A British submarine is said to have made the passage of the Straits of Bosphorus and entered the Black Sea.

If this is the beginning of the end should soon be in sight.

Fierce engagements continued on the Austro-Italian front, but no important Italian advances were chronicled during the week. An Italian submarine sank an Austrian submarine, the newest and most powerful type, and two Austrian torpedo boats bombarded Italian towns on the Adriatic coast, inflicting no very serious damage, however.

The activity of the German submarine "blockade" was vigorously resumed during the week, the principal victims being British trawlers and small merchantmen, and a few merchant vessels belonging to neutral nations.

More than a score of lives were reported to have been lost. The exact positions of these disasters are no longer announced by the Admiralty.

Air raids by Zeppelins on the east coast of England took place during the week, and the town of Harwich in Essex, is believed to be one place visited by these obnoxious air craft.

Nearly twenty civilians, including women and children, are said to have been killed, and a number of buildings burned. On the last day of the week, reviewed, a German submarine shelled three towns on the coast of Cumberland, but the damage done is reported to have been comparatively small; and, fortunately, there appears to have been no loss of life.

Reports of earlier operations in the Cameroons came in during the week, and these appear in the news items.

Intense interest prevailed in regard to the Balkan States, where the Entente Powers appear to have been continuing their efforts to compose the differences of those States and bring about another alliance against Turkey.

The resumption of hostilities by Austria-Hungary against Serbia, which took place during the week, would seem to tend to precipitate events.

The Greek and Serbian parliaments re-assembled on August 16, and the outcome of their deliberations is awaited with keen anticipation, if not with great anxiety.

The serious obstacle to united action on the part of all the Balkan States is the claim for territory on the part of Bulgaria, which Greece and Serbia seem unwilling to concede.

WE print in another column the report of two days' evidence given at the official inquiry at Kentville, N. S., into the matter of the purchase of horses for army purposes.

SOCIAL LIFE OF ST. ANDREWS

WE print in another part of this issue an account of the Patriotic Entertainment given at the Andreale Hall on Wednesday evening of last week, the proceeds of which were handed to the local branch of the Red Cross Society.

The entertainment was projected, arranged and carried out by the summer residents of the Town, though much assistance was given by the President of the local Society, Mrs. G. H. Stickney, and other members.

The entertainment was probably the best ever given in St. Andrews, and the large Hall was filled to its utmost capacity by a delighted and enthusiastic audience.

Too much praise cannot be given to Lady Tait for the genius and untiring energy she displayed in promoting the entertainment and in making it the great success it was.

Perhaps the not least pleasing feature of the event was the bringing together on this occasion the summer visitors and the townspeople. It has been a matter of comment in the past that there is very little community of feeling and interest between the temporary and permanent residents; and that purely local entertainments are never patronized by cottagers and hotel guests.

The Red Cross entertainments ought to be a forerunner of the closer association of visitors with the people of the Town, and a participative in their social life and amusements.

A more intimate acquaintance would undoubtedly prove to be a source of mutual satisfaction to visitors and townspeople alike.

UNSIGHTLY STREETS

IN a recent issue we called attention to the unsightly condition of some of the streets. These are, principally, Water Street and the lower end of the streets joining it.

The most unsightly place of all is the Post Office corner. The pernicious habit prevails of scattering about old newspapers, postal wrappers, peanut shells, fruit peelings, etc., and it is much larger than the estimate by the department.

PREMIER BORDEN PAYS VISIT TO ADMIRALTY

LONDON, Aug. 13.—Premier Borden had a conference at the Admiralty concerning matters of importance to Canada. Subsequently he had a conference with Sir Edward Grey, the Foreign Secretary.

Sir Robert also visited the soldiers' and sailors' hosts at Regent Park, during the past week.

The Premier has been greatly impressed with the excellent work carried on by the Canadian Red Cross Society in London and by the similarly effective work carried on by the Canadian War Contingent Association in providing comforts for the men at the front.

Both these associations had been splendidly supported in Canada, and those carried on the work in London have spoken to Sir Robert in terms of most grateful appreciation of the assistance given them by the people of the Dominion.

LISSAUER BECOMES ASHAMED OF HIS "SONG OF HATE"

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 14.—Even Ernest Lissauer appears to be becoming ashamed of the Song of Hate. He writes to the Berlin Zigzag saying he agrees with its view that the song is not intended for the young, and he has often advised against its publication in school books.

"The Song of Hate," he writes, "was written as the result of a passionate impulse in the first week of the war, when the impression created by England's declaration of war was fresh. The Song of Hate is a political poem directed against individual Englishmen, but collectively against the English will be destruction which threatens Germany. In the excitement of those days my feelings were deeply stirred by this. Whether these feelings can continue with the cool consideration of practical politics is another question."

CAPTAIN FROM INDIA GAVE UP RANK TO GET INTO FIGHTING

LONDON, August 7.—How a captain of the British army in India left his regiment there, and, under an assumed name, joined the British expeditionary force in France as a private, and as a private died bravely in battle, is told in an official statement given out by the British Press Bureau.

Captain S. Smart, of the Fifty-third Sikhs, was missing and his captivity cancelled.

OBSTACLES TO RECRUITING

Lieut.-Col. B. R. Armstrong, of St. John, while in Fredericton on Saturday, told the Claver that in many places in New Brunswick the recruiting for the Overseas units has been carried on by men who have enlisted to go to the front, and as soon as they leave to join their respective units there is no one to carry on the work.

In this way a large number of recruits, who have applied for enlistment, have found nobody in authority to enlist them. He is securing data to make a report to the Militia Department, and will offer several recommendations. He will recommend the appointment of a number of permanent recruiting officers.—Globe.

INCREASE IN REVENUE FOR GOVERNMENT

The lumber cut on the crown lands of New Brunswick this year was 287,366,000 superficial feet and the stumpage yield is estimated at \$416,000.

This information was given out by officials at the department of lands and mines this morning, the final figures having been completed. The cut is greater than last year, when 271,000,000 feet were taken from the crown lands by lumber operators, and is much larger than the estimate by the department.
