Bernhardt was carried into the house of Mr. Scott senseless, but after application of cold water poured over his body he soon began to breathe again, but was deprived of sight. Lang was killed on the spot, and all efforts to restore him to life were found to be in vain. Medical aid was applied to both Bernhardt and Lang; the latter was struck on the breast, and death must have immediately ensued -Bernhardt began to speak soon after, but was totally blind.
