The exhaustion of our timber supply is coming about, not because we have used our forests freely, but because we have failed to use our timber-growing land. The problem in a nutshell is the enormous area of forest land which has been so logged and burned that it is producing little or nothing. This situation can not long continue without grave consequences. If we are to remain a nation of wood users we must become a nation of wood growers. By some means or other we must see to it that forest lands not needed for agriculture are not allowed to lie idle but are kept at work growing timber.

BENNIE SWIM CONFESSES TO FIRING SHOTS

Prompted by Jealousy Kills Wife and Her Alleged Sweetheart.

THEN ATTEMPTED TO COMMIT SUICIDE

After Chase Through the Woods Was Captured by Sheriff Foster of Carleton County.

Woodstock, March 28—Bennie Swim, self confessed slayer of his wife, Olive, and her alleged affinity, Harvey Trenholm at Benton Ridge, is now in the County jail with a bullet lodged over his right eye as the result of an evident attempt at suicide after the double murder. Swim, it is said, will recover from the self inflicted wound.

The facts of the tragedy seem to be as follows: Mrs. Olive Swim, wife of Bennie Swim, left a short time ago to visit friends at Benton, and Swim, learning of certain alleged actions and relations his wife was having with another man, resolved to visit Benton and deal out justice as he saw it. Monday morning he purchased a revolver from a certain merchant at Rockland, his home, and going to Hartland took the train for Benton. It is reported that during the afternoon Swim found his wife and Harvey Trenholm, the other victim of the tragedy at the latter's home at which place, a few hours later, Mrs. Swim and Harvey Trenholm were discovered dead.

Sheriff Albert Foster was notified of the affair and, accompanied by Deputy Morris, immediately left here for the scene of the tragedy which was a few miles south of Delee. After securing data upon which to proceed, Sheriff Foster set out in search of "Bennie" who was at once suspected of responsibility for the double killing.

Followed Blood Trail
 By a trail of blood over the snow Sheriff Foster and his deputy were able to trace the fleeing man, who was evidently heading for the Maine side of the border. This morning, about 7.30 o'clock, Swim was found at the house of James Dougherty, Parish of Richmond, about 1½ miles from the border and seven miles from Benton. Accused quietly submitted to arrest and told the officers he had done the shooting, saying he was prompted to do so because of jealousy. Retracing their course through the woods, the prisoner indicated a spot in the bushes where he had hurled his revolver. Sheriff Foster searched at the spot indicated and was successful in finding the weapon. After arriving here the prisoner was taken before Magistrate Comben and remanded for hearing Monday afternoon.

Straight over the steep sides of the dam he drives the lumbering truck, into the torrent of water, and plugs the widening hole.

COUNTY FORESTS

It is announced that already twelve counties have taken advantage of the Ontario Government's plan for assisting municipal forestry. These counties have acquired blocks of non-agricultural land which, in co-operation with the Provincial Forest Service, will be planted with pine spruce, and other trees. The blocks of land vary in size from 100 acres up to 1,000 acres. It is expected that several other counties will take up reforestation within the coming year.

RADIO STATION TO BE INSTALLED AT MT. ALLISON

Arrangements are now under way for the installation of a radio service station at the Mt. Allison Conservatory of Music; so that it will be possible to link up with New York and other large cities and listen to concerts, lectures, etc., being given in those places.

The apparatus will be erected on the roof of the Ladies' College building, which gives a height of 150 feet and 100ft. in length for the receiving wires. A loud speaking amplifier will be installed, so that the college students and citizens will be able to sit in Beethoven Hall and listen to music by wireless.

Radiophones on a more or less pretentious scale, are being installed by private citizens in many cities and towns all over Canada. Mr. K. Rogers, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., the well-known fox rancher, has installed a radio station apparatus at his residence, and is able to entertain his friends with concerts being given in New York and other large centres.

When the radio station is installed here, Sackville and Charlottetown will be able to reciprocate with concerts, lectures, etc.

SIR ROBERT BORDEN THROUGH WITH POLITICAL LIFE

Toronto, March 27—Political and Washington conference subjects were strictly banned in an interview with Sir Robert Borden, ex-Premier of Canada, at the York Club today.

I don't want to talk about the conference," Sir Robert said. "There will be a report laid on the table of the House soon of all I have to say. I am making a report to the Prime Minister." And as for politics, Sir Robert intimated that he was done with that vexatious life for good and all. He stated that he would have nothing more to do actively in political affairs. "I'm through with political life," he declared. Sir Robert said that he was just in the city for the day attending a meeting of the Legislative Council of the League of Nations in Canada, to be held here this afternoon. Afterwards he is going to Montreal on the work of the same society. A similar meeting will be held there tomorrow.

DEATH OF ONE OF KENT COUNTY'S PROMINENT MEN

Mr. W. J. Brait, Well Known Merchant of Rexton, Passed Away Monday Morning.

Rexton, N. B. Mar. 27—One of the most prominent men of Kent County in the person of Mr. W. J. Brait, the widely known merchant, passed away at his home here this morning at the advanced age of 90 years. Mr. Brait had been in business in Rexton for more than sixty years and he was probably the oldest merchant in the county. He was the leading merchant of Rexton and his extensive trade with the country people for miles around made him one of the best known men in the northern part of the county. The firm name was J. & W. Brait, the late J. W. having been associated with his brother, John, in the business at its inception. John Brait died about thirty-five years ago and the business had been continued since by J. W. Brait, who for some years past had associated with him his nephew, Mr. A. B. Carson.

The late Mr. Brait was a native of Rexton and was the son of the late William Brait, who came from Scotland and settled in Kent County about a century ago.

Up to about two years ago deceased had been quite active but since that time had been in failing health, the end coming quite suddenly at the last.

Deceased never married and his nearest surviving relatives is his nephew, Mr. A. B. Carson, of this place.

The late Mr. Brait had been a life long Conservative and was a staunch member of the Presbyterian Church. He was very highly esteemed by all who knew him, being a man of great integrity and high ideals.

The funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock.

THIRD TRIAL OF JOHN PARIS ON APRIL 25TH.

The third trial of John Paris, the Truro, N. S. mulatto, who is charged with the murder of Sadie McAuley, a crippled girl at St. John, in August last, is now slated for trial on Tuesday, April 25th.

Hon. James P. Byrne, Attorney General, said that a motion for adjournment until that date would be made on his behalf by Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C., when the St. John circuit court opens before Mr. Justice Barry. His duties at the Legislature now in session, prevent the Attorney General from attending court at present.

On Paris' first trial the jury disagreed; on the second trial he was convicted and sentenced to be hanged on March 31 but the court of appeal ordered a new trial.

SWEDEN GOING IN STRONG FOR ELECTRICITY

Electricity has conquered one-third of the entire cultivated area of Sweden, according to the latest official reports.

If Sweden continues electrifying at the present rate it will only be a few years till almost the whole country will be run by electricity.

Most of the farms within the electrified area are now tapping the new source of energy, and nearly all the power used in the daily labor on these farms is derived from the high-power lines which span whole sections of the country.

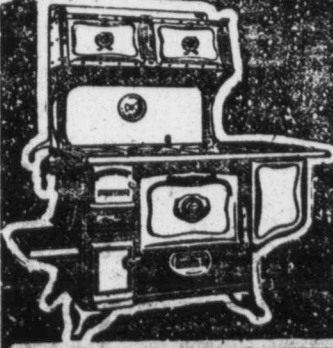

THE KITE IS UP

(St. John Standard)

The Legislative Assembly has now been in session for three weeks, and the public has been eagerly scanning the reports of the proceedings in the hope for some evidence of the Government's reported intention to make some changes in the present law relating to the sale of liquor. The Premier has been studiously silent on the subject, Mr. Venio likewise, and no other member of the Executive has made any reference to the matter.

However, it seems a kite was placed in the hands of Mr. Magee, and he sent it sailing aloft yesterday afternoon. It is up to the public now to say what they think of it, and how it looks from the road.

Mr. Magee handled his kite very delicately, as though he were afraid of some breeze coming up which might upset its equilibrium. Here is what the Official Report credits him with saying:—

Members on both sides seemed to fight shy of discussing prohibition. He did not see why the subject should not be discussed in a sensible and businesslike manner. Prohibition was imposed on the Province by an Act passed some time before, under which a Provincial Commission sold liquor to the vendors, who in turn sold at retail on physicians' prescriptions. There was a strong group in the Province which supported this system. Other groups differed, and held the opinion that the Province should control not only wholesale dealing in liquor, but also the retailing, by means of dispensaries and permits. That was the system in force in Sweden, which he believed to be the best in the world. He was speaking in the best interest of temperance. He believed in temperance not only in the use of liquor, but in all other habits. What course should be adopted in New Brunswick? Should the present system be continued, or should there be adoption of a permit system, with a limit per month and a limit to certain ones in the Province? There was criticism of the Prohibition Act. But its enforcement was carried out by independent inspectors at an annual cost of \$70,000, with an annual revenue of \$101,000. Those figures showed that prohibition was not a fact, but was merely academic. No one within sound of his voice could truthfully deny that statement. What was needed was for the House to discuss this subject from a business point of view, and not for political purposes. He knew that members of the party represented opposite, including senators and other prominent men, were favorable to a change which would extend Government control of sale of liquor, and the same was true upon his own side of the House. The matter should be discussed in a sensible way, to the end that a solution might be reached in the interests of temperance and temperance people.

Now that the subject of amendments to the liquor law has once been broached, we may expect other members on the Government side of the House to expound their views regarding it. Until however, the matter has been put in a concrete form, it is idle to discuss it. When the Government proposals are laid before the House they may prove to be of a nature worthy of support, or they may not. In the meanwhile, the public must continue to watch and wait.

"CANOPIC" HAS MANY BIG FEATURES

When the White Star Dominion liner Canopic arrives in the St. Lawrence this spring she will be for all practical purposes a new ship, according to advices received by the Company from their Liverpool office, indicating that the ship is at present being thoroughly overhauled and re-furnished from stem to stern, at her builders Messrs. Harland & Wolff, Belfast.

Originally constructed to carry first, second and third class passengers, the first and second class accommodations are being adapted to one class cabin requirements, which will thus give an unusually number of large public rooms available for cabin passengers. Designed for tropical service in the Mediterranean where she has been making regular voyages since just before the war, the Canopic's staterooms, companion ways and alleyways are said to be exceptionally large, providing a maximum of light and air circulation. In addition the Canopic has two long open promenade decks and will carry an orchestra of professional musicians, and as well publish a daily newspaper while at sea.

Her third class accommodation, which while in the Mediterranean service, was all of the open type, in compliance with the Italian Government Immigration requirements, is being entirely remodelled, and will have a capacity of 1200 passengers, which will be accommodated in close-fitted two, three and four berth rooms. Third Class passengers are also privileged with an exceptionally fine promenade deck, which extends almost half the length of the ship.

SEED TIME AND THE OAT SUPPLY

The unfortunate crop condition in 1921 in many parts of Canada, more especially for oats, led the Seed Purchasing Commission of the Seed Branch at Ottawa to hold in reserve considerably more than half a million bushels of No. 1 seed oats for this spring's seeding. This grain was stored in government interior terminal elevators at Calgary and Saskatoon.

Early in March about 400,000 bushels of this grain had been disposed of, a considerable proportion of it going to Ontario, Quebec, and more eastern points. The Seed Purchasing Commission supplies seed oats in car loads only and at the net cost of the re-cleaned seed. It is understood that during recent months bankers and others have persisted in encouraging merchants to be cautious.

Reports reaching the Seed Commissioner indicate that seed merchants have been so guided, by these precautions as to have in many cases an insufficient supply of seed grain to meet the full requirements. So much of the success of a crop depends on the quality of the seed sown as well as the promptness of getting it into the ground when the proper seeding time arrives, that farmers who have not already secured their full requirements of seed should see to it without further delay.

TREES ABOUT PRAIRIE SCHOOLS

A short time ago very few school districts in the Prairie Provinces planted trees about the school-house, but in the last three years the number has been steadily increasing. This year in Saskatchewan alone 150 school districts will plant trees. The seedling trees are obtained from the Dominion Forest Nursery Station at Indian Head, Sask.

HOW ESTIMATES EFFECT N. B.

In the estimates Thursday are many items effecting the maritime provinces and New Brunswick in particular, including \$850,000 for St. John harbor improvements. In the public works department are three items, \$25,000 for the St. John quarantine station, \$5,000 for a public building at Sussex, and \$7,000 for the Tracadie Lazaretto. The first two are revotes and all three are ear-marked appropriations not required for 1922-23. The same qualification holds for Nova Scotia, where Baddeck is given a public building worth \$10,000, Halifax a quarantine station worth \$11,000, and North Sydney a quarantine station worth \$26,000.

Harbor improvements in New Brunswick, include new estimates, as follows:

Burnt Church (Northumberland county), repairs to wharf \$900; Caraquet, repairs to deep water wharf, \$2,000; Dalhousie, repairs to wharf, \$1,000; harbors and rivers, general repairs and improvements, \$40,000; Leonardville (Deer Island), repairs to wharf, \$1,500; Oak Point (Northumberland), repairs to wharf, \$1,500; Portage River, repairs to breakwater, \$1,200; Richibucto Beach, repairs to breakwater, \$1,000; Shippegan Harbor, repairs to wharf, \$3,700; Shippegan Gully, repairs to breakwaters, \$4,000; Welchpool (Campello), repairs to wharf, \$1,700.

Another item is Black's Harbor (Charlotte county), wharf extension for \$8,200, of which \$7,000 is a revote. Half a million dollars is estimated for dredging in the maritime provinces, which is the same as last year. There is \$1,700 for repairs to the bridge across the St. John river at St. Leonard's, the State of Maine to contribute a like amount. The appropriation for the St. John and Digby steam service is increased from \$10,000 to \$15,000. The other steamship services for New Brunswick receive the same amounts as last year. St. John post office salaries are estimated to be \$25,140 greater for the fiscal year, the estimate being \$163,740. For Moncton the amount is \$48,240, an increase of \$20,940. Halifax salaries amount to \$187,350 an increase of \$50,100. For the same service Halifax gets \$154,320, an increase of \$9,920.

In the railway department estimates, chargeable to capital provision is made for a vote of \$2,700,000 for construction and betterments on Canadian government railways, as against a vote of \$4,117,994 last year. Provision is also made for the purchase of Moncton and Buctouche Railway at \$70,000, and the Caraquet and Gulf Shore Railways at \$50,000. Both of these are revotes. For railway equipment and materials and for improvement to existing equipment, etc. a vote of \$1,800,000 is provided as against \$1,903,000 last year. The Port Nelson terminals vote is reduced this year to a revote of \$40,000.

MAINE AND N.B. RACE DATES 1922

Big Meeting of Horsemen at Presque Isle—Woodstock Week July 17—Officers Elected.

About 65 representative horsemen and fair managers from both sides of the border gathered at Presque Isle Tuesday and fixed dates for racing events, elected officers of the Maine and New Brunswick Racing Association and had a big time generally. Moncton, N. B. was admitted to the circuit.

The visitors were tendered a banquet by the Presque Isle Trotting Association in the I. O. O. F. dining rooms. E. W. Russ of Caribou president of the association opened the meeting after the banquet and set forth the object of the gathering also calling for a rising vote of thanks to the Presque Isle club for its hospitality.

O. J. Bishop read the minutes of the last meeting, also the reports of the secretary and treasurer. After talks by President Russ and Mr. Howie on last year's events, officers were elected as follows:

President—E. W. Russ, Caribou
Vice-Presidents—R. J. Smith, Presque Isle; J. W. Gallagher, Woodstock Sec. and Treas.—A. R. Fairbanks, Presque Isle.
Executive committee—R. E. Hamilton, Woodstock; R. J. Smith, Presque Isle; E. Watson, Fort Fairfield; Earl Hyslop, St. Stephen; G. C. Howell, Fredericton; E. W. Russ, Caribou; Leighton, Houlton; P. A. Bellevue, Moncton.

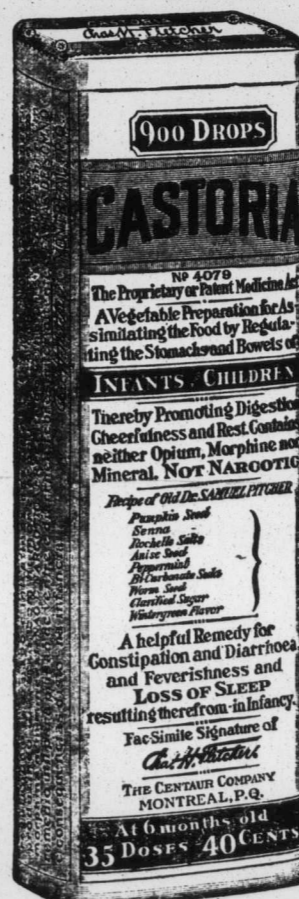
The Woodstock representatives at the meeting were, Jim Gallagher, Bob Hamilton, Rankin Brown and Henry Dewitt.

Upon their return to Woodstock, the press interviewed Mr. Hamilton who said in part:

"The midsummer circuit has been formed with six towns, Presque Isle, Fort Fairfield, Caribou, Houlton, Woodstock and Fredericton, Moncton and St. Stephen had no representatives present, and two weeks of racing were left open for these two towns if they wish to come in; if not, there will be a two days meeting in some town to be decided upon to fill in the open weeks.

When it came to settle the dates, Woodstock objected to the dates allotted it, July 16th and 17th as early in the spring, Woodstock unanimously announced that it would hold the same dates as last year, July 12-13 because it was already decided to hold a grand pageant in Woodstock on these dates to celebrate two noted anniversaries in connection with the settlement of Carleton county. These dates appeared in the American Horse Breeder in the February issue, and it would be almost impossible for Woodstock to change them. Caribou claimed it wanted those dates, but gave away to Woodstock the last two years. It looks as if Woodstock and Caribou will each have celebrations on July 12-13, without any offence to either town. This meeting of course was to settle the midsummer racing dates—the fall dates are the same as last year. Everything, on the whole, was harmonious, and the Woodstock boys were royally entertained."

Asked if there was anything new in speed, Mr. Hamilton said he heard of nothing in Presque Isle or Caribou and the latter had shown no signs as yet of securing the horse that was to try conclusions with John R. Braden and Calgary Earl. Fredericton had no new speed, while Driver Nevers of Houlton had two new ones, Peter Stillwell and Peter Tanlac. Driver Koves of St. Stephen had three new horses and Owner Gallagher of Woodstock has one, Vanco, a green pacer by Vancouver.
