The weather for the past two weeks has been unfavourable, and this, with an almost entire absence of bait, has greatly hindered operations along the shore. Several of the bankers have returned from the Gulf with good all report unfavourable

Cod is reported very scarce at all ports along the South West Coast and the boats at Burin and - Marystown have practically nothing. There is no sign of caplin, except near Point aux Gauls where a few buckets were cast the settlement gave them a trial on the local grounds but did not secure a fish. The little cod that is being takalong the shore is being caught on herring and shell bait.

Fishery Report.

The following reports were receivd by the Board of Trade yesterday: From R. W. Andrews (Gaultois to Hermitage, June 6th) :- The total itch is 500 quintals, and for last week, 25. One hundred dories and skiffs are fishing, but prospects are very poor and the bait supply is short. The lobster catch is small, only about 20 being taken by 100 pots. The fishear for Hermitage Bay, and so far i as been the worst on record.

From J. Cunningham (Connore Bay Red Island, June 6th) :- One banker has returned with 400 quintals, but no schooners from the grounds have yet arrived. Sixty dories, skiffs and boats are fishing. The total catch is 4.589 quintals, and for last week, poor, but there is plenty of herring bait. There was very bad weather all the week. On yesterday, the 5th, we had a gale with very heavy sea, and great damage was done to nets and other fishing tackle.
