



He possessed palatial mansions in London, New York and the country, and pleasure yachts and private railway trains, which enabled him to travel like royalty. His residences were veritable stores of treasure, for he accumulated the finest pictures and curios that money could buy. The bulk of his art treasures were for many years housed at his mansion in Prince's Gate. London, but were removed to New York a few months before his death, and a considerable selection of them lent to the Metropolitan Museum there He began his career as a banker's clerk in London, in 1857, but in the same year, at the age of 20, he returned to America, and entered the private banking house of Duncan, Sherman & Co. Seven years later he founded the firm of Datney. Morgan & Co., which was financed by was dissolved and Mr. Morgan joined Drexel, Morgan & Co., Philadelphia, which eventually, after the death of gan & Co. From his father, Mr. Pierpont Morgan inherited two million pounds. His first great commercial fight was in 1868, against Jay Gould and Jim Fisk, whose attempted capture of the Albany and Susquehanna Railway he defeated. The property was placed in safe hands, and the stock, which was selling at 18, jumped up to 100; the stockholders were guaranteed, and the employees secure.
