#### BRITAIN IS NEUTRAL. LONDON, Nov. 15.

As Great Britain has never recognized the Wrangel Government in South Russia and is now proceeding M. Bourgeoise, had made it clear with negotiations aiming at the opening of trade relations with Soviet Russia, the British Navy will continue observe strict neutrality in the Black Sea, it was stated to-day.
