THE ELECTION FOR MAYOR. The voting for Mayor commenced this morning at nine o'clock, but under circumstances which altered the state of things very much. There was scarcely any organization among his friends, the necessary arrangements for bringing up the voters were not made, or could not be carried out, and many who had promised to vote for him were deceived by the report that he had withdrawn and did not come up to vote and not a few voted against him. THE LILY OF THE STRATH

Strathmae, at the time our story begins, was, as we have said, as secluded a place as could well be imagined, and presented all those features of national existence to which we have referred. 
