Fisk refused to acknowledge the claim, and maintained that the suit was brought for the purpose of extorting black mail from him, the woman having threatened to publish some confidential letters to her, in which several of his frauds and dishonest speculations are acknowledged and explained. A suit for libel arose out of this case, which was tried on Saturday. Fisk's allegations in reference to their attempt to levy black mail were true, and an indictblack mail were true, and an indictment was found against Stokes, who exasperated at the failure of his case, and at his threatened imprisonment laid in wait for his victim, and deliberately shot him.

Such is a brief recital of the circumstances which led to the untimely death of this man, who for years has been the envy of thousands of needy and unscrupulous adventurers, and whose fate may well serve as a warning to those who like him set all laws-human and divine-at defince in order to attain their own ends. Beginning the world with nothing, he became a millionaire. From being a pedlar attached to circuses he became a railway magnate, the owner of a Steamship Company, the proprietor of an opera house, the colonel of a regiment, and held many other offices besides. Bold, defiant, cunning and withal possessing a bluff ning and withat possessing a blui courtesy, his rise was sudden and his career one of almost uniform Treaty.

The cowardly assassin in a moment of frenzy put an end to it all, and in a moment brought the daring speculator face to face with death. A few hours of suffering intervened after the fatal shot was fired, and then it was all over. Such is the end of this man who encouraged vice and promoted licentiousness, who by precept and example did more to corrupt the public morals of New York and of the country—than any other single individual, who bought up public men like so many sheep, who bribed legislators—and who made it his chief boast that no one could resist his blandishments and his gold. diamonds, and when it suited his
