Award £3,500,000.

London, Sept. 14.—A special to the London Times from Geneva says: The award made by the Tribunal of Arbitration to the United States will only exceed £3,000,000 by a trifle. The decision of the Court is signed by all the arbitrators except Alexander Cockburn, who will give a separate judgment, agreeing with his colleagues only in relation to the Alabama, the award in which case constitutes the greater portion of the total sum.
