

The Geneva Arbitration.

The work of the arbitrators was happily closed on Saturday, when the arguments and award in the cases were made public. They have awarded a gross sum of \$15,500,000 gold, to be paid by Great Britain to the United States, in full for all claims by the United States for alleged depredations done by the cruisers during the war.

SOUTH GREENVILLE ELECTION.—The scrutiny into the voters' lists in South Greenville, was on Saturday brought to an abrupt conclusion, the petitioner and respondent respectively agreeing to withdraw from the contest, preferring to pay their own costs so far incurred, and to try once more the fortune of war, to continuing a struggle vote by vote with uncertain results and at a heavy expenditure to both.

AS AN illustration of the advantage of railway communication it is mentioned that from the township of Uxbridge and immediate neighborhood about 17000 cords were sold at an advance of \$2 per cord on the price previously obtainable. Here is \$34,000 realized on a single article at one station of the Nipissing railway during one year. This fact is worth a dozen arguments to show how railways benefit the country.

In Marquette, Mr. Cunningham, editor of the Manitoba, M. Norquay, M. Vertand and Dr. Lynch were nominated; the latter as a Reformer.

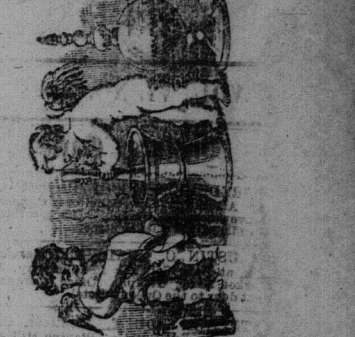

Excessive Legislation. "The world is governed too much," was a fundamental doctrine in the politics of Thomas Jefferson, the author of the Declaration of Independence, and the second President of the United States.

A few laws, plainly expressed and strictly enforced, are all that are required. But our statute books are swelled by unnecessary and mischievous enactments.

Over forty thousand new misdemeanors have been created in Great Britain during the reign of Queen Victoria. A distinguished member of Parliament, Mr. Vernon Harcourt, in calling the attention of Parliament to this fact, remarked that they must make a stand against legislation which "in the name of liberty put every one in prison, and in the name of humanity treated every one with cruelty."

A great many laws are enacted making penal certain acts which were already prohibited by previously existing statutes, of which the legislators happen to be ignorant.

An amusing debate sprang up in British Parliament on an act for the protection of wild birds. The Earl of Kimberley thought that swallows, which had been omitted, should be included in the bill. Lord Cairns protested against unnecessary legislation, and said he did not believe there was any wholesale destruction of swallows.

The Corporation of the County of Wellington.

BY-LAW No. 1. A By-Law to provide for the Erection of a Registry Office for the North Riding of the County of Wellington, the Repair of the Registry Office in Guelph, and to assist in making certain Roads and Bridges in the said County, and for issuing Debentures to the amount of \$30,000 for these purposes.

WHEREAS it is necessary to provide for the erection of a Registry Office for the North Riding of the County of Wellington, which Riding has been set apart for Registry purposes, and it is also necessary to provide for the repair and improvement of the County Registry Office in the Town of Guelph.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to grant by way of a grant of money, payable as hereinafter mentioned, to the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph hereinafter mentioned towards opening and making the new Roads and Bridges hereinafter mentioned in the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph in the said County hereinafter mentioned, and to grant the same hereinafter mentioned to assist in making and maintaining the Township and County lines hereinafter mentioned; the Council of the Corporation of the County of Wellington deeming the County at large sufficiently interested in the said work to justify such assistance, but not sufficiently interested to justify the Council in at once assuming the same as County Works, namely:

- To the Township of Maryborough towards making the road known as the centre side road in that Township \$600
To the Township of Minto towards making the road known as the road between the eighth and ninth concessions in that township \$800
To the Township of West Garafraxa towards making the road between the third and fourth concessions in that township \$200
To the Township of Pilkington towards making a bridge across the Grand River at the fifth and sixth concessions \$400
To the Township of Minto towards making the road known as the Minto and Normandy town line \$900, on condition that the County of Guelph grant an equal amount \$300
To the Township of Luther towards making bridges over rivers and streams crossing the road known as the side road between lots thirty and thirty-one in that township \$600
The Village of Elora towards making the road in that village connecting the County roads \$200
To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the road known as the extension of the Ferguson and Douglas County Road to Waldemar Railway Station \$500
To the Township of Arthur towards making the road known as the Centre side road in that township \$500
To the Township of West Garafraxa towards making a bridge over the making the road known as the second and third concessions of that township \$500
To the Village of Mount Forest towards making the road known as the town line east of Main street, and the bridge over the river Millard \$800
To the Township of Guelph towards making a bridge over the river Speed, on Wellington street, by Mr. Gow's mill in Guelph town \$500
To the Village of Orangeville towards making a bridge over the river Credit in that village \$200
To the Township of Erin towards making the road from Brisbane to Erin village \$400
To the Village of Arthur, towards making a road between the village of Arthur, township of Arthur and Luther, to Arthur railway station \$200
To the Township of Peel towards making the road known as the centre side road in Peel from Arthur village to Gleanallan \$1000
To the Township of Amaranth towards making the road known as the township of Amaranth towards making the road known as the township from Rockwood to the town line of Guelph \$200
To the Township of Maryborough towards making a bridge over the Spring Creek on the road known as the Kilgour's road in that township \$400
To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the road between the fourteenth and fifteenth concessions of that township \$500
To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the town line road between the townships of Amaranth and Luther and East Garafraxa \$400
To the Township of Arthur towards making the town line road between the townships of Peel, Maryborough and Arthur \$300
To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the town line road between the townships of East Garafraxa and Erin \$200
To the Township of Peel towards making the townline road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough from Drayton to Drayton station \$100
To the Township of Maryborough towards making the townline road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough at the hill at the fourteenth concession \$100
To the Township of Luther towards making the townline road between the townships of Arthur and Luther \$400
And whereas it is necessary to rebuild bridges at Arthur: at the Four Mile Creek and across the Irvine River on the road assumed by and belonging to the said County, known as the Guelph and Mount Forest Road, and the sum of four thousand two hundred dollars is required to rebuild the said bridges.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the said County of Wellington, irrespective of any future increase of the same, and irrespective of any interest in or income from the said office, and the said County Roads and Bridges, and also irrespective of any interest to arise from any temporary investments of the sinking fund hereinafter mentioned, of any part thereof, was according to the last revised and equalized assessment rolls of the said County of Wellington, \$13,396,238.

AND WHEREAS there is no interest in or rear. And whereas the Corporation of the County of Wellington hath not in the municipal year contracted any debts of moneys over and above the sum required for its ordinary expenditure which, including the said sum of twenty thousand dollars, exceed twenty thousand dollars.

AND WHEREAS a copy of this by-law hath been duly published according to law, Therefore the Corporation of the County of Wellington, in pursuance of the powers in it in that behalf vested, and by the Council thereof enacted as follows: That the Warden of the said County for the time being, be, and he hereby authorized, empowered, and required to do all and singular the premises hereinbefore mentioned, and to cause the same to be done, and to sign by the Warden, and countersigned by the Treasurer for the time being of the said County, and shall have authority to do all and singular the premises hereinbefore mentioned, and to cause the same to be done, and to sign by the Warden, and countersigned by the Treasurer for the time being of the said County, and shall have authority to do all and singular the premises hereinbefore mentioned, and to cause the same to be done, and to sign by the Warden, and countersigned by the Treasurer for the time being of the said County.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of said debentures and interest, an equal special rate of one-fourth of a mill in the dollar in addition to other rates be levied, levied, and collected in each year upon all rateable property in the said county during the continuance of the said debentures.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, the proceeds of the said debentures shall be applied and apportioned to the several purposes hereinbefore mentioned, and in the amounts and proportion aforesaid, the grants of the said local municipalities to be paid to the Treasurers thereof respectively, to be applied by them strictly to the purposes aforesaid, and an account of such application to be returned by each Reeve to the Council of the said County, at the next December Session of this Council.

No person lending money upon or purchasing said Debentures shall be bound to see to the application of the proceeds thereof.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, this By-law shall take effect upon, from and after the first day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two.

The above is a true copy of a proposed By-law to be taken into consideration by the Municipality of the County of Wellington, at the Court House, in the Town of Guelph, in the said County, on the first day of October, 1872, at the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon, at which time and place the members of the Council are hereby required to attend for the purpose aforesaid.
