The trial of Frank Nicholas for the murder of Tom Netes was continued in the Assize court yesterday. Mr. Justice Walker presiding.

S. Perry Mills, K.C., addressed the jury on behalf of the prisoner. He read authorities showing cases analogous to that of Nicholas.

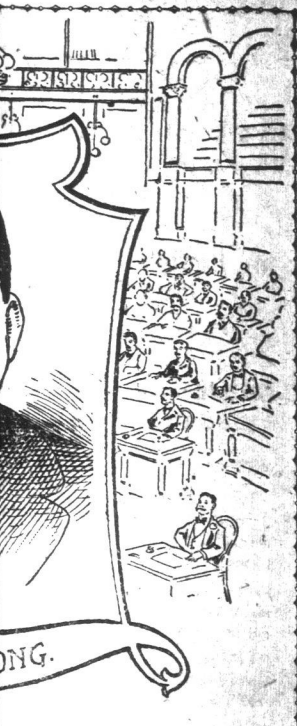
