ONDON, Nov. 23.—Tremendous activity in political circles today, consequent on the circulation of a well-founded report that Premier Balfour had decided to bring his ministry to a close and to directly or indirectly appeal to the country. Rumors regarding the resignation of the cabinet and the dissolution of parliament have been thick for three months past, but when two of the leading government organs today almost in the same terms "suggested" the immediate resignation of the premier on account of the unmendable breeches in the Unionist party over the fiscal question, the "suggestion" mas looked upon as having been inspired Mr. Balfour himself. This was strengthened by the knewledge that for the publication of the editorials Mr. Balfour met certain influential persons at his official residence in Downing street. These two facts, when coupled, led to the belief that the premier had intimated at the conference

His Intention to Resign and as he had just returned from visiting King Edward at Windsor Castle, it was believed that His Majesty had been informed of Mr. Balfour's intentions, Beyond this, however, there is not the slightest official confirmation of the re-

The Associated Press understands that forces have been at work inside the party for some time to bring about the present situation. One prominent Unionist recently wrote to the premier asking whether it would be considered disloyal if he introduced early in the next session a resolution bringing the whole fiscal question squarely before the house. He told the premier that the Unionists got tired of being twitted concerning their attitude on the fiscal question in the last term of parliament, where they repeatedly declined to take part in the debates or divisions in deterence to the wishes of edly declined to take part in the debates or divisions in deference to the wishes of Mr. Balfour. The premier's reply was not given out, but the Associated Press understands that in any event the Unionists intended to push such a resolution, when they believed it would mean the defeat of the government.

The Liberals are inclined to resent Mr. Balfour's resignation at the present moment. The Liberals see no reason why the present opposition should put themselves to the inconvenience of forming a government in the dark without knowing what forces they will command in the new parliament and they object to what they designate as Mr. Balfour's tactical manoeuvre whereby the Liberal attack would be turned into a defence before election and Mr. Balfour would be given a free hand to arrange with Mr. Chamberlain for concerted action against the Liberal party.



Federal Board of Enquiry Held Initial Meeting at Board of Trade Yesterday.

Representatives of Island and **Mainland Cannery Operators** Give Evidence.

Vast Amount of Valuable Information Respecting the Salmon Industry.

THE fisheries commission began its sittings here yesterday morning at the board of trade rooms, with Professor Prince presiding and all the members here. Prof. Prince announced the scope of the commission's work. He said there had been other commissions, but none with so large a field of work. Not only was it to inquire regarding the salmon industry in all its details, the international bearing, but also the development of the deep sea and coastal fisheries of British Columbia in every particular. All available information is sought to guide the commission to make wise and useful conclusions. Before taking evidence he read the order-in-council of July 22, authorizing the commission, which points out the necessity of investigating the Canadian fisheries of the Pacific coast. Representations had been made to the government for a commission, which was specially urgent in view of the crisis which had been reached because of the one-sided arrangement which had existed for some years in the contiguous waters of British Columbia and Puget Sound. 




