Why Col Stewart Left Kharfoum. London, Feb. 13.—The conservative papers charge the government with suppressing Gen Gordon's diary and letters in which that officer stated that he sent Col. Stewart away from Khartoum in order to save his (Stewart's) life, intending himself to meet death at Khartoum, as he knew no help could reach there in time to rescue him. When parliament assembles the production of all despatches to the government in regard to the Soudan campaign will be demanded.

How the Stores Were Transported. Messrs. Cook & Son, the excursion firm, were entrusted with the transportation of Wolseley's stores. The instructions received from the government were to pre-pare for about 6000 men, with 6000 to 8000 tous of stores, which they were to carry from Assiont to Wady Halfa. They were also to take up about 400 special rowboats. The admiralty calculated that 12,000 tons fict they had actually conveyed about 11,000 English and 7000 Egyptian troops, and 49 000 tons of stores, and had con-sumed nearly 24,000 tons of coal. 




