# OUR ANNEXATIONISTS AT BAY

## The Mail and Globe, in a Corner, Turn on The World.

### THE REASON OF THEIR MALICE.

#### Trying Their Best to Drift This Country into Civil War.

#### WILL THEY BE ALLOWED TO DO IT?

##### Canadians and the Descendants of the U. E. Loyalists Will Not Consent to Being Made Citizens of the U. S. Without Strife—The Dishonorable Practices of these Annexationist Advocates—Bunting and Cameron Annexationists Boast their Heads are Bore Over Political Disappointments.

The people of this country are Canadians and British subjects. Their loyalty is to Canada first and to the empire of which they form a part.

The people to the south of us are citizens of the United States, and not British subjects. Many of them are pronouncedly anti-Canadian and anti-British. When you take the oath of allegiance to the government of the United States you especially renounce all allegiance to the Queen and government of Great Britain.

There is a movement afoot, as all men know, to make of us Canadian subjects of the United States. This movement is called by some Commercial Union, by others Unrestricted Reciprocity, by others by its plain and unadorned term, Annexation.

Of all the people resident in the United States who favor this movement, Ben Wiman is the only one of any account who believes in C. U. Ben Batcherworth came over here with 'Tas to talk up C. U. as something different from Annexation, but he has now a bill before Congress for the purchase of our Canadian from Great Britain at so much a head. Senator Sherman and all the leading men and all the leading papers of the United States know that Annexation means, think it is a good thing and are ready to admit us any day. To annex Canada is the ambition of all the statesmen of the United States. Wiman himself is an Annexationist and nothing other. He may try to humbug you and me into the belief that he is something else, but his speeches, the company he keeps and the methods he employs stamp him as a straight Annexationist.

There is only one kind of this cattle in the United States and they are all Annexationists.

But in Canada they profess to be of a different breed. They claim to be friends of Commercial Union, advocates of Unrestricted Reciprocity, and a few who are honest enough to avow themselves as Annexationists. But these open secret Canadian Annexationists are hand and glove with the Annexationists of the United States. They get their inspiration and their hope from across the border. They are not satisfied with Canada as it is; they are always complaining; they want to be making more money; they would sacrifice anything and everything for '42 on a hog and 60 on a turkey; they continually vilify Great Britain, either openly or by implication; they take the side of the Provisionals as against the Federal power; they say that geography and history are against our remaining a separate nationality, that our doom is sealed, that some morning we shall wake up and find ourselves in the American Republic and things will run on just as before, only more smoothly, more harmoniously, that we shall all suddenly become richer and happier by reason of free access to the market of 60 millions.

First, my political delusion! No such mighty change can be effected without strife. There has been strife twice before on the same score, and as sure as there is a God of Nations and a God of Battles there will be strife again whenever it is attempted to be put in practice. You are not going to change a loyal British Canadian into a citizen of the United States and ask him to renounce his British citizenship without a struggle!

Why, either civil or foreign, does not come about delicately as the lion springs on the prey, but nations and parts of nations come into open hostilities by a system of drifting. Strife over the annexation of Canada to the United States will not come on any fixed day but will gradually develop and we shall hardly know of it till the fighting begins some quarter least expected. The great civil war that devastated the United States a quarter of a century ago came from a comparatively small matter and the first gun was a surprise, but the results were terrible, appalling, disastrous to millions of lives and billions of dollars.

So it will be here. As sure as Annexation is forced, openly or covertly, strife will come. And these who live through that time of strife will come out of it ruined and shivered men. To live through one such war means the lifetime of those who see it.

Do you, young man, who are just entering on your future, wish to pass through such a civil struggle, to have your home ruined, your prospects shattered?

Do you, business men, think you can come out of such a struggle retaining your business, your customers, the money you had saved?

Do you, farmers, think you can come through such a struggle without your farms lying like your cattle being destroyed and carried off, your barns burnt to the ground?

Do you, women of Canada, think your fathers, husbands and sons will come back to you from such a struggle?

Do you, citizens of Toronto, think you will come through such a struggle with your houses, your lands, your investments intact? Beggary will assail you and want attend you!

Go to the Southern States and study the results of civil war there if you have any doubt about the matter.

No, there will be strife and blood before there will be Annexation, and as we said whoever comes through such a struggle comes out of it ruined and hopeless citizen.

Think for a moment what stuff Canadians are made, recall the history of the U. E. Loyalists, of the events of the war of 1812-15, and the attempted Fenian invasions, and say if you honestly think Canadians will allow themselves to be forced to become citizens of the United States. No, there will be bloodshed, there will be strife.

And this moment is this strife beginning. It does not begin on the field of battle; the struggle first shows itself in the press, on the platform, in the legislature, in street rows, in fights, in civil war and blazing buildings. Already has the strife got into the press and on the platform.

Of the Canadian papers, the two great Annexationist organs are The Mail and Globe. The Mail is openly Annexationist, The Globe dishonestly pretends not to be an Annexationist because it is doing the work of the Annexationists to the south of us. They are backing up The Globe. For such men and papers as The Globe were written the remarkable article that we transfer to our columns this morning from The New York Tribune. The president of The Globe Co. and the managing editor of The Globe are Annexationists. The latter is the weak vessel fashioned by David Mills, for years an open advocate of the Americanization of Canada! In troublous times, or when danger threatens, men do not split hairs nor make fine distinctions. Men are not judged by "saving clauses" but by the drift of their writings and the company they keep.

Opposed to these two Annexationist journals, The Globe and The Mail, has been The World. It fought them single-handed when the movement was first started and it has fought them up to the present. So far it has carried on the war with vigor and success. We have frequently followed these Annexationists and exposed them in their own light before the Canadian people. So successful have we been that they stand today as discredited Canadian journals. They have lost their business and The World has gained it. They have become despised and rejected of Canadians for good reason.

At last this fact is coming home to them in no agreeable fashion. Once aware of their disgrace, and that their treachery to this country has been discovered, they turn on the paper that has driven them into the corner, where they stand shivering like rats in a trap.

They see The World doing the business that they once got and they turn on "the little paper" that they once despised and ignored, and on the same day treat this paper to a thrash for libel, and the other pours out a measure of personal abuse because this paper published, as an item of news, a statement furnished by men on the staff of both papers, that these two Annexationist journals were about to amalgamate.

Which is the beginning of the strife in the press. Like, strife will rapidly break out on the platform and in the halls of legislation unless the men in their own way work out an effectual stopper on these Annexationist advocates. Already they feel the heavy hand on their quaking backs. The business men of Toronto see the danger that these men are trying to rush them into, and they have said "Stop, stop!" or at least, "You shall not gallop at that pace at my cost and my destruction."

A crisis has approached for these Annexationist papers, and they know it. But they

may be mad enough to rush still further into the pit that stands ready to lose them in its depths. No, Messrs. Bunting and Kildon, Messrs. Cameron and Jeffrey, you must take the consequences of your conduct. You may hate one another as the Devil hates Holy Water—and it is evident you do, or else amalgamation between men in the same trade, stock and must stand and fall together. The "little paper" you have pretended to ignore, that one of you at least has been bold enough to call close, will take you both together and force you to mend your ways or leave this town. You have turned traitor on everything Canadian. You, Bunting, have been caught red-handed in a plot to overturn one Government in Toronto, and you did your best to destroy another Government at Ottawa. Failing in this you went to Washington and tried to make a deal to sell Canada to the United States, and you are engaged in this nefarious business to-day.

Both of you, Bunting and Kildon, are Provisionalists. One of you was a barefaced Rielite, the other an anti-French Canadian, both in the hope of creating racial strife. You encourage discontent in every province at every opportunity. You, both of you, hate the idea of Canada becoming a manufacturing country, and you antagonize the idea of Protection to Canadian industries, though Protection is the great principle underlying the American system of to-day. And yet do you, Bunting, recall that four years ago you were one of the biggest protectionists for Protection in this land. And, you of the Globe, do you recall that you were one of the most ardent Free Traders, and striving to make up part of the most Protectionist nation on the earth.

You are Provisionals, you are Annexationists, you are Anti-British, you are anti-Canadian, and yet this country has raised all of you without exception from indigence to you to wealth, to you to easy circumstances. Why, then, do you denounce the country that has done so much for you, and why have you turned traitor on this Canada of ours?

Disappointed political expectations affect two of you, disappointment that your hundreds of thousands may not become millions affects you other two. You would be political bosses and you would be millionaires, and you are neither. A newspaper director and manager you are about to learn that no journalist can pursue the policy that you are now pursuing without amplification.

RELIGIOUS FAVOR A PROGRESSIVE COLONIAL POLICY.

Religious Favor A Progressive Colonial Policy. The attitude of the Russian and German press does not improve. The Hamburg Correspondent's article of Thursday on Thursday's editorial in the 'Patriot' and Russia was issued by a semi-official telegraphic agency and may accordingly be accepted as authentic. The correspondent's strong feeling is displayed, the article has produced much effect either on the Bosphorus or the Danube. The fact that the semi-official writer has threatened to publish the Austro-Russian treaty of 1878 and 1877 has not only alarmed the public mind, but has also caused the North German Gazette, referring to the article, to express the hope that the Russian newspaper war will not be renewed, and intimates that if it is the Russian Pan-Slavic press will be left to sew in its own ruin, while the 'Lightning' drives the public mind to alarm in the journalistic war, but to wait until the Reichsanzeiger publishes the treaties.
